

Eighteen photos have bene selected for this exhibition and community calendar. The exhibition will be hosted at Poindexter Village Annual Drum Circle event, and a calendar will be created for the 2023-2024 school year. A \$100 cash award will be presented to the student winners. One student winner has been selected as the cover photograph winner and will receive the inaugural Kojo Photo Excellence Award named after the legendary Columbus photographer, Kojo Kamau.

Kojo Kamau Award

This award is in memory of the renowned photographer, historian, teacher, mentor and visionary.

Co-founder of Kojo Photo Art Studio and Art for Community Expression (ACE), a community organization created to nurture African American Artists and provide a venue to exhibit art.

He devoted a lifetime photographing positive images of African Americans and people of color.

He worked tirelessly to strengthen

the bond between African American
Artists and the boarder Columbus Arts
Community. Transcending boundaries
and time, his photographs captured truth
and portrayed integrity.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt came through Columbus to mark the opening dedication Champion Avenue development project in 1940, one of the first public housing projects in the country. Poindexter Village and the area that surrounded the 35 apartment buildings on 27 acres on Columbus' Near East Side was a vibrant mix of Black families, businesses, places to worship, and culture, including emerging artists, musicians, and leaders.

James Preston Poindexter Foundation

The James Preston Poindexter Foundation (JPPF), was founded in 2014 to ensure the preservation of Poindexter Village. It is the culmination of over a decade of effort from the community including former residents, preservationists, historians, activists and other partners working together to create a museum and cultural center to preserve Columbus black history.

The James Preston Poindexter Foundation does its work through its committees, advocates, and volunteers.



Rev. James Preston Poindexter was born on March 14, 1819, in Rockbridge County, Virginia. Rev. Poindexter was a trailblazer who fearlessly championed the rights and aspirations of the Black community. In recognition of his contributions to the community and education, the Poindexter Village public housing complex in Columbus was named after him. The complex, opened in 1940, was one of the first of its kind in the nation and provided affordable housing for African Americans.





Poindexter Village: A Place Called Home


Poindexter Village was first Ohio public housing development in Columbus, Ohio and one of the first in the country. The new construction replaced an area known as the "Blackberry Patch" Operated by the Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority it was home to 1800 persons residing in 425 apartment located in 33 red brick building on the east side of the city.

Named after Reverend James Preston
Poindexter, the minister of Second Baptist
Church for forty years, businessman,
underground railroad conductor and the
first black man to serve on the Columbus
City Schools Council, Columbus City
Council, Ohio State Forestry Bureau, State
School for the blind, and a Trustee at
Wilberforce University the residents were
proud to fulfill their dreams in a "place
called home."

In 1940 fourteen families moved into their dream home that symbolized the inspiration and honor of this great statesman. On October 12, 1940 the housing project was dedicated by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The Columbus Recreation and Parks leased the facility from CHA and operated a center with programs and a playground for families that supplemented the Beatty Recreation Center.

The James Poindexter Foundation founded in 2014 and in 2016 partnered with the Ohio History Connection to become the 59th site of the Ohio History Connection to change the two remaining buildings into the James Preston Poindexter Museum and Learning Center, the first African American Museum and Learning Center for the City of Columbus, Ohio.


Facts and Quotes

Poindexter Village was a historic public housing complex in the King-Lincoln Bronzeville neighborhood of Columbus, Ohio. Poindexter Village was the first public housing project in Columbus, and one of the first in the United States. Today, the remaining two buildings are set to become the Poindexter Village Museum and Cultural Center.

Sen. Hearcel F. Craig

announced the passage of his legislation to designate Columbus' Poindexter Village as a historic site, Senate Bill 192. "Poindexter Village is a prominent part of Columbus' vibrant history," said Craig. "By designating this neighborhood as a historical site, we are preserving the extraordinary leadership and dedication of James Preston Poindexter, the influence of FDR's New Deal in our community and – most importantly – the memories and the people that Poindexter Village produced."



- In 1940, the Columbus
 Metropolitan Housing Authority
 completed the construction of
 Poindexter Village, the city's
 first affordable public housing
 project and one of the earliest
 in the nation. The 400-unit lowrise apartment complex was
 built exclusively for Columbus'
 Black population.
- By the 1940s, Columbus'
 Near East Side was a popular migrant destination and a flourishing hub for Black businesses, churches, social organizations, and other community institutions.
- Early residents of Poindexter Village formed a diverse community of doctors, professors, and lawyers mixed with factory workers, domestic servants, chauffeurs, and merchants. Poindexter Village offered its residents a place to call home.
- For generations, Poindexter Village was a place where neighbors looked after one another and elders were revered and respected.

Facts and Quotes

- Poindexter Village thrived through the 1960s. The community nurtured its residents, producing many successful individuals.
- Public investment in affordable housing declined, resulting in a cut to services and maintenance in older public housing units. Many vacant units, too costly to repair, were boarded up. Due to this disinvestment, public officials called for the demolition and redevelopment of Poindexter Village.
- A coalition of former residents and preservationists fought to protect and restore the buildings, but of the thirty-seven buildings that once made up this thriving community, only two were saved. With new construction neighboring these older sites, Poindexter Village is now beginning a new chapter. Once restored, the two remaining buildings will house a museum and learning center. This historic site will share the story of a thriving early-twentieth century African American community and the legacy of the Great Migration in Columbus.
