State Historian's Report

Michael Joseph O'Rahilly



The least remembered leader of the 1916 Easter Rising is Michael Joseph O'Rahilly was the only leader of the Rising to die in the actual fighting.

He was born April 22, 1875, the son of a wealthy County Kerry family. He was educated in the national schools and attended Clongowes secondary school. In 1893 he entered the Royal University of Ireland where he hoped to study medicine, but a bout with tuberculosis in 1894 and the death of his father ended his medical plans. In 1898 he left Ireland for the United States where he married Nancy Brown. They were married in April 1899. Together they would have six children.

He was in the US for over 10 years, returning to Ireland in 1909. He became a nationalist and protested the 1911 visit to Dublin by King George V by erecting a banner across Grafton Street that read, "Thou art not conquered

yet, dear land." It was eventually torn down, but not before it gained some publicity.

He spoke the Irish language loudly, and, some say, badly. That did not stop him from speaking it, however. He would often enter a pub and address everyone in his "murdered" Irish, to insure that the language of the Gael was heard.

He called himself "The O'Rahilly" (in Irish Ua Rathghaille) using the Irish custom of assigning the definite article before his last name indicating that he was the leader of the clan. This self-assigned title stuck and even his friends referred to him by that name.

He joined Conradh na Gaeilge (the Gaelic League) in 1912 and soon became a member of An Coiste Gnotha, its governing body. He was editor of its newspaper, *An Claidheamh Soluis*, (The Sword of Light) in 1913. He worked on a project translating Dublin street names into Irish. O'Rahilly provided many of the bi-lingual translations seen today on Dublin street signs. He was an admirer of Arthur Griffith and soon became a member of Sinn Fein

He was the co-founder along with Eoin MacNeil of the Irish Volunteers in 1913 and was appointed its Treasurer and Director of Arms. He, along with Erskine Childers, directed the first major arming of the Volunteers, the landing of German Mauser rifles at Howth on July 26, 1914.

He reluctantly agreed with Eoin MacNeil and the Volunteer's Chief of Staff Bulmer Hobson that the 13,000-man force should be used only for defensive purposes. Despite his support for militancy, he was not a member of the secret Irish Republican Brotherhood (IRB). By 1915 the Irish Volunteers had been infiltrated by the leadership of the IRB who intended to use them for an armed rising against British rule in Ireland.

The O'Rahilly discovered that the IRB had kidnapped Bulmer Hobson in order to prevent his interference with their Easter plans. On Good Friday 1916 O'Rahilly burst into the office of Patrick Pearse at St. Enda's School. Brandishing a pistol he shouted to Pearse, "Whoever kidnaps me will have to be a quicker shot!" Pearse was able to calm him down by assuring him that Hobson was unharmed and would be released after the Rising had begun.

The IRB leadership issued orders for the Irish Volunteers to march on Easter Sunday 1916, the planned date for the Rising to begin. MacNeil did not agree with going forward, so he sent The O'Rahilly west to Cork, Kerry and Tipperary to countermand the orders for an Easter march. After a great deal of confusion, caused by the conflicting orders, Patrick Pearse and James Connolly took charge. They began assembling the Irish Volunteers and the Irish Citizen Army at Liberty Hall in Dublin on Easter Monday, April 24. The group was to march to the General Post Office (GPO), occupy it, and establish it as the headquarters for the rising.

The O'Rahilly arrived back in Dublin on Monday just as the force was preparing to leave Liberty Hall. He drove up in his green dust-covered touring car (a 1911 De Dion-Bouton). The O'Rahilly was the only member of Sinn Fein with a car.

Pearse and Connolly knew that he did not support the rising and for that reason they were reluctant to let him participate. But The O'Rahilly insisted on going with them. He said, "I've helped wind up the clock. Might as well hear it strike." Pearse agreed, and The O'Rahilly began loading his car with rifles, ammunition and homemade bombs. The car was later burned, the wreckage becoming part of a street barricade.

Upon capturing the GPO, The O'Rahilly was assigned as aide-de-camp to Patrick Pearse and given command of the top floors. The fight went on for a week. On April 29, 1916, as the GPO was being burned down around them, the leaders decided upon a plan of escape. The O'Rahilly would lead a column that would find an escape route out of the GPO and set up a new headquarters.

The O'Rahilly gathered an advance party of thirty men. Realizing that there was little chance of success he said to his friend, Desmond Fitzgerald, "The only thing that grieves me is that so many of my lads are Gaelic speakers." Quickly thinking of a solution, he then said with a big laugh, "When it comes to the end, I'll say 'English speakers to the fore, Irish speakers to the rear."

The O'Rahilly ordered his men to fix bayonets and they charged out of the GPO and up Henry Street. When they crossed onto Moore Street they ran head-on into a British Army barricade. In one of the most brutal confrontations of the Rising the unit charged the barricade. The O'Rahilly was hit several times by machine gun fire but made his way to a doorway on Moore Street. Bleeding badly, he made a dash across the road to find shelter in Sackville Lane (now O'Rahilly Parade). This exposed him to more fire. Hit several more times, he died in a doorway on the side of Moore Street off Sackville Lane. His last act was to write a good-bye note to his pregnant wife and family.

