Face the clerk, raise 2 your right hand and take the oath. 3 THEREUPON, 4 Was called as a witness and after having been first duly 5 sworn on oath, was examined and testified as follows: 6 7 THE BAILIFF: Have a seat in the witness stand. 8 Speak in a loud and clear voice. 9 DIRECT EXAMINATION 10 BY MR. BULONE: 11 Q. Okay. , go ahead and take a deep breath. 12 Please state your name for the jury. 13 Α. 14 Q. And are you employed? 15 A. Yes. 16 Q. What do you do? 17 I'm a cashier. A. 18 Do you go to school? Q. 19 A. Uh-huh. 20 What are you taking? Q. 21 A. Just basics. 22 Q. Where do you live now? 23 Α. In Clearwater. 24 And how old are you? Q. 25 A. Twenty-one.

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	e. Let's go back to July the 14th, July 15th of
•	1989. Where were you living at that time?
:	A
4	Q. Is that a house or apartment?
5	
6	Q. And who did you live there with?
7	A. My fiance, and my son.
8	Q. And how old was your son then; do you remember?
9	A. About three-and-a-half months old.
10	Q. How old is he now?
11	A. Seventeen months.
12	Q. And is your fiance now?
13	A. Yeah.
14	Q. And is he the father of
15	A. Yes.
16	Q. Now, in this triplex did you guys live in the
17	east apartment?
18	A. Yes.
19	Q. And did somebody else live in the west apartment?
20	A. Dave and Barb.
21	Q. Okay. David Stewart?
22	A. Yeah, I guess, that's his last name.
23	Q. And then is there an apartment on the south side
24	as well?
25	A. The landlord Theresa's apartment.
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1	Q. So it's kind of U-shaped?
2	
3	Q. Did you know the Defendant in this case Kevin
4	Herrick?
5	A. He had been staying there for a couple weeks, so
6	I had seen him and we had talked to him a few times, but I
7	didn't know him really.
8	Q. He had been staying where?
9	A. With the landlord.
10	Q. Do you see him in the courtroom today?
11	A. Yeah.
12	Q. Could you please point him out and describe what
13	he's wearing for the record?
14	A. He's wearing a black coat and gray shirt and
15	black tie.
16	MR. BULONE: Your Honor, may the record reflect
17	the witness has identified the Defendant Mr. Herrick?
18	THE COURT: Let the record reflect that this
19	witness has identified the Defendant.
20	Q. (By Mr. Bulone) During the couple of weeks that
21	he was living with the landlady about how many times did
22	you see him?
23	A. Just a few times.
24	Q. What were the circumstances when you saw him?
25	A. Well, we were having a barbecue and he was

1	walking around the triplex, I guess, smoking a cigarette
2	and he was talking to We watched
3	videos with him one time and played a game of chess with
4	him one time.
5	Q. How many times do you think he was in your
6	apartment?
7	A. Four or five, probably, total.
8	Q. Were you ever in his apartment at all?
9	A. In Theresa's?
10	Q. Yeah.
11	A. I've been in the kitchen and stuff.
12	Q. With him?
13	A. No, with her.
14	Q. Now, when he normally left your apartment how
15	would he leave?
16	A. Most of the time he left through the back sliding
17	glass doors.
18	Q. All right. Let's go specifically to July 14th,
19	1989.
20	Did you see the Defendant on that day?
21	A. During the day, yeah, that's when we played a
22	game of chess.
23	Q. Okay. Please describe how you first saw him on
24	that day?
25	A. He came over and he wanted to play a game of

]	chess with . It was time for to get off work,
2	so he said he would play a game of chess with me. I told
3	him he'll be home in a minute and I'll play chess, so we
4	did.
5	Q. Was the baby there?
6	A. I think I just put him down for a nap. Either
7	that or he was in his swing, I'm not really sure.
8	Q. Okay. What happened after that?
9	A. came home about five minutes after he
10	showed up and he was with his friend Tammy and Darrel. We
11	decided to go to a drive.
12	decided to go to a drive-in. Kevin left and Tammy and
	Darrel left, so me and went to the drive-in.
13	Q. With the baby?
14	A. Yeah.
15	Q. Then you came home from the drive-in?
16	A. We only saw the first movie because the baby was
17	grumpy.
18	Q. Do you know what time you got home?
19	A. Around 11:30.
20	Q. What did you do after you got home?
21	A. I took a bath, put the baby down first for
22	nighttime. came to the door, to the bathroom door,
23	and told me he was going to go with Dave to drop off
24	tropical fish to his mother's house because the tank was
25	not ready for the fish or something.

1	Q. And you said okay?
2	A. Yeah, I said okay.
3	Q. What did you do after that?
4	A. Went to sleep. I had cracked the baby's door
5	open, and I leave the bathroom light on because I have to
6	get up and feed him, and I just went to sleep.
7	Q. Did you leave the bathroom light on?
8	A. I'm not sure if it was the bathroom or hall light.
9	Q. But you left one of them on?
10	A. Uh-huh.
11	Q. You went to sleep?
12	A. Yes.
13	Q. Where did you go to sleep?
14	A. In my bedroom.
15	Q. On your bed in your bedroom?
16	A. Uh-huh.
17	Q. What happened after that?
18	A. Well, I woke up. I don't know how long I had
19	been sleeping, and there's there guy over me and it was
20	dark. I couldn't see anything except for like an image
21	over me. He had his knees on either side of me and a
22	knife to my neck.
23	Q. Did you feel the knife?
24	A. I thought it was a scalpel because it was so
25	sharp.

1	Q. It was either a scalpel or a knife?
2	A. Uh-huh.
3	Q. Did this man have any clothes on?
4	A. A shirt, I think, because it seemed like a dark
5	shirt. I could just see the outline. I couldn't really
6	see any details.
7	Q. Did he have any pants or underwear on?
8	A. No, it was in my face.
9	Q. What was in your face?
10	A. His penis.
11	Q. What did he do then?
12	A. He told me if I didn't suck on it he was going
13	to kill the baby.
14	Q. What happened after that,
15	A. He just kept trying and he kept threatening the
16	baby. I was getting scared. I told him not to touch the
17	baby and he said just do it. I just couldn't do it
18	because I was scared, you know. The knife was right on my
19	neck and he kept trying to shove it in. And one time when
20	I was screaming, he started to put his hand over my mouth
21	and then he just started moving the knife down. I don't
22	know whether he was going to cut me or stab me or cut my
23	underwear or what.
24	Then he turned around and was there. He
25	jumped up and they started going back and forth. I didn't

know if he was going to kill him or not. 1 2 Was this man ever able to get his penis inside of 3 your mouth? 4 Α. Once. 5 It actually went inside your mouth? Q. 6 A. Yes. 7 Was that against your will? Q. 8 Α. Yes. 9 Did you notice if the hall light or the bathroom Q. light was still on? 10 11 I couldn't see anything, so I believe it was off because I couldn't see really anything. 12 13 What happened next then? Q. 14 Α. Well, him and were just fighting back and 15 forth and, you know, I wasn't sure if a gun was going to go off or if he was going to get stabbed or anything. 16 They were just fighting back and forth and he had a knife 17 18 in s face. He told him to back up and let him get his pants. 19 20 Now where did this take place, in the bedroom Q. 21 still? 22 It was still in the bedroom. Α. 23 What happened after he was waving the knife or Q. 24 scalpel around? 25 Α. let him get his pants off the ground and,

you know, when I looked down it looked like jeans with a big belt buckle, so that's another reason why I thought it was the guy next door. Then he closed us in the room and we were trying to get the door open and told him — he said he was going to go kill the baby if we didn't let go of the door. So we let go of the door and said to stay away from the baby. So after he opened the door I ran into the room and checked on him.

