

Holy Week and the Passion Stories of Jesus in the Gospels Arthur E. Zannoni

In Holy Week, the Gospel Passion stories are read twice. First, on Palm Sunday, this year (2025) the story from the Gospel of Luke (see Luke 22:14-23:56). And on Good Friday from the Gospel of John (see John 18:1-19:42).

The Passion stories are in all four Gospels. They contain a tragic four-act drama that rivets the reader on the main character, Jesus. Act one narrates Jesus at prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane. Act two describes Jesus on trial before Jewish religious authorities. Act three portrays Jesus before the Roman governor Pilate, while act four is the way of the cross, Jesus' crucifixion and death on the cross.

Many of us do not realize how terrible the crucifixion was. The following explanation provides both a background and explanation.

Crucifixion: An Explanation

As a form of capital punishment and execution, crucifixion was exceedingly cruel. It was used by a number of ancient peoples, not just the Romans. During the Roman Empire, crucifixion was the preferred way of executing rebels, slaves, and lower-class violent criminals. The Romans crucified many, both before and after Jesus, including thousands when the Romans put down the Jewish revolt of 66-70 C.E. Crucifixions were carried out in a variety of ways using different styles of crosses.

The common Roman procedure was to first scourge the one being crucified, to both increase suffering and weaken the person. Then the condemned person was forced to carry the horizontal cross beam to the place of execution, where an upright vertical beam would already be in place. Roman crucifixions were located at public sites, such as along a busy road or in a public square, in order to create a horrific public display and deter others from performing such crimes.

The one being crucified was stripped of clothing, and their arms were tied or nailed to the crossbeam. The horizontal cross beam was then lifted up and affixed to the vertical beam at a notch already cut into it. Sometimes the person's feet were tied or nailed to the upright beam. There was no supporting piece of wood under the feet. The Romans posted a sign indicating the crime for which the person was being crucified. Despite both their suffering and pain, those being crucified could survive for several days, but were tormented by pain, thirst, insects, and the shame of dying naked before others.

Death usually resulted from suffocation or asphyxiation when both the chest muscles and diaphragm muscle gave out. A body was sometimes left on a cross to decompose to be eaten by vultures, dogs, and rats. Crucifixion was designed to be as painful and degrading a death as possible. Romans used crucifixion with a two-fold purpose in mind to execute the criminal and as a warning of what would happen to those who challenged their authority.

Crucifixion was considered so ignominious that Cicero, a first century Roman statesman described crucifixion as "the most cruel and disgusting penalty." And Josephus a first century Jewish historian called it "The most wretched of deaths." Roman citizens were exempt from crucifixion except in rare cases. As Cicero stated: "...the very word cross should be far removed not only from the person of a Roman citizen but also from his thoughts, eyes, and ears."

For Reflection

Considering having read the above description of crucifixion, which character in the Passion story can I identify? Could I be like Peter who denied Jesus of Judas who betrayed him? Or could I be like some of the religious leaders who accused Jesus of blasphemy? Or could I be like Pontius Pilate washing my hands of Jesus or like Simon of Cyrene helping Jesus to carry the cross? Could I be like the Roman soldiers in charge of crucifying Jesus? Or could I be like the male disciples who abandoned Jesus, or sheepish about my commitment as a disciple like Joseph of Arimathea? Could I have been a bystander in the crowd? Or could I have been like Jesus' mother standing at the foot of the cross along with other women? While these questions might be shocking, at least to some of us, they do help us to better embrace the profoundly dramatic character of the Gospel Passion Stories.


