Rusk Chamber to sponsor local job fair Sept. 19th

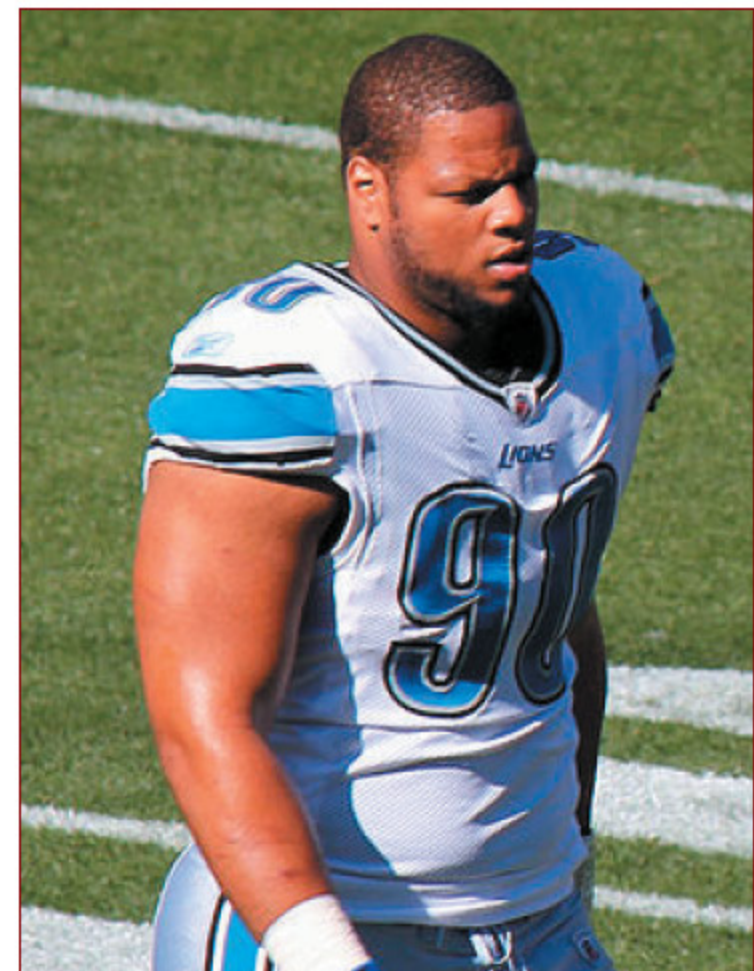
Detroit Lions Ndamukong SUH comes to Rusk for Cody Glenn Football Camp

Dear Editor:

Monday afternoon, I attended a Town Hall Meeting on Health Care with Congressman Jeb Hensarling. After introductory remarks, he asked for questions. I spoke up; saying that my family has had to deal with a lot of health issues over the years. We've paid a lot for medical insurance and medical care. We've paid for more than our fair share by also having to pay for care for the uninsured. We all are paying higher insurance premiums and higher hospital bills because of "free riders". For that reason, I am a strong supporter of the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The Congressman also claimed that the Congressional Budget Office had predicted that the act would cut Medicare by \$500 billion and increase taxes by a like amount. The CBO in its most recent complete estimate, in March 2011, said the new health care law would actually reduce the federal budget deficit by \$210 billion over the next 10 years. The tax increases fall heavily on upper-income people, health insurance companies, drug makers and medical device manufactures. As a community where the Health Care industry is a significant part of our economy, we should be optimistic about the growth of new jobs in the

health care field due to the ACA. It has been projected that there will be a twenty five percent growth in health care jobs over the next two decades. Mr. Hensarling carried a new complex chart of colorful circles showing what he said would be the new ACA bureaucracy and referred to this summer's version of "death panels", the IPAD, which in reality is designed to monitor for Medicare waste and abuse. From where I sat in the room, the map looked like a garden plot. All I could think was that I'd suggest they put the corn along the east and the pole beans down the middle. The mind wanders – what can I say. The ACA is the law of the land and the Supreme Court has upheld it. To attempt repeal is nothing more than a sound and fury signifying nothing. After all, whoever is elected President in November; both candidates have passed health care reform. I'm clear on my support. I'm with President Obama because of his support for all of our families with the passage of the Affordable Health Care Act.

