Dear Friends in Christ,

Though it seems like the Christmas decorations were just taken down, the fact is that March 5th is Ash Wednesday and the beginning of our 40-day Lenten journey to Easter. This is an opportunity for us to dig deeper and take on some practices which can help strengthen our faith and bring us closer to Christ. In this newsletter you will find Daily Lenten Helps for each day of Lent. It will provide you with a scripture to read and a prompt or idea of something to do or pray/meditate about throughout the day for each day of Lent. You will also find a sheet of all the Lenten offerings (times and place).

I want to remind you that there is still time to pick up a book for the book study. Join up on Tuesdays at Grace at 1:30 PM or Thursday at 6:30 PM at Augustana. Our book will be "Meeting Jesus at the Table." There are four books left between the two churches, so please let me know if you would like one.

Every month we print the reading in the newsletter and bulletin for the upcoming Sundays: a lesson from the Old Testament, a Psalm, a New Testament lesson, and a lesson from one of the four Gospels. You may or may not read them before the upcoming Sunday; but during this season of Lent, I would ask you to engage in a process we call Lectio Divina. Choose one of the four readings for the Sunday and then choose a word or phrase of the scripture you want to pray. Try not to predetermine or set a goal for where you want this prayer time to go. It is in God's hands, not ours.

First, READ. Read the text slowly and savor each word, constantly listening for a word or phrase which somehow God seems to be lifting up to you. Don't expect a lightning-bolt experience. In Lectio Divina God is teaching us to listen and to seek him in silence. God doesn't reach out and grab us or shake us but rather invites us to come more deeply into His presence.

Second, PONDER. Take the word or phrase into yourself. Memorize it, slowly repeat it to yourself, allowing it to interact with your inner world of concerns, memories, thoughts, and ideas. Do not be afraid of distractions. Memories and thoughts are simply parts of who you are. When they rise up during Lectio

Divina just give them up to God along with all the rest of your inner self. Allow this time of pondering to bring you into a dialogue with God. From the text in front of you, tell God what is on your mind and then listen for God to respond. It may take some time for the dialogue to begin but dialogue always has to start somewhere... listening intently is a good place to start.

Third, PRAY. Whether you use words, images, ideas or all three – that is not what is important. Interact in this prayer time with this word or phrase you have chosen as you would with your closest friend or with someone who has known, loved, and accepted you. Give to God what you have or have discovered during your reading, pondering and meditating. Give to God something new which you have found in your heart. Don't evaluate the experience. The first few times may feel uncomfortable; but the more you do this type of prayer, the more familiar and comfortable it feels. The goal of Lectio Divina is to simply be in the presence of God.

Marty Haugen wrote a hymn (music & text) in 1950 that has sustained me through many Lenten Seasons. It is found as hymn 334 in our worship book and has nine stanzas. I leave you with four of those stanzas from "Tree of Life and Awesome Mystery."

- 1. Tree of Life and awesome mystery, in your death we are reborn though you die in all of history, still you rise with every morn, still you rise with every morn.
- 2. We remember truth once spoken, love passed on through act and word; every person lost and broken wears the body of our Lord, wears the body of our Lord.
- 3. Christ you lead and we shall follow, stumbling though our steps may be; one with you in joy and sorrow, we the river, you the sea, we the river, you the sea.
- 4. Light of life beyond conceiving, mighty Spirit of the Lord; give new strength to our believing, give us faith to live your word, give us faith to live your word.

DAILY HELPS FOR YOUR LENTEN JOURNEY 2025

March 5th – Ash Wednesday – Read Matthew 6: 5-18

As Lent begins, ask for God's guidance as you take on the practices of prayer, fasting, and good works. Have you decided what to give up or what to take on for Lent? Do not wait. The season of Lent is upon us providing us with so many opportunities to sow love and goodness in the world.



March 6th – Thursday after Ash Wednesday – Read Luke 9:22-25

Meditate on this daily Gospel reading. What do you notice? What are you drawn to. Ask God to guide you in your study.

March 7th – Friday after Ash Wednesday – Read Joel 2:12-13 and Matthew 9:15

Observe a traditional fast today (from Sunrise until Sundown) or abstain from a favorite food, TV program, or another enjoyable activity.

March 8th – Saturday after Ash Wednesday – Read Luke 5:32

Consider using the individual service of confession in our ELW. Ask a family, member, friend, or church leader to engage in this process with you. Feel God's forgiveness, grace, and mercy. Offer forgiveness, grace, and mercy to another person.

