Select Board Report

The select board once again had another busy year in 2018. Grant work was done on Cross Rd. and Birdseye Road. This work involved ditching. This will help to prevent erosion. Some of the ditches were lined with rip rap. This will help to hold the ditches in place. Several culverts were also replaced. We have applied for another grant to replace another culvert and do more ditching on several other road segments. Manufactured sand is now being mixed with the sand and salt mix that is spread on the winter roads. This should help with winter road driving conditions and is easier on the spreader on the town truck.

A committee is in the progress of studying the benefits of building a municipal building to serve as the Town Garage, Salt Shed, and Fire Department.

Much work was done on the Town Hall. Conner restorations repointed the brick work. The Friends of the Town Hall are raising money to help cover more work that needs to be done. A lot of effort has been put in by these volunteers. Thank you! And thank you to the people who have donated to this cause. The gardens look fantastic thanks to the many volunteers who work to keep them up. For many the Town Hall brings back memories of past days chicken dinners, school plays, grange meetings, and many other events which brought the community together.

The Fire Department is also in the process of having a group of first responders. They will not replace regional ambulance, but there is a peace of mind knowing that immediate help may be closer. Thank You to the ones committing their time to taking the first responder course and to the members of the Fire Dept. They voluntarily commit a lot of their own time.

Ira still has school choice! Thank you to the efforts of the school board.

Appreciation is extended to the many volunteers who serve in various town positions, on boards, commissions, committees, and the fire department. They all provide a tremendous value to the town and need to be thanked for their time and talent.

Town Clerk Report

The Town Office continues to serve the community by offering motor vehicle registration renewals, Fish and Wildlife licenses, copies of vital records, marriage licenses, Green Mountain Passport, and free notary services.

All dogs 6 months and older are required by State law to be licensed on or before April 1st of each year. A license for a spayed/neutered dog is \$9.00 and for an unsprayed/un-neutered dog it is \$13.00. A current rabies certificate must be on file or provided at the time the license is purchased. There were 86 dogs licensed in fiscal year 18 for revenue of \$176.00 for the town. Licenses will be available on Town Voting Day, March 5, 2019 during voting hours.

If you are new to town or just turned 18, please remember to register to vote. You can vote in person at the Town Office during normal business hours on the days preceding the election and during polling hours on Election Day. Voting is held at the Town Office for all elections. Polls open at 10:00 am and close at 7:00 pm.

TOWN HALL RENTAL PROCEDURES

- 1. Rental fees for the Ira Town Hall are as follows:
 - Ira Residents \$150.00 with a \$75.00 security deposit.
 - Non-Residents \$275.00 with a \$75.00 security deposit
- 2. Contact the Town Clerk @ 235-2745 or Alta Johnston @ 235-2247 for an Application and Rental Agreement Form or from the website: townofira.com
- Return completed and signed Application and Rental Agreement Form and Certificate of Insurance to the Town Clerk for review and approval from the Select Board. ** The Select Board meets on the 4th Monday of each month, so applications should be received well in advance of the planned event.
- 4. Arrangements need to be made with the Town Clerk or Alta Johnston to make payment and pick up the key prior to the event.
- 5. PAYMENT must be made in 2 separate checks, one for the rental fee and the second check for the security deposit. Make checks payable to Town of Ira.
- 6. After the event, return the key to the Town Clerk or Alta Johnston, who will inspect the Town Hall prior to refunding the security deposit.
- 7. In case of emergency (i.e. death/funeral) for Ira residents only, the Town Hall may be obtained without prior notice, with no charge. Call the Town Clerk or Alta Johnson to make arrangements.
- 8. Refer to the terms and conditions of the Rental Agreement for additional requirements and responsibilities.

Cemetery Committee Report

In 2018 four lots were sold. These funds will help with the up keep of the cemetery. Two burials also took place.

There is still much work to be done. More head stones need to be straightened and repaired and the shed needs some repair and staining. There have been many comments about repairing or replacing the fence along Rte 133. Two new gate posts were installed for the North gate at a work day several years ago. Many of the other posts are rotting off and leaning.

