Greetings in Christ,

"Then little children were being brought to him in order that he might lay his hands on them and pray. The disciples spoke sternly to those who brought them; but Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs.' And he laid his hands on them and went on his way.— Matthew 19:13-15

For our family, February is shaping up to be a very exciting month. This is the month when we will meet our second daughter, as Kim's due date is February 20<sup>th</sup>. Our two girls will be about 21 months apart, so there promises to be an extra dose of chaos in our lives – but we cannot wait.

## A Stewardship Minute

#### Inspiring a deeper understanding of true giving An introduction of *Stewardship* to the congregation

#### February 2020

The beloved UCLA basketball coach John Wooden, now in his nineties, began each basketball season by sitting his players on a bench and demonstrating the proper way to put on their socks before putting on their basketball shoes! Coach Wooden knew that if the socks were smooth and tight on their feet it would prevent them from getting blisters and probably not be able to play as they became worse.

One of Coach Wooden's mottos was: "Little things make big things happen." Another of his quotes is "Failing to prepare is preparing to fail." He believed that being disciplined in one's life, habits and daily practices is the clue to living a successful and worthy life. Is it any wonder that his UCLA teams won National Championships 10 times? What the coach was teaching was that to be a good steward of the life God has given us, one must be disciplined in all things: one's body, mind, spirit, talents, resources, even the use of our time. This month's issue of *Stewardship* makes highlights the point that if we are not so disciplined, we will not fulfill the plans God has for each of us. The last five verses of the 24th chapter of the book of Proverbs makes a similar point:

"I passed by the field of one who was lazy ... and it was all overgrown with thorns ... covered with nettles. Then I saw and considered it; I looked and received instruction. A little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to rest, and poverty will come upon you like a robber, and want like an armed warrior." (Proverb 24:30-34)

Such is the life of one who fails to apply their God-given gifts in a consistent, disciplined manner.

Prayer: Teach us, dear Lord, to make our lives fruitful so that we become good and faithful servants of Christ. Amen.

#### We know the truth

This column is a reprint of her June 2018 column in Living Lutheran.

Father's Day is in June. Let me tell you a little bit about my dad. His name was William Frederick Eaton. He was born in 1924 to an Irish Catholic father and a German Lutheran mother. (There were always going to be potatoes and cabbage in my future.) My father was a child of

the Depression. Like thousands of his generation, he enlisted in the army during World War II. An Army Air Corps officer at age 20, he flew B-24s and served in North Africa and Italy.

My father, who had an amazing sense of humor, told my brothers and me stories about his time in the army—about the training, the friends he made and the not-quite-regulation antics they pulled. These were 20-year-olds, after all. Only once did he speak about an actual combat operation, and then only briefly. War is about killing, and those we send to serve carry that with them for the rest of their lives.

After the war and newly married, my father and mother built a life together. They bought their first house. My father went to night school and earned his bachelor's degree. One of my fondest childhood memories was when my mother allowed me to stay up late so I could see my dad when he came home from night school. He was the first in his family to graduate from college.

My father was a man of integrity and courage. He grew up in a working-class family, and he worked hard for everything he earned. He served his country; loved my mother, brothers and me; raised a family; served his church; and was involved in the community.

June is also the month of Juneteenth, the celebration of the emancipation and the end of slavery in the United States. President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863. It wasn't until June 19, 1865, that the news reached Texas, the last state that had slaves. Finally, at least officially, freedom was granted to all. We know that

African descent people took their place in local, state and national leadership and elected positions, including Congress. This was a time of great hope and possibility for our country as former slaves became citizens and worked alongside European descent citizens to rebuild the nation. But it was short-lived.

Almost immediately laws were put in place that restricted African Americans' access to economic advancement, voting, education and property ownership. We know the dreadful history of the rise of the Ku Klux Klan and the horror of lynching.

My father's family had only arrived in 1863. My mother's family would not come to America for another half century.

Here is where my father's story and that of the not-yet-realized emancipation of African American people intersect. After World War II our government enacted the GI Bill that made benefits like college tuition and low-interest home loans available for veterans.

My father's bomb group had a fighter escort squadron. It was the job of these men to protect pilots like my dad. They were the Tuskegee Airmen, the Red Tails. They were also brave men who served our country and, after the war, came home to start families and build a life. They served in the same war, wore the same uniform and flew the same missions, but they were barred in practice from the benefits of the GI Bill because they were African American.

This is white privilege. It doesn't diminish my father's courage and service. It doesn't mean that white people don't sacrifice and work hard. It does mean that the system favors white people. We didn't create this—we inherited it.

