

NOBEL Women Resolution Supporting the Creation of Low-Income and Emergency Assistance Programs for Water and Wastewater Services

COMMITTEE: Health RESOLUTION:HEA-20-09

- 1. WHEREAS, clean water and reliable wastewater services are essential utilities to which
- 2. every person must have ready and affordable access; and
- 3. WHEREAS, the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and economic downturn have
- 4. highlighted affordability issues related to water and wastewater services. These
- 5. affordability issues disproportionately impact low-income households and communities
- 6. of color. For example, it has been estimated that low-income households spend an
- 7. average of 12.4% of their disposable income each month on water and sewer services.¹
- 8. African American job losses during the pandemic and economic downturn have greatly
- 9. outpaced other demographic groups. As of July 2020, the unemployment rate for African
- 10. Americans stood at 14.6%, further exacerbating longstanding and persistent Black
- 11. income and wealth gaps. As a result, these communities are most at risk of being unable
- 12. to pay for critical water and wastewater services; and
- 13. WHEREAS, the pandemic and economic downturn have impacted the finances of
- 14. municipal governments with local officials, on average, expecting a 13 percent decline in
- 15. general fund revenues² forcing many cities to severely cut services and layoff or furlough
- 16. employees; and
- 17. WHEREAS, state regulators and water service providers across the country have
- 18. deployed a range of solutions, including temporary moratoriums on utility service
- 19. disconnections, to ensure that every household continues to have access to essential water

- 20. and wastewater services during the pandemic; and
- 21. WHEREAS, these temporary solutions have benefited many and underscore the
- 22. importance of implementing permanent solutions to affordability issues. Long-term
- 23. moratoria on water and wastewater disconnections are unsustainable and unsuited for
- 24. addressing these challenges; and
- 25. WHEREAS, The National Organization of Black Elected Legislative Women (NOBEL
- 26. Women) passed RESOLUTION: ENE-17-02 which states, The National Organization of
- 27. Black Elected Legislative (NOBEL) Women reaffirms that clean, safe, reliable and
- 28. affordable water service is essential for our communities"³; and
- 29. WHEREAS, unlike for other utility services, there is a dearth of water and wastewater
- 30. affordability programs at the state and federal levels. Subsidies for electric and gas
- 31. service are available via the federal Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program
- 32. (LIHEAP); and
- 33. WHEREAS, The National Organization of Black Elected Legislative Women (NOBEL
- 34. Women) signed on with the National Energy and Utility Affordability Coalition (NEUAC) and its national coalition of more than 200 member organizations representing thousands of individuals, along with the hundreds of stakeholders on a letter to support LIHEA, to strongly urge Congress to defend and improve LIHEAP funding in FY21 and;
- 35. WHEREAS, The National Organization of Black Elected Legislative Women (NOBEL
- 36. Women) has recognized that "even though the number of households eligible for the
- 37. LIHEAP program continues to exceed those receiving assistance, this funding has been a
- 38. lifeline...helping to ensure that people do not have to choose between paying their energy
- 39. bills and paying for food or medicine;" and
- 40. WHEREAS, many low-income programs do not contemplate national crises with
- 41. widespread economic consequences including high unemployment, therefore excluding
- 42. countless families that find themselves in need of assistance; and
- 43. WHEREAS, there is growing support for creating a low-income and emergency customer

- 44. assistance program for water and wastewater services provided by either municipal or
- 45. privately-owned utilities as a permanent solution to affordability challenges facing
- 46. consumers of these services. The National Association of Regulatory Utility
- 47. Commissioners (NARUC) and the National Association of State Utility Consumer
- 48. Advocates (NASUCA), among other organizations, have adopted resolutions calling for
- 49. the creation of such a program;⁴ and
- 50. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, The National Organization of Black Elected
- 51. Legislative Women (NOBEL Women) supports the creation of a low-income and
- 52. emergency customer assistance program for water and wastewater services, provided by
- 53. either municipal or privately-owned utilities, at the federal and state levels to ensure that
- 54. all households, regardless of race or income, are able to better afford water and
- 55. wastewater services; and
- 56. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The National Organization of Black Elected
- 57. Legislative Women (NOBEL Women) supports the allotment of federal funds allocated
- 58. for COVID-19 as part of the CARES Act to be used for water and wastewater customer
- 59. assistance programs; and
- 60. **BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, that copies of this Resolution be dispatched to the
- 61. President of the United States, the Vice President of the United States, Members of
- 62. Congress, House and Senate Leadership, and other elected officials as appropriate.