- Q. Was he okay?
- A. Yeah, he was still sleeping.
- Q. Sleeping like a baby, huh?
- A. Yeah.
- Q. Okay. What happened after that?
- A. I guess , like, chased him out to the hallway. He went to the glass sliding door, apparently, because I heard say it's locked and I guess -- I didn't really see. I just heard the door's locked and then chased him out down the street. And I started screaming out the front door that somebody tried to rape me and that somebody stabbed because he had blood all over him.
- Q. Who were the first people that came out of their doors besides yourself and ??
- A. I'm not sure if it was Theresa or Barb. It was Theresa because Theresa was like, "Oh, my God. What's

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wrong?" And I told her. I was just screaming and holding onto the baby because I was really scared. I told her that you know somebody tried to rape me and threatened to kill the baby and that ran after him. She was just ranting and raving, "Oh, my God. Oh, my God," and then Barb and Dave -- well, Barb came out and I guess came back and told them to call the police.

- Q. Was Theresa still out there?
- A. Yeah, she stayed out there.
- Q. Were the police called and the ambulance?
- A. I guess Barb called them and they showed up and everything, yeah.
 - Q. What happened after that?
- A. Well, the policemen was asking what was -- they came and just investigated. And they had to take to the hospital because he had two stab wounds in his chest and they just pretty much were looking at all the fingerprints and everything.
 - Q. Did you see the Defendant after that?
- A. Yeah. He came right through the front door, and I didn't know it was him, but I kept thinking it was him because I couldn't see him. All I saw was an outline, but when he walked out I felt sick to my stomach because I knew it was him. But he just came out the front door.
 - Q. Was he the last person out of all the neighbors

and everything? 1 2 Yes. 3 And then did you go to the hospital with Q. 4 then? 5 No I went home with my mother. Α. 6 Q. Then did go there? 7 Yeah, they had to take him to the hospital. A. 8 Q. And then did go to your mom's house after 9 that? 10 Α. Yes, he did. 11 Did he call the police from there? Q. 12 He called and made a positive identification A. 13 then. 14 Let me ask you this: Before you even spoke to 15 about who this was, did you have an idea about who 16 the attacker was? 17 A. Yes. 18 Q. And who was that? 19 Kevin Richard Herrick. Α. 20 And why did you feel that way, what observations? Q. 21 Just everything. It was just -- like the dark Α. shirt, he always wore the same shirts when he was walking 22 around the apartments. It was like the dark shirt and his 23 build, the outline of his hair, just everything. 24 that, but it was just everything led up to it. I just 25

1	Q. Big belt buckle?
2	A. Yes.
3	Q. Now was there anything that you observed or heard
4	or anything like that that would indicate to you that it
5	was not Kevin Herrick that did this to you?
6	A. No.
7	Q. Now, when he went into the house at that point in
8	time was it against your will; he wasn't invited in, was
9	he?
10	A. Of course not, and I was sleeping.
11	Q. And when he put his penis inside of your mouth
12	that was against your will, too, wasn't it?
13	A. Yes.
14	MR. BULONE: I don't have anything else, Judge.
15	THE COURT: Cross-examination.
16	CROSS-EXAMINATION
17	BY MR. LEINSTER:
18	Q. have you had an opportunity to go over
19	your deposition and your written statement prior to coming
20	in here today?
21	A. Yes, sir.
22	Q. How recently?
23	A. Today.
24	Q. Okay. And has that helped to refresh your
25	memory?

	A. Yean, a little bit.
2	Q. Theresa, the lady that came out of the house,
3	that's Theresa Porrey?
4	A. Uh-huh.
5	Q. She's been rather ill for some time?
6	A. I guess, she's been on oxygen since we moved in
7	there.
8	Q. How long would you say it was from the time
9	that left running after the assailant until he got
10	back?
11	A. Oh, I don't know. I mean, I was pretty scared
12	and I was just yelling for help. It didn't seem like that
13	long, really. Five minutes.
14	Q. Do you think it was that long?
15	A. Five, ten minutes. I don't know.
16	Q. He got back before the police got back, didn't
17	he?
18	A. Yes.
19	Q. And the first investigator that you talked to,
20	you told that individual that your assailant had on a tank
21	top
22	A. Muscle shirt.
23	Q isn't that right?
24	A. Muscle shirt, yes.
25	Q. Are you sure that's what it was?

1	A. Uh-huh.
2	Q. I'm referring to page 14 line 18. "I woke up and
3	it was pitch dark." Going to line 25, "it was pitch
4	dark." And the next page 15, line 8. "It was totally
5	dark."
6	MR. BULONE: Judge, I object. I think this is
7	improper impeachment because I don't think this is
8	inconsistent at all, so it would be hearsay.
9	THE COURT: I think we'll rely upon the jury to
10	determine if it was a consistency or inconsistency.
11	I'll allow him to continue.
12	Q. (By Mr. Leinster) Do you recall stating under
13	oath it was pitch dark?
14	A. I don't recall. But if it says it then, I guess,
15	I did say that.
16	Q. All right. But there is no question in your mind
17	that your assailant had a shirt on?
18	A. No. When he was over me he did not have a shirt
19	on I mean he did have a shirt on.
20	Q. All right. So when came into the room he
21	would still have the shirt on?
22	A. As far as I know, yes.
23	Q. Okay. Now, prior to the police coming out to the
24	scene, did not take you back inside to console you?
25	A. When he came in he asked me did I see who it was

and I said it looked like the guy next door, and he told 1 2 me it was. That's what I'm getting at. He told you at that 3 Q. point that it was Kevin Herrick, right? 4 5 Α. Right. 6 And yet you didn't tell the police it was Kevin Q. 7 Herrick? 8 Α. No. 9 Did you disbelieve Q. 10 No, it wasn't that I didn't believe him. Α. 11 just really freaked out at that time. I was in shock and I really -- it was not like he'd ever been mean or acted 12 strange. He was kind of quiet. I just couldn't believe 13 that somebody that was being nice to you would do that to 14 you, you know, would hold a knife to your neck. 15 told me at the time, I was in shock. Me and 16 didn't talk any further. It was just those two 17 18 statements. 19 The fact is, you didn't tell the police it was Q. 20 Herrick? I told them it looked like the guy next door. 21 22 As a matter of fact, the only description you Q. gave to the investigator, is it not true, that he seemed 23 tall, heavyset, with dark, curly hair, right? 24 25 Α. Right.

