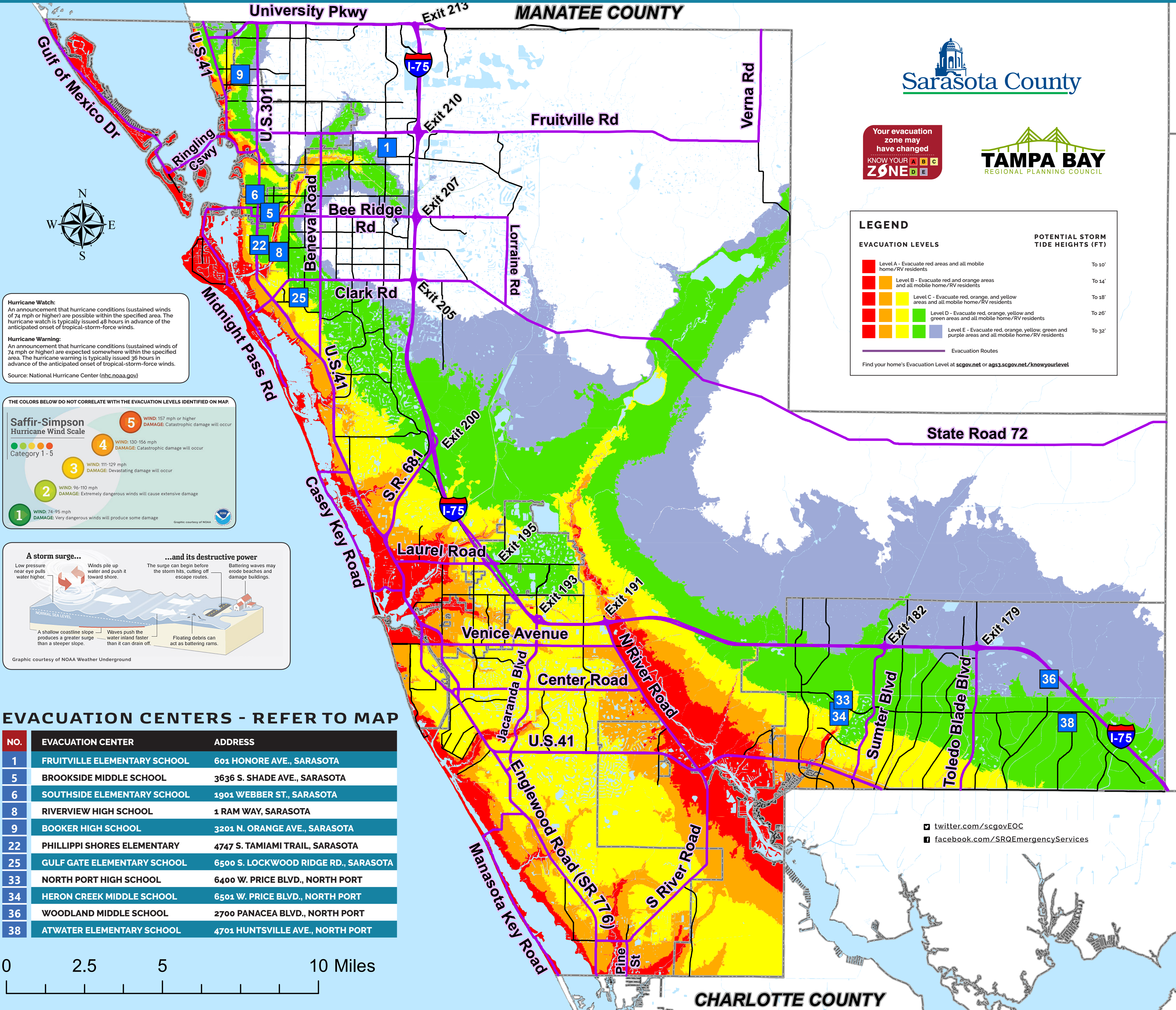


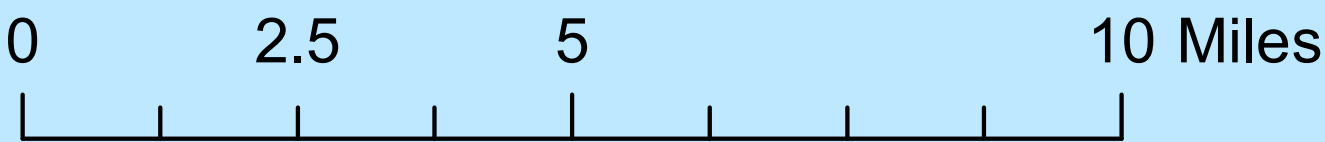

SHELTER-IN-PLACE

You may be able to shelter-in-place if you live outside of a flood hazard area in a home built under the 2002 Building Code or after. Additional measures such as placing shutters over windows and having doors that can withstand wind pressure and debris impact can make your home a safer place to ride out a storm.

