On Sunday, June 19, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ—popularly known as Corpus Christi. In doing so, we are reminded that the Eucharist in which we share is not mere bread and wine but the actual Body and

Blood of the Risen Lord. We celebrate the great gift God gives us in feeding and nourishing us with his very self in order that we might continue our journey through this world, allowing us to have not just a spiritual but also a physical encounter with Him. 1) Coronavirus (COVID-19) and Veterans: www.va.gov/coronavirus

2) Ohio Governor's Memorial Wreath Laying Ceremony, May 27, 2022:

For the first time since 2019, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine hosted the annual Ohio Governor's Memorial Wreath Laying Ceremony for the public at the Veterans Plaza of the Ohio Statehouse on May 27th. The Governor invited Gold Star Families, veterans, servicemembers, families, and the public to attend this moving and poignant event and your Veterans Affairs Chairman was honored to act as Master of Ceremonies. Jim Tate, Gold Star Father of USMC Corporal Jacob A. Tate (KIA 1/2/11, Afghanistan) shared keynote remarks and the ceremony honored three families of US servicemembers who have been killed in action since 2019. Those servicemembers are Army Sergeant Joseph P. Collette of Lancaster (KIA 3/21/19, Afghanistan), Army Private First Class Brandon J. Kreisher of Stryker (KIA 7/29/19, Afghanistan), and Navy Hospitalman Third Class & Corpsman Maxton W. Soviak of Westerville (KIA 8/26/21, Afghanistan). Also participating in the program were honor guards from all branches of the Armed Forces, the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation & Corrections, and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources.

3) Revamped US Department of Veterans Affairs Website, www.va.gov:

The VA has revamped the format of their main website at <u>va.gov</u> that has created an easily navigated platform that directs veterans and their families to the key services they may need the most. The new site places VA facility operations and coronavirus status up front and center with key links to VA healthcare and disability services "above the fold". Scrolling down, veterans can find featured services related to education and access to military/veteran records. Additional links right on the homepage include specific pathways to 11 areas of service to veterans and families along with information on how to access state and local veteran services information. It is a tremendous resource for veterans just starting their efforts to connect to benefits and services as well as for those veterans who are looking for additional services.

State Historian's Report

Chaplains and the U.S. Military



The early U.S. Military adopted the custom of having military chaplains. This custom, however, meant Protestant chaplains only. Members of the Catholic faith in the Continental Army were often forced to rely on French military chaplains. Although there were very few Catholic priests available in America, their absence from the Continental forces was due more to anti-Catholic discrimination than availability of priests.

The surviving records from the War of 1812 indicate that there were 12 regular army chaplains during this war and that none of them were Catholic.

The man most often with being the first Catholic priest commissioned as a chaplain and officer in the armed forces of the United States was Father Adam Marshall, S.J. He served aboard the USS North Carolina from December 22, 1824 until his death on board ship, September 20, 1825.

In 1846 the United States declared war on Mexico. The number of Catholics in the military had dramatically increased due to increases in Irish and German

immigration to the U.S. With few exceptions, the vast majority of the U.S. officer corps remained Protestant. These Protestant officers had little use for their Catholic soldiers and singled them out for cruel and often unjust punishments. As a result hundreds, possibly thousands, of Irish and German solders deserted to Mexico where they formed the San Patricio or St. Patrick's Battalion in the Mexican Army. Catholic bishops formally complained to President James K. Polk about Protestant officers forcing Catholic soldiers to attend Protestant services and about the generally cruel and unusual punishments applied to Catholic troops.

In Washington, President Polk was concerned about the increasing number of Catholic desertions and he was also concerned that the war was being perceived in Mexico as an anti-Catholic crusade. Polk secretly contacted New York Bishop John Joseph Hughes and requested a meeting. Secrecy was necessary because if Polk's political allies had discovered that he was meeting with a Catholic bishop, Polk would surely have been driven from office.

Polk requested that Bishop Hughes assign Catholic priests to the Army. As a result, two Jesuit priests were assigned to General Zachary Taylor's army. They were, Father John McElroy, S.J. and Father Anthony Rey, S.J. Their duties were to minister to the Catholic Irish and German soldiers. Father Rey was killed in Mexico during the war. The records are unclear whether his death was due to military action or if he was killed by Mexican rancheros that often espoused hated for Jesuits. Father McElroy served one year with the Army then returned east where in 1863 he founded Boston College.

