2) Veteran/Military Services at Ohio's Colleges and Universities.:

In 2008, the Ohio became the first state in the nation to provide in-state tuition to veterans and dependents attending public colleges and universities. From 2014 and onward, the state has continued to upgrade the services and support offered to veterans and their families. Ohio's public colleges and universities have been joined by many private/non-profit institutions of higher education in ensuring the success of veteran/military students. If you know a veteran, active duty/reserve/Guard servicemember, or family member who is seeking more information on how to access higher education, the best resource for helping them learn more about Ohio's veteran higher education programs is the Ohio Department of Higher Education. They maintain several websites that help link individuals to the broad set of services offered through each of Ohio's public colleges and universities:

In the only program of its type in the country, the state has established an Ohio-specific Military Transfer Assurance Guide (MTAG) that helps veterans translate their military experience into college credit. By state law, these credits must be awarded to the veteran at no charge and are transferrable to all 36 of Ohio's public colleges and universities. State Historian's Report

He Rode With Custer

Myles Walter Keogh (key-oh) was born on March 25, 1840 to a wealthy Catholic family near the village of Leighlinbridge in County Carlow, Ireland. His family owned a large farm known as "Orchard House."

He attended the seminary at St. Patrick's College in Maynooth for only two years then left Ireland. He decided to seek his fortune in Africa, where he served as a mercenary soldier for hire.

In 1860 the Pope sent out a call to Catholics to protect the Holy See from the Italian forces of unification. Keogh signed up in the Papal Army and soon rose to the rank of Second Lieutenant. For gallantry against an overwhelming Peidmontese force he was awarded two medals, the *Magaglia de Pro Petri Sede* and the

Cross of the Order of St. Gregory by Pope Pius IX (medals are pictured below). While still in Rome he was approached by American bishops recruiting experienced foreign officers for the Union army.

Because the American Civil War promised excitement, Keogh resigned his commission in the Papal Army and immigrated to the United States in 1862. He joined the Union volunteers and because of his prior experience he was made an officer and assigned to a staff position in a cavalry unit. Major General George Thomas wrote to General Halleck on April 25, 1865, "Major Keogh went forward with a detachment of the 12th Kentucky Volunteer Cavalry – surprised and routed the rebels near Salisbury – killing 9 and capturing 68. Much credit is due Major Keogh."


Although a staff officer, Keogh saw action at the 2nd Bull Run, Antietam, Brandy Station, Gettysburg and other battles. At the end of the war, he was mustered out of the volunteer service in September 1866. He then signed up in the regular army. Keogh was commissioned a Captain in a newly organized cavalry unit, the 7th Cavalry.

Keogh soon found favor with the 7th Cavalry's colorful deputy commander, Lt. Colonel George Armstrong Custer. He soon became part of Custer's inner circle of officers. It was Keogh who suggested that the 7th Cavalry should have its own regimental band. Custer's wife, Elizabeth, credits Keogh with suggesting that the regimental song be the *Garryowen*, an Irish quick-step, which was named for a village in County Limerick.

Captain Keogh was in command of the 7th Cavalry's Company I. His company became known as the "Wild I" because of its hard fighting and general wild behavior. On June 25, 1876, Captain Keogh and his company were with Lt. Colonel Custer when they attacked what Custer thought was a small Indian encampment near the Little Bighorn River in Montana.

The small encampment turned out to be a major gathering of Sioux and Cheyenne warriors. Having split his forces, Custer was vastly outnumbered. The resulting battle saw Custer and all of his men killed (thirty-four of the 215 men killed with Custer were born in Ireland).

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Captain Keogh's Company I fought its final battle just to the left of Company F, with which Custer was fighting. According to some Indian accounts of the battle, Keogh might well have been among the last to fall. One Indian survivor of the battle later said of Keogh, "Like the flame of a coal blazed his eyes. His teeth glistened like a fighting grizzly."

Two days after the battle, General Alfred Terry's main force inspected the battlefield. They found that all of the troopers were dead and all had been stripped and mutilated by the Indians. Captain Keogh was found where he had fallen; however, his body had not been stripped or mutilated in any way. It is believed by some historians that it was the large Papal medals that Keogh wore

that may have caused the Indians to leave his body undisturbed (many of Sitting Bull's warriors were Catholic).

Originally buried on the battlefield, Keogh's remains were disinterred and taken to Auburn, New York as he had requested in his will. He was buried at Fort Hill Cemetery on October 26, 1877, an occasion marked by citywide official mourning and an impressive military procession to the cemetery.

But the story does not end there. Although Captain Keogh and the others lost their lives, Captain Keogh's horse, Comanche, was found on the battlefield, severely wounded, but still alive. Comanche is credited with being the only living survivor of the Custer battle.

Comanche, wounded seven times, was taken to Fort Lincoln where he eventually recovered form his wounds, under the care of the 7th Cavalry's blacksmith, Gustave Korn. Thereafter, on ceremonial occasions, Comanche walked at the head of Captain Keogh's old troop. He would be draped in black with a pair of cavalry boots slung over the saddle with the toes pointing backward. Comanche lived to be twenty-nine. He died on November 7, 1891.

Today, at the Custer Battlefield, a marker memorializes the spot where Captain Myles Keogh fell commanding Company I in its final battle.