Friends of the Ira Town Hall Committee

The Friends of the Ira Town Hall Committee was formed in 2018 to raise funds for the continued restoration of the Ira Town Hall and to find additional ways to use the building for community functions.

2018 Income from Fund Drives

As of December 31, 2018 a total of \$6,245.00 from 45 donors has been collected from our in person and mailed fundraising campaign.

At the fall community pot luck supper a 50/50 raffle netted a total of \$135 (the winner donated her share back to the restoration fund).

2018 Monies Spent

\$5,200.00 was spent on brick and mortar repair work.

2019 Plan

The committee is working on a service auction scheduled for Saturday March 23, 2019 to continue the fund raising efforts.

A quote has been received for repair of the upstairs windows and repair of the flashing over the furnace room roof and the installation of new gutters. We hope to have sufficient funds to complete this work.

The committee will be researching available grants in 2019 and are looking for folks to help us write these.

We will be looking for input from the community on new uses for the hall and welcome any volunteers to join the committee and or to work on specific projects.

The committee will continue to accept donations. Checks should be made to the Town of Ira and write for the "Town Hall Restoration".

Report of the Ira Planning Commission for 2018

The planning commission had a quiet year. We were not successful in our attempt to get a municipal planning grant, however, we will try again this year. The next revision (5 years) of the Ira Town Plan is due in 2020.

As we have done in the past, we will receive assistance from the Rutland Regional Planning Commission and we will hold one or more meetings in town to receive input and comments from Ira residents.

Rutland Free Library Update

This will be remembered at Rutland Free Library as the year the ceiling fell down – literally! A section of the original, 1858, plaster-and-lath ceiling in the Fox Room collapsed, eventually requiring the entire ceiling to be repaired with strapping and new acoustic tiles. While the work was in process, the Board decided to replace worn carpets and old, inefficient lighting in the Fox Room. Eventually, we replaced all the old lights in the building with LEDs. The cost of Fox Room repairs was approximately \$64,000, paid for by the Library with significant contributions from Friends of Rutland Free Library, and grants from Alma Gibbs Donchian Foundation and Vermont Community Foundation, as well as in-kind contributions from many local professionals and organizations. The lighting work was largely offset by rebates from Efficiency Vermont, with an expected annual electric savings of \$7,000. So in three years, the work should have paid for itself.

The Fox Room has been busy ever since its reopening, with ongoing programs and special events, and use by many diverse community groups. An exciting new RFL effort has been outreach to school children from each of the five "member towns", to ensure they/their parents can easily secure their library cards. In Rutland City this was accomplished in direct partnership with the school administrators, while in Ira paper and email applications (for both children and adults) were made available at the Town Office and at the Tree Lighting Ceremony, as well as published in the December newsletter. Applications can be dropped off at the library to immediately receive your card, or mailed in for the card to be mailed to your home. Hopefully this will make using "our" library even more convenient for all Ira residents.

In other news the Library received a donation of snowshoes from the Vermont Department of Health, which can be checked out for free. They have been a popular and highly visible new addition to our collection. RFL also received a private donation of \$10,000 to pay for new staff computers, while an increase in the Rutland City tax funding allowed the Library to return to evening hours - much appreciated by many patrons! The Library is now open year-round, Mondays-Wednesdays until 8:30 PM. Finally, of course, the library continues to update and increase its wonderful collection of books, e-books, CDs, DVDs, magazines, and on-line data bases, and offers computer access and assistance to a steady stream of patrons each day.

Rutland Free Library and members of the Board of Trustees appreciate the ongoing support of Ira residents and hope they feel well-served. They ask that a request for \$2990.80 be placed on the March 2019 ballot, which is a \$65.80 increase (2.25%) from 2018.