In the years prior to the Civil War, records indicate that Catholic chaplains served in remote forts of the western territories of the United States. Father Ignacio Ramirez, Father Michael Sheehan and Father Peter DeSmet, S.J. were three priests who served with distinction at these remote forts as military chaplains.

The Civil War – With the beginning of the Civil War the number of Catholic immigrants in this country had quadrupled. Irish and German units were common in the Federal and the Confederate armies. About 40 Catholic priests served the Union Army and about 28 served the Confederacy. Many chaplains, particularly in

the Confederacy, served without any official recognition or pay. As many volunteer units were formed from Catholic parishes, the parish priest often joined the unit. Catholic chaplains most often served at the front lines, exposing themselves to enemy fire in order to provide both medical and sacramental care for the troops.

Noteworthy Union Army chaplains were: Father William Corby, chaplain of the Union Irish Brigade. Father Corby is noted for administering absolution to Catholic troops at the Battle of Gettysburg. He was later served as president of Notre Dame University. Father John Ireland was chaplain of the Fifth Minnesota Regiment and later was Archbishop of St. Paul.

Noteworthy Confederate Army chaplains were: Father John Bannon who was chaplain to the Missouri Irish Brigade and later in the war served as Jefferson Davis' emissary to the Vatican. Father Abram J. Ryan served as chaplain and later became known as the Poet-Priest of the Confederacy.

World War I – At the beginning of World War I there were only sixteen priests serving as chaplains in the Regular Army, eight in the Navy and another ten in the National Guard. This was not enough to meet the anticipated number of Catholics in service. The U.S. bishops formed the National Catholic War Council and appealed to all dioceses and religious communities to contribute what religious personnel they could. Many responded.

Records compiled by the Military Archdiocese report that by the end of the war a total of 1,026 priests (762 diocesan and 264 from religious orders) were serving with the armed forces. There were also 165 priests serving without commission as civilians paid directly by the Knights of Columbus. About 30% of all chaplains in World War I were Catholic priests. Seventeen priests died in service during the war. While most of these deaths were due to military action, several died as a result of tending to sick soldiers during the 1918 flu pandemic. The most famous Catholic chaplain of the war was "Fighting" Father Francis P. Duffy (pictured) of the 69th New York and Rainbow Division. Father Duffy was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the Distinguished Service Medal and the Croix de Guerre. There is a statue of Father Duffy in New York City near Times Square.

Given that this war saw the largest number of Catholic chaplains in any U.S. military operation, it was natural that questions and conflicts of authority arose. Did the chaplains report to their own bishop or to the bishop where they were stationed? This vast military congregation, officially, had no head. On November 24, 1917 the Pope appointed Bishop Patrick Hayes, Auxiliary Bishop of New York, to be "Ordinary of all Catholics who fight in the Army and the Navy during the present war..." All Catholic chaplains now had Bishop Hayes as their Ordinary for the duration of their military career and the organization was run from New York. This organization was called the Military Vicariate. In 1985 the vicariate was made a separate archdiocese and the headquarters moved to Washington, D.C. Archbishop Joseph Ryan was the first Ordinary of the vicariate. In 1987 the title of the vicariate was officially adopted as The Archdiocese for the Military Services, U.S.A.

Of course, chaplains continued to serve nobly and bravely in World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, as well as in Iraq and Afghanistan.

