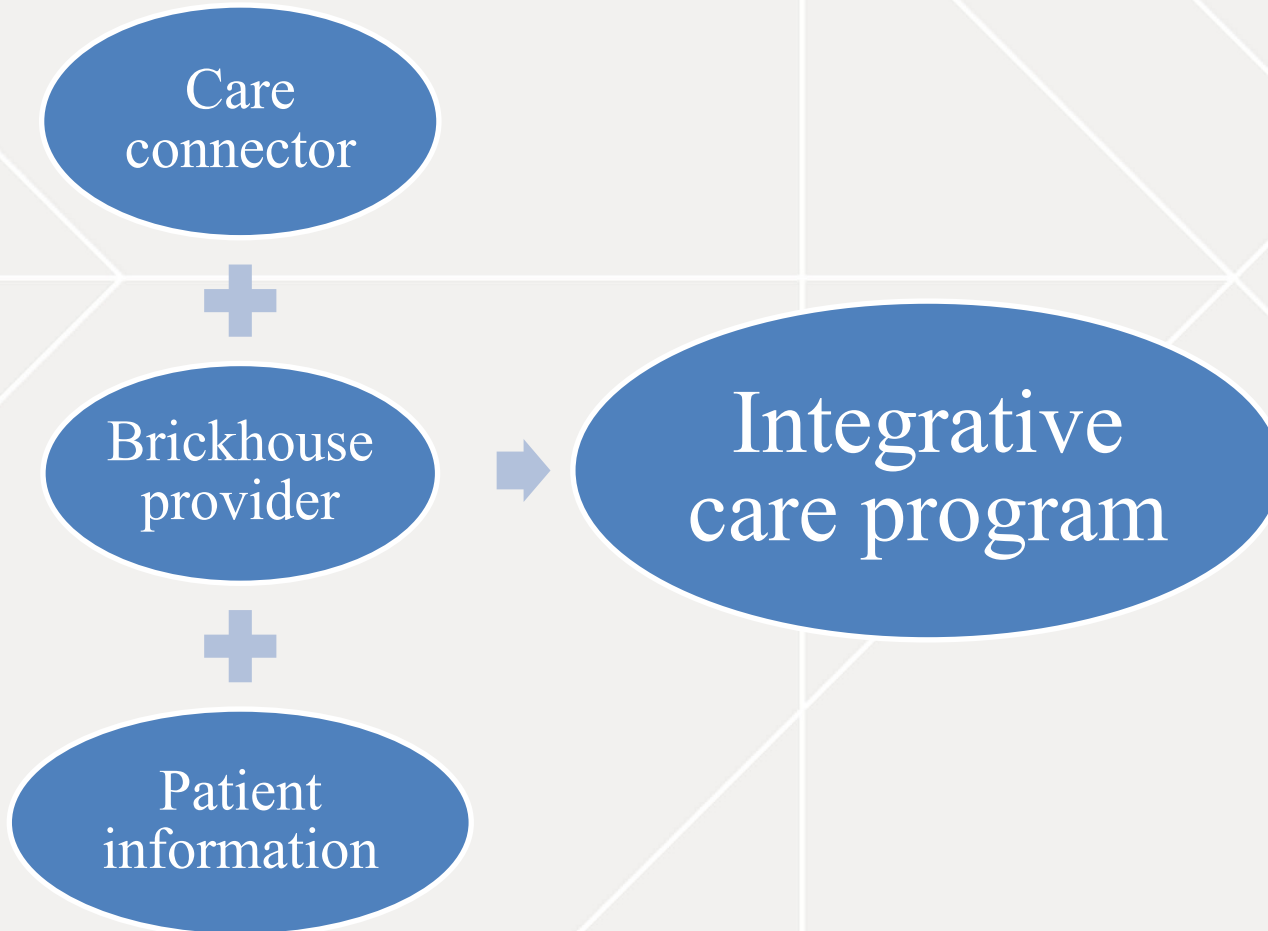

“Make a commitment to serve the needs of the ‘least of these’ and give voice to the voiceless.”

