

Philip Shore Elementary played host to this exciting event, held from 4:00 pm to 7:30 pm, on March 28, 2014. This year saw vendors Music Showcase and Sam Ash, as well as coffee provided by Starbucks and doled out by HCEMEC social co-chair Rose Lathers. Sigma Alpha lota provided a make and take activity for children. Any interested child was allowed to create their own shekere from household materials such as paper plates, soda bottles, pasta, pipe cleaners and beads. They were a big hit!

Having most of the equipment available also lent to a speedier set up for each group and less downtime in between performances.

Performances this year represented the school district very well. Entertaining and diverse, we heard steel drums, hand bells, songs in Italian, incredible Orff and drumming ensembles as well as a few modern bands. Thank you to the teachers who prepared their students so well and orchestrated the rehearsals and transportation of their talented children.

The evening concluded with a community drum circle led by Nate Strawbridge of Crestwood Elementary. It's hard to sit still when Nate's in charge! Children of all ages were playing drums, moving, dancing, and having a good 'ol time! It is an incredible thing to witness.
