NOTES

La Fleur de Cayenne

A virtuoso of both classical and jazz traditions, Cuban-born clarinetist and saxophonist Paquito D'Rivera has long been celebrated for his ability to merge diverse musical worlds. *La Fleur de Cayenne*, a work originally for clarinet and piano (or clarinet and ensemble in other versions), exemplifies his signature style: rhythmically vibrant, melodically expressive, and deeply rooted in Afro-Caribbean traditions.

The title, which translates to *The Cayenne Flower*, alludes to the French Guianese city of Cayenne and reflects the cultural richness of the region—an intersection of Latin American, Caribbean, and European influences. The music bursts with rhythmic vitality, drawing upon syncopated dance forms and jazz idioms, while also incorporating lyrical passages that highlight the clarinet's expressive range.

La Fleur de Cayenne demands both technical prowess and stylistic sensitivity from its performers. The piece traverses a colorful soundscape: sultry melodic lines contrast with driving Latin grooves, and improvisatory gestures mingle with classical precision. It is at once a celebration of cultural hybridity and a testament to D'Rivera's unique voice as a composer who defies categorization.

Fantasia

Brazilian composer Heitor Villa-Lobos was known for blending Western classical forms with the folk rhythms and melodies of his native Brazil. His *Fantasia for Soprano Saxophone* originally written for soprano saxophone and orchestra (often performed with piano reduction)—is a vivid example of this fusion.

Composed in 1948, the *Fantasia* is in three connected movements, exploring a range of moods from lyrical introspection to lively, dance-inspired rhythms. The work showcases the soprano saxophone's versatility, combining virtuosic passages with rich melodic writing that reflects the colors and spirit of Brazilian music.

Though written for the French saxophonist Marcel Mule, the piece was initially scored for tenor sax due to range concerns, but today it is most commonly performed on the soprano saxophone, as originally intended.

Spring Concerto Grosso Op. 9

In Spring Concerto Grosso, Lebanese composer Nicolas J. Chaanine captures the awakening of nature and spirit that comes with spring. Written in the aftermath of conflict, the work embodies a yearning for renewal and hope for Lebanon's future.

The first movement evokes the industrious dance of bees restless, vibrant, and vital to the rebirth of nature. The second turns to the ants, scurrying across the earth with mechanical purpose. Yet, as the solo instruments begin to intertwine, a subtle transformation occurs: the creatures start to contemplate their own existence, as if touched by the quiet poetry of spring.

The final movement is a declaration of hope—a musical blossoming that symbolizes the resilience of life and the possibility of a brighter season ahead.

Premiered in Lebanon by the Beirut Chamber Orchestra under the baton of Jean-Pierre Schmitt, this concerto stands as Chaanine's Opus 9.

Prana

Prana, by French composer Hélène Rasquier, is a meditative and expressive work for two saxophones that draws inspiration from the Sanskrit term meaning "life force" or "vital breath." Through flowing lines, intricate interplay, and subtle shifts in texture, Rasquier creates a sound world where breath and rhythm intertwine. The piece explores the intimate connection between the performers, emphasizing balance, energy, and the shared pulse at the heart of the music.

Prana invites listeners into a contemplative space, where musical gestures seem to breathe and evolve in real time—a poetic reflection on the power of sound and silence.

Duo Concertante

A key figure in the early history of the saxophone, Belgian composer Jean-Baptiste Singelée was a close friend of Adolphe Sax, the inventor of the instrument. Composed in the mid-19th century, *Duo Concertante* is one of the earliest chamber works written for saxophones, showcasing both their lyrical and virtuosic capabilities.

Cory Woolley is a Senior Music Education major at Western Connecticut State University, studying classical saxophone under Javier Oviedo. Throughout his time at the university, he has Played with the Saxophone Ensemble, Saxophone Quartets, The Symphonic Band, as well as the Wind

Ensemble. In the Fall 2024 semester, Cory was a featured soloist with the Wind Ensemble performing "Catch Me If You Can" by John Williams. Cory is also a winner of the 2024 WCSU James Furman Honors Recital Competition. In addition to these school ensembles, Cory was the principal Alto Saxophone in the Eastern Division Intercollegiate Band at the Connecticut Band Directors National Association (CBDNA) Eastern Division Conference which took place at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. He is preparing to enter his first year in the profession of Music Education.

MEET THE ARTISTS



Lebanese composer Nicolas Chaanine started composing at a young age. By the age of 15 he was already writing music for radio and television. Nicolas studied at The Holy Spirit University of Kaslik and the Lebanese National Higher Conser-vatory of Music. His harmony

and composition teachers, soon realized his artistic potential and encouraged him to pursue a career as a composer. Soon Nicolas was approached to com-pose incidental music for films and documentaries. His style can be best defined by his passion for exploring the music of many different cultures. The geographic position of Lebanon, between the western and middle eastern world presented him with an array of different musical traditions. This rich mix of cultures became an inexhaustible source of inspiration, result-ing in a musical style that abolishes all boundaries.

Saxophonist **Javier Oviedo** stands as one of the brightest soloist performers of the classical saxophone world. Acclaimed for his lustrous tone, passionate musicianship, and formidable technique, he has kept alive the excitement and versatility of his instrument through his tireless efforts and continuous research.

> Javier has a big contribution not only in reviving the old compositions but also in commissioning and premiering dozens of new pieces.

His debut recording, The Classical

Saxophone: A French Love Story, features original music for saxophone and orchestra from the 19th and 20th Centuries. The album garnered tremendous acclaim and appreciation from music critics and the public at large. Since then there is no looking back.

During his journey, he has worked with many renowned music artists including Akira Endo, Zdenek Macal, and Mitch Miller. Javier has performed in many cities across the country and around the world.

In 2014, he released two new recordings. And So It Begins..., which highlighted his playing on two tracks and Lazy Afternoon: Salon Music for Classical Saxophone of Byron Bellows, recorded with St. Luke's Chamber Ensemble and lead by Maestro Jean-Pierre Schmitt.

In 2019, he recorded Légende by Florent Schmitt with the City of Prague Philharmonic, released on MSR Classics.

He has appeared with the New Jersey Symphony, the Austin Symphony, the Chattanooga Symphony, l'Orchestre Lamoureux, l'Orchestre à Cordes d'Ariège in France, and both National Philharmonics of Moldova and Russia in Oryol.

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

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Praised for his precision and elegance at the podium, conductor **Jean-Pierre Schmitt** was trained in the purest French conducting tradition under the tutelage of his friend and mentor, the late maestro Jean Fournet. In June 2013 he lead the premier of a new work at Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall to great applause. Maestro Schmitt is admired by the orchestra members he has conducted and possesses a rare ability to convey his musical insights to the performers.

In France, Mr. Schmitt worked with the Conservatory Paris V youth orchestras and the International Orchestra in Paris. He has since conducted around the world as an invited guest on several occasions to lead both the Chamber Orchestra and the Philharmonic Orchestra of Macedonia, the National

Orchestra of Moldova, and the State Philharmonic Orchestra of Oryol in the Russian Federation.

Soon after his arrival in the United States Maestro Schmitt was invited to conduct the Classic Chamber Orchestra of Connecticut and the New York Lawyers' Orchestra. He also lead The Monte Vista Chamber Orchestra in Texas and The Louisiana Chamber Orchestra. Schmitt is the founder of The French-American Chamber Orchestra in New York, performing on New York's finest stages including the United Nations, Lincoln Center, and Carnegie Hall.

Jean-Pierre Schmitt's recordings have been well received by critics and the public alike and his affinity for the art of accompanying a soloist comes through.