Your shelter-in-place location should contain enough non-perishable food, blankets, communication equipment (such as radios), alternate power sources, first aid supplies, necessary medications, and any required durable medical equipment (e.g., hearing aid batteries, catheters) to allow self-sustainment in that location for a minimum of 72 hours.

How do I know if I need to go to an Evacuation Center?

Local authorities will give evacuation orders for areas with significant risk of damage resulting from a high wind or surge event. **If you are not in the identified areas, you can choose to remain in your home.** Evacuating unnecessarily can cause overcrowded Evacuation Centers and traffic jams.

EVACUATION CENTERS

In the event of a community emergency, Sarasota County has Evacuation Centers for residents and visitors available as a last resort.

A hurricane Evacuation Center is a facility that provides increased protection to the public from high winds and/or storm surge. They are designated by Sarasota County and operated in partnership between Sarasota County and the Sarasota County School Board. It is a place to ride out the storm that may or may not be comfortable with very limited provisions.

Become familiar with the information provided and make sure everyone in your household knows the following facts:


- Current Evacuation Center information is available from local radio and television stations, the Sarasota County Contact Center at 941-861-5000 and Access Sarasota (Comcast ch. 19/ Frontier ch. 32). More information is available on the county website, [scgov.net](#).
- Evacuation Centers will open based on the nature and timing of the threat to the county.
- All Sarasota County Evacuation Centers welcome properly crated and supplied dogs and cats. Current vaccination records are required for dogs and cats.
- Never go to an Evacuation Center unless local officials have announced it is open.

Stay tuned to local media for a listing of Evacuation Centers that will be open. Openings may differ by size and intensity of a disaster. See map list above.

Evacuation Centers are opened for the single purpose of protecting life. We open them based on the ability of that facility to withstand the forecasted wind effects and storm surge.

Evacuation Centers do not have generators and offer no services other than a very basic food provision, water, and 20 sq. ft. per person for floor space. There are no cots, pillows or blankets provided. Evacuees must bring their own bedding and supplies.

Power loss results in no air conditioning. It is a public environment where there are large numbers of people in close proximity to each other. The one thing all evacuees have in common is they are seeking protection from intense weather.

MEDICALLY-DEPENDENT EVACUATION CENTERS

Sarasota County residents with qualifying medical needs are encouraged to apply NOW for registration as a medically-dependent person (MDP).

Examples of qualifying medical needs include the use of oxygen or use of medical equipment that requires electricity.

It is important to apply in advance for this program so, if qualified, you will be on the county's registry for transportation and sheltering at a medically-dependent Evacuation Center during a disaster. USING YOUR COUNTY MAP

- Locate where you live and work on the map.
- Determine whether you are in an evacuation area, and if so, what level (color).
- If you are in an evacuation area, or live in a mobile home/RV, decide where you will go if ordered to evacuate.

Your choices include:

- Home of a relative or friend outside the evacuation level
- Hotel/motel outside the evacuation level (make arrangements early)
- Go to a public Evacuation Center
- As a last resort, leave the area entirely

If you must go to a public Evacuation Center, use your county map to decide which one is convenient. **Make sure you verify that the Evacuation Center is open before you go.**

HURRICANE THREAT

- The colored areas on the map are vulnerable to storm surge. Storm surge is produced by water being pushed towards the shore by the force of the winds moving around the storm.
- Storm surge creates a path of destruction, wiping out structures as it rapidly surges inland and then recedes. This is a life threatening situation for anyone who ignores evacuation orders and stays in vulnerable areas.
- Hurricanes are categorized on a scale of 1 to 5, depending on wind strength and destructive power. The evacuation levels are color coded to designate the level of storm surge likely to occur.
- If you live in an area ordered to evacuate, gather your family/pets and emergency supplies, secure your home and leave the evacuated area. Failure to obey an evacuation order is a violation of state and local laws.

Note: All persons living in mobile homes/RVs must evacuate for all evacuation orders, regardless of where you are located in the county, due to threat of tornado or high velocity winds.

NOAA WEATHER RADIO

A NOAA Weather Radio can provide you with valuable hurricane information as well as vital warning information for tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and other dangerous weather phenomena. It also broadcasts important post-event information for all types of hazards such as chemical releases and significant matters of public safety.

