Chaplain's's Comments

On March 2, we enter the season of Lent, a season in which we are invited to ponder our mortality and to turn away from sin and to turn toward the Gospel through the acts of prayer, fasting and the giving of alms.

For many of us, fasting is the most difficult aspect of these Lenten practices. I know from my own experience that I would often begin Ash Wednesday with the right frame of mind and the resolve to fast the entire day. By the time the sun would set, however, I was usually indulging in something sweet and chocolaty, thus violating not only the fast of the day but also the sacrifice of sweets which I usually planned to forego throughout the forty days. And yet I also know from my experience of illness that fasting is not impossible. After a two week hospital stay in 2018, during which I was not allowed to eat food for the better part of twelve days, I learned that the feeling of hunger eventually goes away.

But what we so often forget is that we need to join our fasting and our giving of alms together, so that what we save from our fasting we might give that the hungry might have food. What we forego from our fasting we should offer, instead, to those who are in real need. And to do this not begrudgingly but with a spirit of gratitude for all that God has given us, to do this prayerfully as an act of worship in which we acknowledge that God is the source of every good gift.

We might also wish to consider something we often forget when we celebrate our patronal Feast of Saint Patrick in just a few weeks that this celebration falls within the season of Lent. And I while I am not suggesting that we refrain from celebrating the feast, I do think it serves us well to remember that Saint Patrick's day is not just a day of feasting and celebrating but also a day of prayer, a day in which we might consider especially giving alms through Project Saint Patrick, which benefits men in formation for the priesthood and men and women in formation for consecrated life.

Finally, just a reminder that Stark County Division 1 is sponsoring a Lenten Day of Reflection on Saturday, March 5 beginning at 9:00 AM at St. Paul Parish in North Canton, in the basement social hall. Cost is \$20, which will cover food. Mass is at 8:00 AM, followed by confessions at 8:30 AM. If you are interested in attending, please email me at jkeehner@youngstowndiocese.org.

3) Columbus VA Offering Pharmacogenomic Testing for Veterans (PHASER) Program:

Beginning February 1, 2022 Columbus VA offers Pharmacogenomic Testing for Veterans, also known as PHASER. This one-time blood test will help providers determine which medications may be the most effective for their patients and the least likely to cause adverse reactions - all based on each individual Veteran's genes.

PHASER test results can be particularly useful for Veterans on any medications related to mental health, cardiovascular diseases and pain management. Veterans utilizing other Ohio-based VA facilities should ask about the availability of PHASER services when seeking care. 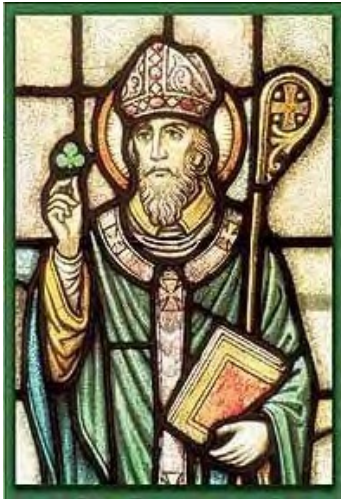

State Historian's Report

J. Michael Finn, State Historian



The Deer's Cry is a prayer also known by the name **St. Patrick's Breastplate** and is an example of a lorica -- a "breastplate" or an "armor of faith" recited for the protection of body and soul against all forms of evil. The authorship of the prayer has historically been attributed to St. Patrick.

The name **Deer's Cry** derives from a legend – Lugaid mac Lóeghaire, the High King of Tara, resolved to ambush and kill Patrick and his monks to prevent them from spreading the Christian faith in his kingdom. As Patrick and his followers approached chanting this prayer, the King and his men saw only **a herd of wild deer** and let them pass by.

The word 'cry' also has the sense of a prayer or petition. This prayer outlines Saint Patrick's spirituality and his keen awareness and perception of the battle between good and evil and thus the importance of praying for protection on a daily basis. St. Patrick eventually converted King Lóeghaire and his people to Christianity.

The Deer's Cry

Attributed to: St. Patrick of Ireland

I arise today, through a mighty strength, the invocation of the Trinity, through belief in the threeness, through confession of the oneness of the Creator of Creation.

I arise today, through the strength of Christ's birth with his baptism, through the strength of his crucifixion with his burial, through the strength of his resurrection with his ascension, through the strength of his descent for the judgment of Doom.