March 9th – First Sunday of Lent – Read Luke 4:1-2

Ask Jesus for an increase in strength and perseverance in resisting temptation, and in following God's will for you. Do you have a bad habit you wish to overcome? Keep a notepad handy and strive every day during Lent to make progress to stop the habit. Each time you fail, mark it in your notepad and don't beat up on yourself but ask God for perseverance.

March 10th – Monday of the First Week of Lent – Read Matthew 25:31-46

Make time to volunteer at church or one of our local charities or perform a small act of kindness for a stranger today to share God's love.

March 11th – Tuesday of the First Week of Lent – Read Matthew 6:7-15

Offer a prayer of your choosing on behalf of someone who has caused you pain and strive to let go of persistent grudges.

March 12th – Wednesday of the First Week of Lent – Read Luke 11:29-30

Is there a particular social issue (addiction, homelessness, hunger, gambling, hoarding, etc.) that you have not had time to read about or learn more about as a sign that you are trying to follow Jesus more closely and deepen your compassion and understanding of some of the struggles faced by others.

March 13th – Thursday of the First Week of Lent – Read I Corinthians 6:19-20, Matthew 7:7-12

Ask the Lord for grace, assistance, and whatever else you might need to become closer to Him and more like Him. During this time of Lent, trade your guilty pleasures for healthier habits. Challenge yourself to keep it up throughout the season of Lent and beyond.

March 14th – Friday of the First Week of Lent – Read Matthew 5:24

If you need to ask someone for forgiveness or mend a broken relationship, this is the day. Afterwards, spend time meditating on Christ's sorrow throughout his life when he saw God's children not forgiving or asking for forgiveness.

March 15th – Saturday of the First Week of Lent – Read Matthew 5:43-44

Strive to imitate the love of Christ and pray for someone who has caused you pain or sorrow. Then go to your pantry (or grocery if your pantry is empty) and put a food item in a box for each person for whom you pray. Take these items to our church pantry.

March 16th – Second Sunday in Lent – Read Luke 9: 28-36

In the afternoon or evening re-read the four lessons from this morning and prayerfully listen to the voice of God in them and allow your heart to deepen in love for God.



March 17th – Monday of the Second Week in Lent – Read Luke 6:36-38

Serve an elderly family member, neighbor or friend today – prepare a meal, run an errand, or help with a task. Whatever you do, let it be done with the love of God shining through your actions.

March 18th – Tuesday of the Second Week in Lent – Read Matthew 23:1-12

Pray the following Doxology numerous times throughout the day and experience the peace it brings to your heart. "Blessed be God the Father, who has created us. Blessed be God the Son, who has redeemed us. Blessed be God the Holy Spirit, who sanctifies us. Blessed be the Holy and undivided Trinity, now and forever. Amen."

March 19th – Wednesday of the Second Week in Lent – Read Matthew 1:16-24a

Reflect on the trials Joseph endured being Jesus earthly Father. Take a moment to honor your Father, Grandfather, or the Father figure in your life. If that person is still with you, pick up the phone and share your love and thanks. If they have returned to God, lift your prayer to God entrusting them to the Lord's eternal care.

March 20th – Thursday of the Second Week in Lent – Read Luke 16:19-31

Pray to have a deeper trust in the Lord, surrendering to His divine will and the beautiful plan He has for your life.

□ March 21st – Friday of the Second Week in Lent – Read Matthew 21:33-43, 45-46

Meditate on the Apostle's Creed or the Nicene Creed and pray that God will inspire us through the Holy Spirit to remain close to Christ in all things. May the creeds be more than just words for us; may they carry our belief into every aspect of our day.

March 22nd – Saturday of the Second Week in Lent – Read Matthew 4:4

If you could pick up your phone and speak to God, what would you say? More importantly, imagine the loving words he would share with you – words of guidance, mercy, and love.

March 23rd – Third Sunday of Lent – Read Luke 13:1-9

Today, pray for forgiveness for yourself, the church, and the whole world.

March 24th – Monday of the Third Week of Lent – Read Luke 4:24-30

Pray for the grace to continue accepting Jesus into your own heart and pray for those who do not yet know Him to change their hearts.

March 25th – Tuesday of the Third Week of Lent – Read Luke 1:38, Philippians 2:8

Contemplate the virtue of humility and meditate on Mary's obedience and Jesus' humble obedience to God's will. Pray that God will give you a humble and obedient heart to love God above all things.

