ProLife Report

This past Friday, I attended the Ohio March for Life in Columbus with Pat Lally, Ed Moss and Bruce McPherson. Thanks for coming and standing up for the right to life! Just this



past week, the Ohio Department of Health released the 2024 abortion statistics report. The overall number of abortions decreased slightly from the year before, but the number has increased in Franklin and Hamilton counties. Almost 22,000 abortions were performed last year in Ohio, with around 3,000 women traveling to Ohio from states with greater protection



for the unborn. Around 60 lives are ended

through abortion every day in Ohio, with almost half being done by the abortion pill. These numbers aren't the most encouraging, but it just shows that as Hibernians, we have plenty of opportunities to get involved with the pro life movement. Some good news across the nation is that planned parenthood in Wisconsin has stopped performing abortions, and the once largest abortion facility in America, the planned parenthood in Houston has closed. Keep building a culture of life.

IRISH SAINTS OF OCTOBER

Oct. 11 Canice, Abbot (c. 515-99)

According to some sources, Canice, also known as Kenneth, was born at Glengiven, and became a monk and priest in Wales under St. Cadoc, at Llancarfan. He traveled to Rome, studied under St. Finian at Clonard, and evangelized in Ireland and Scotland. He was a close friend of Columba, whom he accompanied on a mission to the Picts. Canice may be the founder of monasteries at Aghaboe and Kilkenny in Ireland, and he also left a number of traces in place-names in Scotland.

Oct. 11 Loman of Trim (d.c.450)

Loman, a Briton like St. Patrick, and according to some accounts, his uncle, is said to have accompanied Patrick on his return to Ireland. The party arrived at the mouth of the Boyne River, where Patrick left Loman to watch the boat. Having waited many days in vain, Loman rowed up the river to the ford at Trim, where a chieftain named Fedelmid had a castle. In quick succession, Loman converted Fedelmid's son, Fortchern, Fedelmid's wife, then Fedelmid himself with his household. Fedelmid granted land for a church nearby, and Loman became the first bishop established by Patrick in Ireland.

Oct. 16 Gall (d. c. 635)

Gall distinguished himself as a scholar of grammar, poetry, and Holy Scripture under Saints Comgall and Columban at Bangor and was ordained a priest. He was one of twelve disciples who accompanied Columban to the Continent, first evangelizing in France and later in what is now Switzerland. Gall did not accompany Columban when the latter departed for Italy. Some legends have it that this resulted in a falling out between the two that was only healed at the death of Columban, but this may simply be a story to explain their separation. Gall became a hermit, and eventually the famous monastery of St. Gall came to occupy the site of his hermitage. Several stories would seem to indicate that the saint was an avid fisherman. He turned down offers of bishoprics and abbacies to remain a hermit. St. Gall is considered the apostle of Switzerland and is often depicted in the company of a bear.

Oct. 21 Fintan, Abbot (d.c.635)

Also known as Munnu, Fintan was a monk of Cluain Inis, spent some time at Iona, and upon returning to Ireland founded a monastery at Taghmon, Wexford, serving as its abbot. He was a firm supporter of the Celtic liturgical practices. He reportedly contracted leprosy late in life.

Oct. 27 Otteran, Abbot (d. 563)

Also known as Odhran, this saint may have been a Briton. He was an abbot in Meath before he left Ireland among the twelve companions who accompanied Columba to Iona. There are some very odd stories about Otteran, perhaps incorporating elements of pagan mythology. Interestingly, the Viking settlers of Waterford chose him as their patron.

Oct. 29 Colman of Kilmacduagh, Bishop (d.c. 632)

Son of a chieftain, reportedly consecrated a bishop unwillingly, he lived as a hermit in the Burren. He built a monastery at Kilmacduagh and is considered the first bishop of that see. Like many Irish saints, there are many fanciful stories about him. Colman is said to have been aided in his devotions by a rooster, a mouse, and a fly: the first woke him up for the night office, the second kept him from falling asleep again, while the third served as a bookmark.

Oct. 31 Foillan, Abbot (d.c. 655)

With his two sainted brothers, Fursey and Ultan, he left Ireland for England c. 630, built a monastery at Burgh Castle, near Yarmouth, and evangelized the East Anglians. When his monastery was destroyed by the pagan Mercians under Penda, Foillan and his brother Ultan decided to follow their brother Fursey to Gaul, where they were welcomed by the Neustrian king, Clovis II. Foillan was founder and first abbot of a monastery at Fosses and converted many of the locals. He was murdered by outlaws.

OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY

This memorial of Our Lady was originally established by Pope Pius V to commemorate the naval victory of a European Catholic coalition over the Turks, in 1571. The Islamic Turks at the time posed a real threat to Christian Europe. The Pope had appealed to all of Catholic Europe to pray the rosary for the enterprise.

OHIO NEWS AND NOTES

The State of Ohio's biennial budget includes provisions requiring pornographic websites to verify that users are at least 18, establishes a tax credit for donations to pregnancy help centers and increases grant support to the same, and recognizes that in Ohio policy there are only two sexes—male and female.


The State March for Life is October 3rd in Columbus. Hibernians will be there. Will you join us?

Many of us head to the polls November 4. As Catholics, we are called upon to participate with a well-informed conscience.



The Political Parties of the North: Who They are And What They Stand For

When we read about the political and legal matters facing the north we regularly see the political parties mentioned as well. The representatives speaking on behalf of their parties will state their party's perspective on the issue, usually with an unequivocal voice. Beyond the immediate statements they make on the issues concerning the day, where do these political parties stand on issues that extend beyond the day? Where do they stand on Irish unification, the economy and Brexit, and the Legacy Act? To find out we need to review the party manifestos and positions.

The Parties and Their political Positions

In 2025, thirty political parties in the north had registered with the UK government. Not all of these parties are major participants in the electoral process, nor do they hold offices in the north. Nonetheless, they are a registered political party. Seven of the registered political parties have members elected to the Northern Ireland Assembly. They will be the focus of this article. For additional information on the other twenty-three registered parties you may go to The Electoral Commission UK at www.electorialcommission.org.uk . It is advisable to tailor your search to northern Ireland. The seven parties elected to the Northern Ireland Assembly are:

The Alliance Party. The Alliance Party was established in 1970 by former members of the New Ulster Movement. It currently holds seventeen seats in the Northern Ireland Assembly. The party is divided on Irish unification. Party members are beginning to show signs of support for unification. Overall, Alliance is not currently taking a position on the question. Alliance's position is to seek elimination of the cultural divides in the north and obtain a lasting peace. Alliance views the economy and Brexit in a collective fashion. It opposed leaving

the European Community and advocates returning to it at the earliest opportunity. It argues that by 2035, incomes will have been reduced, and a 5-6% GDP decline will occur. Alliance opposes the Legacy Act on the grounds it deprives families and victims' access to justice and supports its repeal For more information on the Alliance party go to their website at www.allianceparty.org

The Democratic Unionist Party. The Democratic Unionist Party, also referred to as the "DUP", was started in 1971 by the Reverend Ian Paisley, MP. It currently holds twenty-five seats in the Northern Ireland Assembly. Its vision is to "maintain and enhance Northern Ireland's constitutional position within the United Kingdom", meaning it advocates remaining in union with the UK. It firmly opposes any efforts towards unification with the Republic. Its economic objective is to grow the northern economy through Agri-tech, health sciences, and manufacturing. It supports the removal of the "Northern Ireland Protocol" that was established following Brexit to allow goods to flow between the north and the Republic. It promotes restoring the north to a UK internal market. The DUP, however, opposes the Legacy Act and calls for its repeal. As with the nationalist parties, the DUP denounces the lack of accountability for those committing unlawful murders during the troubles. People Before Profit. Initially established in 2005, People Before Profit was called the Socialist Environmental Alliance People Before Profit. It currently has one member serving in the Northern Ireland Assembly. It also has two members (Teachta Dála or "TD's") elected to the Dáil Éireann making it a cross border party. People Before Profit calls for a united Ireland. They envision a united Ireland as a united socialist Ireland established in the vision of James Connolly, a socialist himself and a leader of the 1916 Easter Rising. It also calls for a boarder poll on the unification question. The party sees a