IRA NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH NEWS

Deputy Sheriff Cram was newly assigned in our area. There was a recent armed robbery at West Rutland Price Chopper parking lot, an overdose in Ira that Rutland Regional and the Ira Emergency response team responded to, and a fatal overdose in Tinmouth. Home security systems should be updated with new technologies with camera and lighting systems. Many varieties are on the market with great technologies.

Like communities around the world, Vermont cities and towns face the challenge of safe needle disposal. While this is a statewide issue, there are different approaches that communities may choose based on what is locally feasible, sustainable and effective. You may also contact our local sheriff's office at <u>802-775-8002</u> for proper disposal. The sheriff's office may also be used to turn in old medical prescriptions.

What To Do With A Found Needle

With a few simple steps, it's OK to throw it away.

- 1. Put on heavy-duty gloves and use pliers or tongs to place the needle in a thick plastic container like a laundry detergent bottle. (Tip: look for "HDPE 2" imprinted in the plastic.)
- 2. Screw on the lid and seal it well with strong tape, like duct tape.
- 3. Write "Do Not Recycle" on the container and throw it away in the regular trash.

If you are accidentally stuck with someone else's needle:

- 1. Wash the wound well with soap and water.
- 2. Seek medical attention right away.

It gives responsibility for the area to one patrol deputy and allows the deputy to shift from town to town to answer calls and do follow-up investigations. We know that the criminal activity is not dictated by town lines, and the geographic locations of these towns makes is advantageous for all to conduct patrol activities in this manner.

Tinmouth and Middletown are among the towns who have utilized the building for "live burn" training with Ira in practicing fire safety and mutual aid training.

The Greater Rutland County Supervisory Union (GRCSU) was established on July 1, 2018. Member districts include stand alone districts of Ira and Rutland Town. Also included are Quarry Valley Unified Union School District (Poultney, West Rutland, and Proctor) and Wellspring Unified Union School District (Wells and MIddletown Springs). Ira has one voting member on the 10 member GRCSU Board. And Ira maintains K-12 school choice.

The GRCSU Board voted to hire Dr. Debra Taylor as the GRCSU superintendent. Dr. Taylor was the superintendent for the Rutland Central Supervisory Union prior to consolidation. Consolidation involved the merging of two supervisory unions, Rutland Southwest Supervisory Union and Rutland Central Supervisory Union.

Thanks to all who serve and have served on the Ira School Board through this transition.

The Ira School Board also recently approved an annual stipend of \$700.00 for each board member. Stipends are standard for school board members in our area districts. Dear Parents, Guardians and Community Members,

This has been an exciting year! We are proud to introduce our newly unified Greater Rutland County Supervisory Union, which began official operation on July 1, 2018. Transitions have been our focus during the year as we implement the voter-approved governance unification resulting from several years of planning. Our new school system includes Ira, Quarry Valley, Rutland Town and Wells Springs School Districts.

We would be remiss if we did not take this opportunity to recognize the hard work of our school board members, in particular, our retiring school districts. As a result of GRCSU unification, the Rutland Southwest Supervisory Union and Rutland Central Supervisory Union concluded their oversight of their respective school districts on June 30, 2018. As a result of the merger of the Wells Springs and Quarry Valley School Districts, five town school boards concluded their work last June as well: Middletown Springs Town School District, Wells Village School District, Poultney Town School District, Proctor Town School District and West Rutland Town School District. The years of board member stewardship of our town schools represents a long history which we must honor as we transition to our new school system. While all of our schools continue to serve children and families in our communities, our school district board and supervisory union board governance has unified. We remain committed to achieving stronger schools and communities through newly forged partnerships across our communities. Together we are better!