Cody Glenn and Ndamukong Suh Team up to bring the 1st Annual Cody Glenn Football Camp to Rusk

As a college senior, Suh became one of the most decorated players in college football history. He won numerous awards including the Associated Press College Football Player of the Year Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Chuck Bednarik Award, Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy, and was recognized as a unanimous All-American.[1] Suh was born in Portland, Oregon. He attended Grant High School in Portland, where he earned Parade magazine high school All-America honors and was voted the 2004 Portland Interscholastic League Defensive Player of the Year and was a Class 4A first-team all-state selection.

Considered a four-star recruit by Rivals.com, Suh was ranked sixth among defensive tackle prospects in the nation. Suh attended the University of Nebraska, where he played for the Nebraska Cornhuskers football team from 2005 to 2009. As a true freshman in 2005, Suh played in the first two games and had an assisted tackle against Wake Forest before missing the remainder of the season after undergoing knee surgery. He received a medical redshirt.

Suh was selected second overall in the 2010 NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions. On August 3, Suh agreed to a five-year, \$68 million contract with \$40 million guaranteed.[30] On September 12, Suh had his first sack against Chicago Bears quarterback Jay Cutler.[31] On October 10,

during a game against the St. Louis Rams, he recorded his first career interception off of Sam Bradford, the No. 1 overall pick of the 2010 NFL Draft.[32] Suh scored his first touchdown of his NFL career against the Washington Redskins on October 31, 2010, on a recovery of a Rex Grossman fumble. After an injury to Lions kicker Jason Hanson, the Lions had Suh.

Cody Glenn is a hometown Rusk boy whose football career has been followed by local citizens since Junior high days. He played four years with the Nebraska Cornhuskers leaving behind a record any player would be proud to have. Glenn played 19 games with the Colts as a special teamer from 2009-2010 and played in the Superbowl in 2010, which was an experience of a lifetime.

Cody and Suh have been close friends since the Nebraska Cornhusker College football days. They often work as a team when it comes to travel and doing community volunteer activities, so it was easy to get him to Rusk to work with the youth in hosting the 1st annual Cody Glenn Football Camp. The camp will be scheduled each year to motivate local athletes and aid them in improving their athletic skills.

Athletes came from Nacogdoches to join local youth in a workout with the dynamic duo.

What is Sacrament?

Some churches connect sacrament to only The Lord's Supper done in remembrance of Jesus. To others there is more. Sacrament is a formal act in which the actions and materials used are the channels by which God's grace is communicated, either actually or symbolically.

The word "sacrament" is not used in most English versions of the Bible. It comes from the Latin "sacramentum" which was the word for a soldier's oath of allegiance.

The word also came to have the idea of mystery associated with it. The Eastern Orthodox churches usually refer to the sacraments as mysteries.

Roman Catholics and the Orthodox have seven sacraments; the Lord's Supper, baptism, confirmation, penance or the forgiveness of sins, matrimony, holy orders and the anointing of those in danger of death. They believe that these sacraments are means of grace, or channels through which God imparts spiritual blessedness.

Protestant Christians consider baptism and the Lord's Supper the only true sacraments instituted by the Lord Jesus. These are the only two actions involving visible symbols, the water and the bread and wine, that were clearly observed by Jesus Christ (Luke 22:12-20) and commanded by Him (Matthew 28:19-20).

Some Christians object to calling baptism and the Lord's Supper sacraments, insisting that these "ordinances" are not means to grace but symbols of grace.

