

First Lady Designates Two New Preserve America Stewards

Washington, D.C.—First Lady of the United States Michelle Obama has signed designation letters for two new Preserve America Stewards, bringing the total nationwide to 56.

The newest to join the honor roll include Friends of Burial Hill, Inc. in Massachusetts helping to preserve Plymouth's Burial Hill Cemetery; and Friends of Lakewold in Washington, preserving a 1918 estate and gardens.


"Preserve America Stewards are volunteer programs that have demonstrated success in saving historic places in the best tradition of the national historic preservation movement," said Milford Wayne Donaldson, FAIA, chairman of the federal Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP). "Preservation has always relied upon motivated, active volunteers who band together to make certain that significant historic places remain to enrich and enlighten present and future generations."

Massachusetts: The Friends of Burial Hill was founded in 2010 to preserve Plymouth's Burial Hill cemetery, one of the country's earliest English colonial burying grounds. Volunteers assist with grounds maintenance, act as tour guides, conduct research, and work to conserve historic grave markers. Their work has reversed years of previous neglect and community disinterest.

Washington: The Friends of Lakewold works to preserve Lakewold estate, which includes a 1918 Georgian-style house and 10 acres of historic gardens. The gardens have evolved over almost 100 years, with significant contributions by famous landscape architect Thomas Church. Volunteers maintain the house and gardens, act as docents, provide horticultural education, and promote tourism to the site.

Marker A28 Section A - Before and After Photos

SACRED
to the memory of
ANGELINE
dau.tr of Truman
and Experience Bartlett.
died April 24, 1838:
Aged 20 yrs.

Weep not for her whom the veil of the lamb.
In lifes happy morning hath hid from our eyes
E're sin threw a blight o'er the spirits young bloom
or earth had profaned what was born for the skies.

This large marble marker was cleaned and surveyed by FOBH member Rhonda Atchison at a recent workshop. After cleaning, we could fully appreciate the lovely motif and were able to read the inscription in its entirety. Often when we clean the stones and uncover the motif or an epitaph that was not visible or was perhaps indecipherable, we become excited. We had some discussion over the imagery on this stone. Benjamin Drew, in his book, describes a square structure with radiations from upper surface; above and hanging at side, draped curtains, with cords and tassels.

Sticks and Stones

Bier

A stand used to place the coffin or casket on during a wake, funeral, or at the graveside prior to burial.



In the Robinson survey, they record, thick curtains with tassels, or festoon, over a pedestal with an ark that appears to be glowing. Or it could simply be a depiction of Truman's and Experience's beloved daughter Angeline's casket resting on a bier, draperies parted and raised, rays of pure light pointing towards Heaven, representing her soul's ascension. Rhonda described in her survey, a tabernacle with rays of light, draperies and tassels hung over a rod. However we interpret the iconography, many agree, the festoons, draperies or veil, drawn back and lifted by tassels traditionally represent a transition from one existence to another, a passage. Draping cloth and palls also represent mourning and sorrow. It was once the custom to drape objects, both in and outside of the home to signify that the household was in mourning. The Ark of the Covenant is the gold clad chest, constructed according to God's design, made to contain the stone tablets on which were written the Ten Commandments. A tabernacle could be a place of worship, a portable sanctuary and a cabinet used to house the consecrated Host. The rays of light must symbolize resurrection; the Heart of Jesus is most often shown encircled by rays of light. Glory. Similar compositions might also depict a dove or an angel.

Angeline's marker is flanked by the grave markers of her family, Charles, Experience, Stephen, Truman and Lucia.
