Augusta County Genealogical Society Board Meeting
October 17th, 2018

JoAnn Pendley called the Augusta County Genealogical Board to order at the Augusta County Library on October 17th, 2018. Those present were JoAnn Pendley, Leslie Hall, Sylvia Butt, Harriett Sherwood, Bob Kuykendall, Sharon Sturdivant and David Riel.

The president reported that the Fall Newsletter has been posted. It was decided that a synopsis of the minutes should be published in the newsletter.

The vice-president gave a summary of future programs and announced the "Beginner's Workshop" will continue to be offered in March.

The treasurer reported a balance of \$12,703.69 in general account and \$6,600.89 in the African American Education account.

Members are encouraged to view the display case outside the genealogical library each month. This month Sara Young has put together an exhibit on castles.

The Library committee continues to work on organizing the ACGS library and deciding what should be kept in the ACGS library.

Current total membership in the ACGS is 125.

Research - 726 copies have been sent to 29 researchers in 22 states.

A Video conference for the WEB update will be Thursday 25th October from 2 pm- 6pm at the Augusta County Library.

Several publications were sold at the VGS conference and a future discussion will decide what other conferences to attend and send publications to.

Mike Wilson asked about donating a book he has written on the Wilson family from the 19th century. It was suggested that he could either donate it to Augusta County Library or the ACGS library. It was also decided to take an offer of Back Roads Magazines for the ACGS library.

An additional board meeting will be held on 29th November at 2pm to discuss vision and goals for the ACGS.

The President opened the meeting with a discussion of ACGS vision for the future and long and short term goals. Board members were asked to submit their version of a vision statement to Harriett Sherwood by December 8th. She and Leslie will format a vision statement to be submitted to the board in January.

Long term goals:

ACGS be seen across the country as a viable source for genealogical information on Augusta County.

The ACGS encourage youth interest and involvement in genealogy.

The ACGS maintain the WEB site.

Short term goals:

To increase the accessibility to the ACGS library.

To hold one evening meeting in 2019, possibly in June or July.

To have a new Web site up and running in 2019.

To strive to increase ACGS membership by 10% in 2019.

To retain current membership.

To offer at least one program for Youth in 2019.

To develop future ACGS leadership.

To increase publication sales.

The Program chair confirmed the program for January. Barent Parslow from the Stonewall Museum will present "Researching your Military ancestors". Deborah Harvey will talk about DNA and genealogy in February. Other suggestions for programs included someone from the Special Collections library to talk to us and then a possible follow up field trip.

It was suggested that Lynn Coffey who wrote a series on Appalachian culture called "The Backroads Books", should be asked to speak. Sarah Young has offered to talk about Ahnentafel Charts, a German system of genealogical record. A program on the process of Naturalization might also be considered. A list will be sent around at the next meeting for suggestions for programs.

The treasurer reported electronically \$12,213.42 in general account and \$6,602.29 in the African American account. John also reported that we are Patron members of the VGS and our dues are up to date.

New members Janet McAfee from Ashville, Mary Belle Dudley from Baltimore and Karen Carr were approved. All Chairs of committees should be members of the society. Total membership is 132. David will be asked to remind people in the next newsletter to pay their dues.

JoAnn reported a total of 864 copies of research were made for 34 researchers in 25 states.

Progress is being made by the new web site committee. They have spent more than 16 hours so far in training. It was suggested that a Pay-Pal Account on the web site would make it easier for paying dues and buying publications. The web site will take 6 to 8 months to set up and get running.

JoAnn submitted information to a travel counselor from Staunton Visitors center who requested information about ACGS library and local genealogical resources.

It was agreed that the July picnic will be held at Tinkling Spring and Bob will make the reservation.

The Beverley Manor NSDAR has requested that we advertise their sale of a P. Buckley Moss print designed for the Beverley Manor chapter 125th Anniversary. The board agreed to display information in the ACGS library about the chapter selling the print.

It was decided not to hold a December board meeting and snacks will not be provided at future meetings.

