


Fig. 4. Ken Lum's English Carronade model entered at the June 15, 2024 IPMS Silicon Valley Classic convention.

## Marítime Matters of the Month (Ken Lum)

• Liberty Ship, Jeremiah O' Brien in Financial Difficulty and in Need of Donations. It has been recently reported that our beloved Liberty ship, the Jeremiah O' Brien (JOB), now located at Pier 35 in San Francisco, is seriously short of money for maintenance and operations.

This has resulted from the destruction by fire of its old Pier 45 in 2020 followed by its move to Pier 35 after the fire where it was less noticeable by tourists despite luckily receiving no significant damage from the pier fire. And then the COVID-19 pandemic hit, closing down the ship to visitors for several years. All this caused the ship's tourist revenue to take a big hit.

It is said that the *Jeremiah O' Brien* is one of the few of this vintage to be fully operational and able to provide local cruises around the Bay for paying passengers. Cruises will also be available for the upcoming **Fleet Week** as it has done during normal years. Indeed, the JOB was able to steam under its own power to Normandy, France in 1994 to participate in the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Commemoration of the D-Day Landings which it originally participated in in 1944. Current tourist visits have not yet recovered past 1/3 the number of prior years.

There are three commonly available commercial model kits of the JOB. Two plastic kits by **Trumpeter** are in 1/700 and 1/350 scale (fig. 7).

And, then, there is an excellent wood kit in 1/192 (1/16" = 1 ft) scale from **Bluejacket**, available from **Ages of Sail** in San Lorenzo (Fig. 8).




Fig. 17. Model railroad barge.




Fig. 24. Close up of George Sloup's Russian tender, *Avos*. The ships' cannon are now installed.




Fig. 25. A *Lady Nelson* kit from Amati by Clare Hess at the beginning of its construction. Balsa wood blocks provide stability for the hull formers. Clare is considering a conversion to the armed cutter, *HMS Sherbourne*.