Now that we know about it, we have to do something about it. Americans love fair play. We've been taught that everyone should have an even chance. Now we know the truth. Jesus said, "You will know the truth, and the truth will make you free" (John 8:32). It might hurt, but it brings liberation. We are not free until all of us are free."

#### **Epiphany**

On the day we call Epiphany (January 6<sup>th</sup>) astrologers from the Near East found the Savior by their cosmic calculations. Were they disappointed when they found the humble baby in the manger born to working class parents? We don't know; what we do know is that they left extravagant gifts, fit for a king – gold, frankincense, myrrh. These gifts point to royalty and to death....the death of Jesus 33 years later. It has been said that it may have been this same myrrh which was prepared to embalm Jesus. In the Eastern church Epiphany was celebrated second only in importance to Easter. The Day of Epiphany opens up the entire season of Epiphany as a season of light and hope that enters our lives and helps us see beyond the darkness. In our western world we have not been very observant of Epiphany.

The season of Epiphany for us extends from January 6<sup>th</sup> through Transfiguration Sunday (The last Sunday before Ash Wednesday). During the Christmas season we focus on the infant Jesus and his childhood but during Epiphany we see who Jesus really is. The first Sunday after the Epiphany is the Baptism of Jesus where God calls forth Jesus to be God's son. With this Jesus begins to call disciples, to teach and train them and then begins his ministry of preaching, teaching, and healing, and performing miracles. Throughout the Epiphany season the readings show us how Jesus cared for people and their problems. The final Sunday in the Epiphany Season celebrates the Transfiguration of our Lord, when Jesus leads his three closest disciples up a mountain where they see him shining with a brilliant light and again, like at his baptism, hear the voice of God proclaiming Jesus to be God's beloved Son. The Transfiguration is Jesus' last epiphany in the season and calls for our last alleluias until the resurrection of our Lord on Easter.

#### Things to do in the New Year to strengthen your spiritual life

- 3. Prepare a Health Care Power Document (This will name the person who will make health decisions if you are unable to make them for yourself.)
- 4. Write your obituary (If you are like me, my family would not know some of the needed information.) Sister Nora has a form to help you
- 5. Talk with a funeral home or crematory Services and do pre-planning and even pre-pay. Your family will thank you.
- 6. Put together what kind of funeral or memorial service you would want....hymns, scripture, and participants. Sister Nora has a form to help you think through this.
- 7. If you don't have a cemetery plot and you wish to have burial in the ground or mausoleum, consider options.
- 8. Talk with your family about what is important to you in life, during dying and after your death.
- 9. If you would not want to be resuscitated at the time of cardiac or other event that might require CPR, you MUST have a doctor sign an Out of Hospital DNR. You will also sign it. This is not a document that a lawyer can do for you.
- 10. In order to prepare for your future you must plan in the present. This definitely will let you enjoy a much better 2020.

#### Ash Wednesday an Important Day in the Life of the Church

During our services on Ash Wednesday, a cross is marked on our foreheads to symbolize repentance. Ash Wednesday marks the first day of Lent, a six-week period leading to Easter. Easter Sunday is always celebrated on the first Sunday after a full moon following the Spring Equinox. Ash Wednesday follows Shrove Tuesday known as Pancake Day. It is customary for the ashes used on Ash Wednesday to be made by burning palm leaves which may be mixed with some olive oil. As the cross is marked on our heads we hear the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.". Though the origins of Ash Wednesday are not all together clear, it is believed to go back as far as the papacy of Gregory the Great (590-604).

#### **Lenten Booklet available in February**

Thanks to forty people from both Grace and Augustana all members of both churches will be able to read the same scripture, meditative devotional and prayer for each of the days of Lent. The booklets will be available on Feb 16<sup>th</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> at Sunday worship. If you know of someone who is unable to pick one up, please feel free to take one to them. Lent is the 40 days when we as Lutheran Christians focus on practices which draw us closer to God. This includes spiritual disciplines such as prayer, devotional reading, scripture reading, fasting from certain things and feasting on other things, and almsgiving (sharing what we have with others.) The 40 days of Lent do not include Sundays as we consider them Little Easter's when we celebrate the Lord's Resurrection. We pray that this booklet prepared by your brothers and sisters will be a meaningful blessing to you and your family.

# ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

After confirming a quorum (29) the meeting proceeded.

A call was made for elections for three three-year members for the Council and two three-year members for the Endowment Committee. 