His men were not able to break through the barricade and were forced to fall back. Twenty of the original thirty men that left the GPO had been killed. An ambulance driver later reported that after the skirmish his attempts take the still living O'Rahilly to the hospital was prevented by British officers.

Michael Joseph O'Rahilly is buried in Glasnevin Cemetery in the Republican Plot alongside the grave of Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa.

AOH ROLE IN FIGHT FOR LEGACY JUSTICE 1

The front page headline in the prominent Belfast weekly paper the *Andersontown News* said it all-*IRISH AMERICAN SUPPORT PIVOTAL* in getting historic move by the Irish government to take Britain to the European Courts, on behalf of Irish victims' relatives and fight Britain's gambit to shut down any chances to get the truth about the murders of their loved ones.

We are being contacted by victims' family members who have been fighting Britain to get justice for decades. They say this action by the Irish government is the best Christmas gift they could wish for, and are deeply grateful to the AOH for playing a major role in making it happen.

The AOH of course has a longstanding relationship with victims' campaigns like the Bloody Sunday and Ballymurphy Massacre Families, and Relatives for Justice.

When the British used their Queen's Speech to announce their planned amnesty injustice, within 3 days the AOH hosted a webinar with relatives of the Ballymurphy Massacre explaining how such proposals would deprive others of hopes for justice.

When more than 3,500 family members, signed a "Time for Truth" letter appealing for truth about loved ones murdered during the conflict, the launch was scheduled around an AOH webinar where Poilin Quinn and Jim Clinton, were joined by Sinn Fein Policing and Justice Spokesperson Gerry Kelly, and Relatives for Justice Director Mark Thompson.

When the British government announced a new legacy proposals, Congressman Brendan Boyle, Irish Consul General Ciaran Madden, and representatives of Irish and British political parties, joined with Irish Americans across the country, to hear victims' relatives **Jacqueline Butler**, daughter of a **Springhill Massacre** victim, **Steven Travers** a survivor of the **Miami Showband Massacre**, and **Martin Mallon**, whose aunt Roseann Mallon was one of 17 collusion murder victims killed with the same weapons, describe how the new British legacy plans would remove their legal path to truth.

When Fergus O'Dowd, Chair of the Irish Committee for the Implementation of the Good Friday Agreement (GFA) made a formal request to the Irish Attorney General to bring an action, he appeared on an AOH broadcast, also highlighted by a biting analysis of the amnesty bill joined by from House of Lords member Nuala O'Loan, and two victims' family representatives.

AOH representatives on prominent Foreign Policy groups like the National Committee for American Foreign Policy and Ad Hoc Committee for the Protection of the Good Friday Committee, led the way in making legacy justice a key issue for them.

AOH representatives met with and challenged British officials like Brandon Lewis. Chris Heaton—Harris and British Lord Caine. We were the driving force behind a number of Congressional briefings and initiatives. We met with and lobbied key Irish officials. Other Irish American organizations followed AOH leadership.

IRISH SAINTS OF FEBRUARY

Brigid, Abbess (c. 450-525)

February 1

Brigid's name is also spelled Bridget and Bride. She was born near Dundalk, Louth. By legend, her father was Dubhthach, a chieftain of Leinster, and her mother Brocca, a slave. Her parents were baptized by St. Patrick. Even as a child, Brigid aspired to the consecrated life. Besides Patrick himself, with whom she always held a close friendship, Brigid was mentored in her early religious life by St. Macaille of Croghan and St. Mel of Armagh. After earlier establishments under the mentorship of the latter two saints, she founded a double monastery at Kildare about 470, the first in Ireland, and was abbess of the female convent. This foundation developed a reputation for scholarship and sanctity and was the kernel of the cathedral city of Kildare. Brigid's learning and sanctity are reflected in the numerous legends that have grown up around her. She was the inspiration of the many consecrated virgins of the Irish Church. The "Mary of the Gael," her tomb is at Downpatrick, with Sts. Columba and Patrick, with the latter of whom she shares the title of patron of Ireland.

Ia, Virgin (6th century)

February 3

Little reliable evidence exists regarding St. Ia. She is reported to have been a hermitess who lived in Cornwall, having been miraculously transported there from Ireland after missing travel connections with her companions.

Indractus and Dominica, Martyrs (c. 710)

February 5

Little is known of these saints, who were brother and sister. They were reportedly murdered by Saxons near Glastonbury, England, on their way to or from Rome. Their relics were venerated at Glastonbury Abbey during the Middle Ages.

Vodalus (d.c. 720)

February 5

This saint, also known as Voel, was either an Irishman or a Scot, who went to Gaul to preach and lived as a hermit near Soissons.

Mel and Melchu, Bishops (5th century)

February 6

An unreliable legend makes these two brothers nephews of St. Patrick who accompanied him on his return to Ireland. The two were said to be bishops, though of what sees is not certain. Mel was cleared by St. Patrick of a rumored scandalous relationship with an aunt, though Patrick ordered them to live apart.

