Pacesetter Club status is given to all clubs that contribute \$10 per active member. Individual Pilot members and clubs who donate \$250 to PIFF's Grants and Scholarships will be recognized as well If all seven of our district's clubs become 250 clubs, then our district will earn 250 District status.

Finally, mark your calendars for our upcoming District Convention in Breinigsville (Lehigh County), Pennsylvania from April 25 – April 27, 2025.

Let's make this new year a tapestry of memorable Pilot moments, new community relationships, and meaningful projects. Here's to 365 days of friendship, service and growth!

Families are provided a sit down, catered meal and their children can participate in many holiday activities: face painting, arts and crafts, ice cream station, candy bar, etc. All are surprised with a visit from Santa who gives a wrapped toy to each child. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES - Assisting the Club

The "QUORUM" is the most important Parliamentary Rule for the Club. A quorum is the number of members that must be present to conduct a business meeting. A count should be conducted before the meeting begins to determine whether a majority of members are present (half the total membership plus one member). When a quorum is present the business meeting can proceed. Members arriving late do not affect the quorum. However, members leaving early definitely present a problem. According to Roberts Rules, when there is no longer a quorum the business cannot be conducted.

But hold on this is what I love about Parliamentary, Procedures' little twist that helps the Club conduct business.

> If the Club believes that action must be taken on a motion without a quorum present, they can do so. It is not the action of the Club until it is approved at the next meeting when a quorum is present. A non-vital motion can be postponed until the following meeting when a quorum is present.

The Club minutes should reflect that a ratification vote is needed to approve the motion. This motion should be the first item of Old Business. Eliminating the procedure dance, the easiest solution of a quorum is for the presiding officer to contact members and encourage their attendance for the meeting. I encourage the Club's Parliamentarians to bring their Rules book to meetings. When a problem comes up - look it up in the book. The current Club Parliamentarian should train another club member in Parliamentary Procedures or have an assistant.

2025-2026 DAC Nominations Due January 28th

One of the most important things that the clubs in the NEPOT district must do every year is decide on the leadership team for the following year. This year, we are responsible for nominating the team that will lead our district with Gina Monteleone, our current governor elect.

Each club has been sent guidelines for the offices of governor-elect, secretary, and treasurer, and the process to nominate their candidates. A club may nominate a member of their own club, or they may choose to nominate someone from another club. The main requirement of the club is to write a letter of recommendation that tells the committee why you think that person is a suitable candidate for the position. It is important that the nominated person can perform the duties of the office and has the time to attend zoom meetings, the workshop, the midyear meeting, and the district convention.

It is time to decide who we think will best lead our district for the next year and get their nominations in so that our DAC is ready to grow and flourish in the future.

Leadership Update

Being a leader has nothing to do with your title or how many people you manage. You are a leader if you positively impact others' capacity to thrive, and if this is something you care deeply about." ~Nataly Kogan

One of the most common replies we hear when a Pilot member is asked to step up into District leadership is that they don't feel qualified. Often Pilots believe that in order to be a District Officer, they need to already possess a certain expected level of "leadership" qualities. But as the quote above reminds us, we are all considered to be leaders if we have a sincere desire to impact others.

Most of us joined Pilot because we were influenced by the projects and fundraisers that allowed the club to serve others in the community. So if Pilot's mission and programs are something you care deeply about, then you already possess an important officer qualification!

Another important qualification is experience in club leadership. Any Pilot interested in serving as Governor-Elect must have been a Club President. Nominees for District Treasurer and Secretary must have served on a club Executive Board for two (2) years (President, President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer or Director).

Another reason that many Pilots turned down the opportunity to take on a District Office is they don't feel they have the time. It is true that serving as a District Officer requires time. But no District Officer is ever left on their own. The best District Officer teams are the ones where the officers are willing to work together. They are made up of Pilots who sincerely support each other and want the district and its members to thrive. Nominees for 2025-2026 District Office are reminded that they will need to attend Pilot International's "Council of Leaders" at the 2025 PI Convention from July 21-23. The Convention will be held in Charlotte, North Carolina which is a real travel advantage for our District! Another perk is that the District pays for the incoming District Officers registration and contributes towards their travel expenses. The Council of Leaders is an excellent opportunity to network with other District Officers from across the country and be encouraged with leadership training.

We need members who care deeply about our Pilot commitment to service and who want to make a positive impact to step up and carry our District forward.

The club delivered 50 care bags to three organizations: Phoenixville Area Community Services, Orion Communities and Good Samaritan Services.

This has been a signature project for the club for many years and the organization and their clients continue to be grateful for the Pilot club's care and generosity.


