## General Rules

1. Exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor.
2. Exhibitors may enter as many classes as they wish, but each exhibitor may enter only one item per class.

9. NO PERSON WHO HAS AN EXHIBIT IN THE SHOW WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE BUILDING DURING JUDGING, EXCEPT THOSE PERSONS INVOLVED IN HANDLING AND SETTING UP THE DISPLAYS.
10. Exhibits will be open for public viewing from: 4:00 to 9:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 13, 2024; and 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 14, 2024.
11. Prizes and awards will be presented at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 14, 2024.
12. Judges' decision will be final. (Judging standards apply.)
13. In the case of a tie in the Aggregate prize awards, the person with the most first place ribbons shall receive the award.

# Horticulture <br> SECTION 1 - FIELD CROPS <br> Committee Chairperson: Dana Bawden, 780-672-3465 

## RULES

1. ALL ENTRIES MUST BE GROWN IN 2024 by the individual entering, except for threshed grains which must be from 2023.
2. Any active farmer of the same family may exhibit from the same farm, but not in the same classes except class 127, where they must be different crops.
3. All grains may be labelled as to variety grown from.
4. Grain sheaves should be tied 3 times and be at least 1 " wide at the centre band; not to exceed $30 "$ in length.
5. Grain sheaves should be stripped of leaves; forage sheaves should not be stripped.
6. Forage sheaves should be a minimum $15^{\prime \prime}$ in length and $4^{\prime \prime}$ in width; canola seed sheaves should not exceed 40 " in length and tied with 3 bands.
7. All threshed grains become property of The Round Hill Bench Show.

## RULES

1. Exhibits must be the property of the exhibitor and have been in his/her possession for the previous two months.
2. ANY ONE OR MORE MEMBERS OF THE SAME FAMILY MAY EXHIBIT FROM THE SAME FAMILY GARDEN, BUT NOT IN THE SAME CLASS, except classes 235, 236, 237, 238, 239 and 244; entries from the same family must be of DIFFERENT KINDS.
3. Display vegetables and fruit on a SUITABLE SIZE PLATE OR TRAY. (eg. cucumbers on an OBLONG tray, peas or berries on a SMALL PLATE) - NAME VARIETIES.
4. The management reserves the right to remove from the building any exhibit found to be infected with insects or disease.
5. Judged by A.H.A. certified judges.