March 26th – Wednesday of the Third Week of Lent – Read Matthew 5:17-19

Read through each of the Ten Commandments and focus on one you have had difficulty keeping. Write a letter to God sharing what steps you will take to amend your ways and change your heart.

March 27th – Thursday of the Third Week of Lent – Read Luke 11:14-23

Consider making an anonymous donation to the food pantry, to an individual who you know is struggling, or to a project or program of a local organization and pray that God will use your gift to bring hope in a dark place.

March 28th – Friday of the Third Week of Lent – Read Mark 12:28-34

Perform an act of kindness today. It can be as simple as not parking in the closest parking spot to allow someone to go ahead of you in a line at the grocery or fast food. Then say a prayer for those persons you knowingly or unknowingly helped.

March 29th – Saturday of the Third Week of Lent – Read Matthrew 28:19-20

Adopt the heart of a missionary today and spread the love of God with those around you by sharing a favorite scripture, offering a prayer, or offering a loving act to help them out.



March 30th – Fourth Sunday in Lent – Read Luke 15:1-3,11-32

Do you have a family member, friend, colleague, or neighbor who has fallen away from the faith? Consider inviting them to join you for Sunday worship, book study, Holy Week, Easter, or even a meal at church or when a church group goes out.

March 31st – Monday of the Fourth Week in Lent – Read John 4:43-54

If there is a child in your life, teach them a simple prayer or buy them a simple book of prayers to read and pray. If they are a bit older, ask them to pray with you about a person or situation. Let them use their words as well as your words.

April 1st – Tuesday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read Galatians 6:9, John 5:1-16

While you are out running errands today, make an effort to kindly smile at those who are in customer service positions such as a waiter, a store clerk checking you out, etc. Try to bring a little bit of joy to someone's day.

April 2nd – Wednesday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read John 5:17-30

Pray for those who oppose the message of the Gospel and those who seek to silence the voice of God.

April 3rd – Thursday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read John 5:31-47

Take time today to prayerfully meditate on Jesus' ministry of teaching, healing, preaching, and presence. Which of these accounts of Jesus' ministry resonate with you? Carry that most meaningful one with you throughout the day.

April 4th – Friday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read John 7:1-2, 10, 25-30

Remember that all good comes from the Lord and give thanks to Him for the blessings you have experienced this week. Count your many blessings...name them one by one.

April 5th – Saturday of the Fourth Week of Lent – Read John 7:40-53

Reflect on times recently (or in the past) when you may have misjudged the people around you. Make a firm commitment to avoid judging others.

April 6th – Fifth Sunday of Lent – Read John 8:1-11

Is there someone who has caused you pain, anxiety, fear, or anger whom you feel you can never forgive? Offer a prayer for that person as well as for yourself. Ask the Lord to heal your own wounds through forgiveness.

April 7th – Monday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read John 8:12-20

Pray the Lord's Prayer throughout the day emphasizing each petition and asking yourself what each petition means in your life.

April 8th – Tuesday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read John 8:21-30

Reflect on how God willingly sacrificed His only Son for your salvation. What is it that you are willing to sacrifice today? Go without a meal today and use the money that would have paid for it as an offering to the church or other organization or give up some of your time today and call someone who is lonely or grieving.

April 9th – Wednesday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read John 8:31-42

Ask God for the courage to live by truth. What does freedom mean to you? Is it freedom for or from something?

April 10th – Thursday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read Psalm 51:12, John 8:51-59

Pray to adhere to God's Word more faithfully in your own life. Clean an area of your home each week remaining in Lent. Get rid of excess clutter, do an extra deep cleaning in one area, or reorganize a closet or dresser you have be meaning to do for some time.

April 11th – Friday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read John 10:31-42

Pray and meditate thanking Christ for the suffering he willingly endured for our sake. Sit quietly and recall each step Jesus took along his way to the cross. Be sure not to be disturbed by your phone or other distractions.



April 12th – Saturday of the Fifth Week of Lent – Read Romans 15:13, John 11:47

Get up a little early or stay up a little late or carve a space in the middle of your day to ask yourself if you have ever faced prejudice. Also, ask the Holy Spirit for strength to remain faithful to God, even in the face of prejudice. May the Holy Spirit fill our hearts with joy and peace.

April 13th – Palm/Passion Sunday – Read Philippians 2:6-8, Luke 22:14-23:56

Pray for all Bishops, Pastors, Deacons, Teachers, musicians, and lay persons engaged in the preparations of services for this most holy week

□ **April 14**th **– Monday in Holy Week –** Read John 12:1-11

Imagine life without the hope and promise of salvation. Pray that all persons may experience the joy and love of Jesus given to us in our faith.