_	w. In those days Mr. Herrick's hair was considerably
2	longer then it is now; would you agree?
3	A. Longer as on his neck? I mean, it was
4	Q. Longer down his sholders?
5	A. It was pretty bushy everywhere.
6	Q. And that was the nature of the haircut of your
7	assailant bushy, curly?
8	A. I can't say if it was curly. It was rough
9	around. I didn't see curls, I just saw it looked like
10	rough hair around.
11	Q. So you don't recall telling the investigator that
12	it was the dark, curly hair that looked like Kevin?
13	A. Yeah, I do recall that.
14	Q. Okay. Do you recall also that you told the
15	investigator that you couldn't be sure, but you thought it
16	was the neighbor because he'd been there before and always
17	left through the sliding glass door?
18	A. Well, the thing is
19	Q. Do you remember saying that?
20	A. Yes, I do.
21	Q. So in your mind, isn't it true that you're
22	thinking this guy always leaves by the sliding glass door
23	and the assailant tried to leave by the sliding glass
24	door, therefore, it must be Kevin Herrick; is that right?
25	A. Not really. In fact, he knew where the glass

sliding door was and it was locked. So, he, obviously, 1 2 didn't come in the glass sliding door. He knew where it was. After it happened I did think about it. Yeah, he 3 did leave through the sliding door a lot and he walked 4 around the apartments a lot. 5 6 My question is do you remember telling the ο. 7 investigator --8 A. Yes, I do. 9 -- you couldn't be sure, but you thought it was the neighbor because he left through the sliding glass 10 11 door? 12 A. That's right. But it isn't true he left through the sliding 0. glass door, is it? Α. Most of the time. He was only at your place about three times? Q. I don't know the exact time but, yeah. Α. Referring once again to your deposition, page Q. four, line five. "I had been around him a couple of times because invited him over a couple of times when we were barbecuing and stuff and I played chess with him one day and he got the mail for me one day." Okay. Do you remember that? Yes, but he was around the apartments and talked

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to us quite a few times.

- Q. But not inside the apartments?
- A. Not inside, no.
- Q. In fact, on another occasion he came over to watch the VCR, correct?
 - A. With Pat, yes.
 - Q. And he used the door, not the sliding glass door?
- A. No. He knocked on the door and it was dark. He asked for a VCR cleaner.
- Q. It's your statement that it might be the neighbor because he always leaves by the sliding glass door means on three occasions; he may have come through once or twice?
 - A. Excuse me?
- Q. What did you mean by always leaves through the sliding glass doors if he only came over three times?
- A. He didn't come over a total three times. Him and when they came in the house during the barbecue, he walked around and he came in the back door. He always walked around and smoked cigarettes. He was always walking around the apartments and we were building like a little pond by the glass sliding doors. He was always walking around there and talking to us. And there's a couple times he came and talked to , whether I was there or not.
 - Q. Well, you indicated on your testimony today that

you thought he had been in there four or five times? 1 2 Α. He's been in there a few times. I don't know exactly. I didn't count how many times he came in. 3 Well, it might be important. You said a couple 4 Q. 5 times on your deposition. Do you know? 6 Whether it was a few or a couple? Α. 7 Q. What is a few? 8 Α. More than two. 9 Okay. I never knew what a few was. Q. And let me ask you this: You said that it was pitch dark, we've 10 acknowledged that. Were the venetian blinds closed? 11 12 Α. I don't know. I really don't know. 13 When you go to sleep do you customarily close the Q. 14 blinds? 15 Α. They were probably closed, yes. 16 Q. And where are they in relation to your bed? 17 There are two different windows. There's a real Α. big window right by the bed. The bed was against the wall 18 and there was a big window right there (indicating). 19 Q. Is the head of the bed against the wall or the 20 21 side of the bed? 22 Against the wall where the window is. Α. No, first question first. Is the head of the bed 23 Q. 24 against the wall?

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Α.

Yes.

1	Q. At the head of the bed is there a window?
2	A. No.
3	Q. No window there?
4	A. No.
5	Q. So if you were lying on the bed on your back
6	where would the window be, right or left?
7	A. To the left.
8	Q. And would that be facing the little alcove that's
9	created by those three units?
10	A. Would what?
11	Q. If you looked out that window what would you see?
12	A. Just the street.
13	Q. The street?
14	A. Uh-huh.
15	Q. So it faces to the north, that window; would that
16	be right?
17	A. Yes.
18	Q. In any event, your best understanding would be
19	the venetian blinds would be closed?
20	A. But I wasn't laying the way the bed goes.
21	Q. I'm assuming that would contribute to the fact it
22	was pitch dark inside.
23	Now, you also gave a written statement which was
24	a sworn statement and you made this statement on July the
25	18th and you said in that statement. "I left the kitchen

1 light on so that could see when he got home and I 2 always leave the bathroom light on for the baby." 3 Do you remember saying that? 4 Α. Yes. 5 Turning to your deposition on page 35, however, Q. 6 you're talking about chasing your assailant? 7 Α. Uh-huh. 8 "He still couldn't see him at that point because ο. it was dark, pitch dark in the house. See, that's right, 9 10 there were no lights." 11 A. This is what he told me. 12 Q. There were no lights on, your words? 13 Α. When he was chasing him? 14 Q. Yes. Probably not. He probably turned them off. 15 Α. I'll get to that. Quote, "It was pitch dark in 16 Q. the house," and you said you went to the baby's room that 17 got around through the kitchen. 18 19 MR. BULONE: Judge, all this is hearsay unless he can show that it's a prior inconsistent statement. 20 That's the only way you can get in prior out of court 21 statements is if you show it's inconsistent, and he 22 23 has failed to show that foundation. All he's doing is just going through the depositions, which is improper. 24 25 MR. LEINSTER: She said the light was left on and

I'm going to that point where she says the light in the kitchen is not on. If she can explain that, that's fine, but I have the right to ask.

THE COURT: Ask the question.

Q. (By Mr. Leinster) "He didn't want to go by but saw his face when he ran through the kitchen because the light from Dave's porch light was shining in our kitchen."

That's not the same thing as leaving the kitchen light on. Do you understand what I'm saying?

- A. Yeah.
- Q. Okay. You're saying that when they ran through the kitchen the kitchen light was off. The light that was coming through was coming from Dave's porch light?
 - A. Uh-huh.
- Q. So your assumption would be that he turned the kitchen light off, too?
- A. I suppose, yes. He probably turned off the lights that were on. I don't know what he did. All I know is when I woke up there was a guy over me with a knife to my neck and his privates in my face.
 - Q. But we've established all the lights were off?
 - A. (Witness nods head affirmatively).
 - Q. However they got off, they're all off?
 - A. At that time I turned the baby's lights on when I

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1 door? 2 Well, he told him to get him out. Α. 3 Q. Once again, there was blood left on that doorknob, wasn't there? 4 5 There was blood left in a lot of places, yes. Now, I guess it's obvious that in the couple of 6 0. weeks that Mr. Herrick had been living around there he got 7 8 to know that you and lived together, had a child together, slept together. 9 10 Was it a usual occurrence for to leave at 11 midnight and go somewhere? 12 Α. I guess not. 13 So, usually, if someone were to come into your Q. place around that time they would expect to encounter you 14 15 , not just a defenseless lady like yourself? and If they knew us, I guess. If they knew that we 16 Α. lived there. 17 18 You didn't call Mr. Herrick to say Q. left; 19 he's gone? 20 Α. No. 21 probably didn't call him and say, Hey, I'm Q. 22 leaving for a while? But he could look out the landlord's window and 23 A. 24 walk away. I'm just assuming, though. watch 25 Q. got home and he found you playing

