Bottle Jacks - Safety First

Bottle jacks are very reliable, but not always safe around the Model A Ford. We wish to manufacture a fixture to help insure your bottle jack stays put. As a chapter project, we will be making the top that fits atop the jack as shown. This fixture will fit down over the adjustable stem on your bottle jack. It would help keep a front axle in the structure and would center on the curvature of the rear axle. Since jacks come in different size necks, we need to know what sizes will be required for these adjustable neck extensions on your jack. Metal pipe comes in three sizes that we might be considering. Steel pipe comes with inside diameters of 3/4, 1, and 1.1/2 inch sizes. We might be able to manufacture these in a \$10 to \$15 price range.

We need to know if anyone is interested and what size the top of your jack is. Measure yours and bring the measurement to the August 23rd meeting or email to ken Coleman at kcoleman555@gmail.com.

Nebraska Tour September 10-12th 2021! Travel Guide along our way!

Friday 9/10

Meeting at the McDonalds in Platte City, we head out to connect with the Glacial Hills Scenic Byway that starts in Leavenworth and continues thru Atchison. The Glacial Hills Scenic Byway gets its name from the gently rolling hills and rock-strewn valleys carved by glaciers that once covered the land. The scenic drive continues north to the Nebraska through fields and prairies that arc over rolling hills sculpted by glaciers some 10,000 years ago. Our first stop is planned for Troy Kansas where there will be a restroom stop, and an opportunity to check out a few attractions at the courthouse square.



The Peter Toth Indian Monument" Tall Oak" monument sits in the courtyard of the Doniphan County Courthouse. This Monument was sculpted from a Burr Oak log 67 inches in diameter, and at the time it fell, stood 100 feet tall. It is now sculpted to a height of 27 feet. Sculptor Peter Toth was born in 1947, behind the Iron Curtain in Hungary, and was one of 11 children. He was taught wood carving by his father before they fled with 200,000 other Hungarians after a violent anti-communist uprising. Traveling by train and foot, they crossed the icy swamps into Yugoslavia, and stayed in refugee camps. Peter was just 11 years old. Eventually they relocated to Akron, OH. Inspired by John F. Kennedy's famous quote "Ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country," he set out to do an homage to the plight of the American Indian in every state,

beginning his work in 1972. Toth took no money for his art, but sometimes accepted help with living expenses as he carved his way across the country. He works with cities, park departments, chambers of commerce, etc., to erect the giant sculptures. He has now finished at least one monument to the Native Americans in each state.

The Statue of Liberty Replica placed on the courthouse lawn is one of more than 200 replica Statue of Liberty's which were placed in 39 states plus Guam, Puerto Rico, the Canal Zone, and the Philippines between 1949 and 1951. The statues were placed in celebration of the Boy Scouts 40th Anniversary with the theme "Strengthen the Arm of Liberty." Each of the statues made of stamped copper, weigh about 290 pounds and stand about 8 1/2 feet tall without the base. The campaign to place the statues was the idea of Kansas City Scout volunteer, Jack Whitaker and were manufactured by Friedley-Voshardt in Chicago. They sold for \$300 to \$350. This particular statue was dedicated September 15, 1950, and restored and rededicated in 2005.

Continuing on, the byway winds along bluffs of sandstone and loess (German for "loose soil," brought here by wind and the river), passing by White Cloud, a riverboat port which once had a population of 2000. When the railroads came to Kansas following the Civil War, the river traffic declined, and so did the town. Prior to the town being founded in 1957, the location was one of the stops for Lewis and Clark. White Cloud is the home of the original piggybank. A local boy, Wilbur Chapman, was 10 years old in 1910 when he heard about a youngster with leprosy. To help, Chapman sold a pig for \$25 and sent the money to the Leprosy Foundation. From this came the idea of distributing piggybanks to school children to raise money for fighting the illness, Breeze said. By 1938, when a monument to Chapman was dedicated, 100,000 cast iron piggybanks collected more than \$1 million.







The byway continues north to the Kansas/ Nebraska state line, where a large sign explains the boundary between the two. The Kansas-Nebraska Act of 1854 created territories that had to be surveyed before they could be settled. The sign tells the story of how in 1855, a 6-foot-tall, 600-pound cast iron obelisk was hefted up the 100-foot bluff just west of the road to mark this boundary/base line. You can't see



the obelisk from the road, but there's a leaf-strewn dirt path and periodic handrail if you feel brave on a return trip. The marker was placed on May 8, 1855 and was used for the initial point of survey for Nebraska, Kansas and

parts of Colorado, Wyoming, and South Dakota.

We travel through Rulo, Nebraska. Rulo is located on the Missouri River in Richardson County, Nebraska. The land was originally part of the land granted to the Native American wife of Charles Rouleau and the town of Rulo was named after her and her husband. Rulo was a riverboat port, and also a ferry crossing, with ferries in operation from the mid 1800s until a bridge opened in 1939. In 1933, the foundation for the Rulo Bridge, a toll bridge across the Missouri River, was laid. Construction of the bridge began in 1938, after the WPA decided to finance half the cost. The bridge was finished in 1939. Following the access the bridge allowed, Rulo became a favorite place for buying fish



taken fresh from the Missouri River, with fishing shacks up and down the riverbank. At least 13 families made their living by taking fish from the river. 1939 bridge, deemed too narrow for semi-trailers and farm machinery was replaced 2013, and the old bridge demolished in 2014.