April 15th – Tuesday in Holy Week – Read John 13:21-33, 36-38

Today, provide a kind word of encouragement to a friend, family member, neighbor, or someone who may be a stranger who is having a crisis in faith and needs encouragement.

April 16th – Wednesday in Holy Week – Read Matthew 26:14-25

Pray for a true change of heart so that you might turn permanently away from all that separates you from the love of God. Is there a task you have been avoiding? Embrace it today as an act of love, offering your effort as a prayerful gift to God.

April 17th – Holy / Maundy Thursday – Read John 13:1-15

Make an effort to attend the service tonight recalling the last night Jesus sat at the table with his disciples. Experience the stripping of the chancel moving us toward Good Friday. Reflect on how you will follow Christ's example of humble obedience.

□ **April 18**th **– Good Friday –** Read John 18:1-19:42

Attend the Stations of the Cross service during the day or the Tenebrae service in the evening. Allow yourself to experience the depth of the Passion of Christ.

April 19th – Holy Saturday – The Vigil of Easter – Read Luke 24:1-12

Abstain from hurried activities today and make an effort to focus all your thoughts throughout the day on the death of Jesus for your salvation.

April 20th – Easter Sunday – The Resurrection of the Lord – Read John 20:1-9, Luke 24:5-6

Christ is Risen. Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia! May this special day fill your heart with renewed hope and peace. Share the news of the Risen Christ with every person you meet.



Lenten Book Study Opportunity Begins March 4!



"Meeting Jesus at the Table"

During this six-week study we will look at Jesus sharing meals with His disciples, friends, even tax collectors and sinners. We will examine Biblical insights and explore thought-provoking questions regarding our own time of meal sharing: whom do we invite and who is left out in our culture. Each chapter includes group discussion questions as well as personal reflections. Rev. Dr. Cynthia Campbell, former President of McCormick Seminary and retired Presbyterian Pastor from Louisville, Kentucky, is co-author of this book with Rev. Christine Fohr who presently serves at Harvey Browne Presbyterian Church in Kentucky.

- 2. Adopt the compensation and benefits package by a simple majority vote.

No proxy or absentee ballots are permitted. A sign-in sheet is completed by the members eligible to vote, and a quorum is needed for each of these ballots. Our constitution indicates that 10% of the voting members shall constitute a quorum. The election of the pastor shall be by written ballot.

You will be receiving biographical material on the candidate as well as an explanation of the compensation and benefits package. No other business shall be transacted at this Special Congregation Meeting.



Bishop Timothy Mark Graham was elected and called to serve the Indiana-Kentucky Synod, ELCA, at the 2024 Indiana-Kentucky Synod Assembly, in Louisville, KY. His official start began on September 1, 2024.



Bishop Tim is an Iowa Hawkeye by birth. At three-weeks-old, he was adopted by the late Rev. Vernon and Mrs. Ellen Graham (while Vernon was a student at Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, IA). However, most of his young and adult life have been spent in Fort Wayne, IN.

Prior to the assembly election, Bishop Tim served Messiah Lutheran Church in Fort Wayne, IN, in various capacities, for seventeen years. His initial call to Messiah in 2007 was actually a dual parish call shared with Grace Lutheran Church/Light of the Cross, also in Fort Wayne, as the redevelopment pastor. Grace/Light of the Cross celebrated Holy Closure at the end of 2009, and Bishop Tim was called to serve Messiah as the Associate Pastor for Youth and Family Ministry in 2010 and then as the Senior Pastor in 2015.

Bishop Tim obtained his undergrad degree from Purdue University in Fort Wayne (when it was still IPFWJ) in Organizational Leadership and his Master of Divinity from Wartburg Theological Seminary, Dubuque, IA. Bishop Tim was ordained at Trinity English Lutheran Church, Fort Wayne, IN, which was his home congregation prior to his first call. Bishop Tim also worked for 14 yrs. as a fork-lift drive at Supervalu prior to attending seminary.

Bishop Tim, and wife, Meme (Michelle), are the parents of four adult children in Fort Wayne: Sashelle Rose (fiancé Alex Knight), Timothy Graham, Jr., Larraine Graham (husband Cody Williamson), and Robert Graham. They also have seven grandchildren including Jaylen, twins Maleyah and Michelle, Noelle, Elias, Graham, and Greyson.
