

#### OUR MODEL A'S


I bought my first Model A in 1972. I became interested in Model A's and learned of a gentleman living near Neosho, Missouri who owned a Model A coupe. He was using it to haul coal and fence posts in the trunk. He had moved to Neosho from Colorado, where he had used the Model A to herd sheep. He had many interesting experiences to tell about this Model A. I purchased the car for \$250.00 and drove it twenty miles to my dad's farm ... and started making repairs. Fortunately my dad had owned and restored several Model A's and Model T's, so his knowledge was appreciated, and I was pretty much the "gopher guy." When it was completed we brought it home and enjoyed short trips and taking our children and their friends on picnics and fishing at Shawnee Mission Park.

In the meantime, I really had my eye on a pretty little 1928 Roadster owned by an elderly couple in Arkansas. I remember the history of this car even when I was six years old. My parents owned a grocery store and gas station ten miles north of Eureka Springs, Arkansas. The couple would drive in to buy groceries and I would help my dad fill the car with gas pumped from the old type gas pump. He always wanted to buy their car. Even after moving to Wheaton, Missouri he still kept in contact. By this time the car was parked in a barn and driven less frequently. One day 44 years later, the lady called, saying, "I'm 90 years old and my children won't let me drive anymore. Do you still want the 28 Roadster?" Needless to say it didn't take long to drive down and get the little beauty.

Bob Swigert had invited us to join The Plain Ol' A's, telling us about all the wonderful people. After visiting we totally agreed. At the time we joined, the club was smaller with about 25 members. Since I wasn't an expert on Model A's, I also needed the comfort of being around those who were. We

enjoyed the experience of short trips, parades, and escorting Ronald McDonald's grand openings. We also enjoyed escorting the Lenexa Sr. King and Queen in the fourth of July parade, as has been our custom for the last fifteen years.

In 1988 a gentleman from Pittsburg, Kansas called, saying he was looking for a 1928 Roadster and had heard about ours and would we be interested in selling? After making a quick call, I verified that "The Ultimate" had just become available, a 1931 Deluxe Roadster. So we said good-bye to the "little yellow Roadster," and started all over again.



I don't have a lot of history on my present 1931 Deluxe Roadster. It belonged to Mr. Holmes, the funeral director at Monett, Missouri. He passed away living five cars to his son, who really wasn't interested in antique cars. The son remembered it was purchased in Tulsa, Oklahoma as a basket case and was rebuilt in Monett, Missouri.

We have enjoyed driving in the American Royal Parade the last three years and many other parades with the car club. We especially enjoy taking the grandchildren on trips to the park and for special events. We had a wonderful trip to Colorado. It was great fun putting the top down and breathing the fresh air, however, I did put the top up when driving up Pikes Peak! That air was a bit too fresh!

## Southeast Nebraska Tour Recap - My First Model A Tour

### Prologue

We heard that the neighboring club, the Northwest Missouri Model A Ford Club, was planning a three-day tour of southeast Nebraska in early September. It would start in northeast Kansas. (Three state names and multiple compass points in the first paragraph should not concern the geographically challenged. It won't matter. Proceed without caution.) We wouldn't be crossing 3 whole states, but I confirmed that this would cover nearly 450 miles along the Missouri River. Yep, not going to happen. Our Cabriolet just celebrated its 90th birthday. Congratulations! Decision made. Done.

I was overridden by my wife, Deborah. I had never been on a multi-day Model A tour while she was the old pro. She had spent her teens protesting thousands of such trips in a '31 Woody Station Wagon to the deaf ears of her parents. Now she promised that we would have fun. I was as perplexed by her change of heart as I was by her disregard of my thin experience repairing automobiles. I did what any other cautious husband would do. I accepted her logic, signed up for a AAA membership ...and caved.

Other preparations included checking our wills and saying goodbye to family, friends, pets, people I owed money ...anyone who might report our disappearance to the authorities. I read some about Lewis and Clark's "Journey of Discovery." They also had an adventure traveling up this river. Since no paddles were provided in the standard Ford equipment, the often-cited metaphor resonated with ominous foreboding. We left early on Friday morning.

### Travelogue

These stories usually contain a travelogue of place names and sightseeing destinations. I'm sorry to have included some of that directly below. I'll make it brief, but feel free to skip past the bullets below.

- " Julian contained an excellent restored 1930's gas station.
- " Brownville very quaint. The town name could be a reference to the river.
- " Auburn a lovelier shade of Brownville.
- " Nebraska City was exactly that ...except maybe a bit smaller than "city" would suggest. For me, the windmill factory museum was the highlight.
- Indian Cave Park No Indian. No cave (It was out of order). However, the park was big and very well kept.
- " Scenery river and prairie images which rivaled the best Thomas Hart Benton paintings. Very nice. Thanks for your patience. Now onto the unexpected, the human drama, the good, the bad, and the ugly.

