Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor,

It's been over a week now since the shootings and bombings in Litleton, CO. Everywhere you turn on TV and in the newspapers there are reports and questions. The one question that keeps coming up over and over again is WHY? I agree wholeheartedly with the letter to the editor from Mrs. Smith in Wednesday's Daily Progress. This verse seems to sum up what I believe she was saying. Proverbs 29-18 -Where there is ignorance of God, the people run wild; but what a wonderful thing it is for a nation to know and keep His laws.

Everyone has their opinion. Here's mine. First, let me say, I in no shape, form or fashion excuse or condone what happened. I believe the boys who did the shooting were fed up with being teased, taunted and picked on by the "Cool Kids" or the "In Group". You may be thinking kids have been teased since the beginning of time without killing others. That's true, but this is a different world now. The teasing is much more severe, parents aren't home to lend support, and the kids see thousands of examples of violent ways to deal with their emotions and problems in a more appropriate way.

I have been teaching for 11 years and I've been a mother for 21 years. In those years, I've witnessed just how mean children can be. (Some adults can be just as cruel.) Any child who is a little different, not particularly, pretty, smart or athletic, or maybe just a bit shy, is kidded, teased and taunted unmercifully from Pre-K on through all levels of school. It's like a "Snowball" situation. One child begins to make fun of this child and others join in. Soon the unfortunate one is branded as the misfit and chosen as the "whipping boy" (or girl) for the whole school. I've heard so many say, "Children can be so cruel." Since we know this, why don't we make a bigger effort to teach them to be kind and compassionate? Why don't we teach the "Golden Rule" and teach it by example? People seem to think that manners are old fashioned. Well, manners are nothing more than showing consideration for others. The logo, W.W.J.D. should be a reminder to us to love and protect each other because that is what Jesus would do. In every school shooting, the shooter was labeled, an outcast or misfit. I believe they were picked on and teased so much until they had had enough, and because they see frustration and anger dealt with violence on TV, movies, and video games, that's how they chose to handle theirs. If all of us would treat other people the way we would like to be treated and teach our children that everyone has value and feelings, I believe there would be fewer killings. The child or adult who seems the least lovable is the person who needs our love, compassion, and understanding the most.

We must stop teaching hatred and start teaching forgiveness and caring. "The acid of hatred does more harm to the container in which it is stored than to the object on which it is poured" and "Our own souls are nourished when we are kind to others.


Informer: I talk to a lot of people who are in careers they don't necessarily want to be in for one reason or another. They have dreams of starting their own business or just making a change, yet they doubt themselves and their abilities. You made the career change. You have been successful at it. What gave you the self confidence that you needed to take on the challenge?

The following interview was conducted with Sandra: My mom and the kind of upbringing that I had. My father died when I was two years old. There was ten of us kids. I have often wondered how she did it, but mother raised us all. We didn't have a lot of material things but we were happy. She made our clothes and she sewed for other people, too. No matter what activity we were in at school she was always there. When I was in high school I was the first black majorette. All the other girls had years of training, but that was a difficult challenge for me. I had to learn everything in one summer.

> The first night of my performance on the field, I remember well. Mother and Mrs. Otha Johnson had their own special spot to sit at every football game. As we marched onto the field, above all the people in that big crowd, I could hear her yelling, "That's my baby! Yea!, Sandra! That's my baby!"

She lay ill in the hospital in a coma for a long time about a year before she died. When she woke up she kept trying to ask us something. When we finally figured it out, she was asking Sandra: Lana Cook, who was employed here at who won the world Series. She was strong like a rock. She made everybody in her life feel good just being around her.

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



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WHAT'S COOKING

Mable's Old Fashioned Cake

1 lb butter
10 eggs, separated
1 tsp vanilla
1 lb sifted cake flour
1 lb sugar
1/2 tsp salt

Cream butter and blend in flour until mixture is mealy. Beat eggs yolks, sugar and vanilla until fluffy. Add to first mixture gradually, beating 15 minutes. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Beat until well blended. Pour into two greased loaf pans and bake in slow oven at 325 degrees for 1 hour.

It takes a lot of love and patience when baking this cake.

What Texans need to know:

Cable, Phone Investment:

Good News For Texas!



If you want a choice for local phone service, if you want greater speed in connecting to the Internet, and if you want to see hundreds of millions of dollars of investment ... well, there's good news and bad news.

The good news is that AT&T wants to offer all of that. The bad news is that a bill introduced in the Texas Legislature would limit, if not eliminate, local phone choice, greater Internet speeds and huge investments.

This legislation would impose new, burdensome regulations on cable networks, discouraging investment in infrastructure and leading to fewer choices for consumers across a wide range of telecommunications services.

The last thing we need is anything slowing down the remarkable, innovative growth we've seen on the Internet. That growth has provided benefits for our homes, schools, hospitals and libraries in the African-American community.

Even more troubling is the effect this new law would have on investment across Texas and particularly in the African-American community. Passage of this legislation would prevent companies like AT&T from spending money to upgrade their systems, add service options and create jobs.