Last year, our excellence in education was recognized by the Agency of Education as we were featured in a video demonstrating best practices in Vermont which is now posted on the state website. In December, we were honored by a visit of the Integrated Field Review Team from the Agency of Education. They are charged with providing us with feedback concerning our implementation of the Education Quality Standards which are required of all school systems in Vermont. We are pleased with their feedback. One area in which we received commendation was that of Safe and Healthy Schools. Here we were pleased to learn that students and parents across our supervisory union speak highly of teachers, support staff and administrators within their buildings and feel they are safe and well-supported. Staff embrace a growth mindset about addressing the changing needs of our students both academically and socially. Students in all our schools are cooperative and well-disciplined. They have performed many acts of kindness to help others in our communities. This overarching spirit of cooperation and generosity is the hallmark of our schools' cultures.

Last year during our transition work with school boards, teachers, support staff and administrators we developed our GRCSU vision and mission. *Our GRCSU Vision is to* L.E.A.D. - Learn, Explore, Aspire, Discover.

Our GRCSU Mission is to create an engaged learning community by empowering students to:

Learn collaboratively and independently.

Explore their own passions and choose their own pathways.

Aspire to achieve success.

Discover their own roles as contributing local and global community members.

Instruction & Learning: Instruction in GRCSU schools is moving toward ceding agency to students by ensuring they have choice around how, where, and when to access and demonstrate evidence of their learning. Teachers are working to

provide opportunities for students to identify where they are and where they're going in their learning, self-reflect on their learning, and learn cooperatively with and from each other.

This year we are fortunate to have assembled a team of grant-funded Innovation Coaches to help teachers identify individual goals and entry points into transforming their instruction. They provide embedded, ongoing support for teachers to meet those goals while building in opportunities for them to reflect on new learning. Coaches are working with teachers to create project-based lessons, performance-based assessments, and self-directed learning opportunities. Unlike typical workshops or conferences, our coaches provide ongoing, personalized support to teachers, a professional learning model that is research-based and proven to help transform practice.

GRCSU teachers also draw on their unique areas of expertise and learn cooperatively with and from each other. Each Tuesday afternoon, they examine student performance data, identify student needs, and share strategies in Professional Learning Communities (PLCs). These meetings are scheduled synchronously across GRCSU districts so that teachers from different schools can collaborate and share their experience.

Future Planning: Our excellent educational opportunities will grow and expand in our newly unified school system. We will continue to implement student-centered learning in proficiency-based, personalized environments where all students learn at high levels. New educational opportunities began as early as July 1, 2018, such as centralized technology and joint educational program offerings, and our future will continue to unfold in a positive and productive manner as our Board and administration engage in a process to build our collective future plan for years to come.

Community Outreach: As we build our new school system, we understand that community outreach and parent partnerships continue to be very important. There are several ways that we look forward to building these robust connections. First, we are updating our GRCSU websites and plan to embed our schools' social media and superintendent blog to allow for real time information sharing and feedback. We will continue to publish and distribute online our school principal monthly reports to keep our community apprised of the great work underway in our schools. Our principals are utilizing Twitter to share essential information concerning school and student success stories - and there are many! When you see an administrator at a school/community event (such as athletic matches, school music performances, parent teacher conferences and school board meetings), please feel free to reach out to any of us with your ideas or to ask a question. Of course, you may call or email any time!

District Annual Reports and Budget Presentations: Each school board will hold public meetings to present the annual education budget for voter approval. Mark your calendars for these important meetings: Quarry Valley Unified Union School District Annual Meeting on Tuesday, February 26; Wells Springs Unified Union School District Annual Meeting on Wednesday, February 27; Ira School District Town Meeting on March 4; and Rutland Town School District Town Meeting on March 4. Through our community outreach and engagement efforts, annual reports, forums and annual meetings, we hope all of you will become familiar with our school budgets and the important educational programs and plans they support. Our schools are an investment in our students and our future.

Thank you for your continuing support of all our students. Remember, we have a remarkable history and a promising future. We look forward to excellence in our schools and students into 2020 and beyond!

⁻ Following current statute, the Tax Commissioner recommended a property yield of \$10,666 for every \$1.00 of homestead tax per \$100 of equalized property value. The Tax Commissioner also recommended an income yield of \$13,104 for a base income percent of 2.0% and a non-residential tax rate of \$1.58. New and updated data will likely change the proposed property and income yields and perhaps the non-residential rate.

