Texas Redistricting Lawsuit Settlement Talks Have Stalled

SAN ANTONIO, TX. - An attorney for one of nine groups suing to block electoral redistricting maps drawn up by Texas' Republican-led Legislature says negotiations between the two sides have stalled.

Luis Vera, who represents the League of United Latin American Citizens, said Monday he wouldn't bet on a deal getting done in time to keep Texas' April 3 primaries from being delayed again. They were originally scheduled for March.

A federal court in San Antonio last week gave the sides until Feb. 6 to draw up temporary maps that would remain in place through November's election. If they don't, Texas' primaries will be pushed back.

Vera says a major obstacle is that the state isn't involving all parties in the negotiations.

The Texas attorney general's office didn't immediately return an email seeking comment.

Liquor sales possible for Rusk

Rusk City Council met in January to consider the sale of liquor in the town. Voters will have a chance to vote on legalizing the sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption on the May 12, 2011 ballot.

John Hatch with Texas Petition Strategies, an Austin, Texas based

local-option consulting firm circulated a petition during the month of December. A total of 450 signatures were turned in to City Secretary Fran Wendeborn. She was able to verify 347 signatures, which was actually 55 more than what was required to call for the May election.

The sale of beer and wine for off-premise consumption was approved two years ago.

Were the new Photo ID requirements designed by the Republicans to limit participation of potential Democratic Voters?

Were the new Photo ID requirements designed by the Republicans to limit participation of potential Democratic Voters? In my opinion after a careful reading of the legislation, the answer to this question is an unqualified yes!!!

The law was scheduled to become effective January 1, 2012 in Texas but has been blocked by pending litigation.

The new law proposes that citizens be required to show a government issued or approved photo I.D. in order to be issued a ballot for voting.

In addition to showing a photo I.D. at the polling place, the law would also require a person to be a resident of a voting district for at least 28 consecutive days prior to election day, compared to the 10 days required for past elections. The arguments offered by the Republican members of the Texas Legislature and the Governor alleged that these new requirements were necessary to prevent voter fraud. This argument fails miserably when one considers the fact that of documented "voter fraud" in prior Texas elections has been minimal to non-existent

The other factor to consider is that the new law does not really address the issue of voter fraud. These requirements will have no impact on persons really planning to vote in a fraudulent manner.

Some of the proponents even alleged that these measures were needed as element in preserving our national security. Will requiring photo ID's in the voting booths prevent potential terrorists from entering this country? Only the least informed of the electorate will buy this rationale.

There is no doubt in my mind that the real thrust of this statute is simply to have an adverse impact on turn-out of Hispanic, Black and older voters. They are clearly intended to dis-enfranchise many of the voters in these groups. The proponents of this legislation seem to be endowed with the "Poll Tax" mentality.

Many black people are acquainted with the Poll Tax requirement in years past. They will also remember that their parents and grandparents refused to allow this tax to serve as a deterrent to stop them from voting.

The new law, if passed, would require all voters to present one of the following forms of photo identification to be eligible to vote:

1. Driver's license, **election identification certificate, personal identification card, or concealed handgun license issued by the Texas department of public Safety
2. United States Military ID card containing the voters photograph
3. United States Citizenship certificate containing the voters photograph; or United States passport
4. With the exception of the citizen certificate, the identification must be current or have expired no more than 60 days before being presented for voter qualification at

the polling place

Exemptions – voters with a disability may apply to the county voter registrar for an exemption.

Voters who have a consistent religious objection to being photographed
Voters who do not have any photo identification as a result of a Federal or State disaster declaration.

**Individuals who do not have appropriate forms of identification would be required to apply to the Texas Department of Public Safety for a "Texas election identification certificate.

We are aware that a large number of our elderly black citizens do not have driver's licenses; this is also true of a significant number of Hispanic citizens in Cherokee county.

Therefore it is imperative that this new requirement, if passed, go the way of the poll tax. All of us in the affected groups must make an intensive and concerted effort to assure that our members be informed of the requirements and that we take steps to help those who need "election identification certificates" arrange to get them. I urge the leaders of our community: Ministers, Church leaders, Civic leaders, Political Parties, Newspapers, etc to take the lead in this effort. They can and must make a difference!!!



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103 year old Josie Nelson Johnson enjoys life

Ms. Johnson enjoys life at home with family, reading and watching television

People of African decent are some of the oldest in Texas beginning with Estevanico in the 1500's. Black people have played an important role in building the culture of Texas from constructing the state capital in Austin to raising children and caring for families; yet it is a race which has survived slavery, racism and prejudice from every instution in the united states from education to law enforcement, to the justice system to banking, as well as government and private employment.