That investment would be used to upgrade cable systems belonging to TCI, with whom AT&T recently merged. The cable lines currently used to send television signals into your home would be upgraded to carry two-way voice transmissions. Dallas would be among the first cities in the nation to test this new technology sometime in the fourth quarter of this year. Houston would be next, followed by Austin and San Antonio.

For the first time, you'd be able to choose your local phone company over a separate and competing network from that of local telephone monopolies like Southwestern Bell and GTE. And that means lower prices, better service and advanced technology.

If this bill passes, it also would hurt development of the Internet. With the combined service of AT&T and TCI, customers will be able to get faster dial-up connections to the Internet. They'll also be able to choose high-speed, unrestricted access using cable modems at speeds several times faster than what is currently available.

But, all that could change with passage of this bill at the Legislature. We want to make sure you get a choice of local phone service, give you greater speed in connecting to the Internet, and invest in Texas and the African-American community.

Let's Give Texas Electric Customers the Power to Choose

The freedom to choose is one of the most sacred privileges of our political and economic system. As Americans, we have a choice in almost everything we do, from choosing our leaders to the type of bread we purchase at the market.

However, there is one service we presently have no choice about, and that's electricity. The Texas Legislature can give Texans power to choose their electric provider this year. The Legislature, which is meeting in Austin until the end of May, is considering bills to restructure the electric utility industry. They want to replace the current monopoly system with competition.

If legislation passes, many Texans will be able to choose which electric company they buy from. We will be able to compare services and options, as we do when we shop around for the best deal in a car or groceries. Actual delivery of the electricity will continue to be handled by the local utility company, and that part of the process will continue to be regulated.

Texans should encourage their representatives in Austin to vote in favor of retail competition in the electric industry because of the potential economic and social benefit for communities. Such a retail bill must ensure that all customers—both large and small—have the opportunity to benefit.

Competition will give many Texas communities the opportunity to save money on electric bills. Competition will give Texans the power to choose. That means we

would be able to choose our electric company based on price. or even the company's contributions to charitable and civic activities.

Lawmakers can pass a law that gives us the power to choose our electricity provider, but also protects us. Electric providers cannot be allowed to "redline" which neighborhoods they will not serve. Special programs for low-income and elderly customers should continue or even expanded. Customers should not have to worry about having their electric service changed without their permission (slamming) or having

unauthorized services added to their bill (cramming).

Several other states already have given people the right to choose electricity providers. We should have that choice, too. Since these states are already moving to competition, Texas can see any mistakes made and try to learn from those lessons.

Giving Texas electric consumers the right to choose their electric provider is the right thing to do for Texas. As legislators hammer out the details, they have the benefit of watching at least 18 other states move toward competition and choice in electric service, too. Texas has a unique opportunity to develop a restructuring plan that introduces competition while avoiding the pitfalls experienced in other states.

As a representative of the electric companies that served Texas consumers well for decades, CSW and its Central Power and Light Company, Southwestern Electric Power Company and West Texas Utilities Company subsidiaries look forward to helping design a new marketplace that provides Texas consumers the type of electric service they demand and deserve—that which is high quality, low cost, fair and competitive.

Black Newspaper Publishers to Oppose House Bill

Setting Higher Financial Accountability for Minority Businesses

The trade association representing more than thirty (30) African American newspapers in Texas is making public its intent to oppose legislation filed by a Harris County legislator. House Bill 413, filed by State Representative Robert E. Talton (R-Pasadena), would require public disclosure of personal and business information in stat's applications to secure certification as an Historically Underutilized Business or

At present, Texas' HUB applications require an array of detailed financial records. The confidential status of such information would be lost if Talton's bill becomes law. Most often, HUB certification is the entree to information on public contracts and procurement. While Texas laws do no impose minority quotas, virtually every state contract has goals for minority participation.

Thurman R. Jones, chair of TPA's Governmental Affairs Committee and publisher of the Dallas-based Minority Opportunity News, commented on the trade group's concerns: "It's time to move forward, not backward" said Jones. "We are encouraged that at least one African American member of the legislature is willing to stand up for the minority businesses of

April 18th Love, Mother the state. We intend to give him as much support as necessary to ensure that this bill dies."

Jones' reference was to another Harris County Legislator, Rep. Sylvester Turner (D-Houston). Turner serves as vice-chair of the House State Affairs Committee, the same committee to which Talbot's legislation was referred. During committee deliberations, Turner made his opposition clear. Rather than hold minority businesses to a higher level of accountability, Rep. Turner has suggested that all businesses be held to the same financial scrutiny. In other words, if personal and income records are public information, all businesses, including prime contractors and non-minority firms should be subject to the same financial accountabily.

Reportedly, other opponents of House Bill 413 include the Texas Association of Mexican American Chambers of commerce and Small Business United of Texas. Proponents named in other news reports include the Texas Press Association and the Texas Daily Newspaper Association.

"Rep. Turner is right," observed Jones. "Seperate is never equal. If financial accountability is really the issue, then let everyone be accountable in the same way and at the same time."

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

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


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
