DIRECT REPORT FROM NORWAY— EASTER IN NOR-**WAY: SKIING, CRIME AND LAMB!**

The last ski trip of the season, reading crime novels, and eating lamb on Easter eve are some of the strongest traditions in Nor-

"Everybody" goes to their cabin in the mountains to celebrate Easter. All schools are off the whole Easter week and resume Tuesday after Easter. We have as many as four public holidays: Thursday, Friday (Good Friday) Easter Sunday and second day of Easter (Monday). No stores are open those days, so why not go to the cabin in the mountains instead? This is usually the last chance of the season for skiing. The sun is usually warm, and the light is bright with all the snow. In a "normal" year a lot of Norwegians travel to a southern destination, but with this year's travel restrictions, international travel is out of the guestion. Last year, most peoples' Easter at the cabin was ruined because of the travel ban between communities in Norway.

Another tradition is to read one or more crime novels. Almost every TV channel has some kind of crime series over Easter. "Påskekrim" (Easter crime novel) is a well-known expression in the Norwegian language.

The tradition of eating lamb on Easter eve has to do with the Christian Easter story: The lamb of God that was slaughtered. All stores have sales on a leg of lamb in the weeks before Easter.

A lot fewer people go regularly to church in Norway compared to the US, so also over Easter. But many churches follow the skiers to the mountains and offer outdoor services where the skiers are. That way the churches can reach people that almost never go to




