#### Dear Friends in Christ,

Periodically I pull a book from my book case or an article from my file cabinet which hasn't been read for a long time. Recently I reread an article titled, "Monks Have Secrets Worth Knowing" which may have been read for the first time 20 years ago. The author who, who had spent ten days on retreat with Trappist Monks in Oregon, learned many interesting facts, but more importantly he learned one of their secrets – namely what it takes to truly live in a Christian community and be community. He learned that those living at the abbey were fairly typical (as Trappist's go); they comprised an extremely diverse group of individuals bringing to the mix every kind of temperament, interests, background, age, political as well as theological, ethical and moral bent. Wow, sounds a lot like the church. Mr. Berrigan's conclusion was that these monks were "obviously not all ordered from the same catalog." The same can be said for almost every Christian community, religious order, as well as our own congregations of Augustana and Grace.

Upon first entering the abbey, the author had, as do most people, an idealistic understanding of the monks believing that each one could be found near faultless, living in serenity while practicing an exceptional compassion for each other. The reality was not always exactly as he had imagined it.

The monks were ordinary people with weaknesses much like the rest of society. As they lived together in close proximity, they were sometimes petty, jealous, tired, grumpy and bad behaviors, which left unchallenged, grated on each other causing mean spirited and irritable responses. Was this simply an extremely angry group of people who had lost their Christ-centered life? Or could it be that each of these persons brought with them their own history, hurts, joys, memories, griefs, and dreams? The amazement in all of this lies in the fact that they stayed together building up their community since that was of greater importance than any one individual need. They lived there for each other not only for each other but for others and provided a warm welcome to anyone who came through their door. In the end their differences made up their real richness. What a blessing that was. So why did a community like that work? I really believe that the only way a Christian community can live in harmony, grow, thrive and serve is by placing all of their longings, hopes, dreams, desires, and energies in a place outside of themselves. This is the secret worth knowing and a secret worth remembering and putting into practice. We all long for a Christian community where individuals can worship, learn, grow, pray and serve together harmoniously even though we are all very different.

Why is this hard for us? Because often we try to be a Christian community (congregation) build around ourselves, our needs, our wants, our personalities, our egos, and around our philosophies, and what we hope will be our like-mindedness. For many of us this means that everyone must have our opinion, think as we do, and never challenge us. None of this, however, can bring us together in ways that are helpful or meaningful. Without a clear center, rooted in God, our churches will neither be welcoming or lasting. We can worship together, grow and study and pray together, grow in new ways, challenge each other and care for each other without growing weary only when our focus is not upon ourselves. In the next months we will come together to make difficult decisions. In that process we need to be rooted and grounded in God's love and supported and directed by the one who is far greater than any one of us. It is not easy to be open to hearing ideas and opinions which may be very different from ours – yet, we MUST for Christ's sake. As we gather for decision making, for prayer, worship, and for fellowship, may we listen intently, sharing our true feelings with each other openly, laughing loudly, and seeking God's will in every decision. Let us put aside our differences in order that our diversity may bring together unimaginable gifts of healing and whole not just for us but for others. The author of the article I reread ends by his saying, "We can live each other despite our differences, only when we are not simply facing each other, but most Importantly when we are all facing in the same direction, eyes fixed upon praising God and God alone." That is the secret for a good marriage, a good friendship, a good congregation and a good community.

# Where God is doing new things

March 2020

Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord? Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? --God [Isaiah 58:5-7]



The question of the season: What will you give up for Lent this year? Why? The prophet Isaiah appears to have something to say about how we answer those questions!

I have realized that I tend to think of fasting – the practice of giving up things, not eating things, abstaining from things or habits for a period of time – as an expression of my personal piety, something that is about or is meant to deepen my relationship with God. During Lent, the practicing of giving up or fasting from something can also be a path by which I return to my baptismal identity as a Word-washed, cross-marked, Spirit-sealed and sent child of God.

As it turns out, Isaiah – rather, God speaking through Isaiah – is right: my tendency is to individualize my fasting into something that is primarily about me and Jesus, my posture and position before God. Most often, my giving up stuff during Lent is, in fact, about humbling myself, bowing down my head, settling into a bed of sackcloth and ashes for forty days.

Apparently, that's not the fast that God is looking for from us. At least, it's not the only form of fasting that God expects of us. The ancient prophet reminds us that there are also social, communal dimensions to our fasting. It is not only or even primarily about our own personal piety or focus on self-improvement or "me and Jesus." Lenten fasts are also, perhaps even primarily, about growth in self-giving love for our neighbor. Me and Jesus always includes others. Centuries after Isaiah, John the letter writer put it this way [1 John 3:14-17]:

We know that we have passed from death to life because we love one another. Whoever does not love abides in death... We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?

Do you hear the echo? Loose the bonds of injustice. Let the oppressed go free. Break every yoke. Share bread with the hungry. Bring the homeless into our own homes. Clothe the naked. Draw closer to, not further from, others in the family of God. Love your neighbor. Is not this the fast that I choose for

those who have passed from death to life in Christ crucified and risen?

At first blush this sort of fast doesn't seem to involve abstaining from or giving up anything. It's a call to do things, to add rather than subtract. But the gospel truth is that engaging in such Christ-like behavior requires fasting from or being willing to give up or let go of a great deal. This fast calls for us to let go of our need to control or be in charge, to risk losing our sterling reputation and open space in our hearts reserved only for people who are like us, to surrender comfort, loosen our grip on resources, and relinquish time, fear, and stereotypes of others. Yet, in the power of the Holy Spirit who has sealed us in Christ, fasting from, repenting of, giving up these sorts of sin-shaped beliefs and behaviors frees us from the oppressive yoke of self-serving self-preservation, which binds us to the way of death, and sets free us to walk in and share the new, abundant, and lasting life that springs as a gift from the entrance of an empty tomb.