I arise today, through the strength of the love of the Cherubim, in obedience of angels, in the service of archangels, in the hope of the resurrection to meet with reward, in the prayers of patriarchs, in prediction of prophets, in preaching of apostles, in faith of confessors, in innocence of holy virgins, in deeds of righteous men.

I arise today, through the strength of heaven; light of sun, radiance of moon, splendor of fire, speed of lightning, swiftness of wind, depth of sea, stability of earth, firmness of rock.

I arise today, through God's strength to pilot me: God's might to uphold me, God's wisdom to guide me, God's eye to look before me, God's ear to hear me, God's word to speak to me, God's hand to guard me, God's way to lie before me, God's shield to protect me, God's host to save me, from the snares of devils, from temptations of vices, from everyone who shall wish me ill, afar and near, alone and in a multitude.

Major Degrees

Brothers,

The Sons of Milesius AOH Major Degree Team will be exemplifying the Advanced Degrees **Saturday March 26th at 12 Noon at Tara Hall in Columbus**. Please have your members contact Pat Visel (ddanaan@gmail.com) to receive the Degrees or if they wish to observe since we would appreciate an accurate count. If your members aren't or cannot attend the National Convention, this is an opportunity to receive the Degrees.

The Advanced Degrees are an important part of Hibernianism and Division Officers and members sponsors should always encourage members to take the Degrees. I have attached some 'talking points' to use when talking about the Advanced Degrees.

Pat Visel

Major (Advanced) Degrees talking points – The problem with recruiting members to take the Major Degrees is that, you can't talk about them in any solid way. By the bylaws they are secret.

Notes for Officers - These are not something that will convince someone to take the degrees but are beneficial results for your Divisions that you should be aware of.

We can't expect members to absorb everything just by exposure to other members and their activities. Every Person/Division is different and has a different experience and background. The Major Degrees attempt to address some of this.

Statistically, going through the Advanced Degrees usually means a much higher probability of retention and a more active member.

General Talking points

When you took the Shamrock degree at initiation, you agreed to "learn the lessons and take the test of the Order" These are the Major Degrees. I have had some members that didn't realize this connection.

The Advanced Degrees are an experience which attempt to immerse new(er) Hibernians into our History and purpose; in order to understand our identity as Irish. While many Irish clubs, tends to focus on their local Irish-American community, a worthwhile goal, the Hibernians cast our net wider, to the Irish historically, to Ireland's contribution to Catholicism and to Irish-Americans nation-wide. This is why you are not considered a 'Full' Hibernian (eligible to hold office) until you have had your Degrees.

The Advanced Degrees are an important part of Hibernianism, teaching us about what it truly means to be Irish, (-American), and Catholic, both in generations past and now. We Irish-Americans are descended from practically the first significant immigrant group in the new country and have retained our identity as both Irish and Americans remarkably well. We have proven to both America and subsequent immigrant groups, that you can embrace your new country without abandoning your forebearers and your identity as Irish. However, we all know people with Irish names that have no connection with their heritage. As the Hibernian Order grew and evolved, they realized that this was a tragedy and one of the problems that Hibernianism could address. The Advanced Degrees are one part of this mission.

Cuyahoga County, Bluestone Division #3

On Sunday, February 6, 2022, AOH Bluestone Division #3, Cleveland, Ohio held their annual Scholarship Reverse Raffle at the Irish American Club – East Side. The reverse raffle raised over \$6,000 for Bluestone Charities, which provides scholarships to eighth grade students in Catholic school, to help them attend Catholic high schools in the Cleveland area. Catholic Action

On Ash Wednesday (March 2), we enter the Lenten season, a season of penance leading up to Our Lord's Passion, Death, and Resurrection. Traditionally, Lenten penance has comprised fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. The liturgical color for Lent is violet, except that rose may be worn on the Fourth Sunday, Laetare Sunday (March 27). Normally, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence; all the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence. Check with your local parish or diocese for Lenten regulations on abstinence and fasting, for greater opportunities for confession, and for Lenten devotions such as Stations of the Cross.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

IRISH SAINTS OF THE MONTH

Fridolin, Abbot (6th century?) March 6

Reportedly an Irish priest who preached throughout Ireland and then wandered through Gaul preaching, Fridolin settled near Poitiers. He is credited with the recovery, guided by a vision, of the remains of the founder of St. Hilary's monastery there. He rebuilt the monastery, which had been destroyed during the barbarian invasions, and was elected abbot. He later settled on Sackingham, an island in the Rhine, and built a monastery, a convent, and boys' school there, serving as abbot of the monastery. He was known as the Wanderer, or the Traveller.