Augusta County Genealogical Society Board Meeting, January 16, 2019

The ACGS board met on January 16th, 2019 at the Augusta County Library and reviewed the programs that will be presented at the meetings this year:

February 20th Deborah Harvey, Professional Genealogist will present a talk on DNA. She will compare the four primary genetic testing companies.

March 20th Sylvia Butt will present "Understanding the process of US immigration" and relate her personal experience of becoming a US citizen.

April 17th TBA

May 15th Sarah Young will present information on how to prepare An Ahnentafel chart, a German numbering system for listing a person's direct ancestors.

David Swartz from the Staunton Camera Museum is unable to get away during our meeting times to speak to us, but suggested we meet at the museum. We could possibly arrange a field trip for those who were interested.

A Beginner's Genealogy Workshop will be held on March 2nd, 9th, and 16th from 10 am to 12 noon at the Augusta County Library.

The Treasurer reported a balance of \$12,414.28 in the general account and \$ 6,655.06 in the African American account. He also outlined the Income and expenses during 2018 and proposed a budget for 2019. The proposed budget was voted on and accepted.

The president commented on the wonderful Alice in Wonderland display by Sara Young. Sylvia Butt mentioned that she would be creating a display in February to honor the birthday of Charles Dickens.

Concerns were raised about hours for the ACGS library and who was responsible for scheduling volunteers. Volunteers are supposed to call their own subs and a book is kept in the library for volunteers to fill in their times and dates. It was suggested that volunteers meet to discuss organization of schedule and other volunteer concerns.

David will take care of a donation of lineage research of 36 Augusta County families from Christy Short and also sort through a stack of old newspapers from John Pilson.

It was suggested that notice of monthly genealogy meetings should be sent to DAR and SAR chapters.

Webmasters (David Riel, Bob Kuykendahl, Sharon Sturdivant and Leslie Hall) met Wednesday, January 9th. They are starting to work on website content and will be looking for assistance from board members. Matt Frenger, the ACL's IT has agreed to assist us with process of submitting the pages to EasyNetSites in appropriate computer format.

Harriett submitted the latest wording for the vision statement and with some discussion and changes it was decided to accept:

“Our vision is to educate, support, preserve, and promote genealogy. An encouraging foundation exists through meetings, workshops, a library and friendships.”

The board held further discussions regarding recording speakers at meetings. Suggestions were made to put it on SKYPE or YOUTUBE. Bob said he had permission to record today's speaker, and we would see how that went before making further decisions.

DNA Solution to a Family Puzzle By Lynn Scott

DNA is the new research tool in genealogy. Yet it is only as effective as any other tool when used in conjunction with other documentation. Sometimes it can give you information that you would have no other way of finding as with my case below.

Many years ago, I found a birth record for my great, great grandfather, Henry Peece, in the baptisms for St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Reinerton, Schuylkill County, Pennsylvania. It lists his birth as 11 August 1851 and his parents as Christian and Elizabeth Pies. (The Pies name is spelled in various way on records including Pees, Pease, Peace and the way my ancestor spelled it - Peece.)


Henry shows up as a nine year old boy on the 1860 census in Juniata County, Pennsylvania, living with William and Elizabeth Brown. Further research revealed that his mother, Elizabeth remarried sometime before 1855 to William Brown. Since she remarried, I assumed her first husband Christian had died, even though I could not find a death record for him. Many men in the area were miners or lumberman, so a work related death at an early age would not be uncommon.

I held that belief until I was checking my matches on the DNA website that I had tested with and came across a match with a similar looking name. There was a Christian Christopher Pace b. 1829 in Dauphin County, Pennsylvania. St. Peter's Evangelical Church baptisms also had a record for Henry's father Christian Pies b. 1829. Since my match and I shared 130 centimorgans, I wondered if Christian Christopher Pace and Christian Pies were the same person.