1	chess with Kevin, how did he react to that?
2	A. He didn't react. He just sat down and started
3	talking to us.
4	Q. He wasn't angry at all?
5	A. I've been with three years now. Why would
6	he be angry?
7	Q. He's been your fiance for three years?
8	A. Not my fiance, we've been together for three
9	years.
10	Q. And who was the other girl that was there?
11	A. Tammy.
12	Q. And who is Tammy?
13	A. Darrel's girlfriend.
14	Q. Okay. Darrel being another friend?
15	A. Uh-huh.
16	Q. Darrel, is not the same person?
17	A. No.
18	Q. So it was just business as usual. He got home,
19	the chess match concluded, Mr. Herrick left, your other
20	friends left, no harsh words?
21	A. No.
22	Q. You never saw any unusual behavior from
23	Mr. Herrick; you had always friendly, right?
24	A. Yeah.
25	Q. Because that's one of the reasons you told the

police you didn't think it could be him; isn't that right? 1 2 Α. Yeah. 3 Are Dave ar pretty good friends? Well, they just met when we moved into the 4 triplex and, you know, they talked a lot. Yeah, they were 5 pretty good friends, I guess. 6 7 0. Pal around together? 8 Α. Not really, just around the apartments and talked 9 to each other. 10 Q. Good enough friends that Dave would leave at 11 midnight to help him fix a fish tank? 12 Α. It was Dave's fish. 13 Q. Okay, but they're going to fix a fish tank? 14 Α. Their going to take a fish to Dave's mother's house because the fish was dying. 15 16 Okay. When you first saw your assailant on top Q. of you, you claimed he had his pants off; is that right? 17 18 Α. Yes. I don't know if they were all the way off. All I saw was he was on his knees. So I saw from his 19 20 knees up. Uh-huh. And the only thing that you could see at 21 that time was the outline of the hair, the curly hair, 22 correct? 23 24 And his privates in my face. Α.

The curly hair, though?

I understand.

T	A. I don't know. It's been a year now.
2	Q. Well, not since your deposition.
3	A. Almost.
4	Q. Would it help me to show the deposition to you?
5	A. No. I've read my deposition.
6	Q. I'm not trying to mislead you here. "I could
7	just see the outline of the curly hair," is what you said?
8	A. It just was lumpy. It was like it looked like
9	curly hair. It was dark, but it looked like the outline
10	that curly hair would have.
11	Q. Otherwise, no facial features, just the build,
12	the shape of the body; that's about it, right?
13	A. Uh-huh.
14	Q. Now, you didn't wake up at all until you were
15	being straddled, right?
16	A. (Witness nods head affirmatively). I just woke up
17	and he was over me.
18	Q. Okay.
19	A. I think
20	Q. You didn't hear anybody come in, take their pants
21	off, belt buckle hit the floor, things like that?
22	A. No.
23	Q. I am curious, how did you determine these were
24	blue jeans with a large belt buckle, in as much as it was
25	nitch black?

- A. Because when I was screaming and on the bed and and him were fighting, I looked down and they looked like blue jeans and a belt buckle, and I could see the big belt buckle.
- Q. How do blue jeans look in pitch black light; can you distinguish the color blue in the absence of light?
- A. I could see more at that time. My eyes had focused. I could see a little bit more, but I don't know for sure if they were jeans. They did look like jeans and I did see a belt buckle.
 - Q. But you don't know if they were jeans, right?
 - A. I'm not sure.
 - Q. You told the police they were jeans?
 - A. They looked like jeans.
- Q. You didn't say they looked like jeans, you told the police they were jeans, right?
 - A. I guess so.

- Q. You found out, according to your deposition, that it was not a scalpel because somebody told you they found the knife and it was a regular knife?

MR. BULONE: Judge, this is pure hearsay. I

1 object to it. 2 MR. LEINSTER: It has nothing to do with the truth 3 of the statement. 4 THE WITNESS: I don't know if --5 THE COURT: Just a second. 6 MR. BULONE: What somebody told her is hearsay. 7 MR. LEINSTER: I'll approach the bench. 8 THE COURT: Rephrase the question, counsel. 9 (By Mr. Leinster) Isn't one of the reasons that Q. 10 you believe that it's Mr. Herrick that did this is because you think that they found the weapon that was used on you? 11 12 Α. One of the reasons? 13 Q. Yeah. 14 One of the many reasons, yes. Α. 15 Whether it is true or not true, you were told Q. 16 that they found the knife and it was a regular knife, 17 correct? 18 Α. Yes. (By Mr. Bulone) Under what circumstances did you 6 see the Defendant before this happened? Just seen him like out in the yard and in the 7 Α. courtyard and I had invited him into the house a few 8 9 times. 10 Q. What for? 11 Just to have a drink, like, they were out working Α. and it was hot and I asked if he wanted a drink of iced 12 13 tea. 14 Let's go to July the 14th, 1989. 9	my son. I was just out there smoking a cigarette and I
10	heard crying. At first I thought she was just
11	talking on the phone or something, and then I heard it
12	louder and kind of muffled, and that's when I went into
13	the place.
14	Q. What happened when you went in there?
15	A. The lights were out and I went into down the
16	hallway to the bedroom and I opened the door and I saw
17	someone on top of I proceeded to tell him to get
18	off.
19	Q. What did he say?
20	A. Exact words, it was a long time ago, to the
21	effect of, Get out or I'll kill you.
22	Q. What did you do then?
23	A. I didn't get out. I just kept telling him to get
24	off.
25	Q. What happened after that?

- A. He jumped up and started struggling with me and we fought for a few seconds, and I got stabbed twice in the chest and then I backed up.
 - Q. What happened then?
- A. I was facing my back to the window with the venetian blinds and he was, like, holding the knife and putting his pants on. I went to attack him again at that time and then he cocked me in the jaw real hard, but it didn't really phase me at the time. Then he started to wave whatever the object was that stabbed me at my throat, so I backed up again. And when he stood up I saw the silhouette of the person looked exactly like Kevin Herrick.
 - Q. What happened after that?
- A. Then he left the room and shut the door behind him. I went around to the door and he was holding the door closed. I exchanged words with him and he threatened to kill our baby and I yelled, Not my baby. And then after a few seconds he released the door and we rushed out and went to check on our son. And then I proceeded down the hallway where I saw him struggling -- trying to get out the glass doors.

At that point I knew I was bleeding severely and I was fearing for my family's life because the person was obviously capable of anything and my whole intent was to

get him out of the dwelling to make my family safe. instructed him to go out the front door because he couldn't get out the back door. And he told me to back up and I backed up a little bit and he went through the kitchen and through the other -- there's another entrance like right near the front door and he went out that way. The kitchen venetian blinds were open and David's porch light was bright and it was shining through. Q. What porch light?

