How to Deliver Medications for Pharmacies

1. Obtain your Pharmacy Technician License for the State in which you reside.

For the State of Georgia (Georgia Board of Pharmacy) - visit <u>Georgia Board of</u> Pharmacy

- a. Click on "Apply online"
- b. Open an account
- c. Fill out **Pharmacy Technician Application Supplement Packet** (you can go under applications and forms) \$100 at the time of this writing
- d. For the State of GA, I took my application to the 11th Floor of the address of the application Georgia Board of Pharmacy 2 MLK Jr. Drive, SE, 11th Floor East Tower Atlanta, GA 30334 (didn't trust mailing the application)
- e. The notary was free at this location
- f. The employees will help you to sign up for the location nearest you to get your fingerprints and background check (there was a small fee)
- g. I obtained my Pharmacy Technician's License in about two weeks by email
- 2. Obtain your Bloodborne Pathogen License (got mine for \$9.99 from the National CPR Foundation online; short quiz at the end which is easy). There is also the American CPR Care Association (\$9.95). You'll receive your card in the mail for a keychain and for your wallet
- 3. Obtain your courier license (optional) <u>Home Integrity Medical Courier Training</u>, <u>Courier Certification Training Therapak</u>
- 4. Ensure you have a clean driving record
- 5. Don't mind driving, choose a shift
- 6. Track your mileage for tax purposes
- Investigate companies that you would like to work for I'll give you a short list -<u>Drive For Us » SDS Rx</u>, MedZoomer.com, Dropoff.com
- Register with local and hospital pharmacies in your area in which to work/contract
- 9. I suggest purchasing at least two sets of scrubs. Scrubs are a sign of "authority" and people don't generally bother individuals wearing them because it is assumed they are in the medical field. I have blue scrubs. A family member of mine also has a lab coat.
