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
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2015 FMEA PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE AND ALL-STATE CONCERTS

FMEA LEADERSHIP AWARD

MELANIE FAULKNER

The Leadership Award is presented to an individual who demonstrates outstanding and sustained skill in a leadership or an administrative capacity and who carries the mission of FMEA forward throughout the state and/or the nation. The recipient must have demonstrated notable achievements as a leader in the promotion of music education and a continued commitment to the profession.

Congratulations to Melanie Faulkner, elementary music supervisor for Hillsborough County Public Schools, nominated by Ernesta Chicklowski on behalf of the Florida Elementary Music Educators Association.

Melanie Faulkner is the heartbeat of music for Hillsborough County. Melanie serves as the music supervisor for more than 215 elementary music teachers and strings specialist in the district. She has a daily presence in music classrooms, supports new educators, provides quality professional development opportunities and contributes to arts education throughout the state of Florida. She works tirelessly yet joyfully to ensure that each music teacher has the resources and tools to share music with his or her students. The music education program in Hillsborough County has been recognized by the NAMM Foundation and has been named one of the Best Communities for Music Education in America for the past few years under the leadership of Melanie Faulkner. Mrs. Faulkner focuses on making music education relevant in our schools.

Melanie Faulkner graduated with the B.M.E. from Lee University and then the M.A. in music education from the University of South Florida. In 2004, she earned the national board certification in music education.

In addition to overseeing music instruction for 145 elementary schools in Hillsborough County, Melanie is the school district's liaison to the Straz, the Patel Conservatory, the Arts Council and the University of South Florida, to name just a few.

As the elementary music supervisor for Hillsborough County, Melanie helps to implement county-wide professional learning communities, community performances, professional development opportunities, a countywide multicultural festival, a fine arts festival and grants that provide music teachers with opportunities to apply for music equipment or professional development. In addition to the leadership that Melanie personally provides, she seems to have the ability to discover and nurture the leadership qualities in others. Many of the letters of support talk about how Melanie has provided the music teachers in Hillsborough County with the opportunity to grow and take on leadership roles of their own. Jeff Henson, music teacher at Hammond Elementary, puts it best when he says, "Melanie is a leader of leaders who brings out the best in every teacher so that those teachers can then go out and bring out the best in their students."

Barbara Hancock, instructional leadership director for the county, says that Melanie promotes the arts so positively in the community and is always willing to go above and beyond so that each and every task she undertakes is flawless and an excellent reflection of the schools and the Hillsborough district. She states, "I am proud to work with Melanie Faulkner and feel fortunate that she is leading the Hillsborough music program."

Tim Wiegand is very animated and his musical games are engaging! He did a walkthrough using volunteers to show the audience what each game was. Some games included Dr. Frank's Activation Game, Pop Goes the Statue, Crazy Letters, Deputy Dorkface, Boomwhacker conductor, and The Clown Dance. His lessons reinforce getting students to move, playing instruments, and singing solos, etc. I would love to incorporate the Dr. Frank's Activation game in October to get my students moving to the steady beat and plan on trying out the Crazy Letter to review dynamics.

THE POWER OF RHYTHM: TEAM BUILDING TECHNIQUES FOR EVERY ENSEMBLE

Presented by Kelly Cunningham & Jessica Fredricks

Using Orff and drum circle rhythm repetition drills, these ladies emphasize using eye contact to guide students to recover from trouble when the train feels like it is coming off the tracks. They contend that the reason we teach rhythm is to teach the life lessons of flexibility, adaptability and resilience. My favorite tip they used is employing occasional cutoffs resulting in a full measure of silence and later two measures of silence, proving the students have internalized the beat.

Jeff Henson introduces a collection of rhythmic pieces that can be used to teach music concepts such as Ostinato, Form, Syncopation, Beat, Rhythm and Round. The pieces used speech, body percussion and instruments to foster student creativity and facilitate the teaching of the concepts. Speech pieces introduced included "Hot! Hot", "It's So Cold", and "Bubble Gum". This session offered valuable materials and training for techniques that can easily be incorporated into the music classroom on a regular basis.

They hit 5 different NGSSSs with one multi-lesson unit for third grade!

S.O.S. - SMART ORFF STRATEGIES: SUPPORT CRITICAL THINKING IN YOUR GENERAL MUSIC CLASSROOM WITH INTERACTIVE WHITEBOARD TECHNOLOGY

She discusses that the SMARTboard is a "tool" in our music "toolbox", to be used along with our other resources. It appeals to all learners: visual, aural, and kinesthetic, as well as using multiple levels of Blooms' Taxonomy in just one lesson! Helen showed us some of the functions that we could use to create lessons.

My school has just been refreshed, and I will be receiving a tablet for the music classroom. I wanted to take this training, so I can actually use my SMARTboard with functions that I learned in this workshop.

HANDBELLS AND CHIMES IN GENERAL MUSIC

The beginning of the school year started off with a fantastic workshop on utilizing handbells & handchimes which was brought to us by our very own Jennifer LeBlanc. No matter what level of ringer or handbell choir conductor you are, you took away a wealth of knowledge from this training. Jennifer helped outline very simple and effective techniques for preparing sheet music, structuring your choir, conducting rehearsals, auditioning strategies, and so much more!

One of the biggest takeaways for me was “Air Ringing”. “Air Ringing” is how Jennifer introduces a new piece to her choirs. Instead of playing the first time around, her students pretend they are holding their bells and then ring through the piece. This technique takes me back to the days of high school band where we would “finger” through pieces in the sight-reading room at MPA before playing them. This technique helps eliminate the discordant sound of wrong notes and allows them to focus on the rhythm. What a great way to make a new song more comfortable! On a side note, I now use this technique to begin my rehearsals to help focus my students and it has truly made a difference.

I truly got a lot out of good information out of this training. It is not often that we get the chance to come together for a more specialized focus. It was truly worth the time, even on a Saturday, to have this opportunity for growth!