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- His porch light. He has a bright light, porch Α. light.
- Where is that on this diagram? This is David's Q. house?
 - Right there where that panel is. Α.
 - Q. About here?
- Yeah, about there. And it was shining through Α. the kitchen window and I recognized his face was Kevin when he went through the kitchen because the light showed I chased him outside facing the street. on him. around to the right, to the east.
 - Q. This way?
- Yes, and he stopped like a house down and then Α. again I saw him because the moonlight and the street lights were on. I chased him around the corner of the building a couple houses down, but there was a bush right

there at the wall, so I hesitated in case he was hiding 1 2 behind the bush and I lost him. 3 Before we go on with that, there's another Q. diagram here drawn by Officer Joiner. If you want to come down and step down so we can Q. show the jury where these things occurred. This is the bedroom here and this is our son's Α. room here and this is the hallway here and this goes to the front door. This is the kitchen area here with an opening here going to the dining room. Living room, glass doors right here and this is another opening going to the front door. Just go ahead and write down what the things are. 0. Is that your bedroom? Α. Yes. Q. That's your son's bedroom? Α. Yes. Q. Okay. Now where were you in the courtyard when you heard crying? Α. Right here. And then you entered through the front door? 0.

Yes, going in through the front door.

And you went here?

8	A. Right here shining into the window.
9	Q. And it was pretty bright?
10	A. Yes, it was a very bright light.
11	Q. So, you were over here and he was over here,
12	basically?
13	A. No, I was here.

15	A. He came from here and went through here and then
16	out the door.
17	Q. Now, when you saw him then was there any doubt in
18	your mind that that was him?
19	A. None whatsoever.
20	Q. So then he ran out this way and you followed him?
21	A. That is correct.
22	Q. Now, you said that he stopped. Where was that
23	approximately?
24	A. Approximately it was a house down, like right

around this area right here, and he stopped and turned

around and I -- he saw me chasing him, and that's when he turned back around.

- Q. Did you get a good look at him then?
- A. Yes.

- Q. And was it him?
- A. Definitely, beyond a doubt.
- Q. It was Kevin Herrick?
- A. It was Kevin Herrick.
- Q. Okay. So, what happened after he ran and you ran after him?
- A. I chased him around a second building, around a corner. Then I hesitated because there was a big bush there and that was the last visual contact I saw of him during the chase. I went back around and there was a back fence and I thought he might have jumped the fence at the time. So, I jumped the fence and on the other side of the fence is an apartment complex and I saw a car with the engine running. I thought at that time that he might have gotten into the car, so I crouched down between some boats and memorizeded the license plate number and sat there for a couple minutes then went back over the fence and went back around to the triplex.
- Q. Now, how long do you think you were gone from the time that you ran out the front door to the time that you came back?

1	A. A good five minutes because, like I said, I
2	jumped the fence and I was waiting in between the boats
3	looking at the car and getting the license plate number.
4	I'd say a good five minutes.

The ambulance came and the police came. Did you speak to the 6 police first or were you treated first? 7 I didn't really speak to the police very much 8 Α. 9 when they were there. Now, did you tell the police that you knew who it 10 Q. 11 was? 12 At that time I did not. Α. 13 Q. Why not? 14 Α. There was a couple reasons. I was concerned for 15 my family and their welfare. I didn't know if he would be arrested at that time. 16 I wasn't aware of his friends. 17 had seen some of his friends over there before and what 18 they were capable of. 19 0. What did you think might happen? 20 I was fearing for my family. I wasn't really sure what might have happened and I thought, you know, 21 they might not arrest him. Also what was running through 22 my mind was that I wanted to kill him, to tell you the 23 truth. He had just raped my fiancee and threatened to 24

kill my son and almost killed me.

1 Q. So, you were taken to the hospital then, correct? 2 Α. Yes, I was. 3 0. And what was wrong with you? 4 A. Two knife wounds in my chest. 5 Okay. Were you treated and released after that Q. 6 then? 7 Α. Yes, I was. 8 Q. Where did you go after that? I went back to the triplex because I wanted to 9 Α. 10 see who was there and at that time I got a ride from Dave 11 's mother's house where I called the police from. to 12 Q. Why did you decide to call the police at that 13 time? 14 Α. I was at the hospital thinking about it for a 15 while and no matter how badly I was angered over the incident, I knew that I couldn't possibly carry out the 16 justice, that it was up to the law. with the case. When I did come back to the --

- Let me ask you what is confusing about this Q. question and when you gave that tag number to David and asked him to report it to the police, you knew that was not the rapist in the car, that was really to deflect the police. Is that a confusing question to you?
 - Α. Sir --

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- Q. Is it yes or no?
- At that time I had been in there for quite some Α. time and she had gotten me very flustered. And if that was her exact word use, I'm not really sure because I found many errors in that deposition.
- Well, the next question, as a matter of fact, Q. "Okay. Did you later report that to the police?" other words, that the license plate didn't have anything to do with it, and you said you did. So you understood the question, didn't you?
- When she asked the question she was referring Α. about telling the police about the plate, and when I told the police about the plate at that time I was just saying it to tell them something because I already stated it to David.

1 The fact is when you called the police the first Q. 2 time after you had your bout with conscience about having lied to them, do you remember who you talked to? 3 4 The exact person, I do not. He's dumpy, can tell, there is rolls of fat, and so, he went out the front door and around."

It's your words that you speculated it was him because of his rolls of fat?

- A. No, sir, at that time that is not a visual of what transpired there.
 - Q. That's what you said, though, isn't it?
- A. Sir, at that time I pointed to the bedroom when I first saw him through the window of the bedroom is when I -- if you wanted to ask the public defender to come in here and witness it. That particular phrase, when I said speculated, I pointed to the bedroom area on the map.
- Q. Did you go through this deposition; did you have a chance to read it for accuracy?

- Q. When you got through taking a deposition did they not tell you you have the right to read this and see that it was taken down properly or you can waive that right and assume that it's being done correctly; were you not told that?

24	A. It could have been in his hands as well.

2	running.
3	Q. Did he do some fence hopping with his shoes in
4	his hand?
5	A. That would be pure speculation. I did not see
6	after he rounded the corner.
7	Q. So you didn't see him hop a couple fences?
8	A. That was speculation.
9	Q. Okay. Page 18 of your deposition. "No, I chased
10	after him and I thought he might have hopped the fence
11	back here which goes into an apartment complex which I
12	found that he did not, he just circled around, hopped a
13	couple fences."
14	Did you misunderstand that?
15	A. To what you just stated or what you said, did I
16	misunderstan it, no.
17	MR. BULONE: If you read on, he's not stating

21	A. I'm not sure if I quite understand your question.
22	Q. How about his hair?
23	A. What was different about him?
24	Q. Uh-huh.

He had his hair slicked down.

1	Q. He had his hair slicked back close to his scalp,
2	right? It was matted down with mousse or oil of some
3	kind, correct?
4	A. Correct.
5	Q. Ordinarily Mr. Herrick has let's go back to
6	July of 1989. His hair was longer then than it is now.
7	It came down to his shoulders in back, correct?
8	A. Just above the shoulders.
9	Q. Bushy, curly hair, right?
10	A. Correct.
11	Q. But it wasn't that way that night. It was
12	slicked back with oil close to his head, right?
13	A. Closer than normal, yes.
14	Q. You could even see the light gleaming off of it,
15	couldn't you?
16	A. Yes, sir.
17	Q. You only speculated that he had hopped a fence or
18	two. The reason you decided that that hadn't happened, is
19	it not, is because you saw him so quickly when you got
20	back to the residence?
21	A. I did not decide that he had not hopped a couple
22	fences. I decided that he did not go to the car.
23	Q. Okay. I just read to you about hopping a couple
24	fences?
25	A. That was speculation.