Continuing on through Falls City Nebraska, we will make a gas stop as needed. Falls City was founded in 1857. The town is located on the north side of the Big Nemaha River, in the southeast corner of the state. The river in 1857 had banks and bed of rock and stone. The town was located near where the river flowed over a four-foot rock ledge called the "Falls of Nemaha", for which the town was named. Over time the river has changed to the extent that the falls no longer exist. The town was a stop on the Underground Railroad for escaping slaves during the struggles resulting from the Kansas–Nebraska Act. Falls City grew in the late 19th century due to the arrival of the Atchison & Nebraska Railroad in 1871 and the Missouri Pacific in 1882

Our route continues north to Indian Cave State Park, our second stop. Here, we will be met with a box lunch from Subway, and cold drinks for a picnic lunch before completing a wonderful scenic drive around the park. The park is named for a large sandstone cave with prehistoric petroglyphs within the park, and was established in 1962. (Note, at this time the boardwalk to the cave is closed due to flood damage. Repairs are scheduled to begin Fall of 2021, probably not in time for our tour.) The park also



includes the partially reconstructed village of St. Deroin, established in 1853 as part of the former Nemaha Half-Breed Reservation. Indian Cave State Park encompasses 3,052 acres bordering the Missouri River. There are many other wonderful things to see in the park, but time constraints will limit our activity to a scenic drive for this tour.



Following our afternoon at the park, it's time to head for the <a href="https://historic.nc/historic.com/hist

When he got sick, her Grandma, Ines Roberts qualified to become
the first woman pilot on the Missouri River and took over the night
shift as captain of the ferry.





Our Hotel: River Inn Resort is a permanently moored riverboat sitting in the shallows of the Missouri river on the edge of Brownville. Hosts Randel and Jane Smith offer warm hospitality onboard the 18-room floating inn.

Your day will start properly with deluxe breakfast service, included in the price of the room. The spacious, sunny second deck common area is the perfect place for guests to relax and get to know each other. Games, books, magazines and binoculars are all available for those who seek the quiet, simple pleasures of life.







An optional stop in Brownville following checking in to our rooms is the <u>Chitwood Wheel Museum</u> which has recently been renovated and reopened to the public. It features a steam engine, Nebraska river exhibit, press room and carriages. The exterior of the building has recently been restored to its look from the 1920s. This building provides an excellent backdrop for a unique photo op too!



For supper Friday evening, we will travel 10 miles to the Re-bucks Burger and BBQ restaurant in Auburn Nebraska. More than just a BBQ joint, there should be something for everyone!

If time allows, there is a unique little general store and gas station owned by a local body shop in Auburn that we can visit for a photo op.



Saturday 9/11

Start your morning off with breakfast on the boat! Then we head toward Nebraska City, with a special stop along the way.

Julian Nebraska, population 58, is our first stop of the day, to visit the recently restored 1928 Julian Filling Station. The filling station was first opened in 1928, and it closed in the 1960s. The town recently raised around \$30,000 to restore this tiny station, and the grand reopening of it as a museum took place in October 2019. The



filling station was a 'Deep Rock' station when it opened in 1928 and also operated as a farmers coop. On the new pumps out front, they put the 'Deep Rock' logo on one globe, and the price of gas shows what it would have been when the station opened. On the other pump, there is a 'Co-op' logo on the globe, and the price of gas shows what it would have been when the station closed. The filling station also has a garage which was part of the original complex.

Next stop is Nebraska City, and the Kregel Windmill Museum. The museum has been described as a time capsule of early 20th Century shop-type manufacturing. Everyday things such as ledger books on shelves, telephone, pencils and pens on the desk, even an overcoat on a hook remain where they were last used. The building appears much as it did in the 1930's when invoices were written by hand, correspondence was typed on a manual typewriter machine and even local

phone calls were be placed through an operator. The company produced "Eli" branded windmills, moving to this building in 1903. The actual factory was shut down after WWII, and has been preserved with all of its original manufacturing

equipment. The machinery in the factory is powered by a central transverse line shaft and leather belts coming down to pulleys on each machine. The line shaft itself was originally powered by a single cylinder engine, but was converted to electricity in the 1920s.

Our second stop in Nebraska City is the Nebraska City Museum of Fire Fighting. explores the history of the oldest fire department in Nebraska. Many antique pieces of equipment are on display, all once in use by Nebraska City firefighters. The 1884 Button coal fire steam engine is the showcase of the museum. Historic photographs and authentic streetscapes reflect many different eras, from the early 1800's to present day. A 9/11 exhibit and interactive exhibits for all ages are also featured. I think we will all enjoy the final exhibit, the Model A Fire Chiefs Fordor! And yes, the underneath is red too!

Working Around Your Car's Battery

Whenever working on the electrical parts of your car, it is a good idea to de-energize everything to prevent an accidental short circuit. For example, one of the horn wires in "hot" all the time, so any time you do anything with the horn cover, it's a good idea to disconnect the battery. The same is true of the brake light switch and the wires inside the instrument panel in the car.

If you have a fuse on the yellow wire that comes off of the starter switch, just removing the fuse will do the trick. Or if you have a battery cut-off switch on the car, that will kill the power to everything.

But in many cases you need to disconnect the ground strap from the battery in order to make sure everything is without power. Perhaps you need to remove the starter cable, or the battery itself. Whenever you remove cables from the battery posts, it is a really good idea to cover the battery post with something to prevent accidental contact between it and the other battery post.

For example, if you dropped a wrench or other tool while working around or above the battery, it could land on top of the battery touching both posts. This will short out the battery, which can be a really big problem, resulting in a fire or perhaps the battery exploding acid all over.

When you buy a new battery for most cars today, they are sold with one or two small plastic caps over the battery posts. I see them in red and black plastic. If you go to your local auto parts store, the people there may even give you a few of these caps, if you ask.

I keep several of them in my box of battery-related tools and things, to put over the posts of any battery I am working around. It is easy to do and only takes a minute.

Take a minute to be safe. Enjoy! And Have a Model A Day! Jim



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
