

NOTES from the BOARD

The theme for the month of June is Blessings. That made me wonder how the concept of blessings fits in a Unitarian Church. What do we bless with and where do we bless from when we bless another? Why bless at all? I discovered



some of the answers in our values. mission ends. these describe we as а

congregation now and where we are heading.

Our values of wonder and connection are entwined with the idea of blessings. When we stop and look around and notice the wonder in nature, in the people we meet, and the richness of our lives we become aware of how we are blessed in so many ways. We can feel beloved of the Spirit at the heart of life. Taking time to do this every day is a wonderful spiritual practice and allows us to experience life as generous, not threatening. When we feel the overflow of gracefilled surprises, we have no trouble passing those blessings on to others. We become a blessing!

Blessings don't just enrich us, they connect us. If we consciously bless another person, we first gather ourselves - reaching below the surface mind and personality, down to a deeper source within us - the soul. Blessings from soul to soul are a connection at a deep spiritual level. Whenever one person takes another into the

care of their heart, they have the power to bless. It is the offering of a beautiful gift. When we bless another we do not fix anything, or instill health or well-being or strength, for those things are already there within all of us. A blessing is a moment of meeting, in which both people remember and acknowledge their true worth and strengthen what is whole in one another. And don't forget, we can bless ourselves.

When I started exploring the topic of blessings, I did not expect to find a connection to almost all of our ends, but there they are. Being mindful of the blessings in our lives is a deeply meaningful spiritual practice. It embraces the holy in ourselves and all that surrounds us. It can help us build relationships across differences and allows us to receive and provide support and spiritual care. It supports our community with a kind of generosity and abundance. And if we do it together this month we are creating a shared experience of beauty, truth and meaning.

Perhaps we'll all look for blessings this month - a group project! Imagine the power in that. Let's not forget the beauty of a garden, the joy of a single step. There is value in the small as well as the great... As Kent Nerburn asks, "Do we really need much more than this? To honor the dawn. To visit a garden. To talk to a friend. To contemplate a cloud. To cherish a meal. To bow our heads before the mystery of the day. Are these not enough?"

As we enter this summer season of anticipated and hoped-for relaxation and more flexible schedules, it seems that the theme of blessing, of "What does it mean to be a people of blessing?", is quite timely. Blessing is a two-sided term. For UUs, blessings are not something we give to each other as much as they involve us helping each other notice all that's already been given to us. Pointing to blessings repairs our relationship with life, allowing us to see it as generous, not threatening, full of grace-filled surprises rather than dominated by a cold indifference.

At the same time we are called to consider "How are the blessings in your life leading you to bless others?" In other words, blessings don't just enrich us; they connect us. And maybe that is the greatest blessing of all.

Throughout this summer, I suggest you use your hand as an accessible symbol of blessing, whether for yourself, individually, or together with those you love,

- Look at your hand, and first consider your thumb as a blessing for your family and the earth, all the things that are closest to you.
- Then see your pointer finger, as a blessing for all those who help point you in the right direction, such as teachers, colleagues, church family, friends, doctors, nurses, neighbors, mentors...)
 Your index finger, the tallest finger, represents

your appreciation for those who lead and guide

you, that you may be blessed with wisdom and justness.

• The ring finger symbolizes the many blessings vital to those in need who are experiencing trouble and pain, hunger and homelessness, war and loss.

• Your pinkie finger stands as a blessing for yourself, that you may continue to learn and grow into the best person you can be to serve this beautiful and broken world with confidence and affirmation.

And if you really want to challenge yourself in this month of Blessing, try finding 100 blessings in your day, which comes from a Jewish traditional goal. When you try it, you discover that it's quite difficult to find one hundred things each day for which to be thankful. So difficult, in fact, that you spend most of our time looking.

Wishing you many blessings through the summer, whether you participate in worship services and the RE Summer Fun programming, or engage in other activities important to your personal and family values.

Please know that you are blessings to me and this congregation beyond your imagination. Such is the wonder of blessings and love.