Q. The prosecutor wanted me to go on and I will.

"How did you find that out found out?" Answer: Find what out?" Question: "That he had not hopped the fence?"

Answer: "Because when I had come back around and I was in the house for awhile he had come out the front door, and when he originally first came out he had greased his hair, he had greased it back to make it look short with oil or mousse or whatever you use."

So, in other words, you decided he couldn't have hopped those fences because he didn't have enough time to get back and come in and out the front door?

- A. Sir, when you just read that you left out the first part about the fence to the back of the complex which is what the public defender was referring to. I had determined that he did not jump the fence to the back of the complex.
- Q. Well, in any event, your assailant, according to you, would have blood on his hands, he would have slicked, greasy, oily hair and only moments after you arrived back at the complex you see Mr. Herrick coming out the front door, correct?
- A. Incorrect. It was a few minutes, and when he came out he had pouffed up his hair and there was still a line of the grease or oil or whatever he used glistening from his scalp.

1	Q. So he would have had time to go in and wash the
2	blood off his hands get all the oil out of his hair, blow
3	dry his hair?
4	A. No, sir, I did not say that.
5	Q. Was his hair wet?
6	A. It appeared wet, yes.
7	Q. You thought his hair was wet?
8	A. It was glistening and it pouffed up. It was not
9	blown dry or washed.
10	Q. You saw Mr. Herrick before the police arrived,
11	didn't you?
12	A. It was right before, I believe so, yes.
13	Q. He came out and he did not have a shirt on,
14	correct?
15	A. The first time he came out, that is correct.

23	sworn on oath, was examined and testified as follows:
24	THE BAILIFF: Have a seat in the witness box.
25	Speak in a loud and clear voice for the Court.

1	DIRECT EXAMINATION
2	BY MR. BULONE:
3	Q. Sir, please state your name.
4	A. / Howard Crosby.
5	Q. What is your occupation?
6	A. Police Officer, Largo Police Department.
7	Q. And how long have you been so employed?
8	A. Nine years.
9	Q. And your duties with the Largo Police Department
10	are what, sir?
11	A. Patrol and sniper for the tack team, traffic,
12	homicide, radar.
13	Q. Let me call your attention back to the very early
14	morning hours of July 15th, 1989. Did you have occasion
15	to go to the area of in Largo?
16	A. Yes, sir.
17	Q. What county is that?
18	A. Pinellas County, Largo.
L9	Q. Why did you go there at that time?
20	A. I was a backup officer to a call at the scene.
21	Q. And once you got there what did you do?
22	A. I went inside the residence and talked to the
23	victim.
24	Q. Would that be
25	A. Yes, sir.

1	Q. Was there a time when you were there that you saw
2	Kevin Herrick?
3	A. Yes, sir.
4	Q. And where was that?
5	A. As you walk up the sidewalk to the apartments, it
6	was right on the corner of the victim's apartment.
7	Q. Well, we can get the diagram out.
8	Q. Does this fairly and accurately depict the
9	triplex if this is one apartment, this is another
10	apartment and that is the third apartment and this the
11	courtyard?
12	A. Yes, sir.
13	Q. Where did you first see the Defendant?
14	A. The lower left corner. No down. Right there.
15	Q. Do you see Mr. Herrick in the courtroom today?
16	A. Yes, sir.
17	Q. Please point him out and describe what he's
18	wearing for the record.
19	A. Sitting at the table. Black jacket, gray and
20	black stripe shirt and black tie, sneakers on.
21	Q. Did you notice anything unusual about him?
22	A. Yes, he looked very nervous. He was sweating. I
23	even noticed that his heart was pounding so much to where
24	I could see it, his chest rising and falling.

Q. Did he have a shirt on at that time?

1	A. He had a red shirt. It was sleeveless like a
2	tank top type shirt he had on.
3	Q. And you actually saw his heart beating?
4	A. Yes, sir. I walked righted up to him and started
5	talking to him. He looked very nervous and very scared,
6	that's why I started talking to him.
7	Q. Did his face look sort of sweaty?
8	A. Yeah, he was sweaty and breathing heavy.
9	Q. What did you do as a result of that?
10	A. I FIR'd him which is a Field Interrogation
11	Report. We get the information with his name, date of
12	birth and what he's wearing. I wrote all that information
13	down.
14	Q. Why did you do that for?
15	A. I told him we were just getting everyone's name
16	in the area and to me he just looked very suspicious,
17	that's why I wanted his name for sure.
18	Q. Did you also see one of the victims in the case,
19	?
20	A. Inside the apartment.
21	Q. Did you observe any injuries to him?
22	A. Yes, he had his shirt he had one to the chest
23	or abdomen area. I saw a lot of blood on his shirt and
24	the paramedics were taking care of him in the living room
25	of the apartment, and that/g whore they were taking gare

1	of him.
2	Q. Was Mr. Herrick arrested later that evening?
3	A. Yes, sir.
4	MR. BULONE: I have nothing further, Judge.
5	THE COURT: Cross-examination.
6	CROSS-EXAMINATION
7	BY MR. LEINSTER:
8	Q. You advised Mr. Herrick that he did not have to
9	consent to your taking hair and pubic samples, correct
10	MR. BULONE: I object. It's beyond the scope.
11	THE COURT: It has to do with his arrest, doesn't
12	it?
13	MR. LEINSTER: I believe so.
14	THE COURT: Overruled. I'll allow it.
15	Q. (By Mr. Leinster) You informed him he did not
16	have to consent to the taking of hair and pubic samples
17	for possible comparison?
18	A. At the station after his arrest, right.
19	Q. You advised him he didn't have to do that?
20	A. Post-Miranda, right.
21	Q. Nonetheless, he consented?
22	A. That's right.
23	Q. Okay. And did anybody else out there look
24	nervous that night?
25	A. No one that caught my eyes, no.

1	Q. How about Theresa Porrey; she was down right
2	hysterical, wasn't she?
3	A. I don't recall Theresa Porrey.
4	Q. You don't. How about , was she a bit upset
5	herself?
6	A. The victim?
7	Q. Yeah.
8	A. She was inside the house.
9	Q. How long after all this did you arrive on the
10	scene?
11	A. After the canine officer broke the track down,

How long have you been so employed? 15 Α. Four years. 16 Q. What are your duties with Largo? 17 Patrol and I also perform duties as an evidence A. 18 technician. What is an evidence tech? 19 0. 20 An evidence tech is required on occasion to 21 respond to crime scenes and do basic crime scene 22 processing. 23 Q. Let me call your attention to July 15th, 1989 at 24 approximately 1:10 a.m. Did you have occasion to go to the 25 area of in Largo?