In 1908 William Howard Taft was elected President of the United States. Thurgood Marshall was born in Baltimore and would later lead the NAACP to get a court ruling against segregated schools in Brown VS the Board of Education in 1954. Eighty-nine blacks were known to have been lynched in 1908. Two years earlier, black soldiers in Brownsville, Texas roited against segregation in Brownsville, Texas. One year earlier, Dallas adopted a Charter that mandated segregation in all aspects of life, churches, schools, housing and amusement.

In the early 1900s , African Americans frequently were ridiculed as ignorant savages. Economic ploys containg schemes to keep black people working for little or nothing were put into place. Black people rented land, borrowed farming equipment and bought food on credit until they harvested and sold their crops. They were charged twice the rate for food, seed and equipment and paid less than half the going rate for crops harvested. When they fell into debt and tried to leave the area, they were often thrown into jail where they were rented out to private businesses with no pay, but a fee that went to the local governments. During harvest time, white farmers contacted sheriffs, who would increase their arrests in order to supply farmers with labor and earn fees for the county.

On May 11, 1908 Josie Nelson Johnson was born in Ponta, Texas . Her parents Dave and Lucella Nelson were sharecroppers. Ms. Josie remembers life in Ponta as what she called normal for the times. There was a cotton gin, a crate factory, the Bailey General Store, Redden's Drug Store, and the Brazier Garage. The town had a doctor by the name of Jones, and a few churches and a school. Josie and her sisters Lula Mae Nelson (Shears) Ocie Nelson Barnett and brothers Leeman, Rosevelt, Dave Jr. and Morris grewup in Ponta but went to school in Rockhill. Segregation laws would not allow them to attend the Ponta School. She remembers going to schoool with classmates Sarah, Wash and Henretta Irving; Cecil Price (Frazier) , Joe, Lula Mae and Baby Cannon.

Ms. Johnson remembers that family life revolved around work, Church on Sunday, school and community baseball. She remembers that the girls played lots of outdoor basketball at school.

Plant farming began in the area about 1925.

In the early 1930's her family moved to the Elm Grove Community. It was well populated. Families used horses and horse and buggy to travel. Many traveled mostly on foot. By the late thirties, Elm Grove located six miles northeast of Rusk on State Highway 110 in Cherokee County, had several stores, three churches, a school, and a number of houses.

Josie met Amsden Johnson in Elm Grove and they were married in 1937. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church, so it became her church home.

At that time, there were four churches in Elm Grove the same as it is today, only they were located in different places. The methodist church was located on Bagley Road. The baptist church is the only church situated then on the same location as it is today.

Aunt Jo, as she is often called, and her husband Amsden were married sixty-eight years before he passed away in 2005. She spent her working years growing plants at one of the local green houses just a few miles from where she lives.

They built their home in the 70s. Visiting with her now is like taking a relaxing step back into the 70s. The house inside is exactly as it was when it was built, right down to the emaculately neat decorations and furnishings of that era.

Annt Jo spends her days reading and watching the news.

If you ask her, I'm sure she can give you an upday on the current news headlines of the day.

She will celebrate her 104th birthday in May. Her niece Regina says the family is planning a big birthday bash for her.

Komen Charity reverses decision on dropping funding

The Susan G. Komen for the Cure breast cancer charity has reversed its decision to halt funding of breast-screening grants to Planned Parenthood, the organization announced Friday.

In a statement, Komen for the Cure Founder and CEO Nancy Brinker apologized for "recent decisions" and said the organization would continue to fund Planned Parenthood.

"We want to apologize to the American public for recent decisions that cast doubt upon our commitment to our mission of saving women's lives," Brinker said. The reversal comes after three days of intense backlash over Komen's announcement that it had adopted new criteria that excluded because it was under government

investigation. Planned Parenthood is currently at the center of a congressional probe into whether taxpayer money was used to fund abortions. Brinker said Friday they would "amend the criteria to make clear that disqualifying investigations must be criminal and conclusive in nature and not political." "We will continue to fund existing grants, including those of Planned Parenthood, and preserve their eligibility to apply for future grants, while maintaining the ability of our affiliates to make funding decisions that meet the needs of their communities," she said. While the statement says Komen will not halt current funding, it does not necessarily guarantee future grants.

CDC investigates multistate Salmonella outbreak

The US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is investigating a multistate outbreak of Salmonella Enteritidis infection, which has been linked to an unnamed Mexican-style fast food restaurant chain. To date, the outbreak has affected at least 68 people in 10 different states. Epidemiological investigation of the outbreak has indicated a link with consumption of food at branches of the restaurant chain, referred to only as 'Restaurant Chain A' in the statement. Since those affected ate at at least 18 different restaurant locations, it is thought likely that the food product responsible must have been contaminated before reaching the restaurants. As yet, no single food item has been identified as the source of the contamination, although many of those made ill reported eating lettuce, ground beef, cheese and tomatoes. Ground beef is thought unlikely

