The Liturgical Season of Advent (2020) by Arthur E. Zannoni

Advent is the liturgical season made up of the four weeks that precede Christmas. It is a season of hope and longing, of joyful expectation and peaceful preparation.

What does the word "Advent" mean?

When capitalized, "Advent" usually refers to "the coming of Christ into the world" or to "the liturgical period preceding Christmas"; it may also refer to the "Second Coming" of Christ (the "Advent of our Lord"). The word "advent" is a Latin translation of the Greek noun *parousia* commonly used to refer to the Second Coming of Christ. In Latin, the noun *adventus* (meaning "arrival, approach") is made up of the preposition *ad-* ("to, towards"), the verbal root *ven-* (from the Latin *venire*, "to come"), and the suffix *-tus* (indicating verbal action). For Christians, the season of Advent anticipates the coming of Christ from three different perspectives: in the flesh in Bethlehem, in our hearts daily, and in glory at the end of time. The liturgical season offers the opportunity to share in the ancient longing for the Messiah's coming and to be alert for his Second Coming.

What are the traditional liturgical colors of Advent?

For most of the Season of Advent, the official liturgical color is violet, while some in the Christian family have favored using dark blue. Only on the Third Sunday of Advent is a rose (pink) colored candle lit on the Advent Wreath as a symbol of joy; the priest may also wear rose vestments this Sunday. Other church decorations (altar cloths, banners, etc.) will often have violet, pink, and blue colors throughout the season.

What are the liturgical readings for the Sundays of Advent?

Each of the four Sundays of Advent has its special readings and characteristics. This year (2020), we begin reading cycle B in the Lectionary. In this year's cycle, we read the Gospel of Mark.

The Gospel of Mark at a Glance

The Gospel of Mark is the first written Gospel and the shortest in length. The author, an unnamed Gentile Christian, possibly a disciple of Peter, composed his Gospel in koine Greek (simple rather than literary Greek). It was written around A.D.65 to 70. Its audience was Non-Jewish (Gentile) Christians, most likely living in Rome who were experiencing persecution, possibly during the time of Caesar Nero, because they believed in Jesus and not the gods of Rome.

The Chosen Gospel readings for the Sundays of Advent (2020)

First Sunday of Advent - The Gospel reading is an excerpt from the Apocalyptic Discourse of Jesus in one of the Synoptic Gospels. This year (2020), it is Mark 13:33-37.

Second Sunday of Advent - The Gospel reading focuses on the preaching and ministry of John the Baptist as the forerunner of Jesus, the one who came to "Prepare the Way of the Lord." This year (2020), it is Mark 1:1-8.

Third Sunday of Advent - The Gospel reading continues to focus on the ministry of John the Baptist. This year (2020), it is John 1:6-8,19-28.

Fourth Sunday of Advent - The Gospel reading narrates the annunciation to Mary by the angel Gabriel that she is to bear a son by the power of the Holy Spirit, and his name will be Jesus. This year (2020), it is Luke 1:26-38.

What is an Advent Wreath?

An Advent wreath is traditionally made of some type or mixture of evergreens (fir, spruce, juniper, holly, etc.), symbolizing the continuation of life in the middle of the cold and dark winter (in the northerly latitudes, at least). Advent wreaths traditionally include three purple/violet candles, and one pink/rose-colored candle arranged evenly around the wreath. Only one purple candle is lit during the first week, two in the second week, three (including the pink one) in the third week, and all four during the fourth week of Advent; the gradually increasing light symbolizes the approach of Christmas, the birth of Jesus, the light of the world. In many churches, a large wreath is blessed at the beginning of the first liturgy on Advent's first Sunday.

Advent Spirituality

As a liturgical season, Advent is a time of prayerful preparation for the continued coming of God into our lives. This preparation is done by reading Sacred Scripture, engaging in daily prayer, and reflecting on how we prepare the way for the Lord in our lives individually and as a community of faith. Each day of Advent, we are challenged to reflect on how God is always and continually arriving and not just on Christmas. O, come, O come, Emmanuel.
