
We extend a special invitation to the descendants of Seth Paty, George Wadsworth, Thomas Hayden, and Thomas Collingwood.

Featured Stone: FRANCIS LEBARON

Not much is known about Dr. Francis LeBaron. While there are many theories about his origins none have been verified as yet. What is known is that he hailed from France and arrived on our shores in 1694 as the surgeon aboard a French privateer. The vessel sailed into waters just off the Falmouth coast and was assumed to have piracy as the intent and was captured. The officers and crew were taken as prisoners and led to Boston for to be charged. All save Francis LeBaron, His skill as a physician was needed in Plymouth at the time and the townspeople petitioned the governor for him to be allowed a pardon and be "permitted to tarry in the town of Plymouth." This request was granted and Francis remained. Francis married Mary Eames Wilder on September 6, 1695. They had three sons James, Lazarus, and Francis. Lazarus followed his father into medicine thus continuing what would become a long tradition of LeBaron physicians. His life was short.



Dr. Francis LeBaron died on August 8, 1704 at 36 years of age and is buried on Burial Hill in section L. His legacy is one of kindness and generosity, especially to the poor. In his will he left 90 acres to the Town of Plymouth to be used "for the benefit of the poor of Plymouth." The marker for Francis is a small slate stone that benefited from early conservation efforts. It probably broke off at ground level and was then cut even and subsequently encased in a granite surround. While this is not a conservation measure that would be used today it has been successful for this stone, as it still remains. The stone was probably carved by James Gilchrist of Boston. The tympanum is carved with a nicely coiffed winged head and hourglass. The borders are carved with gourds/breasts and pumpkins. This marker was cleaned and surveyed by the Friends of Burial Hill in 2012. The survey can be found from our website.

Carvers of Burial Hill

Nathaniel Holmes (1783 - 1869) was born in Plymouth. He learned stone carving from Amaziah Harlow of Plymouth. He most likely also was influenced by William Coye and Lemuel Savery. Holmes moved to Barnstable about 1805 to become the first resident carver on Cape Cod. During his long career he made the transition from carving winged heads on slate to carving urn and willow on marble. The marble markers of the nineteenth century make up the bulk of his work. It has been reported he carved over 1300 gravestones on Cape Cod. None of his nine children took up stone carving. Holmes carvings on slate included small winged heads, trumpeting angels and sunbursts. The winged heads have high foreheads due to the eyes being placed low on the face, small mouth and hair parted in the middle. Note that he used a variety of interesting tympanum shapes.
