

Dear Friends in Christ,

Most of us have highs and lows in our life (on a daily basis). Things go well, we are in a good state of health, doing our work, enjoying our families, and whatever recreation brings us joy. We meet up with friends and have a coffee or soda (or something stronger on occasions) with our colleagues or perhaps a neighbor and never question that in a matter of seconds the tides of life may shift, and our life could be so very different. Usually, the ups and downs even themselves out fairly quickly and life is back to normal...to "same old; same old."

Hopefully, during these days of Lent we have allowed ourselves to dig deeper into our highs and lows to experience the reality that if we are at the peek or in the valley, our Lord is right there with us. And because he is right there, he gives us the strength to not get stuck in the dark places; but rather, he gives us purpose and hope to see beyond the sense of betrayal, hurt, sadness, and anything that would keep us from vindictive, unloving, and less-than-Christlike behavior. Simply because our own world appears to be caving in and leaving us exposed and vulnerable does not give us the right to take our frustrations out on others.

It has been important for us during these days of Lent to reflect not simply on our own shortcomings, our own need to repent, and be turned around in order that we can make it out of the deep dark valley of our life's shadows and see that our Lord wants to bring us up to a brighter and better place, a free and forgiven spot where love, not hate or bitterness, drives our every action, word, and thought. Have you ever noticed that when things seem to be moving along fairly smoothly in our lives we may rejoice momentarily, but we move on quickly toward the next thing and the thing after that. Sometimes we rarely take the time to stop and say, "Thank You God for these rich, purpose-filled moments...for this glorious experience...for the blessings which I don't deserve but with which you have showered me."

But let me get sick, need to go to the Emergency Room, spend six days in the hospital, receive an alarming new diagnosis which could have long-term implications for how I have decided to live out the remainder of my life, and I will obsess and complain that life is not fair...where is God when you need God the most... doesn't God care; and more to the point - what is God going to do to get you out of this mess, fix things, and get life back to how it used to be?

The first words out of my mouth isn't, "Thank you God for walking with me through this time...thank you God for providing me with the courage to move beyond this time of adversity...thank you God for placing people in my life to bring the knowledge, wisdom, and understanding to my life which will point me in the direction of hope, healing, patience, and submission to your will and to all that is yet to come.

Whatever part of the journey you are on today I pray that your walk with the Lord, who has already experienced suffering, pain, and death to spare us the ultimate jaws of eternal death, will give you peace and hope. All of history was dependent on his willingness to endure to the end and through the deepest lows he would ever face we would be able to experience the biggest high we could ever imagine – eternal life with the lover of my soul - Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Think of your lowest moment in life, your worst day ever, the day when you may have said to yourself, "It can't get much worse than this." Even then our Lord's passion was so much worse than any of my terrible, horrible, no good, very bad days. He was nailed to a tree, pierced in the side, crown of thorns pushed into his head, the whole earth going dark with the sun unable to shine, being made to drink vinegar, spit upon, tortured, body weight pulling on his lungs making it impossible for him to breathe, left to die by crucifixion in the scorching heat and laid in a tomb to rot. And none of that was on his own behalf but rather for the sake of the whole world. In just three short weeks we will be able to sing the uplifting words, "The Stife Is Over, The Battle Done; now is the victor's triumph won! Now be the song of praise begun. ------!" This is the word we will unbury on Easter and sing many times in our Celebration of the Resurrection.

Blessings to each of you as we gather for Holy Week services and enter the glory of our Lord's resurrection at Easter.

#### **Special Congregation Meeting Follow-up**

Candidate Pastor Emily Trubey-Weller preached and presided for the service on March 30, 2025. After worship, the Special Congregation Meeting was called to order by Mark Moyer. Rev. Priscilla Geerdes, Assistant to the Bishop for Ministry Transition, then took the floor, opening with prayer and the reading of the Letter of Call, a legal document. A quorum was present.

Two votes were taken:

- 1. Ballot for Rostered Minister Call An affirmative vote of 2/3 of the ballots cast by the voting members in attendance was necessary for the election of a pastor. It passed with 33 yes; 2 no.
- 2. A simple majority verbal vote was necessary to pass the Compensation and Benefits Package. It passed with all ayes and no nays.

The process now continues. Once the Bishop has the documentation from each congregation regarding these actions and after the pastoral candidate has received the Official Call Document from the Bishop's office, the candidate has 30 days to respond that either "yes" they will accept the call or "no" they will not accept the call. If they accept, this begins a period of transition as the candidate prepares to resign the present call and complete responsibilities at the present congregation. It is also typical for a pastor to take some time off between calls to physically, emotionally, and spiritually prepare for all that is to come in a new call. So be patient; the process continues. Pray that the Spirit of the Living God will continue to move as the process proceeds.

## DAILY HELPS FOR YOUR LENTEN JOURNEY 2025

## The journey continues...

## March 31<sup>st</sup> – Monday of the Fourth Week in Lent – Read John 4:43-54

If there is a child in your life, teach them a simple prayer or buy them a simple book of prayers to read and pray. If they are a bit older, ask them to pray with you about a person or situation. Let them use their words as well as your words.

## April 1st – Tuesday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read Galatians 6:9, John 5:1-16

While you are out running errands today, make an effort to kindly smile at those who are in customer service positions such as a waiter, a store clerk checking you out, etc. Try to bring a little bit of joy to someone's day.

