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#### **Chaplain's Comments**



In the Gospel for Easter morning, the disciples found an empty tomb and were confused because they did not understand the Scripture that He had to rise from the dead. They thought that

someone had removed the body of Jesus. We are fortunate that we know the events that followed. The Risen Christ appeared to many so the Scripture may be understood, and His victory over death could be confirmed and recorded. As Jesus revealed himself to people, they understood the meaning of his death and what it meant for them.

The Apostles had locked themselves in the upper room for fear of the Roman authorities. They thought the Romans may think that they took the body of Jesus to try and prove that he wasn't dead. They believed that they were being sought and would be tortured, imprisoned and possibly executed for their affiliation with Jesus. After He appeared to them, however, they feared no more.

They understood the meaning of the Resurrection and boldly preached the Gospel in the face of persecution. It was in the experience of the Risen Lord that enabled them to really live. The experience produced an ontological change in them. An ontological change is one that affects the very nature of something, and makes it something new. They were made new beings. After their experience of the Risen Lord, they taught and preached with a new confidence. They spoke with

authority that comes from Jesus and the assurance that all that Jesus taught them was true. The Acts of the Apostles, which we shall hear about in the coming weeks, details the events in the lives of the Apostles after their experience of the Risen Christ.

I hope this sounds familiar, brothers. For it is in celebrating the Sacraments that we experience Christ, and the effects of which should produce an ontological change in us. We enter into the death of Christ as we enter the waters of Baptism and we rise again, in victory over death and sin with the Risen Lord, as we are cleansed and made new. Our very nature is changed as original sin is removed, we are made new beings, and enter into communion with Christ and become adopted sons and daughters of God, the Father. It is the experience of the Risen Lord that has changed all of us and has allowed us, through Baptism, to be changed forever, and live a new life in Christ.

We, therefore; like the Apostles, are called to preach the Gospel message of life. We are to spread the Gospel message with the authority and assurance that they possessed. This is how we can help others meet the Risen Lord. Experience Christ in the Sacraments and then go forth to love and serve the Lord by sharing that experience with others. The Eucharist is the source and summit of our life. It is Christ that gives us life and offers an opportunity to share in it forever. We come to the altar to offer ourselves in communion with Christ. #### **State Historian's Report**

#### **Our Chaplains**



In this article we will discuss a very important and honored position within the Ancient Order of Hibernians – that of **Chaplain**. The chaplain's position is an appointed position. He is appointed by the President of the particular jurisdiction (National, State, County or Local). It is generally protocol in most Dioceses that the chaplain appointment be approved by the local Archbishop or Bishop.

The Chaplain holds a position of respect and honor within the Order. At meetings and formal affairs of the Order the Chaplain should sit at the right of President and is a trusted advisor in all matters pertaining to the good and welfare of the Order.

The AOH National Constitution (Section 8) defines the qualifications and duties of the Chaplain as follows:

State, County, District, and Division Chaplains shall be a Priest or Deacon or a Professed Religious Brother and shall:

- •Provide spiritual guidance for their respective jurisdictions
- \*Advise on all matters pertaining to the welfare of the Order
- Attend meetings and participate in discussion with their jurisdictions
- •Be a member of the Catholic Action Committee of their respective jurisdictions

As we are an Irish Catholic organization, we must recognize that our *Practicing Catholic* qualification for membership is very important. Protection of the Church and the support of its teachings and beliefs are of historic importance to the Order. This has always been a mission of the Order going back to our ancient beginnings. It has contributed to our Unity as Irish Catholic men. Catholicism is the glue that binds us together and our faith should always be reflected in our work and activities.

At the national level the most famous National Chaplain was Venerable Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen (he served when he was a Monsignor from 1937 to 1941). The fact that Archbishop Sheen has currently being considered for sainthood should be a source of pride for all Hibernians. On July 6, 2019, the Vatican Congregation for the Causes of Saints promulgated the decree approving Archbishop Sheen's final miracle needed for beatification. Archbishop Sheen will be beatified in Peoria, Illinois at a date yet to be determined.

Also, serving in the position of National Chaplain were illustrious American Churchmen Francis Cardinal Spellman and Richard Cardinal Cushing.

The only known priest from Ohio to serve as National Chaplain was Monsignor Donal O'Carroll. The good Monsignor was born in Roscrea, County Tipperary, Ireland and served as a priest in the Steubenville Diocese (his picture is included with this article). He was appointed by National President Michael J. Coogan of Dayton, Ohio in 1989 and served until 1990. Today, the AOH Division in Washington County bears the name Monsignor Donal O'Carroll Division. Monsignor O'Carroll also served as Ohio State Chaplain for many years.

In addition to our chaplains the AOH also has members of the clergy who are regular members of our order. Some of our clergy members are retired and some are still active in their ministry. It would be a great idea for a

Division to honor the clergy who are members of their Division on an annual basis with a dinner to show appreciation for their service. In today's difficult times, they need our constant prayers and support.

A few of the many priests and clergy who served as State Chaplains were: Father Matthew Scanlon of Niles, Ohio who not only served as State Chaplain, but in 1876 was elected as State President; Father Charles Mulhearn of Martin's Ferry, Ohio who served in 1900; Father John I. Moran of Youngstown who served as State Chaplain from 1904 until 1919; Father James Patrick Ward of Dayton, Ohio who served from 1924 until 1928; and Father John J. Cunningham of Cincinnati who served until his death in 1987.

Please remember our National, State, County and Division chaplains, past and present, in your prayers. Don't forget to thank them for their service to our Order as ministers of our faith.

There is an old Irish blessing for a priest. It goes "Go mbuanaí Dia í Cota Chríost thú." Translated that means "May God keep you in the Coat of Christ."

#### A United Ireland is Imminent

The Irish Unity Summit was held on March 1<sup>st</sup> this year in New York City at the historic Cooper Union. I had the privilege to attend. The Cooper Union venue is indeed historic. In 1860, Abraham Lincoln gave his celebrated anti-slavery speech at Cooper Union before his election as President. It is also the venue where, in 1902, James Connelly spoke in support of a free and United Ireland. Fourteen years later, he would be executed at Kilmainham Gaol for his participation in the Easter Rising. The Cooper Union once again served as a historic venue when Mary Lou McDonald, Sinn Féin President and Leader of the Opposition in the Dáil, addressed the Irish Unity Summit declaring that, "We've run the numbers, and it is adding up to a vote in 2030 that will create a United Ireland."

Ms. McDonald's declaration was not one made-up of hope or wishful thinking. It is a declaration that recognizes the changes from the past and grounds itself in fact. Three major events within the past thirty years support Ms. McDonald's declaration. First, no Irish Republican-Nationalist has served in any elected leadership capacity in the north following partition. This year, Michelle O'Neill, Sinn Féin Vice President and MLA, became the First Minister and leader of the Northern Ireland Assembly, with Sinn Féin holding the majority in the Assembly. This is a clear tell on the political direction the north is taking. In the Republic, a poll conducted by Politico in early March of this year revealed that, among all political parties in the Republic, Sinn Féin has a 28% support level among Irish citizens, followed by Fine Gael at 20%, and Fianna Fáil at 18%, with all other parties and independents trailing. The level of support for Sinn Féin in the north and the Republic provides an indicator of the direction that unification support is heading. Second, although a slim majority in the north presently favors remaining a part of the UK, the number is dwindling. As an example, an Irish News poll from February of this year revealed that 62% of the residents in the north would choose to rejoin the European Union following the UK's adoption of Brexit. This is a revealing statistic. The Republic is a member of the European Union, enjoying the privileges of trade, travel, a common currency, along with having a thriving economy. From this vantage point, one can see that unification is an attractive and sensible alternative to the present situation in the north. The third factor is the success of the Good Friday Agreement (GFA). Since its signing in 1998, the GFA ended the thirty years of the Troubles, established peace, and allowed for new investment in the north, albeit slow at this time. It also opened the border with the Republic.

While all of this is good, much more must be addressed before a border poll on unification can take place. The demographic changes in the north have led to a growing Catholic, nationalist, majority. However, this growing majority does not equate to a clear win if a border poll was called today. The risk of calling a border poll before it is ready is the backlash and rigidity it would create if it failed. The GFA mandates that the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland shall call for a border poll when it '... appears likely to [him or her] that a majority of those voting would express a wish that Northern Ireland should cease to be part of the United Kingdom and form a part of a united Ireland." Dr. Brendan O'Leary, Political Science Professor at the University of Pennsylvania, speaking at the Summit, opined that political support for unification is growing albeit such support would not exist today. The necessity of addressing multifaced cultural, economic, and governing issues must be resolved if voters are to be made comfortable with unification. Mr. Glenn Bradley, a former British soldier, a Loyalist political leader, and a declared Irish Republican, posed one example of an issue that must be

solved before some residents of the north would support unification. Because Mr. Bradley is a former British soldier he draws a pension from the British government. Many in the north are in Mr. Bradley's same position, whether as a soldier or a government worker, unionist or nationalist. Before he could support unification, Mr. Bradley wants to know which government will cover his pension. Other issues discussed included health care coverage, infrastructure, financing obligations, and how government representation will be structured; all of this must be resolved before a border poll on unification can take place. Fortunately, the planning process is underway. A non-governmental multi-party body has been formed with committees made up of individuals from various disciplines and backgrounds participating to address these issues.

A critical factor to the realization of unification is the involvement of the United States and Irish America. Summit presenters made clear that major support from the United States is vital to making any unification plan workable. This includes the pressure that the United States can impose upon the UK to support unification as well as encouraging investment and providing financial backing for the north. Some presenters questioned whether the UK would economically assist with unification should a border poll pass, making pressure from the United State on the UK a necessity. The Summit presenters also put out the call for active participation from Irish-America in the unification process. Ms. McDonald and other presenters encouraged Irish-Americans to contact their elected U.S. Representatives and Senators to tell them that, as a voter, Irish unification is important and that we want our government involved. For us, the Irish-American diaspora, now is the time to make our voices heard if we want to see an Ireland united and free.

#### **IRISH SAINTS OF APRIL**

#### Tigernach, Bishop (d. 549)

April 4

St. Tigernach (or Tierney) was baptized by St. Conleth of Kildare; St. Brigid may have been his godmother. One might say that St. Tigernach suffered the fate of St. Patrick in reverse: as a boy, he was kidnapped from Ireland by raiders from Britain. A British king gave him his freedom. After spending some time at the monastery of Rosnat in Scotland, he embarked upon a pilgrimage to Rome, returning thence to Ireland. He was consecrated bishop at Clogher and lived at his monastic foundation at Clones, County Monaghan. Tigernach became blind in his old age and spent his time in contemplative prayer.

#### Celsus, Archbishop of Armagh (1079-1129)

April 7

Celsus (Ceallach mac Aedha) was a member of a family in which the see of Armagh had become hereditary. Like many of his predecessors, he was a layman when chosen to succeed to the abbacy of Armagh (1105), at the age of 26. Shortly thereafter, he was consecrated its bishop. He proved to be a model bishop, conducting visitations, conserving the temporalities of the see, and restoring discipline. Celsus was instrumental in bringing the reform movement sweeping the continent of Europe to Ireland. He held a great synod at Rath Breasail (1111), at which he sought to enforce these reforms. One of the problems of the Irish church was its organization around the power of the abbots rather than the bishops, a situation leading to the frequent neglect of the spiritual life of the people at large. Celsus replaced the old monastic organization with a diocesan one under the bishops. There was considerable resistance to many reform measures. Celsus is also said to have rebuilt the cathedral of Armagh. The church at this time suffered from depredations carried out by the O'Briens and the O'Rourkes, and Celsus was called upon at times to mediate among warring chiefs. In his efforts, Celsus was supported by St. Malachy. At his death, Celsus broke the tradition of hereditary succession by nominating Malachy to succeed him. He is buried at Lismore. Some calendars place his feast on April 1.

#### Paternus of Abdinghof (d.1058)

April 10

St. Paternus was probably an Irishman, whose sojourning on the Continent brought him to Westphalia. There he entered the monastery of Abdinghof founded by St. Meinwerk. He adopted the life of a walled-up hermit. From his hermitage, he predicted the destruction of the city by fire unless the inhabitants repented. The fire came to pass; Paternus was among its victims. The Gregorian reformer St. Peter Damian was very impressed by St. Paternus.

#### Ruadan of Lothra, Abbot (d.c. 584)

April 15

This saint was born in western Leinster. He was a disciple of St. Finian of Clonard. In Tipperary, he founded a monastery at Lothra and served as its abbot. Beyond these details, much of what comes down to us about him is considered unreliable.

#### Donnan and his Companions, Martyrs (d. 618)

April 17

St. Donnan was one of the many Irish who followed St. Columba to Iona. Later, with 52 companions, he founded a monastery on the island of Eigg, in the Inner Hebrides. Robbers descended upon the place during the Easter liturgy in 618. The monks were permitted to finish and then murdered. Though robbery is cited as the motive, a story also recounts that the crime was instigated by a woman resentful of the loss of sheep pasturage to the foundation. A St. Donnan's Well survives on Eigg, as well as several Scottish churches named for him.

#### Laserian, Abbot and Bishop of Leighlin (d.639)

April 18

Also known as Laisren or Molaisse, the early life of this saint is poorly documented. He may have spent several years at Iona, and then went to Rome, where he was ordained by Pope Gregory the Great. Later, he appears at Leighlin, in a monastery run by its founder, St. Goban. At a local synod held at White Fields, St. Laserian was notable as a defender of the Roman usages for Easter, as opposed to the Celtic usages still prevalent in Ireland. The synod could not reach agreement, and Laserian was sent to Rome with a deputation to seek the Pope's assistance in settling the matter. There, Pope Honorius consecrated him bishop and named him legate for Ireland. Upon his return to Ireland, the saint seems to have settled the Easter controversy, at least in southern Ireland. Upon the resignation of St. Goban, Laserian assumed the abbacy at Leighlin, an office which he held until his death.

#### Malrubius, Abbot (d. 722)

April 21

Also known as Maelrubha, this saint became a monk at St. Comgall's monastery at Bangor, County Down. At the age of 29, he went to Scotland, likely spending some time at Iona before going to the mainland. He established a church and monastery at Applecross in Ross, which served as his base of operations for the remainder of his life. He preached to the Picts, extending his reach to the Isle of Skye. The coast of Scotland between Applecross and Loch Broom contains a number of places named after him, and at least twenty-one churches in Scotland bear his name. An island in Loch Maree contains a spring dedicated to him which till recent times was sought for its healing properties, especially for insanity. The saint ruled as abbot at Applecross for 51 years, dying at the age of 80. Some accounts say he was martyred by Vikings.

#### Asicus, Bishop of Elphin (d.c. 470)

April 27

Also known as Tassach, this saint was a disciple of St. Patrick, a monk, and probably the first bishop of Elphin. He was said to have been a skilled brass worker or coppersmith, and also a married man. He resigned his see-accounts vary as to the reason--and retired to solitude on the island of Rathlin O'Birne in Donegal Bay for seven years. His monks eventually tracked him down. They tried to bring him back to his see, but he died on the way.

#### Maughold, Bishop of Man (d.c. 498)

April 27

Of Maughold, also known as Maccul, we know only what is found in some early lives of St. Patrick, who converted him from a life of crime and violence. To free him from association with his former companions, St. Patrick imposed exile from Ireland as a penance. He is said to have set off alone in a coracle without rudder or oars, finding his way to the Isle of Man. There, he was welcomed by two missionaries sent there by Patrick. From that time he led an austere and penitential life. He was chosen bishop over the Manx, possibly by acclamation, and succeeded in evangelizing many there.

#### Cronan of Roscrea, Abbot (d.c. 626)

April 28

Cronan came from what is now County Offaly. He first entered monastic life at Puayd. He practiced the unusual charity of building houses which he then vacated to provide a home for any anchorite who needed one. He is said to have built about fifty, taking nothing with him when he left. St. Cronan is probably the founder of monasteries in Offaly at Lusmag and Monahincha, near Roscrea. By the bog of Monela, near Senross, he built himself a cell, where he spent the remainder of his life.

#### Forannan, Abbot (d.c. 982)

April 30

Forannan is said to have occupied an Irish bishopric at Domhnach-Mor, which cannot be identified. He is reported to have embarked for the Continent with twelve companions on the basis of a dream, in which an angel showed him a beautiful valley to which he was supposed to travel. Forannan concluded that the abbey of Waulsort on the Meuse was the placed pointed out to him. He was apparently appointed abbot in 962. Forannan spent some time later at the abbey of Gorze in Lorraine on a trip back from Rome. There he was seeking instruction in the Rule of St. Benedict, which Waulsort had either abandoned or never embraced. He succeeded in reforming the relaxed practices that had developed at Waulsort, and also persuaded the local nobles to observe the Truce of God in regard to all pilgrims visiting the abbey.

#### STATE NEWS AND ISSUES

As we have mentioned before, several pilgrimages will converge upon Indianapolis from different quarters of the United States for the National Eucharistic Congress in July. The St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Route, in progress from the East, May 17 to July 16, will pass through the Ohio (arch)dioceses of Steubenville, Columbus, and Cincinnati.

#### **Major Degrees of the Order**

Brothers,

An exemplification of the Major Degrees of the Order will take place on Saturday, April 20, 2024, in Akron. Please see the attached flyer for details. It is imperative that we get as many members as possible to receive the Major Degrees of the Order for several reasons:

1. Article VII, Section 12 of the AOH National Constitution states:

In addition to being a member in good standing for a continuous six (6) month period, each State may require in its respective By-Laws that: (a) a candidate for State elected or appointed office has received the major degrees of the Order before election or appointment; (b) a candidate for County elected office must have received the major degrees of the order before election; and (c) a candidate for Division President or Vice-President must have received the major degrees of the Order before election, This section does not apply to the election of officers for a newly formed Division at organization, however, no member shall be eligible to hold any elected or appointed National office unless he has received the major degrees of the Order for at least one(1) year prior to election or appointment.

2. After the St. Patrick's Pledge that we all took, the President states:

You brothers, having made this promise of your own free will, I hereby declare you, each and all, members of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, and commend you to the friendship of its members, subject; however, to the condition that you receive the Lessons and take the Test of the Order known as the Major Degrees of the Order in accordance with our laws.

3. It has been proven that members who take the Degrees of the Order, are more productive and are more likely to remain engaged members of the AOH.

Presidents, please do your part to get as many candidates as possible to the ceremony. I know that it will be easier for those candidates in NE Ohio to attend than from other parts of the State. It is my hope that we can schedule an exemplification of Major Degrees in other areas of the State in the near future.