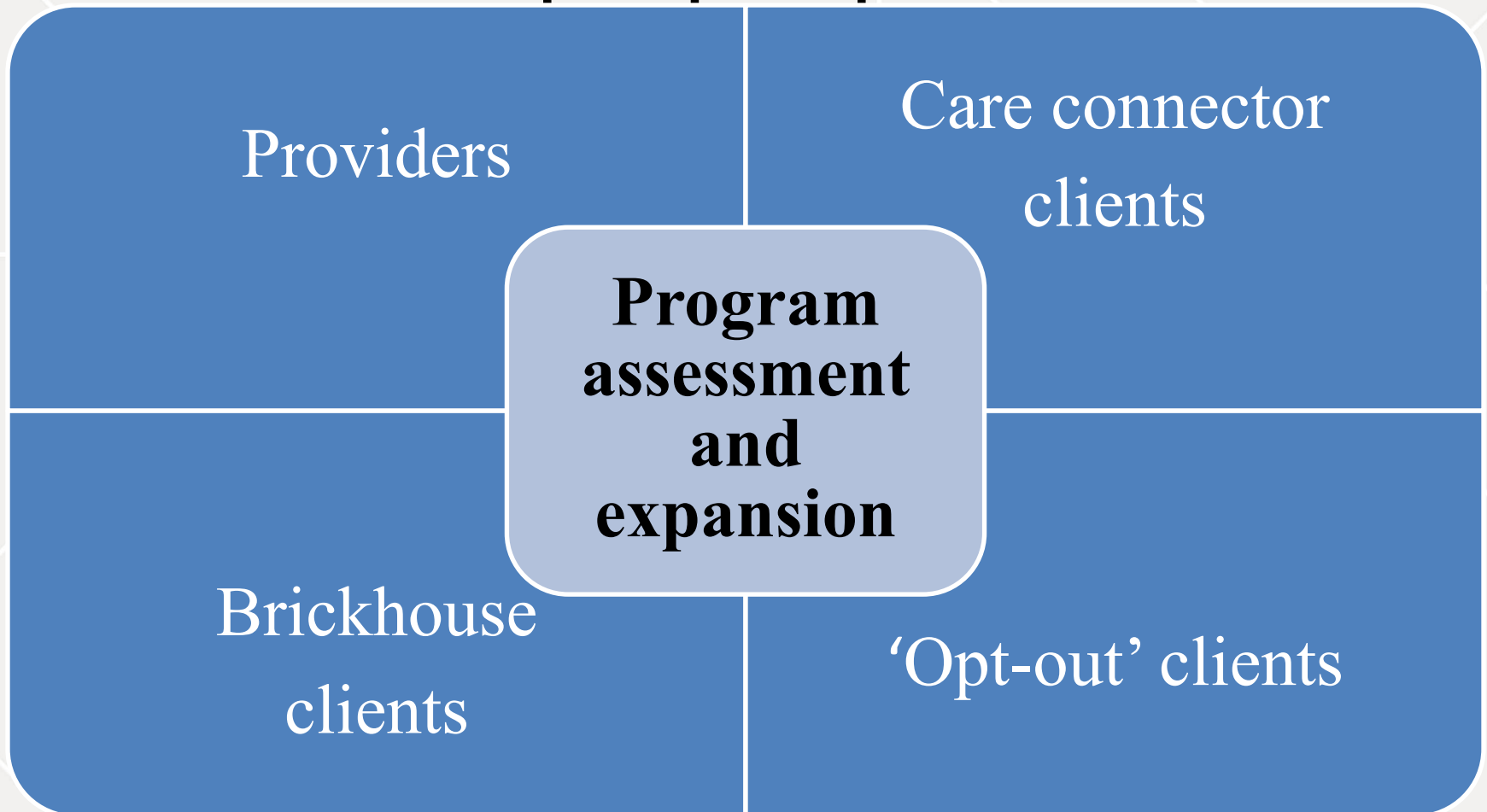