Alto, Abbot (d.c. 760)

February 9

Alto was probably an Irishman. He took up the life of a hermit near Augsburg, in Germany, in about 743. Impressed by his holiness, the local Germanic king gave him a parcel of land near Altomunster, Bavaria, where he constructed a monastery.

Marianus Scotus (d. 1088)

February 9

Marianus, or Muiredach mac Robartaigh, seems to have been born in Donegal. After assuming monastic garb and being ordained a priest, he and some companions departed for the Continent, apparently intending a pilgrimage to Rome. What started as a temporary stop in the diocese of Regensburg ended up being a lifelong commitment, when this band of Irish pilgrims took up residency in a double monastic community there. Marianus came into his own there as a skilled copyist and calligrapher, and a poet and theologian as well.

Ludan (d. 1202?)

February 12

Ludan was either a Scot or an Irishman. He used an ample inheritance to construct a hostel for travelers and the infirm, and then set out on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. On his way home, passing through Alsace, he received an intimation of his imminent death, which was itself heralded by miraculous events. His relics were venerated in the area till they were evidently destroyed during the Thirty Years War.

Modomnoc (6th century)

February 13

Modomnoc was an Irish monk who went to Wales, where he studied under St. David and also served as beekeeper for the saint's monastic community. According to legend, he introduced bees to Ireland, when a swarm followed him there upon his return. He settled at Tibraghny, Kilkenny, and reportedly was later bishop of Ossory.

Tanco, Abbot and Bishop (d. 808)

February 15

Also known as Tatto, this man was an Irish monk who went to Amalbarich Abbey in Saxony, where he eventually became the abbot. He evangelized in Cleves and Flanders and was eventually a bishop in Saxony. Tanco was martyred, though accounts differ as to the circumstances of his martyrdom.

Fintan, Abbot (d. 603)

February 17

One of a number of sainted Fintans, this man was a monk trained by St. Columba. He led an eremetical life at Cloneenagh, eventually becoming abbot of the community which grew up around him. He was known for his gifts of prophecy and clairvoyance and had many miracles attributed to him.

Finan, Bishop (d. 661)

February 17

Finan was an Irish monk of Iona. He succeeded St. Aidan as second bishop of Lindisfarne, a diocese which at the time encompassed all of Northumbria, Durham, and York. Finan opposed the adoption of Roman liturgical practices to replace the Celtic usages. He was a friend of King Oswy of Northumbria, and did much to evangelize the kingdoms which lay to the south as well.

Colman, Bishop (d. 676)

February 18

There are a number of sainted Colmans, but this one was an Irishman and the third bishop of Lindisfarne. He reigned only three years, but his reign was a momentous one, since during it the controversy between the Celtic and Roman usages, especially over the date of Easter, came to a head in the British Isles. Reportedly, King Oswy of Northumbria sought a solution when he found, to his consternation, that members of the royal household did not agree on when to celebrate Easter. The English monastic historian Bede relates the debates at the ensuing Synod of Whitby (663), the winning argument being that the pope, as successor of Peter, had received the power of the keys, whereas the followers of St. Columba had not. Colman found that he could not accept the Roman usage, resigned his bishopric, and returned to Ireland, where he founded a monastery on Inishbofin. Rome chose not to press the issue of Easter with many of the Irish congregations, reasoning (correctly) that time would bring a resolution.

ISSUES AND NEWS


On Dec. 29, Governor DeWine vetoed a measure that would ban transgender surgery and "gender-affirming" care for minors in the state of Ohio, and would ban transgender athletes from participation in female sports. As his veto message indicates, the Governor appears to be under the impression that not allowing "gender-affirming care" contributes to elevated suicide in the population afflicted with "gender dysphoria." He did say that he was planning to administratively ban transgender surgery till age 18—something which he did on Jan. 3--but presumably not other "gender-affirming" care, and that he planned to position the state to better regulate and track such treatment for adults and children. He did not address the plight of woman and girls who may have to share locker rooms and compete against biological males. The Governor's veto has since been overridden by both houses of the state legislature, controlled by members of his own party, so that the original measure will be going into force.

On January 9, a federal District Court placed a temporary restraining order on a new Ohio law requiring children to have parental consent to use some social media. This follows a suit brought by a trade group representing TikTok, Snapchat, Meta, and other tech companies.



2023 Assessments

The 2023 assessments will be due on or before February 15, 2024, per the Ohio State Bylaws see below.

ARTICLE VIII	ASSESSMENTS

Section 8.1 The Board shall levy an annual assessment on all Divisions of six

dollars (\$6.00) per year for each member in good standing as of December 31. Two dollars (\$2.00) of this assessment amount shall be earmarked to offset expenses for the hospitality room at the National Convention. The assessment shall be submitted with the Division's annual report and corrected membership roster, on or before February

15.

Section 8.2 Annual reports received later than February 15 shall include an

additional ten percent (10%) levy not to exceed twenty-five dollars

(\$25.00.)

Section 8.3 During their first year of their existence, newly organized Divisions

shall pay assessments of twenty-five (\$.25) per each month the Division has been in existence, not to exceed three dollars (\$3.00) per member,

per year.

Section 8.4 Annual reports and assessments shall be sent to the Secretary by

Certified Mail.
