### **Reflection for the Fourth Sunday of Lent**

John's gospel passage recounting Jesus healing the blind man is a favorite narrative of mine, in part because I am a blind person and equally as important it demonstrates the compassion of Jesus and challenges attitudes and beliefs of that time particularly that God rewards good and punishes evil. So if you were poor, or disabled, your life was a punishment that was either blamed on you, your parents, (as in the case of the blind man), or your ancestors.

Yet, Jesus, as we see in so many of the gospel narratives challenges these conventions, to show that this man's blindness was not a consequence of sin or inherited evil. So in his infinite compassion for those who suffer, Jesus wanted to heal this man who was born blind and end the life long suffering his disability had caused him. The miracle itself is given even more significance with the beautiful words that Jesus said just before he healed the blind man. He said, "While I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

And as we see in so many of Jesus' healing events during his public life and ministry, the miracle itself is so ordinary, so every day, without any heavenly pyrotechnics. Jesus spat on the ground and smeared common clay on the man's eyes; and holy clay it was. The first light the blind man saw was through this intimate encounter with the divinity of Jesus Christ.

In this gospel, we see how this miracle affected not only the man who was cured, but also the community in which he lived.

This miraculous event got the attention of the entire community though it took a while for the townspeople to absorb and understand what had happened. The Pharisees never did. They threw the blind man out of the synagogue rather than listen to the truth of what really happened to him, and who it was that healed his blindness.

Here, Jesus shows his continued compassion in seeking out the blind man when the Pharisees banned him from the synagogue. He didn't have to do this. When Jesus found him and asked if the man who could now see believed in the Son of Man, having revealed himself as God's Incarnate, the light of faith was illumined and Jesus had a new disciple.

God has the power to turn trials into blessings. The blind man in this gospel received not just his sight, but a gift of healing, wholeness and peace. Fortunately, very few of us need physical sight but all of us in one way or another are in need of spiritual sight and insight. There are things that we should see that we are blind to.

We are blind to the many graces that God bestows on us every day. Maybe we can't see who Jesus is for us.

Maybe we are blind to where Jesus wants to lead us.

Maybe we are blind to the many ways Jesus wants to love us, and so all we focus on is our own shortcomings, our weaknesses, and so we do not feel worthy of God's love and mercy.

Maybe we are blind to the ideas and perspectives of others and so we criticize and discount what they are saying.

In this Lenten season, we have the opportunity of inviting and allowing Jesus to re-form our seeing, our desiring and our hoping. Sometimes we despair and say: "I don't have any hope. I don't see any way out of this."

Lent's answer to our dilemma, our hopelessness: Wash in the One sent by God to heal me. "I washed; I see; I hope; I desire." My eyes are opened; I am renewed and cleansed by the healing water of God's infinite love. Lord, that I may see myself as you see me, that I may continue to follow your light. Amen.
