



MASA Section 576 Hosts NARCON 2008


NARCON 2008 was held at the Kahler Grand Hotel in Rochester, Minnesota from March 14 through March 16. The weekend devoted to the hobby of sport rocketry was hosted by MASA for the second year in a row. A staff of MASA members planned what they had hoped would turn out to be a great event, as the first of three National events during this historic year. 2008 marks the first 50 years of the NAR, and the 50th anniversary of the beginnings of Estes Industries.

The theme for this year's event "Looking Back / Paying Forward" was played out by hosting many events that ranged from listening to Vern and Gleda Estes reminisce about their historic early days to teaching teachers how to promote rocketry in their schools.

The event drew people from around the country, and a favorite place to be was in Vendor Hall, where prominent rocketry vendors sold their latest and greatest creations and chatted with NARCON attendees.

NARCON 2008 Special Guests: Vern and Gleda Estes





NARCON's Featured Event was a presentation on Saturday night by Special Guests Vern and Gleda Estes, the original founders of Estes Industries. Seated in front of a packed house wearing their leather flight jackets full of various patches, Vern and Gleda shared special moments with us as they retold the history of Estes Industries from its humble beginnings fifty years ago.

They shared old stories and old black and white movie clips explaining how they started the company that ultimately started this hobby. They even shared a letter from one of their daughters about what it was like as a small child "growing up Estes", and more excerpts from Vern's upcoming book, "Dear Mr. Estes". They shared stories of how Vern built Mabel (the original rocket engine machine) from whatever old parts he could find, and the chilling story of the accident in 1959 that put one of their first employees and dear friend Jim Berns in the hospital and nearly ended the hobby before it began. Many of the stories, pictures and movie clips that they had shared were never before seen or heard, which made their presentation all that more memorable and historic.

After their presentation and a standing ovation, Vern and Gleda graciously signed autographs on rockets, program books, motors, or anything else that a long line of NARCON attendees brought. Their presentation was the highlight of NARCON 2008, and they are truly two of the most down-to-earth gracious people you could ever meet. Gleda explained to Carol Marple and Jeff Taylor at lunch the next day, "We had no idea we were making history – we were just trying to make a living."


A NARCON 2008 Original: Kid's Pack Activity Books



The 2008 NARCON sport launch was a beacon to summon folks with true rocketry hearts. Those rocketeers braved the elements at Maple Island to fly some birds on a 'balmy' Minnesota spring day.

The Launch started off with a nice looking X-15 by Dakota Hanson. Its first flight speared the ground with deployment issues, however, the wet ground was kind to X-15 and it found its way to the pad again.

Elsewhere in the low power flights, Andrew Allas had an Alpha that enjoyed a nice flight on a C6-5 but was hard to track after deployment and folks thought it might be sacrificed to the rocketry gods, but in a stroke of real good luck, Andrew returned to the range head with the Alpha. I think he might have lost his shoe temporarily to the gods, however they returned his shoe, his rocket, and a muddy Andrew back the to range head.

One rocket that did go missing was Carl's Arreaux, flown on a G40 white lightning. The Arreaux took off and soon lost tracking by the folks at the range head. Last sighted, it was north and perhaps a little east of the range head. Hopefully, the Arreaux might turn up by the April launch.

John Cieslak certified Level 1 in a great flight of his Mole-1 on a H123W to 2000 feet. A very fine looking flight! Congratulations!

Karen Ingmundson gave John a little competition in a flight by her Canadian Arrow on a D12 with a recovery very close to the road - which was welcomed by all flyers who didn't have to sample too much of the wet fields.

David Graper certified Level 2 with his Diablo 5.5 on a J180 to 2700 feet in a fine flight. Based on the recovery conditions, David and his Diablo were very brave in the L2 attempt and it all worked out great! David also flew his 38 Special on a H-123W in another great flight with close to road recovery.

Neal Higgins had what I would call the coolest looking rocket out at the NARCON sport launch. He had a rocket called the Vulcan X29B which looked darn cool and had an equally impressive paint scheme. After some struggling with some technical difficulties on the pad, the Vulcan did take to the air but its rear deployed chutes didn't fire as expected for a gentle recovery and the Vulcan came in hot in a very untimely end. For the effort that went into the Vulcan it seemed very unfair, Hopefully Neal will not be swayed by the unfortunate end of the Vulcan and another might rise from the ashes! Neal also had his Moya and his Tiny Pterodactyl out for flights that went much better than the Vulcan.

Scott Emkovik has his Mini BBX out for a flight on a H-165 to an expected altitude to 2000 feet. I believe the BBX needed some fin repair - hopefully any damage will be resolved for the BBX to return again to Maple Island.

Andy had a couple fights as well at the sport launch. His 'Changed' on a G64 took a tumble recover with a broken fin that can be fixed. His Paid Assassin flew on a H-128 in a nice flight.






Sport Launch Continued

Raising the power level, Dennis launched his Hawks Hobby Super Sprite on a D12-5 in a nice flight with a landing close to the road. Highest in power was the Lil' Blue Nuke that Dennis flew on a F20. I believe the Nuke started very slowly off the pad and found itself a ballistic missile landing next to the road. A big thanks goes out to Dennis for his help with the amenities! The tent and the heaters he brought were very much welcomed by the cold but determined rocketeers.

NARCON 2008 Hosted Three Forums

Three open forums, including a Vendor's Forum, an Educator's Forum and an Old Rocketeer's Forum were held at NARCON 2008.

The Vendor's Forum was moderated by the NARCON Vendor Coordinator Mark Thell. Mark introduced each of the NARCON Attending Vendors after the Welcome Speech Friday night. Vendors were able to get in front of the audience and show off their stuff, including their latest released products and what they are working on for future releases.

The Educator's Forum was moderated by Vince Huegele on Saturday. Vince is the Chairman of the NAR Education Board and works at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama. This forum included longtime education advocate Jim Flis and a group of 17 teachers from the Minneapolis C2C Program as well as other teachers and youth leaders. This open forum was designed to allow educators to share their ideas on how to introduce rocketry curriculum into schools and youth groups.

The Old Rocketeer's Forum was hosted by Bob Kaplow from Dundee, Illinois in Heritage Hall II shortly after the Educator's Forum. Bob shared much of his own personal rocketry memorabilia that he has collected from over the years with all that attended. This was truly a "looking



Host Hotel for NARCON 2008

The Kahler GRAND HOTEL:

NARCON 2008 was held at the Kahler Grand Hotel in Rochester, Minnesota, which was also the site of NARCON 2007. In 2006, MASA was approached by the Rochester Chamber of Commerce asking if they would be interested in bringing a national rocketry event to Rochester, hence NARCON 2007. Because of the success of NARCON 2007 and the close working relationship between MASA and TSM, NARCON 2008 planners decided to return to the Kahler Grand for NARCON 2008. Many NARCON attendees enjoyed a discounted nightly room rate at the Kahler Grand Hotel, and where able to go from their hotel room to the convention and many food and shopping locations without ever having to go outside, which is a definite plus in Minnesota when March is still winter.

Opening in 1921 at a then-price tag of \$1.75 million dollars, the 87 year old hotel features 691 guestrooms and 25 suites, a fitness center, domed recreation area, salon, complimentary shuttle service, a selection of dining services, convenience to nearby shops and boutiques, and 24-hour room service. The Kahler Grand is right across the street and directly linked to the Mayo Clinic via a climate-controlled pedestrian subway.

NARCON events were held on the lower subway level of the Kahler Grand Hotel. Vendor Hall was located in the 2,420 square foot Heritage Hall III, and was one of the most popular places to be throughout the weekend. Welcome speeches, the Vendor's, Educator's and Old Rocketeer's Forums, Vern and Gleda's Presentation and the Make it/Take It Sessions were held next door in the 2,365 square foot Heritage Hall II. The NARCON Registration/Information Booth was set up in the foyer right outside these two great halls. Presentations were held all weekend in the three Windsor Hall rooms just around the corner. Just upstairs from the Heritage Halls was Victoria's Ristorante & Wine Bar, a favorite Italian dining location for NARCON rocketeers.

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NARCON 2008 Make It/Take it Sessions

Make It/Take It Sessions are opportunities for attendees to build model rockets at NARCON. The builders were assisted by the Make It/Take It presenter, and at the end of the session they took home their creations.

NARCON 2008 held two separate Make It/Take It Sessions, one was held for all NARCON youth, and was presented by MASA's Andy Heren. Quest Aerospace donated Starhawk kits for the youth to build. This kit is a skill level 1 rocket with streamer recovery. The 13 inch tall .79 inch diameter rocket with a single piece plastic fin can flies on A6-4 and B6-4 engines.

The second Make It/Take It Session was held for the Minneapolis C2C Teacher Group, and was presented by FlisKits' Jim Flis. FlisKits donated Pheord X-150 kits for the teachers to build. This kit is a skill level 2 flying saucer with featherweight recovery. The 3.2 inch tall "redneck" style saucer with spring loaded landing gear flies on B6-0 and C6-0 engines.












































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
