

A Note from Pastor Amanda



Ongoing business:


- Discussed video conferencing glitches and procedure changes for 2020.

The ELCA: A Sanctuary Denomination



The highest legislative body of the ELCA, our Churchwide Assembly, gathered delegates from congregations and synods to address memorials and resolutions gathered from around the nation. We will be presenting our shared work over the next few months.

One of the topics brought forward by the New York Synod was a resolution to become a sanctuary denomination. It passed as 700 of the 922 in attendance approved.

What does this mean? (A solid Lutheran question.)

Becoming a sanctuary denomination means the ELCA is publicly declaring that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith. We acknowledge the brokenness of our immigration system and commit to providing concrete resources to assist the vulnerable. **THIS IS NOT NEW** to the ELCA. The Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (a refugee resettlement agency) began over 80 years ago, AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation, and Opportunities) has been functioning since 2015. Our social messages and statements specifically in 1991, 1993, and 1995, affirm the value of each life, regardless of where they were born.

We are not called to act in ways that are illegal. We are not called to align ourselves with a political party. We **ARE** called to see the people over the issue and act with the same compassion of Christ.

What Makes Me Lutheran?

When we call ourselves Lutheran, we identify with the Reformation movement sparked by Martin Luther and we claim a theology expressed in the "Lutheran Confessions."

The Lutheran Confessions, written by Luther and a colleague and published in 1580 as *The Book of Concord*, addressed both beliefs (what we think about God, sin, salvation, etc.) and practices (whether priests can marry, do we need a pope, whether Christians have to fast or go to confession, etc.). You are likely familiar with one of these writings: Luther's *Small Catechism*.

These documents weren't meant to establish a separate denomination. Their purpose was to explain that the way Lutheran Christians understood and practiced their faith was authentically Christian, even though it differed somewhat from Roman Catholic beliefs. The heart of the Confessions is the understanding that the gospel is the promise of the free gift of God's love, forgiveness and new life.

An example of how this theology shapes our practice...Lutherans call the sacraments "means of grace" because we believe that baptism and communion are ways through which God's grace is given to us. Unlike Christians who talk about baptism as committing oneself to Christ, we believe that God's grace comes to us freely. Baptizing babies reminds us of that.

If the Christian faith is a piece of music, denominations might be different musical voices in a choir. Although the musicians sing different notes, together the sound is much richer than that of a single voice. —LivingLutheran.org (excerpt)