More research on Christian Pace made me almost certain they are the same man. I found a marriage record for Christian Pace and Harriet Hamblin in Lawrence County, Pennsylvania for 1853. That is about the same time that Christian Pies disappeared from Dauphin County. Christian Pace's Find A Grave record lists the same birth date as Christian Pies. I compared census, tax and land records and once Christian Pace shows up Christian Pies is no longer in the records.

In my years of genealogy research, I have found 3 cases where a man disappeared and then started a new family elsewhere. That is what I think happened here. Christian Pies went to a different county in Pennsylvania (Clearfield), changed his name slightly from Pies to Pace, married a second time and started another family. He eventually ended up in Ohio, his marriage to Harriet lasting over 57 years.

Without the DNA connection, I would never have had any reason to look for a man named Pace. Sharing information with my match, we traded photos of my great, great grandfather, Henry Peece, and her great uncle, son of Christian Pace. The two men look almost identical and are shown below.

DEATHS DURING THE WEEK.



Mr. W. H. Wayland, brother of Mr. Edward J. Wayland of Swoope, died on Thursday of last week in Silver City, New Mexico, of pneumonia. His remains were brought to his old home at Swoope for interment, the funeral taking place Tuesday from Hebron Church. Mr. Wayland was successfully engaged in mining interests and had not been here for twelve years. He was unmarried. Mr. Wayland was born near Swoope in 1844. He served through the Civil War as a member of Co. F. Fifth Virginia Infantry. He was captured near Waynesboro and taken to Point Pleasant, W. Va. He went to New Mexico thirty two years ago.

Milnesville, Jan. 12 – Mrs. Lavina Echard, who has lived in this community for many years, died quite suddenly of heart failure, aged 85 years, 6 months and 4 days, and was laid to rest at Salem church cemetery on Saturday, the 9th instant. The deceased was the mother of several children, two sons living in the West who could not attend the funeral. She was a faithful and loving mother and a good neighbor and friend to all classes of our people. She was the oldest person living in our community. Rev. Peter Garber of the German Baptist church, conducted the services and preached from the words, “Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from hence forth, and their works follow them.”

Mrs. Julia Frances, wife of Mr. J. J. Shuey, died at their home near Swoope at half past two o'clock Friday afternoon. She had been a sufferer for 30 years, but there had been no special change in her condition until in the past few days. She was a devoted wife and mother and a consecrated Christian and bore her years of suffering with fortitude.

Mrs. Shuey was the daughter of the late John and Sarah Mizer of this county, and was 71 years old. She is survived by her husband and three sons, B. F. and James L. Shuey of the county, and Rev. J. W. Shuey of Alone, Rockbridge county. The funeral took place at 11 o'clock Sunday from Mt. Tabor Lutheran church, of which she was a communicant, and the interment was in the burying ground of the church, the pastor, Rev. E. A. Repass, officiating.

Mt. Solon, Va., Jan. 11 – Mr. Peter Miller, a prominent farmer of near this place, died at his home at 9 o'clock p.m. Thursday. The deceased was aged 75 years and 10 months. Mr. Miller came from Rockingham and engaged in the manufacture of paper on Mossy creek, which was successfully conducted by Sheets, Buck and Miller until near the close of the war, when he retired from the paper business and purchased a farm where he was living at the time of his death. He leaves a wife, three daughters and three sons and a large number of relations to mourn his loss. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. John Blick of the German Baptist church at Emmanuel's church, Saturday at eleven o'clock, when the remains were laid to rest in the presence of a large number of sympathizing friends: Messrs. Geo. Stoutamayer, Simeon Cupp, W. P. Rush, Martin Daggy, John Cassiday and John Rusmiser acted as pallbearers.

night. The funeral was from the Lutheran church at Churchville Sunday afternoon. Mr. M. L. Masincupp of this city, is a son of the deceased.

Mr. J. G. O'Callaghan, the popular deputy postmaster, was married in Brooklyn on Monday to Miss Mary K. Walter, eldest daughter of Prof. and Mrs. F. W. Walter of this city. After an extended tour they will be at home to their friends at 341 East Beverly street
