It is with great sorrow that I inform everyone that our loyal SBMS member of the last approximately 10 years, Bill Sherman, has passed away as of August 31. His passing was announced to us by his wife, Vickie. While I am sorry to say I cannot recall any particular ship models that he built, I do recall his encyclopedic memory of his experiences in the Air Force which he enjoyed sharing with all of us during our monthly meetings. It was a real treat to hear about his expertise on military matters gained over his early career, and he obviously enjoyed

the many club members with similar interests and conversing with experiences.

Bill was born in 1942 in White Plains, New York, just north of New York City. (Mark Zuckerberg, co-founder of Facebook and Meta was also born much later in the same town). Unfortunately, his mother died when Bill was only 2 leaving behind Bill, his father and four brothers. After Bill's father remarried, the family moved to San Francisco where he attended the Town School for Boys. Then, he attended the Lycée Carnot in the South of France during a family year abroad, and followed by the Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts. After high school, he went to Princeton University where he was in ROTC and earned a B.A. in Romance Languages and Literature.

Upon graduation, Bill was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the US Air Force and served in Peoria, IL and the Panama Canal Zone rising to the rank of Captain. After he left the Air Force, he and his own new family returned to the Bay Area where he attained a combined M.B.A./J.D. from UC Berkeley. Then, he joined the law firm of Pillsbury, Madison & Sutro in San Francisco and was made partner in 1979.

In the 1980s, Bill and his family moved to the Peninsula where he joined the law firm of Morrison & Foerster (MoFo) and helped establish their Palo Alto office. He specialized in IPOs for technology companies including Intel, Tandem, and Compag and developed a reputation as a maverick in his field. Bill was listed in "America's Best Lawyers" for over 10 years, taught at the Haas School of Business, and retired in 2015 as a senior partner at MoFo. Bill then joined the SBMS to add to his many retirement activities including trips to the Sierras. He is survived by his wife, Vickie, four children and six grandchildren. Vickie most generously made a \$500 donation to the SBMS to help with expenses. Thank you to Vickie and the rest of the Sherman family, and fair winds and following seas to Bill!

## •The Thomson Ship Model Collection at the Art Gallery of Ontario (AGO), Canada. (Ken Lum). I went

to Toronto, Canada in mid-November to attend a meeting of the Antique Telescope Society and visit the 1930s vintage David Dunlap Observatory located there. But less well known is the fact that Toronto is also home to an outstanding ship model collection at the **Art Gallery of Ontario (AGO)**. The collection was the result of the acquisition efforts of British/Canadian businessman, **Kenneth Roy Thomson, 2nd Baron Thomson of Fleet (1923-2006)** (Fig. 4). Baron Thomson inherited from his father, **Roy Thomson, 1**st **Baron Thomson of Fleet,** and managed a media empire, the **Thomson Corporation,** that included many Canadian, British, and American publications. At the time of his passing in 2006, he was listed by **Forbes** as the richest person in Canada and the ninth richest person in the world, with a net worth of approximately US \$19.6 billion in 2006 dollars.

Baron Thomson began collecting art in the 1940s which ultimately included thousands of mostly paintings including works by Canadian-American artist, **Cornelius Krieghoff** (1815-1872) and the 1610 masterpiece, **The Massacre of the Innocents** by **Peter Paul Rubens**.

In addition to traditional artistic items, there includes some 69 ship models of exquisite quality including eight Navy Board Admiralty models, thirteen Prisoner-of-War models and five miniatures by the famed ship model miniaturist, Donald McNarry. They are all exhibited in the AGO in Toronto (Fig. 5). The

oldest Admiralty model dates from 1692 (Fig. 6) and the rest of the collection represent ships dating up to WW2. Below are representative examples of the models exhibited. (Fig. 6-12)




Fig. 8. British sixth-rate 20-24 gun warship. Nightingale. c. 1702. (Wikimedia Commons, AGO)

•A New Model Pilot Boat Phantom in 1/48. For many years, the ship kit company, Model Shipways, offered a 1/96 scale kit of a New York pilot boat named the *Phantom*, 1868. This model was offered as a beginner's kit with a solid wood hull. But Model Expo, in Florida, which has been the main distributor of Model Shipway kits, has now released an upgraded 1/48 scale plank-on-bulkhead version (Fig. 14 and 15). Twice as large for more credible detailing including new photo-etched parts. And still looks suitable for beginners! Currently on sale from Model Expo for \$149.99:
