Firewood at the Falls

The MFBIA has firewood in **0.8 cubic foot bags** available just past the entrance kiosk and at the upper and lower campground areas when open. The cost is **\$10/one** bag, **\$18/two** bags, and **\$25/three** bags.

Where does the Firewood Come From?

What would camping be without a campfire, and those marshmallows! Have you wondered where that nicely bagged wood comes from?

To start with, the wood itself comes from right here in the Park. We want to be sure that firewood does not bring in pests and diseases from out of the area. When trees die, are felled by storm or fire, or are cut down as hazards, the wood is cut and bagged in manageable amounts by inmates housed at the Intermountain Conservation Camp, managed by CalFire. These hard workers also do some

of the hazard tree removal, trail repair, campground clean-up, weed eating and brushing, both here in Burney Falls and in Ahjumawi Lava Springs State Park. Their efforts supplement the hard work of the Park's maintenance staff, MBFIA volunteers who replenish the wood sheds weekly, and save taxpayer funds.

On top of supporting a healthy forest, these efforts produce a significant portion of the proceeds each year for the McArthur Burney Falls Interpretive Association in support of campfire and evening programs, replacement of interpretive signs that have weathered dramatically in the last 10 years, bird and nature walks, the **Discovery Quest** and **Junior Ranger** programs, **Heritage Day**, other interpretive programs for young and old, including the production of the **Visitor Guide**.

MBFIA Mission Statement

The McArthur Burney Falls Interpretive Association is an all-volunteer non-profit education organization that provides assistance and funding for activities which enhance the quality of visits to McArthur Burney Falls Memorial State Park, Castle Crags State Park and Ahjumawi Lava Springs State Park. The association was founded in 1984 to promote greater appreciation of the cultural and natural history of the region.

MBFIA raises funds to support educational and interpretive activities, including interpretive personnel, and a printed Visitor Guide provided free to visitors. MBFIA manages the Visitor Center Gift Shop. Funds are raised through the sale of firewood, advertising in the Visitor Guide, the operation of the Visitor Center gift shop, and most importantly, donations from friends and visitors.

Friends of the Falls

Friends of Burney Falls provides education and interpretation and our programs highlight the Park's natural and cultural elements. Burney Falls offers hiking trails, flora and fauna, birds, squirrels and the like, camping, cabins and Lake Britton. Funds donated support Interpretive and educational activities, including guided hikes, Junior Ranger programs, campfire and craft activities, sing-alongs and group games. At Burney Falls, our Visitor Center includes a Gift Shop, as well as information about the geology, flora and fauna, cultural history and recreational opportunities in the park and the surrounding area. Our annual Heritage Day celebration in October offers weaving, cross-cut sawing, branding, candle-making, pine-doll making, apple cider pressing and Dutch Oven cooking. The Park has instituted a birding program, that includes guided bird identification walks, loaner binoculars plus a library of information. In addition, we have supported new native plants around the Visitor Center, with information about the plantings available for visitors.

We're also in the process of renewing our availability for sale and placement of memorial benches and picnic tables at the Park. Contact us for more details.

Board Meeting Highlights

January 2026

- The association budget for 2026 will mirror 2025.
- Hamburgers and hotdogs will be used for Volunteer Appreciation Day and Heritage Day.
- Typically 6,000 firewood bags are used per season.

- No Memorial Picnic Tables were sold in 2025. There is one family interested at this time. There is continued interest in benches.
- Volunteer Day was set for Saturday, September 12, 2026. Heritage Day will be Sunday, October 11.
- Planning for replacing technical equipment and updating the video for the Visitor Center.
- Fair weather is keeping the Parks busy prior to the traditional season. The same staffing level for is very optimistic for this year.
- The MBFIA will continue to fund additional signage.
- Old stands or signage might be desirable to purchase by visitors or supporters of the Park.
- The cost and beauty of the new signage has been disappointing due to the finished artwork not being installed quickly and properly.
- Tony Otto was approved as a new board member.

February 2026

- 2026 is not appropriate for a Centennial celebration. In 1927 there was a Bill put forward and passed that turned Burney Falls land into a State Park. The land was transferred to the State in 1923.
- We will recognize the 250th anniversary of the United States during Heritage Day.
- Memorial Day will continue to be challenging due to high demand for camping.
- Once the Castle Crags signage is installed, the Burney Falls signage will be completed.

- Advertising in the local paper & posting on bulletin boards was suggested to recruit new members.
- The association will continue to manage recycling.
- T-shirts were okayed by Parks for this year. Other ideas for using the same artwork will be pursued.
- The Visitors Center will open as soon as possible, targeting April 3, with staffing Tuesday through Sunday.

March 2026

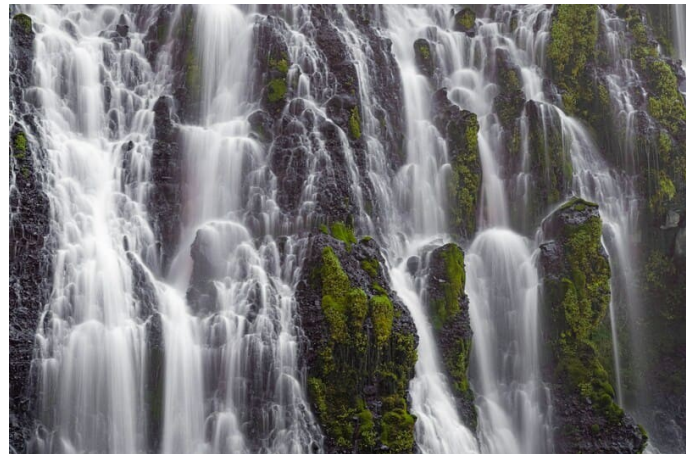
- The current slate of officers was approved for 2026.

About the Three State Parks

McArthur-Burney Falls Memorial State Park

The park is within the Cascade Range and Modoc Plateau natural region, with forest and five miles of streamside and lake shoreline, including a portion of Lake Britton.

The park's centerpiece is the 129-foot Burney Falls, which is not the highest or largest waterfall in the state, but possibly the most beautiful. Additional water comes from springs, joining to create a mist-filled basin. Burney Creek originates from the park's underground springs and flows to Lake Britton, getting larger along the way to the majestic falls.

The park's landscape was created by volcanic activity as well as erosion from weather and streams. This volcanic region is surrounded by mountain peaks and is covered by black volcanic rock, or basalt. Created over a million years ago, the layered, porous basalt retains rainwater and snow melt, which forms a large underground reservoir. Within the park, the water emerges as springs at and above Burney Falls, where it flows at 100 million

gallons each day. Burney Falls was named after pioneer settler Samuel Burney who lived in the area in the 1850s. The McArthurs were pioneer settlers who arrived in the late 1800s. Descendants were responsible for saving the waterfall and nearby land from development. They bought the property and gave it to the state as a gift in the 1920s. This year, we experienced heavy snow in mid-February so the falls were flowing exceptionally heavy.

Cellular service in the park continues to improve, so you should be able to find a signal as you travel the roads.

Visitor Information for the Falls:

McArthur Burney Falls Memorial State Park entrance kiosk is open now, but closed in the off-season. Please bring exact change or credit/debit cards to pay by APM (Automatic Payment Machine) which is located just past the entrance kiosk in front of the visitor center.

- Park Day-Use Fee - \$10 Per Vehicle
- Overnight Camping - \$35 Per Night (Includes One Vehicle).
- Additional Overnight Camping Vehicles - \$10 Per night.

Warnings for Falls Visitors:

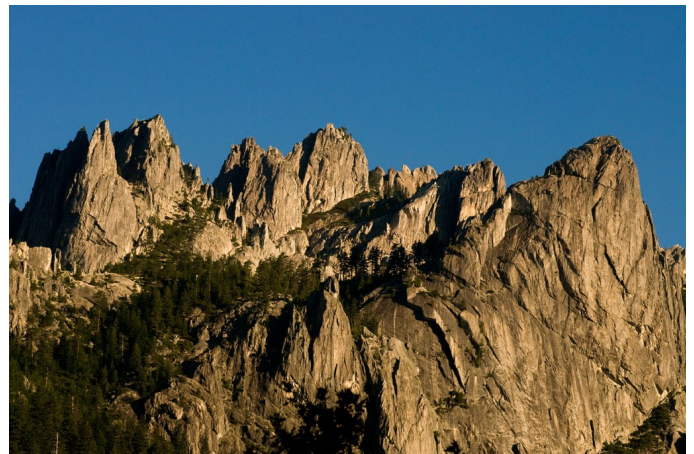
McArthur Burney Falls State Park experiences extremely high visitation beginning in April and continuing through October. Most weekends all summer the park will fill to capacity and entrance into the park is subject to closure due to limited parking availability. Visitors should expect traffic delays on State Highway 89 for up to an hour prior to entering the park due to the increased visitation experienced at this park. It is illegal to park along Highway 89 outside of the park for a mile either direction. If you park along Highway 89 your vehicle will be subject to citation and tow. The speed limit is 55 mph along Highway 89 and utilized by a large volume of semitrucks, it is not recommended to walk along the highway. If you

arrive to find the entrance closed due to full capacity, please return at a later time - typically after 4:00 p.m.

The park cannot admit entrance to vehicles over 32 feet for day-use or camping. Additionally, only a limited number of oversized vehicles (less than 32 feet in length) will be admitted into park. Oversized vehicles will only be allowed to park in the Lake Britton parking lot (approximately 1.5 miles walk to the falls) on Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays.

Due to limited parking capacity, McArthur-Burney Falls Memorial State Park cannot accommodate entry, drop-offs or parking of tour busses until further notice.

Castle Crag State Park

Majestic Castle Crag have inspired enduring myths and legends. More than 170 million years old, these 6000-foot tall granite spires in the Castle Crag Wilderness border the northwestern edge of Castle Crag State Park.

Castle Crag State Park offers a variety of camping, picnicking, hiking, and fishing opportunities.

The park has 76 developed campsites that are each equipped with a picnic table, food locker, and a fire ring. Flush toilets, showers, and drinking water are

available near each campsite. Picnic sites are located along the Sacramento River and at the awe-inspiring Vista Point. McArthur Burney Falls State Park experiences extremely high visitation beginning in April and continuing through October. Most weekends all summer the park will fill to capacity and entrance into the park is subject to closure due to limited parking availability. Visitors should expect traffic. With 28 miles of hiking trails, everyone can enjoy a mild stroll or an invigorating adventure. From the Vista Point parking area, a quarter mile accessible trail leads visitors to Vista Point where there are dramatic views of Castle Crags, Mount Shasta, and nearby Grays Rocks. Gentle and shaded, the mile long Root Creek Trail guides hikers along an accessible path to a year round flowing creek.

The most popular and challenging route is the Crags Trail which leads adventures to the base of Castle Dome where the views are simply breathtaking. The Pacific Crest Trail winds through the Park as well. Castle Crags State Park is often a respite for the weary hikers of this 2,650 mile trek from Mexico to Canada.

The Sacramento River flows through the park and has several access points that allow for fishing and hiking. Facilities at Riverside include camping and picnicking sites as well the famed pedestrian suspension bridge that crosses the Sacramento River.

Ahjumawi Lava Springs State Park



"Where the waters come together...." is a translation of the California Indian word Ahjumawi, which is

also the self describing word used by the band of Pit River of Indians who still inhabit the area.

Ahjumawi is a place of exceptional, even primeval, beauty. Brilliant aqua bays and tree studded islets only a few yards long dot the shoreline of Ja-She Creek, Crystal Springs, and Horr Pond. Over two thirds of the area is covered by recent (three to five thousand years) lava flows including vast areas of jagged black basalt.

The park's backcountry is characterized as wilderness with extremely rugged lava rock. Visitors should prepare adequately for their visit. While there are over twenty miles of park trails by which to explore this beautiful geographical wonder, please be advised that travel off the trails requires proper preparation and equipment. Be sure someone knows where you are going and when you expect to return.

Visitor Services Senior Park Aide

The Visitor Services Senior Park Aide (Seasonal) is expected to work weekends, holidays, and evenings if necessary and assigned days off may vary from month to month. The Visitor Services Senior Park Aide (Seasonal) will perform duties dressed in full State Park uniform.

Primary duties include but are not limited to: Park Aide Lead and administrative duties such as maintaining accountability worksheets, attendance records, and Park Aide schedule, training new Park Aide staff, providing direction and assistance to Park Aide staff, and receptionist duties for the office. The Senior Park Aide (Seasonal) will also operate the entrance station, greet visitors, and provide information about park conditions, closures, trails, and rules and regulations. In addition, the Senior Park Aide (Seasonal) should be proficient in basic use of a computer and able to check work e-mail account.

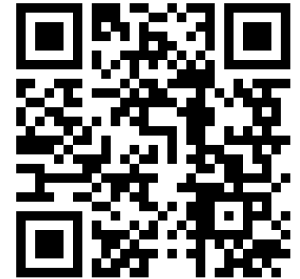
