Find Fergus / Mike Boldt / Doubleday Books for Young Readers, 2020.

Fergus the bear wants to play hide and seek with the reader, but will need help--and practice--to hide well. An interactive romp.

Green on Green / Dianne White / Beach Lane Books, 2020.

With gentle, rhyming text and vivid artwork, this book is a heartfelt celebration of family, nature, seasons, colors, and the wonder and magic of them all.