NAACP addresses UN Human Rights Council on US voter ID

The NAACP is sending representatives next week to a session of the United Nations Human Rights Council in Geneva, Switzerland to argue that minority community members are facing clear voter suppression efforts in the United States, NAACP President Ben Jealous said during a press call on Thursday. The NAACP has been campaigning against what it sees as a wave of new Voter ID laws being pushed by states, and it released a report in December reviewing laws that have been passed in recent years. Proponents of such laws say they are necessary to prevent identity fraud at the polls and maintain that Americans should be used to the concept of having to produce identification to perform certain tasks, such as applying for a job or buying a home. Roslyn Brock, NAACP board chairwoman, said, "As of December 2011, 14 U.S. states passed 25 measures designed to restrict or limit ballot access of voters of color, threatening to disenfranchise millions of eligible Americans. Furthermore, since January 2012, additional states have introduced measures that, if enacted, would result in the disenfranchisement of even more racial and ethnic minorities." "We are here today because in the past 12 months, more U.S. states have passed more laws pushing more U.S. citizens out of the ballot box than in any year in the past century," NAACP President Ben Jealous said during the meeting. "Historically, when people have come after our right to vote, they have done so to make it easier to come after so many of our other rights that we hold dear." During a conference call with reporters last week, Jealous said he hoped the NAACP presentations would prod the U.N. body into taking some sort of action.

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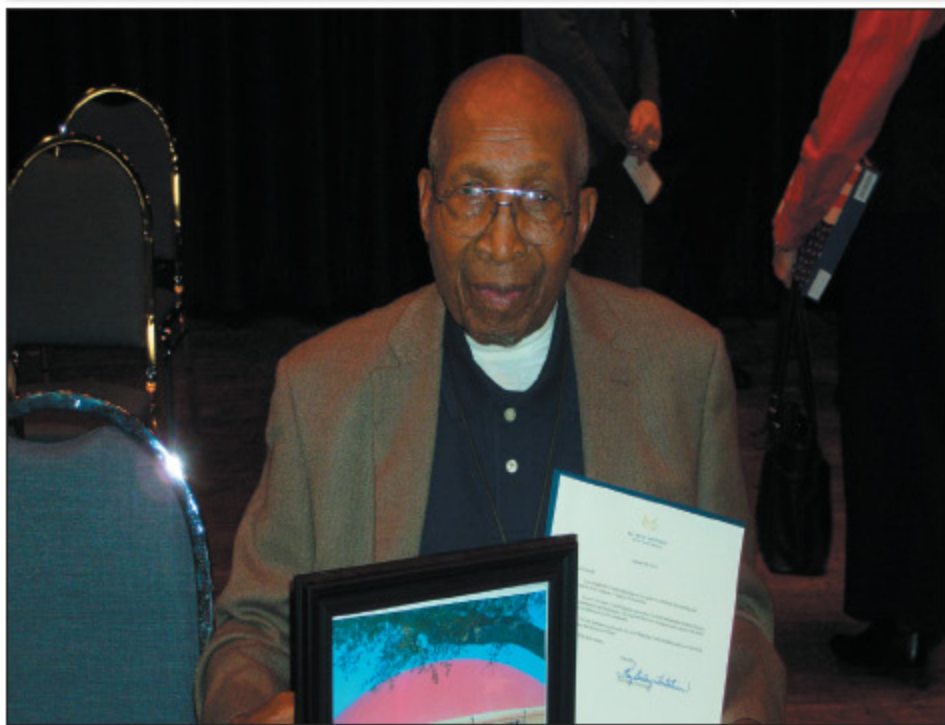

Hopkins Event Center Safe Room/Gymnasium. The facility is named after longtime Crockett ISD educator and coach, Andrew J. Hopkins. Crockett ISD began the project of constructing a safe doom two years ago. In November 2011, Crockett ISD received a grant in the amount of \$3,371,300 from the United States Treasury Department. After college, he was drafted by the Chicago Bears for football and the Pittsburgh Pirates for baseball all in the same year. He was later drafted by the United States Army where he served as a Flight Traffic Clerk. Mr. Hopkins held teaching positions at Mount Pleasant High School, Williams High School, and Crockett Colored School/Ralph Bunche/Crockett High School

where he became Athletic Director.

Mr. Hopkins has taken several teams in all three sports to the state finals and winning. Mr. Hopkins was inducted into the Hall of Fame of Prairie View in 1989 and awarded the Ring of Honor by Crockett ISD in 2010.

City of Crockett Mayor Wayne Mask presented Mr. Hopkins with a key to the City of Crockett and a proclamation proclaiming January 20, 2011 as Andrew J. Hopkins Day. In attendance were family members, friends, community members, and officials of Houston County to witness the official naming of the facility.

Mr. Hopkins received congratulatory letters from Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison and Senator John Cornyn. Both Congressman Joe Barton and Congressman Kevin Brady had staff members to present United States flags to Mr. Hopkins.