WORTHY RECEPTION OF THE EUCHARIST (CONTINUED)

If a Catholic in his or her personal or professional life were knowingly and obstinately to reject the defined doctrines of the Church, or knowingly and obstinately to repudiate her definitive teaching on moral issues, however, he or she would seriously diminish his or her communion with the Church. Reception of Holy Communion in such situations would not accord with the nature of the Eucharistic celebration, so that he or she should refrain.

IRISH SAINTS OF FEBRUARY

Brigid, Abbess (c. 450-525)

February 1

Brigid's name is also spelled Bridget and Bride. She was born near Dundalk, Louth. By legend, her father was Dubhthach, a chieftain of Leinster, and her mother Brocca, a slave. Her parents were baptized by St. Patrick. Even as a child, Brigid aspired to the consecrated life. Besides Patrick himself, with whom she always held a close friendship, Brigid was mentored in her early religious life by St. Macaille of Croghan and St. Mel of Armagh. After earlier establishments under the mentorship of the latter two saints, she founded a double monastery at Kildare about 470, the first in Ireland, and was abbess of the female convent. This foundation developed a reputation for scholarship and sanctity and was the kernel of the cathedral city of Kildare. Brigid's learning and sanctity are reflected in the numerous legends that have grown up around her. She was the inspiration of the many consecrated virgins of the Irish Church. The "Mary of the Gael," her tomb is at Downpatrick, with Sts. Columba and Patrick, with the latter of whom she shares the title of patron of Ireland.

Mel and Melchu, Bishops (5th century)

February 6

An unreliable legend makes these two brothers nephews of St. Patrick who accompanied him on his return to Ireland. The two were said to be bishops, though of what sees is not certain. Mel was cleared by St. Patrick of a rumored scandalous relationship with an aunt, though Patrick ordered them to live apart.

Alto, Abbot (d.c. 760)

February 9

Alto was probably an Irishman. He took up the life of a hermit near Augsburg, in Germany, in about 743. Impressed by his holiness, the local Germanic king gave him a parcel of land near Altomunster, Bavaria, where he constructed a monastery.

Marianus Scotus (d. 1088)

February 9

Marianus, or Muiredach mac Robartaigh, seems to have been born in Donegal. After assuming monastic garb and being ordained a priest, he and some companions departed for the Continent, apparently intending a pilgrimage to Rome. What started as a temporary stop in the diocese of Regensburg ended up being a lifelong commitment, when this band of Irish pilgrims took up residency in a double monastic community there. Marianus came into his own there as a skilled copyist and calligrapher, and a poet and theologian as well.

Fintan, Abbot (d. 603)

February 17

One of a number of sainted Fintans, this man was a monk trained by St. Columba. He led an eremetical life at Cloneenagh, eventually becoming abbot of the community which grew up around him. He was known for his gifts of prophecy and clairvoyance and had many miracles attributed to him.

Finan, Bishop (d. 661)

February 17

Finan was an Irish monk of Iona. He succeeded St. Aidan as second bishop of Lindisfarne, a diocese which at the time encompassed all of Northumbria, Durham, and York. Finan opposed the adoption of Roman liturgical practices to replace the Celtic usages. He was a friend of King Oswy of Northumbria, and did much to evangelize the kingdoms which lay to the south as well.

Colman, Bishop (d. 676)

February 18

There are a number of sainted Colmans, but this one was an Irishman and the third bishop of Lindisfarne. He reigned only three years, but his reign was a momentous one, since during it the controversy between the Celtic and Roman usages, especially over the date of Easter, came to a head in the British Isles. Reportedly, King Oswy of Northumbria sought a solution when he found, to his consternation, that members of the royal household did not agree on when to celebrate Easter. The English monastic historian Bede relates the debates at the ensuing Synod of Whitby (663), the winning argument being that the pope, as successor of Peter, had received the power of the keys, whereas the followers of St. Columba had not. Colman found that he could not accept the Roman usage, resigned his bishopric, and returned to Ireland, where he founded a monastery on Inishbofin. Rome chose not to press the issue of Easter with many of the Irish congregations, reasoning (correctly) that time would bring a resolution.

ISSUES AND NEWS

- --It has always been a problem getting accurate and complete news about events in the Church through the secular media, but the problem is especially acute today. Many journalists speak and write in ignorance, many in malice, and many in a toxic mix of the two. It is vital to have reliable sources of information. If you like your information in a newspaper, may I recommend the *National Catholic Register*? Some excellent websites are Eternal Word Televison Network, www.ewtn.com, and Catholic News Agency, www.cna.com.
- --Those who are concerned with religious liberty issues know that in recent decades we have seen an alarming increase in threats to individual rights to freedom of religion. The pandemic has exacerbated this trend, revealing that many of our "elites" view religion as a "non-essential" function, or worse, a threat to public health. One way to stay informed about these issues is to follow the podcast of legal analyst Andrea Picciotti-Bayer at www.ncregister/topic/religious-freedom-matters.
- --ACLU of Ohio and the Planned Parenthood Federation of America have brought suit to halt an Ohio law which passed the legislature a little over a year ago, which mandates respectful burial of aborted children. The suit was brought in the Common Pleas Court of Hamilton County, where the plaintiffs have previously had success blocking the law.