1	A. Yes.
2	Q. Why did you go there?
3	A. I was summoned by the supervisor to respond and
4	process the scene for processing.
5	Q. Where specifically did you go?
6	A. To the triplex located there on the left on the
7	map.
8	Q. Okay. Would this be the residence of the
9	victims?
10	A. Right,
11	Q. Did you in fact draw this particular diagram?
12	A. Yes.
13	Q. Does it fairly and accurately represent the
14	triplex and the three apartments that are in this
15	particular triplex?
16	A. Yes, it does.
17	Q. Okay. Now, the victim's apartment was here; is
18	that correct?
19	A. Right.
20	Q. On the east end?
21	A. Right.
22	Q. What did you do when you first got there?
23	A. When I responded there I spoke with the officers
24	on the scene as to what had occurred, what was needed of
25	me as far as processing and then I went ahead and did the

1	processing as far as photographs and prints and collecting
2	evidence.
3	Q. Okay. Did you take photographs?
4	A. Yes.
5	Q. I'm going to show you what's been previously
6	marked here as State's Composite Exhibit Number One and
7	ask you if you recognize what these photographs depict?
8	A. These are the photographs of the victim's
9	apartment on .
10	MR. LEINSTER: May we approach?
11	(THEREUPON, A SIDEBAR CONFERENCE WAS HELD OUTSIDE THE
12	HEARING OF THE JURY AS FOLLOWS:)
13	MR. BULONE: Would you like to take a look at
14	them?
15	MR. LEINSTER: I thought that I had been provided
16	all discovery. I did not specifically ask for
17	photographs other than any kind of discovery request,
18	but I have, as counsel, asked to have a copy of all
19	reports and matters of evidence. I don't know that
20	there's anything in here of materiality, but I would
21	like to know if there is anything else I haven't
22	gotten.
23	MR. BULONE: We are going to introduce the latent

LEINSTER: I have no problem with that. 12 have no problem with these pictures. I just haven't 13 seen them before. Are there any reports that you or the witnesses have that I never saw? 14 15 MR. BULONE: No. 16 (IN OPEN COURT) THE COURT: You may continue, Mr. Bulone. 17 18 (By Mr. Bulone) I'm going to go ahead and show Q. 19 you the photographs which are marked as State's Exhibit Number One for identification and ask you if you recognize 20 21 what those depict? 22 Α. Do you want me to go through each one of the 23 photos? 24 0. Go ahead. 25 This first photograph is a picture of the

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victims' dining and living room area standing in the hallway at the end of the hallway just inside the front door.

- Q. Okay. Tell me what -- if you want you can move down and show the jury.
- A. This first photograph is the picture of the dining area, living room, sliding glass doors. This is standing -- can we correspond with the --
 - Q. Fine, whatever you want.
- A. This is standing here, facing this way taking this photograph, this first one. This is standing inside the bedroom of the victims' apartment. The victims' bedroom, standing inside the bedroom shooting towards the bedroom doors. You can see the bedroom door here. Here's the hallway. He's standing here and shooting this way and what you're seeing is the door and the part of the hallway here of the victims'.

This photograph, once again, standing in the hallway and shooting into where the baby's room is at.

This is the baby's room with the door which connects to the victims' bedroom. Again, corresponding with the diagrams, this is standing here in this area. This is the baby's room.

This is standing outside the courtyard area of the triplex shooting in towards the front door. Here's

the front door area. This is the hallway, and at the end of the hallway is the closet with wood bi-fold doors and that's right here standing out here and shooting in. This one is standing again in the hallway. This is standing on the outside of the victims' bedroom with the door open shooting straight in. Here is the dresser. The victims' bedroom door.

This is the photo of the kitchen as you come into the apartment of the victims. The kitchen entrance way is right off to the right and the kitchen comes around taking you out to the living room. This photo is taken standing right here and photographing in. Here's the front door and standing right there.

- Q. Let me ask you this, the diagram you're referring to, does that fairly and accurately represent the victims' residence?
- A. Right. This is a photograph of the doorjamb of the baby's room. And what I was trying to capture there were some smudge prints which were believed to be the blood at the time.
- Q. This is the sliding glass door that I showed you earlier in this photograph. And in the living room this is only one sliding glass door capturing, here again, smudge prints in the door handle area of the sliding glass door. This is the door of the victims' bedroom. I was

trying to capture here also smudgy blood impressions or prints just adjacent to the doorknob.

This is in the victims' bedroom. This is the bed and the bedroom itself. This is standing in the room shooting this ways. The bed was up against this west wall coming out east. I'm standing here taking a picture of it from there angle. The same bed, just a different angle shot, a little bit closer. This is standing in the doorway taking an angle shot trying to capture a wider angle of the victims' bed and the bedroom. And this is a photo taken in the kitchen of one of the victim's shirt that was worn.

- Q. shirt, the male victim?
- A. Right.
- Q. And do these all fairly and accurately depict what you said they did?
- ∥ A. Yes

MR. BULONE: At this time I would move these in evidence as State's Composite Exhibit Number One.

MR. LEINSTER: No objection.

THE COURT: Received as State's Composite Number One.

- Q. (By Mr. Bulone) Now, officer, while you were there did you try to lift latent fingerprints?
 - A. Yes, I did.

Q.

A. A latent fingerprint is a print which can be used to compare with other fingerprints.

What is a latent fingerprint?

- Q. Is that something that you would lift off an object?
 - A. Yes, a door, doorknob.
- Q. What sort of training do you have as far as lifting latent fingerprints?
- A. I went through an 88-hour course sponsored by the department which is taught by the identification person there John Barone.
- Q. And what process do you go about doing this lifting the latent fingerprints?
- A. As far as lifting the prints, it's lifted with a black graphite powder and a brush. You put a little bit of the powder on there, and using the brush, going over the area of the print and then taking a marking type tape, putting it over the print and then smoothing it to get the air bubbles out, capturing that print. You lift the tape in the same manner it was applied and taking that piece of tape, put it on a three by five index card and the print comes up very nicely.
- Q. Now, from your experience of the person that handles or touches a door or paper or anything, will that always leave a fingerprint?

A. Yes.

Q. Is it possible that when a person handles or touches an object that it could be smudged so you could not get a print of value?

- A. Right.
- Q. Going back to these pictures, did you attempt to get fingerprints of value from what appears to be blood smudges?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Why not?
- A. I did not because there was nothing there that you could lift from. It was just a smudge. It was basically a pattern of such that someone had grabbed hold or leaned up against something, and at the same time it was just like in a sweeping motion.
- Q. And that's not the type of thing that you can get a latent fingerprint of value from?
 - A. Correct.
- Q. Where did you try to get latent fingerprints from?
- A. Okay. I lifted two prints from the exterior side of the plaster bedroom doorknob. I lifted one print from the exterior side of the second bedroom doorknob which would be the baby's room. I lifted six prints to include a partial palm print from the interior side of the sliding

1	glass door in the living room. There were nine prints
2	that I lifted all together and out of those I believe six
3	were of value.
4	Q. Okay. Now, you're not the person that does the
5	comparisons of the latent fingerprints with known
6	fingerprints?
7	A. That's correct.
8	Q. That would be John Barone?
9	A. John Barone, right.
10	Q. Do you know if all those fingerprints that you
11	lifted were fingerprints of value?
12	A. The nine prints that I lifted I submitted and of
13	those only six were of value. The other three were not.
14	I guess the technician or the comparison person, there
15	wasn't enough for him to compare with anything.
16	Q. Okay. That would be up to Mr. Barone?
17	A. Yes, he makes that determination.
18	Q. I'm going to show you now State's Exhibit Number
19	Two and ask you if you recognize that?
20	A. Okay. These are the fingerprints that I lifted
21	from the interior side of the sliding glass door and these
22	are prints determined by Mr. Barone to be of value.
23	Q. Do you have any idea what might have happened to
24	any of the other latent prints?
5	A. No, sir, I do not. They were turned in and I

