Ernie Judson Receives Annual Founders Award

Brother Ernest Judson '25 was presented the annual Founders' Award for outstanding service to Phi Sig at the Founders' Day banquet March 17. The presentation was made in behalf of the Los Angeles Alumni Association by brother Bob Topping.

Brother Judson was one of the founders and past presidents of the local group which became the Omega Deuteron Chapter in 1928. He served as the first resident adviser of Omega Deuteron (1949-52), chapter adviser (1952-53), and was for many years secretary-treasurer of the Alumni Association. He is presently, after a few years deserved rest, serving in that capacity again.

The Founders' Award was first presented to a member of the Los Angeles Alumni Association in 1955 and Paul Jones, '30, was the first to receive the honor. Since that time Scheff Nies, '32, Henry Segretti, '27, and Martin Shakley, '23, have been honored also. The active chapter has presented the Founders' Award to Bob Topping '50 and Frank Gifford '52.

Leukemia Takes Life of Phi Sig Dick Van Vliet

A great group of young men were pledged to our fraternity at SC in the fall of 1926. One of those pledges was Dick Van Vliet. He came from Covina where he had played on the Championship CIF Football team the year before under our brother Coach "Chief" Newman

Dick was always a great competitor in athletics, fraternity and business. His fraternity interest never wavered throughout the years and even a few weeks before his death he was still telephoning in rush prospects for Phi Sig.

He is survived by his wife, Madge; a son, George, now a Sophomore at SC and a fine athlete; and a daughter, Shirley, a Senior at Whittier High School

The family, community and Phi Sigma Kappa have all suffered a severe loss with Dick's untimely death.

Chapter President Denny Kouri presented Brother Gifford the Founders' Award on behalf of the Omega Deuteron Chapter. Over 140 Phi Sig alumni, actives and their guests gathered for the banquet. Many of Omega Deuteron's former athletes were present. Among the most well known were Nate Barragar '30 and Ernie Smith '33, both

All-American Football players and former members of the Green Bay Packers.

Hal McDaniel '49, past-president of the LA Phi Sig Alumni Association, introduced the alumni present. Just a few of the prominent brothers attending were Ralph Smith '28, presidentelect of the SC General Alumni Association and member of university Board of Trustees; Vick Knight '52, one of the five men in California just chosen as "Young Men of the Year" by the state JC; Eddie Bernard '27, managing-director of the Biltmore Hotel; Hal Seley '29, part owner of the Los Angeles Rams and owner of a leading racing stable; and Paul C. Jones, Chancellor of the Court of Honor of Phi Sigma

Brother Gifford in accepting the award remarked that the associations he had made as an undergraduate Phi Sig, had become his best friends since graduation, and that the award was something which he greatly appreciated.

At the conclusion of the banquet, movies were shown of the 1951 Cal-SC game, which is considered by most of the experts to be Frank's greatest game for SC. The Bears were leading 14-0 at the end of the half, but Gifford ran wild during the second half and the Trojans finished the game by winning 21-14.

The banquet turned out to be an appropriate and very successful tribute to a great Phi Sig and athlete—Frank Gifford.