Senan, Bishop (d. 560) March 8

At least one authority on the subject lists twenty-two St. Senans and separating the details of their lives is not easy. This man is known as Senan of Scattery Island. He was of Munster origin and lived the life of a warrior before hearing a call to religious life. After tutelage under an abbot named Cassidus, Senan was sent to St. Natalis, abbot of Kilmanagh in Ossory. Like many Irish saints, Senan made a pilgrimage to Rome, and on his journey home, made the acquaintance of St. David of Wales, whose staff Senan bore back to Ireland. After spending some time in a community at Inishcarra, Senan was directed by divine signs to found a community on Scattery Island (Inish Cathaigh) in the estuary of the Shannon. He was supposedly consecrated a bishop at some point, but no one knows over what see or when.

Gerald of Mayo, Abbot (d. 732)

March 13

Gerald was an Englishman, a Northumbrian monk of Lindisfarne. After the Synod of Whitby imposed the Roman Easter observance over the Celtic one, a decision which Colman could not abide, a group of English novices accompanied St. Colman and his Irish followers back to Ireland. A community was established on Inishboffin. Though the Irish and English monks of the foundation agreed on liturgical usage, they evidently disagreed on enough other matters to cause Colman to erect a separate house on the adjacent Mayo coast for the English monks. It is not known whether Gerald was an original English member of Colman's group or came later; many English monks did come later, as the place had a reputation as a "school for the Saxons." Colman was at first abbot of both house, but was succeeded by Gerald as abbot of the English one. Gerald is sometimes said to have been a bishop, but it is likely that this results from confusion over the likelihood that Gerald enjoyed some sort of privileges as a protector and patron of his countrymen in Ireland. Gerald probably lived to see the imposition of the Roman Easter usage upon his abbey.

Patrick, Archbishop (c. 389-c. 461)

March 17

Most of us know at least the outline of the story of the Apostle of Ireland, and at least some of the legends about him. The son of Calpurnius, a Romano-British official, born somewhere in the Roman province of Britain, he was carried off into slavery by Irish raiders when he was about 16. After serving as a shepherd for 6 years, probably in Mayo or Antrim, he escaped, and made his way to Gaul. He seems to have studied at the monastery of Lerins, 412-15, and was probably ordained c. 417. Patrick harbored the desire, encouraged by a vision which he experienced, to return and evangelize the pagan Irish. In about 432, consecrated bishop by St. Germanus, he was sent back to Ireland to carry on the work of St. Palladius, who had died the previous year. Most of the remainder of his life was spent in this task, as he travelled throughout the island, encountering the potentially deadly opposition of many pagan chieftains and the Druidic priests. In 442 and 444, he visited Rome. He made Armagh his episcopal see, cementing its role in the history of the Irish Church. Besides his many conversions, Patrick brought the Irish Church into closer union with Rome, encouraged the study of Latin, and raised the standards of scholarship in general. Among surviving writings, we have his *Confession*, an answer to some of his detractors, which contains many details of his life, his *Letter to the Soldiers of Coroticus*, denouncing murders committed by Welsh Christian marauders against their fellow Christians in Ireland, and his prayer, *The Lorica*. Patrick's tomb is believed to be at Downpatrick, with Saints Brigid and Columba.

Frigidian, Bishop (d.c. 588)

March 18

Frigidian was an Irish priest, who during a pilgrimage to Italy, resolved to become a hermit on Monte Pisano near Lucca. Eventually he unwillingly accepted the bishopric of Lucca under pressure from the pope. He fled the Lombard invasion of Lucca, returning later to rebuild the cathedral destroyed by the barbarians. He was noted for his solicitude for the suffering and sick, even those among the conquerors, many of whom he converted. Frigidian retired to his hermitage from time to time. He also founded and presided over a community of clergy, later organized as canons regular, who even five centuries later were seen as models for reform. He is better known in Italy as Frediano, and is still the patron of the cathedral of Lucca.