WEB-BASED HURRICANE INFORMATION

Sarasota County Government maintains a special webpage to relay important hurricane information for local residents. You can find out which, if any, evacuation level (zone) you live in, your nearest public Evacuation Center (shelter), medically dependent (special needs) registration forms and much more. MANASOTA MEDICAL RESERVE CORPS

The MRC is a community-based group of medical and non-medical volunteers. Training is provided to help members fulfill their roles. Examples include dispensing of medication or vaccinations, serving in hurricane Evacuation Centers, assisting with disease outbreak investigation and community outreach. STORM DEBRIS

Residents are encouraged to watch or listen to local news outlets, follow Sarasota County's social media channels or check [scgov.net](#) for updates after a storm. Depending on the severity of the storm, residents should anticipate delays, and possibly suspension in their regular collection services including trash, recycling and yard waste.

Storm debris must be separated by category for collection. Examples of these types of categories include the following:

- Vegetative - tree limbs and trunks
- Garbage - place spoiled food in containers, or double bag it for pick-up
- Household goods - furniture, clothes, books, toys
- Construction materials - drywall, roof shingles, carpet, aluminum, vinyl, wood fencing
- Appliances - refrigerators, water heaters, televisions, computers

TIPS: Avoid stacking debris by utility poles, under power lines, on top of water meter or other water connections, by fire hydrants, by vehicles, next to mailboxes or fences or on storm drain. Do not place any storm debris in the street.

Live on a private road? If so, the homeowner must grant the county the right to enter the roadway for debris removal. For further information, or to obtain the Right-of-Entry/Hold Harmless form, call 941-861-5000.

FUNCTIONAL NEEDS SUPPORT SERVICES

Functional Needs Support Services (FNSS) are services that enable children and adults to maintain their usual level of independence in a general population Evacuation Center. Those requiring FNSS may have physical, sensory, mental health, cognitive and/or intellectual disabilities affecting their ability to function independently without assistance. Individuals will not be turned away from general population Evacuation Centers, or inappropriately placed in other environments.

Upon arrival to a Sarasota County general population Evacuation Center, inform Center Management staff of your request for services to ensure the most effective approach. Sarasota County will make every effort to meet functional and access needs at approved County Evacuation Centers upon request.

SARASOTA COUNTY NOTIFICATION/ WARNING SYSTEM

Sarasota County utilizes a free, secure, advanced, and effective community notification system that allows you to receive calls, emails alerts, or text messages about events that could impact your neighborhood or help protect your family or property. This system allows us to send critical communications to all or targeted areas within the county when immediate actions are required. Your contact information remains private, and will only be used for PUBLIC HEALTH SAFETY and WELLNESS purposes. Anyone with a physical address in Sarasota County may participate. PRESCRIPTIONS

Your prescription medications are one of the most important things to include in your disaster survival kit. But in a declared emergency, what happens when your insurance company claims it is too early for you to get a refill?

The Florida Emergency Prescription Refill Bill (FS 252.358 and 462.0275) requires all insurers to suspend refill-to-own restrictions when a patient seeks a refill in a county that is (1) under a NWS Hurricane Warning; (2) under a state of emergency declared by the Governor; or the County Emergency Operations Center is activated.

If you evacuate out of the county, this law also allows patients to get an emergency 72-hour refill if the pharmacist is unable to obtain refill authorization from the doctor. Keep a list of each medication you take, including the name of the doctor who wrote the prescription, dosage instructions and the name and phone number of the pharmacy where you had it filled

DOGS AND CATS

Sarasota County allows dogs and cats at all Evacuation Centers, indicated on the list in this guide. If you are unable to meet these requirements, please make other arrangements to protect your pet.

- Provide proof of current license and vaccination
- Pet must be in an appropriate pet crate
- Provide all items required for your pet
- You are responsible for your pet while in the shelter

DO NOT CALL 9-1-1 FOR DISASTER INFORMATION

WHAT TO BRING FOR SMALL CHILDREN

- Please bring age appropriate items for your child
- Baby food jars - combination of vegetables, fruits, cereals & meats
- Cereal (child age specific)
- Favorite healthy snacks
- Diaper wipes
- Diapers / pull-ups
- Formula (powered and/or ready-made)

- Oral electrolyte solution, such as Pedialyte
- Juice boxes
- Baby bottles
- Baby feeding spoons
- Nipples for baby bottles
- Diaper rash ointment
- Disposable changing pads
- Infant bathing basin, wash cloths and towels

- Infant hat and booties
- Lightweight blankets
- Portable crib
- Toddler potty seat
- Small toys that do not make noise such as books, cards, puzzles, handheld games, extra batteries
- Any special item that the child may be attached to that provides comfort