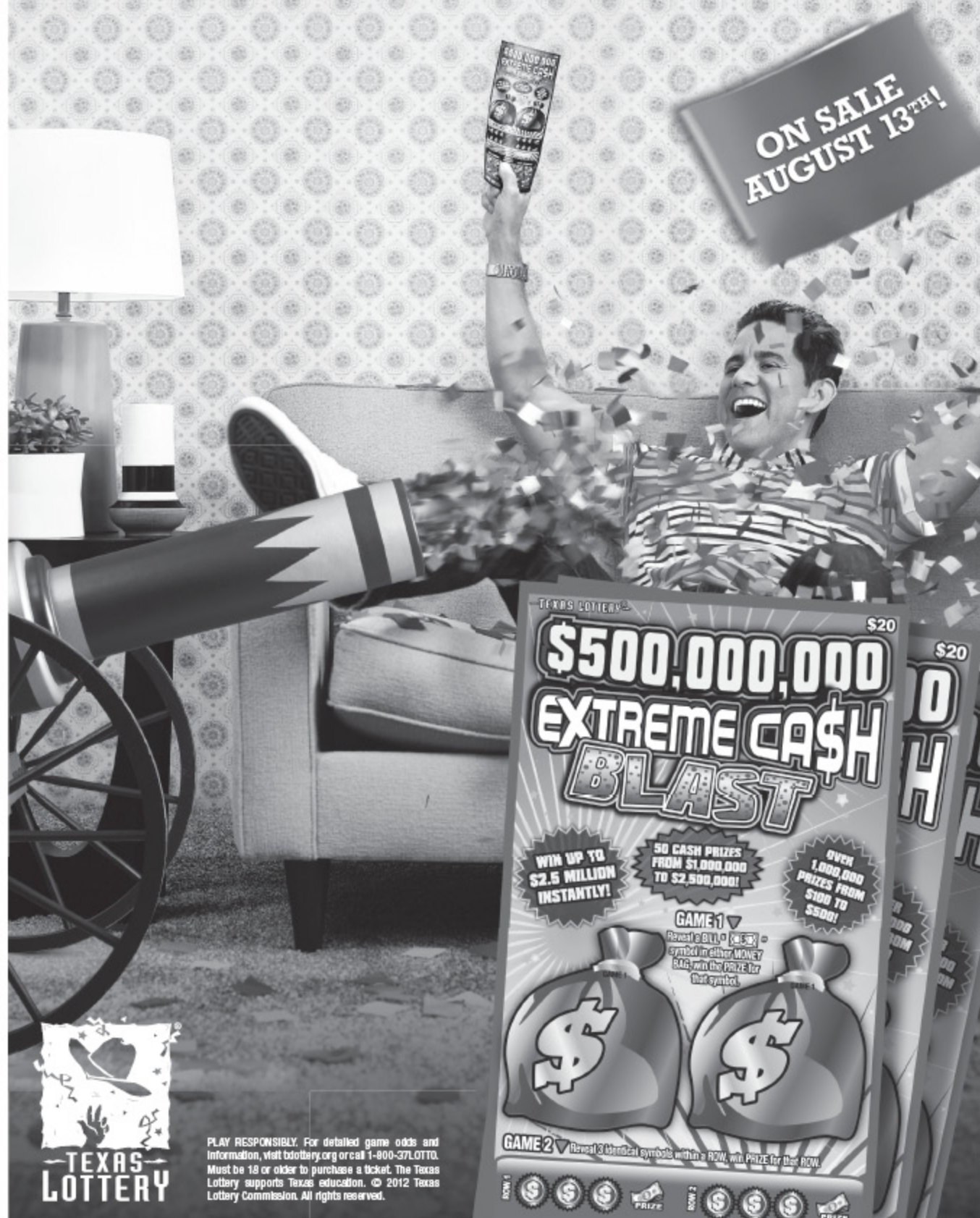

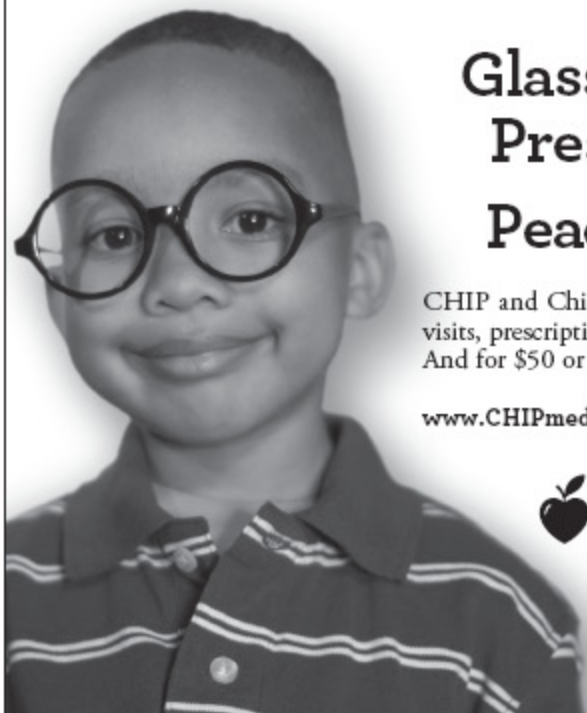

Hollywood's Time

The Supreme Court Has Spoken

The recent Supreme Court decision which made President Obama's Health Care Reform the law of the

land, spoke volumes to where we are as a nation. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Roberts showed great courage, patriotism

and wisdom in his decision to rule in favor of President Obama's Affordable Health Care Act. What would it look like to the rest of the world for America, by far the richest nation on the planet, to continue to have millions of its citizens without Chief Justice John Roberts may have been seen by some as a turncoat to the Republican Party because he was appointed

Chief Justice Roberts made a decision based on the future of America grounded in reality and common sense. The opponents of Affordable Care, in my opinion,

seem to have an obstructionist view of America. They want to go back to the past at the expense of Americans who are building toward the future. NAACP, files Amicus Brief with Supreme Court in Fisher V. The University of Texas At Austin

The NAACP Files Amicus Brief Supporting the University of Texas at Austin's Admission Policy (Washington, DC) – The NAACP, Texas State Conference of NAACP Branches and University of Oregon School of Law Professor Barbara Bader Aldave have filed an amicus brief with the United States Supreme Court in the case of Fisher v. The University of Texas at Austin, et al. The Court's decision could significantly impact admissions policies at public colleges and universities. NAACP Legal Department prepared the brief with the assistance of global law firm DLA Piper LLP (US). The brief supports the University of Texas at Austin's admission policy. A link to the brief can be found here. "Texas has an ugly legacy of de jure and de facto discrimination at all levels of public education," stated NAACP General Counsel Kim M. Keenan. "The University of Texas's admission policy is narrowly tailored to eliminate the continuing effects of that legacy. The policy is individualized and considers race simply as a factor of a factor of a factor." The brief emphasizes several key points. First, it