## The good

Our overnight accommodations were on a riverboat in Brownville. It was a nod to the historic traditions of this majestic vessel that the boarding procedures did not include TSA scans or pat downs. Of course, being firmly anchored to shore, hijacking was out of the question. It could float just in case the river rose. This was billed as a convenience to everyone avoiding the widening effects of life vest fashions. The riverboat was nicely appointed and very comfortable.

The tour included a Saturday evening dinner cruise on "The Spirit of Brownville," an adjacent boat capable of navigation. We were treated to a fine meal and, afterward, the sights and smells of the river. Our arrival back at the dock was signaled by a very agitated calliope.

#### The bad

The calliope is a very loud steam driven organ. It ranks right up there on the list of most dreaded musical instruments with the bagpipes, the bowed-handsaw, the cat-hammer, and Yoko Ono. Calliopes are inextricably associated with old merry-go-rounds and riverboats.

A bit about merry-go-rounds. Merry-go-rounds were first imagined in the 14th century by the Italian poet, Dante. He imagined a misery-filled future for the wicked doomed to the inner rings of hell. His design was unworkable. The merry-go-round, so envisioned, did not make it to reality until someone placed a calliope in its center. This made

all the difference. The calliope would start-up and folks jumped at any quick path to safety. When the horses were spoken for, panicking adults, and even children, would even throw themselves onto the backs of galloping ostriches... lions... tigers... bears. Their fate was sealed as their speeding mounts would then cruelly orbit ....never gaining any distance from the cacophony. Their screams of despair were drowned out by the unceasing toots and howls.

Introduction of the calliope to riverboats had a similar impact but the screams were drowned out by actual drowning. The tormented jumped overboard. The calliope's continued presence upon riverboats was surely responsible for a significant loss of passenger traffic and the rise of the railroads.

It was no surprise then that, back on our docked cruise boat, there was a mad scramble to escape when that infernal contraption sounded off. A swarm of hornets could not have had a more instantaneous effect. Thankfully, no passengers or hands were lost in the evacuation of the decks. I imagine burials at sea are less than somber when the bottom is mere feet away and the departed are barely so.

### The ugly

One car was running poorly, died, and started gushing gas onto the ground. This was a very dangerous situation. There could have been a fire or even EPA sanctions. Somebody whipped out a carburetor float to slap in there. All good. Everyone got back on the road.

An extremely nice Fordor almost had a wheel fall off. A cotter pin had sheared and the axle nut then spun off. The axle key was mangled as it worked out of the keyway. A replacement cotter pin was quickly found. No problem. But the key? Out of the bazillion parts in a Model A, somebody, with the preparedness of an Eagle Scout, had intentionally packed this random item. The wheel was reassembled. The lug nuts were tightened. Off we went.

Other mechanical complaints came from a Tudor. It would not start. Many willing mechanics descended unrestrained and started working it over. There were so many hands under that hood that I'm sure they were in a cycle of undoing and re-doing the work of someone right next to them in the scrum. They're heroic guys who know far more than me, but I am grateful no one was struck with appendicitis while on the roadside. An appendix should really only have to be removed once.

The patient pulled through and started-up. After 10 miles the Tudor again died and, again, would not restart. Many of the pit crew, unwilling to be the last guy to touch it before it went on the trailer, stayed back. I was shocked by my first available glimpse under the hood. I'd heard of fixing things with baling wire and chewing gum but thought that was exaggeration. The coil was actually suspended from the radiator braces with baling wire. Honest to gawd baling wire! It was necessary because a bracket for the replacement coil was not on hand. Whatever the issue, it was not resolved with the coil. The car was pushed onto the trailer for some later diagnostic procedures. It was time to roll on.

## **Epilogue**

Yada, yada, yada...and then we slid into home on Sunday afternoon. Safe! So what did I take away from this experience?

There were many "auto prepare" lessons for me. Bring the Les Andrews books and a wide selection of parts. Experienced hands and the parts you did not pack will always be offered but, just in case, be nice to the guy hauling the trailer. And finally, when necessary, be open to innovation (i.e., remember to bring baling wire and duct tape). Even Lewis and Clark recognized car show judging standards are secondary to survival.

I also came to recognize some broader truths. Southeastern Nebraska is beautiful in September. Good gin is hard to find there so pack it. Our Cabriolet was capable of more than I expected. My wife knows what she is talking

about. We had fun.

### Carl Bohland's Auto Wash Bowl

Carl Bohland patented the auto wash bowl in 1921. His idea was that cars would drive into a large, concrete bowl filled with water. After a couple of times around the bowl, the cars would be clean. Or, at least, cleaner.

Back in this early age of motoring, roads were often unpaved and muddy, and that mud would get caked on the underside of the car and the wheels – but a spin in the nifty Auto Wash Bowl took care of that.

Customers paid 25 cents to an attendant who strapped a protective rubber cover over the radiator. Patrons would then enter the bowl via a ramp and drive their cars around and around the bowl at a speed of about 10 miles per hour. The ridges in the concrete would vibrate the car and the water, creating a sloshing action that helped wash away all the mud from the chassis and wheels. The whole process took about 3 or 4 minutes.




