#### I Corinthians 13 NRSV

<sup>1</sup>If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. <sup>2</sup> And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. <sup>3</sup>If I give away all I have, and if I deliver up my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing.

<sup>4</sup>Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant <sup>5</sup> or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; <sup>6</sup> it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. <sup>7</sup>Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

<sup>8</sup>Love never ends. As for prophecies, they will pass away; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will pass away. <sup>9</sup>For we know in part and we prophesy in part, <sup>10</sup> but when the perfect comes, the partial will pass away. <sup>11</sup>When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I gave up childish ways. <sup>12</sup>For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known.

<sup>13</sup> So now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Over the last four weeks we have been studying parts of I Corinthians to get a better idea of what it means to be the Body of Christ. Our study is concluding with I Corinthians 13 which we know as the "Love Chapter" which is often used at weddings and even sometimes at funerals. What we learned is that the word love occurs 686 times in the Bible with 425 coming in the Old Testament and 261 in the New Testament.

According to the Bible there are four types of Christian love: **Agape** (unconditional, divine love). This is the type of love that Jesus showered upon us. **Phileo** (brotherly love seen in friendships). Philadelphia is known to be the city of brotherly love. Then there is **Storge** (family love or affection). This is the love a parent has for a child, a child shows to a parent, and that siblings have for each other. Lastly is **Eros** known as romantic or passionate love. This type of love is expressed by husband and wife, those who are engaged to be married, and those who are intimately involved with a partner.

Love... whatever the cost.

This is the making of a great St. Valentine's Day as many people celebrate it on February 14<sup>th</sup> with sweet treats, heartfelt gifts, romantic dinners. Even as children we made little Valentine's Day cards for everyone in our class and slipped them into a white paper sack which had each classmate's name on it. And we made sure that the perfect words were on the heart-shaped candy that we picked out, especially for our favorite friends. It was easy, or maybe I should say easier, to love when we were children since we didn't realize all the reasons people could give us not to love them.

As adults I do not believe that any of us are surprised that humanity as a whole finds the kind of love described in I Corinthians 13 difficult. As humans (fallen, sinful, and sometimes broken) it is difficult for us to "bear all things, believe all things, hope all things, and endure all things" as love does. Do we who call ourselves Christians, who have been cleansed in the waters of Baptism, who have been given a new life and a new heart in Christ, and are able to make use of the guidance of the Holy Spirit for each decision we make...still find it so difficult to love God with our whole being and love our neighbors anywhere as much as we love ourselves?

In the sermon on January 26, I said that Jesus tapped into the power of the Spirit in order to heal and help all kinds of people, and the Holy Spirit makes it possible for us to love like Jesus loved which is impossible without the Spirit. According to the New Testament, learning to love like Jesus loved is hard, hard work, and requires us to deny ourselves what WE might want in order to DO what Jesus asks of us. It means not just putting behind us but, in fact, putting to death the sin that so easily creeps into our lives. It means that each day we die to anything and everything that keeps us from loving the Lord and all creatures great and small. It means we try with all our very being to be humble rather than selfish and self-centered. It means being compassionate, kind, gentle, caring, helpful, forgiving, and genuine. It means not seeking retribution or revenge or harboring evil thoughts or trying to get even.

The costliness of agape is evident in the cross of Christ. Those who resolve to take up their cross resolve to love as Christ loved, in a costly manner. When we begin to really follow Christ, we resolve to love God even if it costs us...and it will cost us...our pride, our comfort, our self-will, our selfsufficiency, and at times our amicable relationships with our family, friends or neighbors. But in laying these aside, we learn the worthiness of the object of our love in a deeper way. As we mature as Christians, we resolve to love God NO MATTER WHAT IT COSTS. Then and only then can we begin to follow Christ in this amazing way which moves us to love our neighbors even if it costs us...and it

will...our preferences, our time, our financial resources, our entitlement, and our stereotypes. At times it may cost us our popularity or respect. But by laying these things aside, we learn the brokenness of the object of our love in deeper way. As we mature in being a Christian, we resolve to love our neighbor no matter what it costs us. This is the kind of love that makes us different from the world's love. In every situation let us ask ourselves, "Am I loving the way Jesus has first loved me?"

Oh, and Happy Valentine's Day.



#### **ELCA News** ~ ELCA Presiding Bishop Issues Pastoral Message on Executive Orders

Dear church,

On Monday, our nation witnessed the peaceful transfer of power central to our democracy, followed by sweeping actions by the incoming Trump administration. Facing such changes, we receive guidance through Martin Luther's words in the Large Catechism.

In the fourth petition of the Lord's Prayer, where we pray "Give us this day our daily bread," Luther writes about the importance of praying for our leaders, asking God to grant them wisdom and strength. He also speaks to the responsibility of leaders to provide stability, sufficiency and equity, saying, "[I]t would be very proper to place in the coat-of-arms of every pious prince a loaf of bread instead of a lion, or a wreath of rue, or to stamp it upon the coin, to remind both them and their subjects that by their office we have protection and peace, and that without them we could not eat and retain our daily bread."[1]

This past week has been one of rapid and cascading change, from the inauguration of a new president and vice president to the flurry of activity in government orders and regulations. The policies and decisions reflected in this week's executive orders and regulatory changes have the potential to profoundly impact our lives, the well-being of our neighbors and the future of the planet. Therefore, I am concerned about the ways that many of the executive actions have created uncertainty and fear in our communities among neighbors struggling to survive, neighbors struggling to provide for their children, and neighbors struggling to be seen.

As a church, we are called to speak up when the government distorts or denies the image of God in each person by endangering access to protection, peace and daily bread. Where harm or inequity occur, we are called by God to respond with love and advocacy.

Luther also writes that in asking for daily bread, we are to pray for our leaders. We should pray that they act wisely and justly, protect all people and not cause harm.

Prayer is not passive; it's an act of hope. Prayer reminds us to ground ourselves in God's promise. We pray for strength, to love unconditionally and to serve one another. As we lift up our petitions, we must also act—advocating for policies that affirm the dignity of every person and standing against actions that demean or exclude.

This church is committed to upholding the humanity of everyone, regardless of who we are or where we come from. We are a church called to love our neighbors and accompany all people in their joys and struggles. We must remain steadfast in this calling. As the ELCA, we will continue to proclaim the radical inclusivity of Christ's love. And we will deepen our local and global partnerships with those working to build a just and compassionate society, especially through our ecumenical and interreligious networks.

I commend to you the social message "<u>Government and Civic Engagement in the United States: Disciple-</u> <u>ship in a Democracy</u>," which states on page 7: "To evaluate how well agencies of government are doing their proper work of providing for the safety and well-being of those within their borders and/or jurisdiction, Lutherans ask one simple but all-encompassing question: Is the neighbor being served?" I encourage our congregations to use the resources of the <u>ELCA Witness in Society Team</u> with advocacy networks on the state and federal level. And get involved with <u>AMMPARO</u>, the ELCA's strategy toward just and humane policies affecting migrants.

As we move forward, let us hold fast to our faith and to one another. Let us be bold in our witness to the gospel, steadfast in our prayers for those in authority and tireless in our efforts to seek justice for all. May God grant us courage, wisdom and peace in these days.