1	don't know.
2	Q. Okay.
3	MR. BULONE: Your Honor, at this time I would
4	move this in evidence as State's Exhibit Number Two.
5	MR. LEINSTER: No objection.
6	THE COURT: Received as State's Exhibit Number
7	Two.
8	Q. Okay. On these diagrams that we have been
9	talking about, I believe that there is two of them. The
10	first one I guess we'll call State's Exhibit 3A for
11	identification. As a matter of fact, I'll write a little
12	3A down here in the lower right hand corner.
13	Does this fairly and accurately depict the
14	triplex of the three apartments?
15	A. Yes.
16	Q. And the other drawing, which we'll go ahead and
17	mark as 3B in the lower right hand column, does this
18	fairly and accurately depict the apartment of the victims?
19	A. Yes.
20	MR. BULONE: Your Honor, at this time I'd move
21	these in evidence as State's Exhibit 3A and B.
22	MR. LEINSTER: No problem.
23	THE COURT: Received as State's Exhibit 3A and B.
24	MR. BULONE: I don't have any further questions.
25	THE COURT: Cross-examination.

CROSS-EXAMINATION 1 2 BY MR. LEINSTER: 3 Did I understand that you didn't actually do the Q. comparisons, it was Mr. Barone? 4 5 Α. Right. So you're basically testifying as to what you've 6 Q. 7 been told, obviously? What I've been told? I don't understand. 8 Α. 9 Q. By Mr. Barone, I guess? 10 Α. I actually lifted the prints at the scene and submitted those fingerprints. As far as them being of 11 12 value, after Mr. Barone makes a comparison with any prints that are ever submitted, he sends us a reply as to what 13 14 the analysis resulted in. 15 The prints taken off the sliding glass door, were Q. 16 they imbedded in blood stains? 17 A. No, sir. 18 Q. Did you not find some blood on the sliding glass 19 door? 20 There was blood on the side of the sliding glass Α. 21 door where the frame is of the door itself. 22 Q. Would that have been in the vicinity of where the 23 prints were lifted?

And did you also test the doorknob going outside

1	the apartment as if someone from inside was going outside;
2	do you recall?
3	A. Which door?
4	Q. The door leading to the alcove out the front.
5	A. No, sir.
6	Q. You did not test that?

11	A. Correct. I did lift a print from there.
12	Q. Was there also blood on that door handle?

17	You indicated that you would expect prints to be left on
18	certain surfaces?
19	A. Right.
20	Q. Doorknobs, glass, glass is a pretty good service
21	for fingerprints isn't it?
22	A. Yes, sir.
23	Q. The prints that were taken from the glass, were
24	they prints that were found to be of value?
25	A. Yes, sir.

1	Q. All right. So they weren't smudged, unreadable
2	prints; these were of value?
3	A. Correct.
4	Q. And you will agree with me that Mr. Barone's
5	findings were that the latent prints were not similar to
6	the known prints of Kevin Herrick?
7	A. Yes, sir.
8	Q. Okay. So he was eliminated as far as his
9	fingerprints were concerned?
10	A. As results to the examination that Mr. Barone
11	conducted, that's what's indicated as far as the
12	fingerprints.
13	Q. Also, as part of your job, other items of
14	evidence were both received and, I assume, examined which
15	would include hair from (sic), both
16	plucked and combed, the voluntary fingerprints of
17	and then of course the prints that you mentioned?
18	A. Yes, sir.
19	Q. What is the purpose of taking pubic samples and
20	hair samples in a case like this?

- Q. , a day or so after July 15th, 1989, did you overhear a conversation?
 - A. Yes, sir, we did.
 - Q. And where were you at the time?
- A. We were in the living room of the triplex we were staying in. In the daytime we were doing some cleaning up and we had the baby down in the room. He was taking a nap and we had the intercom on.
 - Q. How did you hear this conversation?
- A. Oh, we had the intercom in the living room and one of them in the baby's room. We were listening for the baby and then we heard Mrs. Porrey get on the phone on her portable phone next door, and it came over through our speaker.
 - Q. Did you recognize her voice?
 - A. Yes, sir, I did.
 - Q. Did you hear any of the conversation at all?
 - A. Yes, sir, I did.
 - Q. What do you remember hearing?
- A. She was talking to someone and saying how she couldn't really believe that he did it, but that I had seen him and she went in there later and found wet socks in his room. His socks were wet and that the glass door was open, and then she was saying that they should get a good lawyer and she kept going back and forth.

1 Q. Nothing further, Judge. 2 THE COURT: Cross-examination. 3 CROSS-EXAMINATION 4 BY MR. LEINSTER: 5 Q. What was s response to hearing this 6 conversation? 7 What was her response? Α. 8 0. Uh-huh. 9 To the -- in the beginning or in the end? Α. 10 Q. I don't care. 11 Well, she was upset towards the end because she Α. had mentioned something about 12 that upset her, and that's when I told her to turn it off. 13 14 What was that? Q. 15 I don't really recall. It was something like her Α. getting -- her and Kevin were getting close or something 16 17 like that. 18 Q. That and Kevin were getting close? Yeah, she mentioned something like that. Like I 19 said, I don't recall exactly what she said at that 20 21 particular instance. 22 Meaning that | Q. and Kevin had something 23 going? 24 That would be pure speculation. I don't think A. 25 that's what she meant.

1	Q. But she didn't turn it off, you turned it off?
2	A. Right because she was getting upset about it.
3	Q. You made that determination, right? Did she ask
4	you to turn it off or you turned it off?
5	A. No, I turned it off.
6	Q. Was it because you were getting upset?
7	A. No, sir, I was not.
8	Q. You did it out of charity for then?
9	A. Yes, sir, I did.
10	Q. But according to what you're saying, this is a
11	revelation for Mrs. Porrey. She's talking about this

21	Q. This is the first time you said anything about
22	it, isn't it?
23	A. No, sir, it is not.
24	Q. When is the first time?
5	A. I mentioned it to the public defender in

have the same frequency so if the intercom is on the 1 receiver and is near where the portable phone is, then it 2 3 picks up the conversation. 4 Q. Uh-huh. 5 Just in the same aspect, on the portable phone, I don't know if you own one or not, but if a CB goes by when 6 you're talking on the portable phone, you can pick up a 7 person on the CB on your portable phone. 8 9 A baby intercom, if it's like the one we use, you Q. have one in one room and one in the other? 10 11 Α. That's correct. 12 And the noise the baby makes is transmitted Q. through the wire and you hear it in the living room. 13 14 No, it was not transmitted through wire. Α. 15 transmitted through waves. 16 0. So? 17 So I'm saying the waves transmitted from the cordless phone also went into the intercom. I can't prove 18 19 the fact. 20 Q. You know, I've never picked up anybody's phone conversation on my baby's phone. 21 22 MR. BULONE: I object. If he wants to testify, He can be a witness and I'll be the defense 23 fine. 24 attorney. 25 THE COURT: Sustained.