2022 AOH-LAOH JFK Memorial Medal

The In accordance with Article XXVI of the National Constitution of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, nominations were requested for the John F. Kennedy Memorial Medal for 2022. There were five nominations received from LAOH and AOH qualified nominators. The names submitted were certainly some of the worthiest candidates since the inception of this award. The purpose of the award is to recognize a Catholic of Irish birth or descent outstanding in his or her field of endeavor. On behalf of myself and vice-chair LAOH Vice President Marilyn Madigan we are proud to announce that the 2022 AOH-LAOH JFK Memorial Medal recipient is Rocky Bleier. Bleier is best known in his role as running back for 1966 National Championship Notre Dame football team and a four-time Super Bowl Champion with the Pittsburgh Steelers. While those accomplishments in themselves would merit consideration for this prestigious award, it is his work off the field in his role as soldier and longtime veteran advocate where his continued level of excellence has set him apart from so many others. LAOH Vice President Marilyn Madigan adds "President Kennedy challenged us in his Inaugural Address and in his Administration with the Peace Corps to give service to others as Americans. Rocky Bleier accepted that challenge with his Military Service during the Vietnam War where he was a Profile in Courage. His work helping other Veterans and his community involvement demonstrate his commitment to the JFK's quote "Ask not what America can do for you ask what you can do for your country. My fellow citizens of the world ask not what America will do for you but what we can do for the freedom of man"

Rocky Bleier will receive the prestigious award at the closing banquet of the 2022 AOH- LAOH National Convention in his beloved Pittsburgh on Saturday July 16th.

New Orleans AOH member John Fitzmorris prepared the following biography for Bleier's nomination:

Robert Patrick Bleier Jr. was born in Appleton, Wisconsin, the oldest of four children to Robert "Bob" and Ellen Bleier, a solid Catholic Irish-German family; and Rocky's maternal grandmother was a member of the McGuire family. He attended St. Joseph's Parochial School and Xavier High School in Appleton where he excelled at both football and basketball. With neither great speed nor agility, his simple desire to succeed translated into running harder and playing smarter to stand out on the field and led him to a scholarship to Notre Dame to play for legendary coach Ara Parseghian. He played on the 1966 National Championship Team for the Fighting Irish and in the famous 10-10 tie against Michigan State in 1966.

Bleier lasted until the 16th round when he was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers. Football often is compared to war by the overly-dramatic, but Rocky Bleier knows the difference because another draft awaited him. His induction notice to the U.S. Armed Forces joined him with the thousands of young men fighting in the fields and jungles of Vietnam. Reluctantly but with a sense of duty, Rocky put aside his professional career to serve his country—and with the same tenacity with which he played football. He was assigned as a squad grenadier in Company C, 4th Battalion (Light), 31st Infantry, 196th Light Infantry Brigade. On August 20, 1969, while on patrol in Hiep Duc, Bleier was wounded in the left thigh by an enemy rifle bullet when his platoon was ambushed in a rice paddy. While he was down, an enemy grenade landed nearby after bouncing off a fellow soldier, sending shrapnel into his lower right leg and tearing off a part of his right foot. He was later awarded the Bronze Star and Purple Heart.

Rocky began a painful rehabilitation that took two years, but he defied the odds, rejoined the Steelers, and became part of what is arguably the greatest football dynasty in the history of professional football, winning four Super Bowl rings, and finishing his career with 3,855 yards rushing.

A fixture in the Pittsburgh community, Rocky lends his name and presence to numerous charitable causes like helping his fellow Veterans. He has established The Veterans Benefit Institute, an organization that is dedicated to helping our country's veterans receive the benefits that they deserve.

Few individuals can say that they served their country in the military and then have played in the NFL. Even fewer have been wounded in combat only to return and play for a significant period in professional football. Only Rocky Bleier can say that he survived the hell and the heartbreak of combat wounds to fight back, help win four Super Bowls, and then turn his experiences into blessings that he can share with the greater community.

Robert Patrick "Rocky" Bleier has embodied in his life and his example the highest ideals of Friendship, Unity, and Christian Charity, and he embodies the spirit of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Medal.

IRISH SAINTS OF JUNE

Kevin, Abbot of Glendalough (d.c. 618)

June 3

Though Kevin, also known as Coemgen, is one of Ireland's most popular saints, it is difficult to disentangle his real story from the mass of legends which have grown up around him. He may have been of royal blood, was born in Leinster, and was baptized by St. Cronan. He was an oblate to a community of monks at a young age, and after his ordination sought out a solitary life, finding what he desired in Glendalough. As was so often the case, the holy hermit attracted disciples to his location, and eventually Kevin established a community, which grew into the abbey of Glendalough, of which he was the abbot. Many stories about Kevin testify to his close affinity to the natural world around him and are reminiscent of stories about Francis of Assisi. St. Kevin is one of the patrons of Dublin.

