Chaplain's's Comments



We read in St. John's account of the Resurrection narratives that when Mary Magdalene arrived at the tomb on the morning of the first day of the week, the tomb was empty. To a cynic, that means absolutely nothing. But to us who are believers, the empty tomb means everything. Mary Magdalene, of course, was no cynic. But her first impression is that the body

of Jesus has been stolen—taken from the tomb by the ones who had killed him. As we read later in the text, however, she sees the risen Lord and believes. Peter and another disciple, the disciple whom Jesus loved, run to the tomb upon hearing that it is empty. What do you suppose they are looking for? We do not know. But we do know that upon entering the empty tomb, the disciple whom Jesus loved sees and believes.

Every time we hear that phrase in John's Gospel of "the disciple whom Jesus loved", we are to read ourselves into the story. While tradition tells us that this disciple was John the Evangelist himself, we must read ourselves into the passage as he intended. We are the ones who are called to rest against Jesus at the Last Supper, when we are troubled of heart. We are the ones who are called to stand at the foot of the cross of Jesus with his mother Mary and to take Mary into our homes as our own Mother. We are the ones who are called to enter into the tomb, to see the burial cloths lying there and the tomb otherwise empty, and to believe that Jesus is indeed risen from the dead.

In this season of Easter, we are called to go forth from our own tombs, our upper rooms of isolation and fear. We are called to run to the empty tomb which is in our hearts and to see and to believe the impossible—that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead. As Saint Paul reminds us in his letter to Colossians, we are called to seek not what is of earth but what is of above—for we have died, and our life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ our life appears, then we too will appear with him in glory.

State Historian's Report

1894 Hibernian State Convention,

Columbus, Ohio

In June 1894 Columbus was the host for the annual Ohio State Convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians. Early Hibernian state conventions were held annually, the same as National Conventions of the Order. The 1894 Ohio Convention was held in Columbus.

On Tuesday, June 12, 1894 the *Columbus Dispatch* reported, "Large delegations of visiting societies arrived last night and this morning, making the headquarters at the American House Hotel exceedingly animated." It was estimated that over 300 attended the convention.

The American House Hotel was the first building in Columbus constructed as a hotel. It was built in 1836, on the northwest corner of South High and State Streets. In 1925 the building was purchased by the S. S. Kresge Company. It became an S. S. Kresge retail store in 1925, and in 1986 it was demolished to make way for the Vern Riffe State Office Tower that was built on the site.

The American House Hotel was probably a last minute change of location. The AOH generally used the Chittenden Hotel at Spring and High Streets for its functions. The Chittenden had burned down on November 24, 1893 and was being rebuilt at the time of the convention.

The opening session of the convention was held at noon on June 12 at the Columbus Board of Trade auditorium on East Broad Street. This building was located on the site of the present Rhodes State Office Tower. The convention was called to order by State Delegate John H. Conway of Dayton, Ohio.

The State Delegate is the AOH officer known today as the State President. Past National Historian Gerry Curran has written: "Prior to 1894 the elected head of the AOH in America was referred to as the National Delegate. In theory, he represented the American AOH in Ireland at the national conventions held there. In 1894 the AOH in America severed its administrative ties to the AOH in Ireland and our national leader assumed the title President. Following the precedent of the AOH National Board the title State President was adopted by the states."

At the first session, State Delegate Conway appointed a Committee on Credentials which included 30 delegates. That evening, the Credentials Committee met in the parlor of the American House Hotel at 7:00 pm to prepare their report. They were assigned to report to the next day's session at 10:00 am on Wednesday, June 13.

John H. Conway was running for reelection as State Delegate. Although there were four candidates for the position, there were only two who were considered leading candidates, incumbent John H. Conway of Dayton and Patrick J. O'Connor of Springfield.

John H. Conway was born November 16, 1856 in Montgomery County, Ohio. He joined the AOH in September 1886 and was elected Vice President of Division #2 in Dayton the same year. Afterward he was elected as President of Division #2 and the following year he was elected County Delegate. At the State Convention in Cleveland in 1892 he was elected State Delegate for a two year term.

State Historian's Report, cont,

Tuesday's meeting adjourned at 2:00 pm and despite the heat of the day, the convention attendees formed a large parade. The order of the parade march was as follows:

Platoon of Columbus Police, Fourteenth Regiment Band, Jerry O'Shaughnessy, Grand Marshal, Company A, Hibernian Rifles, Columbus, Ohio, AOH Division #1 from Marion, Ohio, Big Six Band, AOH Divisions, Springfield, Ohio, Visiting AOH Divisions, Knights of St. George Band, Divisions 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, Columbus, Ohio, Clergy and Officers in Carriages.

The parade formed on North Grant Avenue and marched west on Broad Street to High, south on High to the Court House, then they counter marched north on High to Spring Street, east on Spring to Fourth Street where cars (streetcars) were waiting to convey them to Merkle Grove on North High Street. There, a grand picnic was held. Other than being located on North High Street, the exact location of Merkle Grove is presently unknown.

Upon arriving at the grove, the crowd found this "charming spot" transformed into an ideal picnic ground with all the trimmings of a county fair, including "a merry-go-round, cane racks, tin type gallery, rag baby stands, a large dancing floor and numerous refreshment booths." Speeches were made by State Officers and prominent members of the Order. There were also foot races and a tug-of-war competition conducted by the men. It was reported that a good time was had by all.