united Ireland as not simply a removal of unionism and joining the Republic. People Before Profit want to establish "an entirely different Ireland." Its economic policy essentially stands for the working class and against corporate subsidy. It supports living wages, public health care, and a tax on those with high wealth. As to the Legacy Act, People Before Profit MLA, Gerry Carroll, has said that the current government cannot replace the current act with one that will continue to "whitewash the state's dirty war in Ireland". Sinn Féin. Sinn Féin has gone through several party iterations since it was founded in 1905 by Arthur Griffith. The Sinn Féin of today was established during the Troubles in 1970, after a split from Official Sinn Féin. It currently has twenty-seven members elected to the Northern Ireland Assembly with Michelle O'Neill, vice-President of the party, serving as the First Minister of the Assembly. Sinn Féin also has thirty-nine TDs elected to the Dáil and is the opposition party in the body. It is also a cross border party with a strong constituency in both parts of the island. The party is steadfastly in support of a united Ireland and for calling a border poll. It strongly advocates planning and preparation in anticipation of a border poll. It contends that cross boarder polls show support for a unification vote. It has held People's Assembly's across Ireland and in the United States to obtain input on planning and preparation for unification. It also staunchly opposes the Legacy Act and calls for its repeal. Sinn Féin views Brexit as the catalyst for continued instability. Although the Northern Ireland Protocol was implemented, it does not in their view address the economic differential between the north and the south. The only opportunity for a strong economy in the north is unification with the south. Sinn Féin unequivocally calls for the repeal of the Legacy Act. It views the Act as a violation of the rights of the victims and their families to obtain justice for the unlawful murders committed during the Troubles. The Social Democratic and Labour Party. The Social Democratic and Labour Party, also referred to as the "SDLP", was founded in 1970 with the objective of reconciling the people on the island of Ireland as an anti-sectarian political movement. Its most notable leader was John Hume, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize for his work on the Good Friday Agreement. The SDLP currently has eight members elected to the Northern Ireland Assembly. It strongly supports the unification of Ireland. The SDLP has established the New Ireland Commission that engages with every community, sector, and age demographic on this island to develop new proposals that can generate a consensus on future unification. It seeks to build a "new Ireland" that is founded on consensus and recognition of all people's viewpoints. The SDLP contends that Brexit has left the north in a difficult situation. It promotes policies that create jobs while reducing inequality, increase support for public services, and grow the private sector economy. Overall, it proposes policies that provide economic justice. The SDLP opposes the Legacy Act and calls for its repeal. It calls out the injustice to the families and victims under the Act which denies them the accountability and justice for the illegal acts committed. The Traditional Unionist Voice. The Traditional Unionist Voice (TUV) was established in 2007 by former DUP members who opposed the party's backing of the St. Andrews Agreement, which reinstated the Northern Ireland Assembly. The TUV currently has one member in the Northern Ireland Assembly. The TUV is thin on policies addressing the economy. It can be safely assumed that it strongly supports Brexit and opposes the Northern Ireland Protocol. The thrust of its policy position is in opposition to the Good Friday Agreement and

serving in government with Sinn Féin. Their website states, "we robustly oppose IRA/Sinn Fein and the advancement of their all-Ireland agenda through the implementation of the pernicious [Good Friday] Agreement...We want an end to the obscenity of unreconstructed terrorists in government and an end to the system which ever let them in." The Ulster Unionist Party. The Ulster Unionist Party, also referred to as the "UUP", has gone through its own iterations since its establishment in 1905 by Edward Carson. In 1921, it formally began referring to itself as the UUP. The UUP currently has nine members elected to the Northern Ireland Assembly. Economically, the UUP wants to establish a self-sufficient economy attracting investment to the north. The strength of this position rests on

remaining in union with the UK. Maintaining unionism, it contends, provides the best opportunity to be part of one of the world's large economies. Thus, it opposes unification of the island. The UUP has criticized the Legacy Act and called for the UK government to refocus its efforts to correct it. It also calls on the UK government to demand that the Republic establish its own legacy investigations, especially Troubles related activities initiated in the south. BLOODY SUNDAY TRIAL-KEY STATEMENTS RULED ADMISSABLE

A chairde

The judge has ruled that key statements by other British Troopers <u>are admissable</u> against Soldier F-the only British Trooper charged for any of the 14 murders and 14 woundings of Civil Rights Marchers on Bloody Sunday.

Two British troopers had made statements to British Military Police and Widgery Tribunal (set up to whitewash the killings in 1972) describing Soldier F firing multiple shots at the civil rights marchers. One has refused to testify at a trial on grounds of self-incrimination and a second is deceased. Defendant challenged the admissability on grounds that these statements were hearsay.

The prosecution called these statements decisive evidence." One of the major arguments by the British for imposing the Legacy Act was that British troopers were being subjected to malicious prosecutions. In fact only a handful of British Troopers have been prosecuted. Eg One trooper for Bloody Sunday,none for Ballymurphy Massacre where a priest, grandmother and 8 others were killed etc.

No one was charged with perjury in giving sworn accounts that they had been fired upon or shot people with bombs-which were subsequently shown to be patently false.