Jarlath, Bishop of Tuam (d.c. 550)

St. Jarlath is not to be confused with an earlier namesake who was a disciple of St. Patrick. Jarlath was said to come from a prominent Galway family. Like many early Irish holy men, he was sent at an early age to be trained by monastic mentors. After ordination, Jarlath founded a monastic community near Tuam and became its abbot and bishop. He was the first bishop of Tuam. Among his pupils were supposedly Sts. Brendan of Clonfert and Colman, son of Lenine.

Colman of Dromore, Bishop (fl. 6th century)

There are more than 200 Celtic holy men named Dromore, so it is no wonder that their life stories have become confused. This man was supposedly a Scot, born in Argyllshire. One of his mentors supposedly assigned him the mission of establishing a monastic community on the Coba plain in Ireland, and he did, at Dromore, in County Down. Colman has been venerated in Scotland and Ireland.

Columba, Abbot of Iona (c. 521-597)

June 9

Columba, one of the greatest of Irish saints, came of royalty from both parents. His father was a greatgrandson of Niall of the Nine Hostages, and his mother traced descent from both the kings of Leinster and the Scottish Dalriada. He was also known as Colmcille, a name etymologically derived from the fact that he established many religious cells or foundations. At an early age, he was sent to St. Finnian's school at Moville, where he was ordained a deacon. From there he went to Leinster to study the bardic arts. Still later, he went to the school of another St. Finnian, that of Clonard. Columba was one of the so-called Twelve Apostles of Ireland who emerged from that school. At some point, Columba was ordained a priest. He was associated for a time with another famous monastic school, that of St. Mobhi at Glasnevin, which was dispersed by an outbreak of the plague in 543. For about fifteen years, Columba went about Ireland preaching and making monastic foundations, the best known being Derry, Durrow, and Kells. Columba must have made a striking presentation to his contemporaries; he was said to be very tall and athletic, with a great speaking voice which carried quite a distance.

Columba became involved in a legal dispute with his mentor, Finnian of Clonard. Finnian was in possession of a copy of Jerome's Psalter, the first one to reach Ireland. Columba borrowed it and made a copy. Finnian heard of this and demanded that the copy be surrendered to him. Columba refused. The case made its way to King Diarmaid, overlord of Ireland, who ruled in favor of Finnian. Soon after, Columba found himself in greater difficulty. He provided sanctuary to a man who had fatally injured a follower of Diarmaid in a hurling match. Diarmaid's followers violated sanctuary and killed the man, touching off a war between Columba's clan and Diarmaid's followers, a war in which many men were slain. Columba felt some responsibility for this and there were others who agreed, even asserting that Columba had instigated the war. A local synod censured him, and he only escaped excommunication due to the intervention of St. Brendan. Columba vowed to exile himself from Ireland and seek to win at least as many men for Christ as had perished in the feud. In 563, Columba left Ireland in a coracle, with twelve relatives. His wandering brought him to Iona, where he founded a monastery on land given to him by his mother's kinsmen. Iona was to be one of the most renowned and influential monastic foundations of early medieval Europe. From Iona, Columba and his disciples evangelized the Picts and Scots, and later the English as well as continental Europeans. Columba, always noted for saintly habits, certainly progressed in those over time, with many of the rough edges seen in his earlier life being transformed. He and his disciples became identified, even after his death, with many of the unique practices of the Celtic Church. The monastic rule which he composed for his followers was used throughout Europe, until it was largely replaced by that of St. Benedict.

NEWS OF INTEREST

Catholic Conference of Ohio Executive Dirctor Jerry Freewalt has testified (May 23) in support of HB 598, The Human Life Protection Act. The act, sponsored by Jean Schmidt (R-65) would if passed take effect in the event that *Roe v. Wade* is overturned and would ban all abortions in Ohio except those necessary to save the life of the mother.

The Catholic Conference of Ohio has also applauded (April 6) the unanimous passage in the State House of Representatives of HB 504, The Sacred Space Act, which would increase the penalties for disrupting services in places of worship. The bill awaits action in the Senate.