asserts that The University of Texas's (UT's) admission policy has no racial preference and caused no injury in fact to Petitioner Abigail Noel Fisher. The overwhelming majority of applicants are selected without any consideration of race. For fewer than 10 percent of the applicants, race is merely a factor of a factor which can positively impact applicants of all races, including white applicants. Moreover, since the Petitioner's academic index (AI) was not within the required range, she would not have been admitted to the UT regardless of her race. AI includes the applicant's class rank and ACT/SAT scores. Second, the brief argues that Texas's long history of state-sponsored segregation necessitates its actions to remedy the lasting effects. The NAACP's brief outlines Texas's

failure to comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act. The NAACP further asserts that "the mere adoption of racially neutral policies for prospective application is not an adequate remedy to the consequences of past discriminatory conduct." "I am disappointed that the Court granted the petition for certiorari in this case so soon after Grutter v. Bollinger and Bollinger v. Gratz," stated Texas State Conference NAACP President Gary L. Bledsoe. "Hopefully, when making its decision, the Court will consider the University of Texas's long history of segregation and the lingering effects of such discrimination." Additionally, brief explains that "UT's admission policy is constitutional because it is narrowly tailored to eradicate the vestiges of Texas's prior official policy of discrimination." More specifically, the NAACP contends that the "program considers race as only one factor among many, in the context of 'truly individualized' evaluation of each applicant for admission to UT." Finally, the brief explains how ignoring race would force UT to ignore the accomplishments of racial minorities. DLA Piper LLP Partner Anthony Ashton noted, "DLA Piper considers it an honor to have worked with the NAACP on this brief of historical importance. The future of higher education in our nation is at stake, and we hope that our work will help the U.S. Supreme Court reach the correct decision."###