The next morning, Wednesday, June 13, at 8:30 a.m. the conventioneers attended High Mass at St. Joseph's Cathedral where Columbus Bishop John A. Watterson greeted the visiting Hibernians and welcomed them to Columbus. Immediately following the Mass the Hibernians proceeded to the business session at the Board of Trade. At the conclusion of the business session, the convention was adjourned.

The convention reelected John H. Conway of Dayton as State Delegate and he would serve until 1896. Since the National Board changed the title, Conway was the last elected officer with the title of State Delegate to serve in Ohio. He was also the first State Delegate from Dayton.

Conway's successor, Michael Stanton of Portsmouth, Ohio, elected in 1896, became the first elected officer in Ohio to carry the title of State President. Brother John H. Conway continued to serve the Order faithfully. He died on September 8, 1921 and was buried at Calvary Cemetery in Dayton, Ohio.

Through sharing stories of our history we can remember those brother and sister Hibernians who came before us and on whose shoulders we stand today.



A Year Without St. Patrick's Day

History shows us that the Irish are nothing if not resilient, and the broader community needs that example of resiliency now more than ever.

Those of us of a certain age will remember a holiday children's special "The Year Without Santa Clause," a story about Santa, who has come down with a cold, and believing that no one cares about him anymore decides to cancel Christmas. As could be predicted in a holiday special, the children of the world convince Santa he is still cared for, he is miraculously cured, and Chrismas is saved.

The story comes to mind as another virus, Coronavirus COVID-19, has many believing we are facing in 2020 "The Year Without St. Patrick's Day" as St. Patrick's Day parades and events around the nation are being canceled. Even the venerable NYC St. Patrick's Day parade will not march down 5th Avenue for the first time in 258 years. The NYC parade predates the formation of the United States as a country and Dublin's parade by more than a century and a half. The NYC parade has continued on despite a Revolution, a Civil War, Economic Depressions, two World Wars, and 9/11.

The safety of people and their lives must take the first precedence; the health of the general public can not be sacrificed for the maintenance of tradition, no matter how sad a pill that is to swallow. Yet, given what the parade has persisted through, its cancellation cannot help but cause anxiety.

Yet the impact of the cancellation of St. Patrick's Day activities should not be understated or treated as lightly as the postponement of a backyard barbecue. Many small businesses, and specifically those owned by Irish Americans, rely on St. Patrick's Day the way other businesses rely upon on "Black Friday." Many of these businesses are already under duress and may not survive canceled parades even if they are rescheduled. Sadly, many communities will realize, perhaps for the first time, how significant St. Patrick's Day is to the broader community. Traditional musicians, pipe bands, and Irish dance schools often use the monies raised from St. Patrick's day performances to "keep the tradition alive" throughout the year. Parades often publicly honor individuals who have quietly served their communities for years and it is often the first public recognition they have received.

However, we should not confuse the cancellation of parades with the cancellation of St. Patrick's Day. We need the real St. Patrick's Day, not the facepaint, funny hats, and tasteless t-shirts, more than ever. What better example for a world in crisis than St. Patrick? A man captured and forced into slavery as a youth, as the society he knew was collapsing into the dark ages, and taken to a land that was literally "off the map" of the known world. Yet, he persisted, survived, and turned a tiny remote island on the fringe of Europe into a bastion for the last flickering light of civilization that the Irish he inspired would return to the world.

History shows us that the Irish are nothing if not resilient, and the broader community needs that example of resiliency now more than ever. The Irish have persisted despite the penal laws, famine, and the Know-Nothings. We have seen our churches burned, and our loyalty questioned. The Irish have frozen at Vally Forge, the Bulge, and Chosin; they have sweated at Gettysburg, Okinawa, Viet Nam, and Afghanistan. It would be a tragedy if this St. Patrick's Day America were to forget the thousands of Irish who will wear their green on that day on their graves in service to America.

Amidst so much fear and uncertainty in the world, let us use St. Patrick's Day as an inspiration and remind the world that despite incredible odds that the Irish are still here in contradiction to all logic. Let us wear our green, fly our flags, and show our resolve. Let us support our communities in these trying times; perhaps, if we are able, by going to where we would customarily celebrate St. Patrick's Day and buying a gift certificate to use when normalcy returns to help that business survive. Let's use that time we would be at the parade that is now canceled to call that relative or friend that we haven't spoken to in a while who is now socially isolated.

It is fitting that in Irish American Heritage Month and at this trying time that we remember the motto of the Sullivan Brothers, "We stick together," a quintessentially Irish value. Amidst the bagpipe free silence of this St. Patrick's day, let us show our communities what it truly means to be Irish. If "everyone is Irish on St. Patrick's day," then we will all come back from these unprecedented events stronger than ever.

State Director/State FFAI Chairman's Report

Due to the global COVID-19 pandemic, there will be no Freedom for All Ireland report this month. At this time, there are 1,125 cases in Ireland with six deaths, while in Northern Ireland there are 148 cases with two deaths. As in the United States, Ireland is trying to increase testing capacity with 40,000 citizens currently awaiting testing. Fine Gael leader Leo Varadkar is to place Ireland on a national lockdown today. The lockdown is to include the complete closure of sit-down restaurants, a potential curfew and the closure of public parks, beaches and some roads. All schools, childcare and other public facilities were shut down as of March 12 with all St. Patrick's Day parades and festivals cancelled. Northern Ireland was placed on lockdown beginning today as well.

At this time of uncertainty, I wish you and your families health and safety.