## April 2<sup>nd</sup> – Wednesday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read John 5:17-30

Pray for those who oppose the message of the Gospel and those who seek to silence the voice of God.

## April 3rd – Thursday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read John 5:31-47

Take time today to prayerfully meditate on Jesus' ministry of teaching, healing, preaching, and presence. Which of these accounts of Jesus' ministry resonate with you? Carry that most meaningful one with you throughout the day.

## April 4th – Friday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read John 7:1-2, 10, 25-30

Remember that all good comes from the Lord and give thanks to Him for the blessings you have experienced this week. Count your many blessings...name them one by one.

## April 5th – Saturday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read John 7:40-53

Reflect on times recently (or in the past) when you may have misjudged the people around you. Make a firm commitment to avoid judging others.

## April 6th – Fifth Sunday of Lent – Read John 8:1-11

Is there someone who has caused you pain, anxiety, fear, or anger whom you feel you can never forgive? Offer a prayer for that person as well as for yourself. Ask the Lord to heal your own wounds through forgiveness.

## April 7th – Monday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read John 8:12-20

Pray the Lord's Prayer throughout the day emphasizing each petition and asking yourself what each petition means in your life.

## April 8th – Tuesday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read John 8:21-30

Reflect on how God willingly sacrificed His only Son for your salvation. What is it that you are willing to sacrifice today? Go without a meal today and use the money that would have paid for it as an offering to the church or other organization or give up some of your time today and call someone who is lonely or grieving.

## April 9th – Wednesday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read John 8:31-42

Ask God for the courage to live by truth. What does freedom mean to you? Is it freedom for or from something?

## April 10th – Thursday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read Psalm 51:12, John 8:51-59

Pray to adhere to God's Word more faithfully in your own life. Clean an area of your home each week remaining in Lent. Get rid of excess clutter, do an extra deep cleaning in one area, or reorganize a closet or dresser you have be meaning to do for some time.

## April 11<sup>th</sup> – Friday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read John 10:31-42

Pray and meditate thanking Christ for the suffering he willingly endured for our sake. Sit quietly and recall each step Jesus took along his way to the cross. Be sure not to be disturbed by your phone or other distractions.

## April 12th – Saturday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read Romans 15:13, John 11:47

Get up a little early or stay up a little late or carve a space in the middle of your day to ask yourself if you have ever faced prejudice. Also, ask the Holy Spirit for strength to remain faithful to God, even in the face of prejudice. May the Holy Spirit fill our hearts with joy and peace.

## April 13th – Palm/Passion Sunday – Read Philippians 2:6-8, Luke 22:14-23:56

Pray for all Bishops, Pastors, Deacons, Teachers, musicians, and lay persons engaged in the preparations of services for this most holy week

## April 14th – Monday in Holy Week – Read John 12:1-11

Imagine life without the hope and promise of salvation. Pray that all persons may experience the joy and love of Jesus given to us in our faith.

## April 15th – Tuesday in Holy Week – Read John 13:21-33, 36-38

Today, provide a kind word of encouragement to a friend, family member, neighbor, or someone who may be a stranger who is having a crisis in faith and needs encouragement.

## April 16th – Wednesday in Holy Week – Read Matthew 26:14-25

Pray for a true change of heart so that you might turn permanently away from all that separates you from the love of God. Is there a task you have been avoiding? Embrace it today as an act of love, offering your effort as a prayerful gift to God.

## April 17th – Holy / Maundy Thursday – Read John 13:1-15

Make an effort to attend the service tonight recalling the last night Jesus sat at the table with his disciples. Experience the stripping of the chancel moving us toward Good Friday. Reflect on how you will follow Christ's example of humble obedience.

## April 18<sup>th</sup> – Good Friday – Read John 18:1-19:42

Attend the Stations of the Cross service during the day or the Tenebrae service in the evening. Allow yourself to experience the depth of the Passion of Christ.

## April 19th – Holy Saturday – The Vigil of Easter – Read Luke 24:1-12

Abstain from hurried activities today and make an effort to focus all your thoughts throughout the day on the death of Jesus for your salvation.

## April 20th – Easter Sunday – The Resurrection of the Lord – Read John 20:1-9, Luke 24:5-6

Christ is Risen. Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia! May this special day fill your heart with renewed hope and peace. Share the news of the Risen Christ with every person you meet.



## Baptisms at the Easter Vigil

The practice of Baptism occurring at the Easter Vigil can be traced back to around AD 150 and by the early 3rd century this pattern had become firmly established. So we continue this pattern. We will baptize both adults as well as infants. At the vigil we commemorate Jesus' resurrection and the triumph of Jesus' victory over death. Baptism symbolizes the death to the old self and rebirth into new life in Christ. The water represents the washing away of sin and the cleansing power of Christ's sacrifice. During the Vigil we begin in dark-



ness with candles, many scripture lessons are read beginning in Genesis, prayers are offered, the Sacrament of communion (The first of Easter) is celebrated and then everyone participates in the Sacrament of Baptism either by Affirmation of Baptism (for those of us already baptized or Baptism (for those adults or infants who have never been baptized.) So, if you know an adult, child, or infant in your life who is not baptized, **please speak with Sister Nora by Sunday, April 6.**