Final figures will be set by the Legislature during the legislative session and approved by the Governor.

Director of Student Support Services Annual Town Report

February, 2019

Greater Rutland County Supervisory Union (GRCSU) provides special education programming in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA) and the Vermont Agency of Education Special Education Rules and Regulations, which ensures that all students with disabilities have available to them a free and appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment that emphasizes special education and related services designed to meet their unique needs and prepare them for further education, employment and independent living.

As of December 1, 2018 our GRCSU Child Count for special education recognized 286 (Prek-12) eligible students with disabilities categories including Autism, Developmental Delay, Emotional Disturbance, Hard of Hearing, Learning Impaired, Other Health Impaired (such as chronic health impairments, attention deficit or attention deficit with hyperactivity), Specific Learning Disabled, Speech or Language Impaired and Traumatic Brain Injured.

GRCSU provides special education services for identified 3 & 4 year old students along with their regular education peers typically through grade 12, or in some instances through the time the student turns 22. Beyond direct instruction, many students also need to access related services such as speech and/or language instruction, occupational therapy, physical therapy and counseling.

Any one or a combination of services may be necessary to address the needs of the whole child. However, for a very small percentage of our students, specialized instruction may not be enough, and a special alternative program may be required. To be legally compliant, each eligible child is provided with an Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Depending on the need, a student may require any combination of the services detailed above. We are legally required to provide a free and appropriate public education to each student on an IEP and we must do so in the least restrictive environment possible.

Finally, we would like to recognize the efforts of all our Special Educators, Instructional Assistants and Service Providers. They are professionals dedicated to meeting the students' needs. BEFORE ELECTION DAY:

CHECKLIST POSTED at Clerks Office by February 3, 2019. If your name is not on the checklist, then you must register to vote. **SAMPLE BALLOTS** will be posted by February 13, 2019.

HOW TO REGISTER TO VOTE: There is no deadline to register to vote. You will be able to register to vote on the day of the election. You can register prior by visiting the town clerk's office or going online to **olvr.sec.state.vt.us.**

REQUEST EARLY or ABSENTEE BALLOTS: You or a family member can request early or absentee ballots at any time during the year of the election in person, in writing, by telephone, email, or online at **mvp.sec.state.vt.us**. The latest you can request ballots for the Annual Town Election is the close of the Town Clerk's office on March 1, 2019. (Any other person authorized by you who is not a family member must apply in writing or in person for a ballot for you.)

WAYS TO VOTE YOUR EARLY BALLOT:

- You may vote in the town clerk's office before the deadline.
- Voter may take his or her ballot(s) out of the clerks office and return in same manner as if the ballots were received by mail.
- Have ballot mailed to you, and mail or deliver it back to the clerk's office before Election Day or to the polling place before 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.
- If you are sick or disabled before Election Day, ask the town clerk to have two justices of the peace bring a ballot to you at your home. (Ballots can be delivered on any of the eight days preceding the day of the election or on the day of election.)

ON ELECTION DAY:

If your name was dropped from the checklist in error, or has not been added even though you submitted a timely application for addition to the checklist, you can fill out a new registration form.

! If the clerk or Board of Civil Authority does not add your name, you can appeal the decision to a superior court judge, who will settle the matter on Election Day. Call the Secretary of State's Office at 1-800-439-VOTE (439-8683) for more information.

If you are a first time voter who submitted your application to the checklist individually by mail and did not submit the required document, you must provide a current and valid photo identification, or a bank statement, utility bill, or government document that contains your name/current address.

If you have physical disabilities, are visually impaired or can't read, you may have assistance from any person of your choice. If any voters you know have disabilities let them know they can have assistance from any person of their choice.

If you know voters who cannot get from the car into the polling place let them know that ballot(s) may be brought to their car by two election officials.

If you have any questions or need assistance while voting, ask your town clerk or any election official for help.

NO PERSON SHALL:
