They are all heroes

When Tyndall became the county seat of Bon Homme County in 1896, thirty-one years after the Civil War ended, residents surely believed their country would never again be drawn into such a horrible conflict. Two years later, in 1898, local men were to serve in the Spanish-American War (in Cuba and the Philippines). To commemorate the end of that war and all wars, the Bon Homme County Board of Commissioners erected the striking flag tower standing today on courthouse grounds.

Only 19 years later, in 1917, the United States again entered war, this time in Europe to help end a conflict that had been escalating

for several years. Hundreds of Dakotans served in that "Last Great War," many returning with wounds to their body and spirit they would always carry--others never to return.

Peace was not to last. Following the bombing by Japan of Pearl Harbor December 7, 1941, the United States was again thrust into war, its forces flung far and wide from North Africa and the European Theater to the Pacific and many places between. Thousands of Dakota youths took up arms, and women also, in a surge of patriotism that remains with them still.

More conflicts have followed: the inconclusive and unpopular Korean and Vietnam Wars and most recently the Persian Gulf War, all of which involved many local men and women.

Freedom is a fragile precious commodity. It has been paid for dearly by nearly 1,200 of our local men and women who were willing to do their duty when called, even die if necessary. This memorial book is dedicated to those hundreds. They are all heroes.

It is hoped that this book will also be a teaching tool for our youth--that they may be inspired to preserve the freedom their local heroes fought so bravely for.

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How Tyndall's Veterans Memorial Park came about

It was fitting that the Tyndall Legion and VFW posts conceived the idea of constructing a veterans memorial on the 56th anniversary of the bombing of Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1997.

From the first, the memberships contemplated a monument large enough to include the names of area men and women who had served in all wars from the Civil War to the present. Also to be included were those who had or were currently serving in either the regular branches of the military or National Guard. In particular the memorial would honor veterans who had given their lives as well as those who became prisoners of war while serving to keep their country a land of freedom. A daunting project!

To promote interest and to seek names of local veterans, the campaign began with a single page bulletin picturing a typical memorial. Local businessmen and


VFW Commander Charlie Skorpik gave impetus to the project by personally soliciting funds locally and in neighboring towns.

In Fall 1998, by which time he had raised \$12,000. Charlie was instrumental in forming a veterans memorial planning committee which was charged with choosing a design, formulating a fund-raising plan cont. on page 3

and selecting a building site. During the next several months several locations were considered including the Bon Homme County Courthouse grounds, the Tyndall City Park and the Shady Rest Motel corner. However on November 1, 1999, with the concurrence of the VFW and Legion memberships, the selection process concluded with the purchase of a 109' wide x 304' parcel located on South Main Street just north of the Dairy Queen.

Following membership approval, the planning committee began the search for veterans' names to be inscribed on the monument stones, meanwhile setting a fundraising goal of \$60,000. In February 2000 over 700 letters including a conceptual illustration of the memorial were mailed to area veterans and businesses soliciting donations for the project. Ladies from the two auxiliaries helping with that mailing project and another in June 2001 included Lornie McCann, Lassie Miller, Darlene Tycz, Marjorie Novotny, Joan Lee, Audrey Hajek, Arda Hoffman, Dorothy Taplett and Mabel Winningham.

In December 2000 the planning committee selected Luken Memorials Inc., Yankton, to provide the monuments. In Spring 2001, the group approved a layout drawing of the project, and local contractors Vince Efta (concrete and general), Dave Schenkel (dirt) and

Gene Marvin (electric) began work in July. Rusty Williams assisted Efta with backhoe work, and Fejfar Plumbing was on schedule for plumbing.

Meanwhile, the committee recruited local historian Maxine Schuurmans Kinsley to compile and edit a memorial book which would include histories of the two posts, names of those to be inscribed on the memorial, photos and stories.

The planning committee expresses its appreciation to several whose assistance has moved the project along. Gary LaCompte, John Lee and Richard Hermanek helped survey the site and provide technical assistance to the contractors. We also commer.d original finance committee member Gene Koenig for his advice and support. The City of Tyndall has provided utility assistance and ground maintenance.

In closing, the committee thanks all who have given their time, support and contributions to make this memorial possible. Nearly 1,200 names of area veterans tell a powerful story. "The rest is history."

Tyndall's First Veterans Group Grierson Post No. 78

Grierson Post No. 78 of the Grand Army of the Republic organized Oct 4, 1884, in Tyndall with 14 members. The post reached its largest membership in 1893 with 36.

In 1898 the post established a one-acre burial site adjacent to the M.E. Cemetery, one-half mile west of Tyndall. January 31, 1907, Cmdr Wm Abbott and Adj F A Morgan signed a deed turning that site over to the newly-formed Tyndall Cemetery Association for \$1 but with stipulations that a monument to GAR veterans be built and that Memorial Day always be observed.

The tall obelisk which is located in the center of the original GAR cemetery contains the following inscription: (on the north) "1861-1865 Erected AD 1907 by Grierson Post No. 78 Dept. of South Dakota Grand Army of the Republic; (east) "This stone is sacred to the memory of all Soldiers, Sailors and Marines who served in the States 1861-1865 Wherever their ashes may lie Known or Unknown; (south, by Tyndall's Chapter of the Womens Relief Corps) "Oft as the year Returns We wreathe with flowers Their funeral urns. Grierson W.R.C. No. 42."

The first paragraph of "Logan's Orders" issued 5/5/1868, begins as follows: "The 30th day of May 1868 is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country..."

History

June 11, 1919, a number of World War I veterans met on the lawn of the Tyndall Carnegie Library to organize a Legion post. Dr. E. H. Boon acted as temporary chairman and C. C. Puckett as temporary secretary. The group hoped to become the first chartered post in the state; however, because they sent in their charter by mail rather than deliver it to Omaha with a personal delegation as Vermillion did, they became Post No. 2 instead of No. 1. The charter was applied for and received October 18, 1919.

Early meetings were held on the library lawn during the summer and fall of 1919, then in the "Rest Room" meeting room in the library basement. In May 1921 when L.F. Chladek was mayor, the City of Tyndall was bonded for \$50,000 for the erection of an auditorium. The building contract was let early in 1922 and by January 1922 the Legion was able to move into their new rooms, complete with piano and furniture purchased with \$1,500 they had raised from minstrel shows and dances. At that time, 147 were members. Pool tables and athletic equipment were purchased, a Legion band and orchestra and football and basketball teams were organized. The post won the loving cup for four years in athletics in the Bon Homme County ex-servicemen's meets.

One-half century later, the original "Legion" Auditorium is gone, having been replaced by a community center, and the Legion post now shares clubroom space with the Tyndall VFW in a building built for that purpose on Main (old Pearl) Street.

Post No. 2 has remained active over the years, focusing especially on youth activities and community service. As long as there were boys who wished to play, the Legion sponsored Junior Legion baseball. Sending high school boys to Boys State annually and awarding 8th and 12th grade good citizenship scholarships have been ongoing activities, as have conducting Memorial Day services, furnishing a color guard for area parades and providing a firing squad for buddy funerals.

Last Man's Club

At the organization of the Last Man's Club November 19, 1934, it was decided to include all past Commanders into the club. Membership to the club would be closed when the first past Commander died.

The club met once per year to renew their allegiance to the American Legion and to perpetuate the comradeship of the past Commanders. These meetings were to continue until all had answered the roll call up yonder to the Last Man.

Harry Kiestra died August 11, 1936, thus closing the membership. However, it was decided at a special meeting October 16, 1945, by the remaining seven past Commanders in the community to consider opening up membership to all World War I veterans who had been or would be Post Commanders. This consideration was approved by a unanimous vote.

Reward Offered!

"A reward of \$500 will be paid by the American Legion for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who stole the machine gun, sword and bayonet from the Tyndall Auditorium on or about November 29, 1985..."

The sheriff's crime report noted that the four legs of the folding sled mount of the WWI German 7.92 Spandau Mauser appeared to have been cut with a hacksaw. Locals are still pondering when and how the familiar landmark could have been removed from its concrete pedestal without anyone noticing.

Junior Legion baseball

Tyndall fielded a good Junior Legion baseball team Summer 1941, "one of the best," surviving members say. Coach "Fuzzy" Heil and his players advanced to state at Pierre but were defeated in the first game. On that team were pitcher "Posch" Drapeau (a recruit from Greenwood whom George Beringer Sr. boarded in his cafe), catcher George "Dud" Slavik; first base, Jerome Marek; second base. Jim Schneider; short stop Jerry Novotny; third base, Gordon McCann: outfield. Morris Schuurmans, Arnie Pudwill and Lou Janele, all of whom would shortly be entering the service.

History of VFW Simek-Ptak Post No. 6895, Tyndall, SD

Thirty-nine veterans of World War II met May 1, 1946, for the purpose of organizing a Veterans of Foreign Wars post in Tyndall. A charter was issued and on June 4, 1946, 97 veterans were mustered in by Chuck Truesdell of the Ernest Bowyer Post No. 791 of Yankton. The post chose the name of Simek-Ptak in honor of veterans Charles Simek and John Ptak, local men who lost their lives in service during WW II.

The post built a clubhouse one-half block east of Main (Pearl) Street where they met for meetings and social gatherings. In the late-1980s they cooperated with the Legion post to build a joint facility on Main Street which they also share with both auxiliaries.

VFW members have long taken pride in community service. Among their activities are helping to foster patriotism, especially in youth, and providing medical equipment for loan without cost to those in need. The post takes part in Memorial Day services, these days held in the local high school gym, attends military funerals and marches in area parades. Another activity of which the unit is proud is sponsorship of the Teener baseball program.



Lt Ray E Post, 1st commander of Post No. 6895, (see photo), was commissioned in Sept 1943. He served 13 months in the North Atlantic as gunnery officer in command of Navy crews on cargo ships. On his return to Tyndall he resumed his law practice.

Mission of the VFW today:

"As long as there is a veteran anywhere who needs a pill, an education, a roof over his head, a meal or his widow or orphans need any of these things, especially those who cannot provide them for themselves, our mission is not complete."





Forty-five women became charter members of an auxiliary to Pike Post No. 2 three years after the men's post was founded. Mary Ann Pike (see insert photo), postmistress, editor and mother of Stillman Pike was first president. In 1946, like the Legion, the auxiliary added the name "Wagner" in honor of a local soldier who died in World War II.

For many years the unit met in the lower level "Rest Room" of the public library. There they held social events and planned various fundraising activities to provide service and support



for veterans, their families and the community. The unit continues to promote patriotism in schools by sponsoring writing contests and since 1947, selecting Junior girls to attend Girls State. Countless poppies have been sold on selected days in the spring, regardless of the weather. Members attend fellow-members' funerals and conduct final prayers, and some march as color bearers in area parades. The "Apples for the Teachers" project is a welcome treat at Bon Homme schools each fall. Before Christmas a committee purchases and delivers gifts to veterans living at the Human Services Center in Yankton.

Today, the unit is challenged to maintain its membership as the World War II population ages, but the spirt of loyalty and patriotism remains. Of note are two long-serving unit secretaries whose loyalty embodies that spirit. Gabriella Srstka was honored in 1963 for 24 years as secretary while recent secretary Helen Vavruska has capably filled the office for 27 years.

History of VFW Auxiliary Simek-Ptak Post No. 6895 Tyndall, SD Organized December 17, 1951

Eleven local women met in December 1951 to organize an auxiliary to VFW Post No. 6895 and to elect officers. On December 17 a contingent from Yankton's Ernest Bowyer VFW Auxiliary came to install offi-

First president Agnes Maus, now 86, remembers when the fledgling unit pitched in to sell sandwiches and pie in the auditorium basement during dances and public affairs to raise money. In those days, she said, the "girls" used to practice "floor work" drills at every meeting, which were at first held in the VFW club. For lack of room, they moved to the library basement. Maus muses that now few even remember the drill.

The days of serving bountiful men's stags with ribs first browned on the range top in the auditorium basement kitchen, served with ham, dumplings, kraut, etc., from a steam table, all heaped on china plates which had to be washed, are gone. However, the unit continues to serve lunches at Las Vegas nights for the benefit of Teener baseball and hold bake sales to raise funds for other projects. The sale of poppies, now held in the fall, remains an important fundraiser with proceeds going for veterans rehab projects.

A primary goal of the unit is to assist in hospital work for veterans. Another is encouraging patriotic youth activities which promote Americanism and respect for the flag. The color bearers take part in area parades and Memorial Day programs, showing by example their devotion to their country.

The Civil War (1861-1865)

History

Foes:

Union (Northern States), Blue, vs. Confederacy (Southern seceded states), Gray.

Causes:

Sectional rivalry; moral indignation aroused by fear of extending slavery into new territories; disagreement over Federal Control and States Rights; election of Abraham Lincoln; secession of South Carolina followed by six states.

Chronology:

1861: Apr 12, Confed Gen P G T Beauregard orders fire on Fed troops at Ft Sumter, SC; July 21, First Battle of Bull Run is won by Confederacy, now 11 states strong, first of string of victories.

1862: Pres Lincoln drafts Emancipation Proclamation.

1863: Disastrous Gettysburg Campaign in Penn.

1864: Gen Sherman's March through Georgia to the sea.

1865: Apr 9, Lee surrenders to Grant at Appomattox; Apr 15: Pres Lincoln assassinated.


Results:

Cpt. Benjamin Wagner

Cpt Benjamin Rice Wagner, b 1830, married Elizabeth Hitt 1862, was wounded in Civil War and carried the wound the rest of his life; because of injury, was placed in charge of rebel prisoners. On trip South for exchange of prisoners, he heard an audible whisper calling, "Ben, Ben, don't you know me?" It was his starved emaciated brother Nehemiah. Cpt Ben, a large man, lifted his brother and carried him to home and health. In 1874 Cpt Wagner and sons, Howard and Walter (for whom Wagner is named) moved to Bon Homme County, where he was active in public service and farming. He and his wife are both buried in Tyndall Cemetery.





History

Foes:

Spain vs. the United States.

Causes:

Cuban patriots demand independence from Spain; guerrilla warfare causes heavy losses of US investments; US recognizes Cuban importance to projected Panama Canal.

Chronology: (All 1898)

Feb 15: Sinking of USS Maine in Havana Habor.

Apr 24: Responding to US demand to withdraw from Cuba, Spain declares war on US.

May 1: Commodore Dewey defeats Spanish fleet in Manila Harbor in Philippines.

May 28: US establishes blockade of Santiago de Cuba; 4 days later Spanish fleet is destroyed in escape attempt.

July 1: US troops, including Rough Riders under Theodore Roosevelt, engage in heavy fighting at El Canay and San Juan Hill.

July 17: Santiago is captured, effectively ending war.

Aug 12: Armistice is signed followed Dec 10 by Treaty of Paris.

Results:

Cuba remains under US tutelage; Puerto Rico, Guam are ceded to US, Philippines are surrendered to US for \$20 million, precipitating Philippines War (Feb 1899-July 1902).

World War I (1914-1918)

History

Foes:

Allies (France, Britain, Russia, US) vs. Central Powers (Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey).

Causes:

June 28, 1914: Archduke Francis Ferdinand of Austria-Hungary is assassinated by Serbian. Austria-Hungary retaliates by declaring war on Serbia. Others follow quickly. On Western Front, Germany approaches English Channel after smashing through Belgium to Paris. Major battles of Marne, Ypres with grueling trench warfare and poison gas attacks inflict huge casualties on Allies in 1916 at Verdun and in Somme Offensive. Germany succeeds on Eastern Front against Russia while Austria is tied up in Italy. Sinking of Lusitania May 7, 1915, by German sub threatens US neutrality.

Chronology:

June 1917: Gen Pershing leads American Expeditionary Force at Chateau-Thiery.

Mar 1918: New Soviet government signs Treaty of Brest-Litovsk with Central Powers; Germans are stopped short of Paris in 2nd Battle of Marne; an Allied counteroffensive succeeds; disintegrating Turkish and Austro-Hungarian empires surrender, as does Bulgaria.

Nov 11, 1918: A chastened Germany signs armistice.

Results:

"Last Great War" was one of bloodiest in history, but not a single decisive battle was million waged. Sixty-five served, ten million were killed. double that number wounded

World War II (1941-45)

History

Foes:

Allies (Great Britian, US, Soviet Union) vs Axis Powers (Germany, Japan, Italy).

Causes:

Benito Mussolini, dictator of Italy, conquers Ethiopa in 1936; in 1938, Munich Pact sacrifices Czechoslovakia to Germany.

Chronology:

1939: Germany invades Poland; France and Britain declare war on Germany.

1940: Germany occupies Norway and Denmark; sweeps through Low Countries to English Channel; France surrenders June 22; Battle of Britain rages Aug-Oct; Axis land operations continue in North Africa; Greece and Yugoslovakia are occupied.

June 22, 1941: Germany invades Soviet Union; Dec 7, Japan attacks Pearl Harbor, bringing US into war.

1942: Japan conquers Philippines, many islands, all of Southeast Asia; Mar 11, Gen Douglas McCarthur leaves Philippines for Australia, vowing "I shall return," (he does, nearly three years later); Germany reaches Stalingrad and the Caucasus; Gen Rommel seems about to take Cairo; German subs severely damage Allied shipping; Allies rally as British Gen Montgomery routs Rommel in North Africa; US troops land in Algeria; Allies conquer Sicily and South Italy.

In the Pacific, Japanese bombard Corregidor, force surrender in May of 10,000 US and Philippine troops; troops captured on Bataan undergo brutal death march to prison camp; US wins naval battles of Coral Sea and Midway, lands on Guadalcanal, begins island-hopping strategy.

1943: Italy surrenders in Sept; Germans surrender at Stalingrad followed by Soviet offensive in Poland, Hungary, Balkans.

1944: German submarine fleet is virtually destroyed; Germans resist stubbornly in North Italy, especially Cassino, Anzio; Gen George Patton, Cmdr of 3rd Army, spearheads liberation of France and (1945) defeat of Germany; final Allied campaign begins June 6, 1944, with Normany landing, in Aug in South France, liberating Belgium and France, advancing into Netherlands, Germany; heavy allied bombing destroys German industrial centers; Germans stage last-ditch counterattack in Ardennes.

1945: Marines take Iwo Jima Feb-Mar at great cost; Russians conquer East Germany to Oder R; Western allies break through Siegfrid Line Mar 7, cross Rhine, overrun West Germany. In Apr, Hitler commits suicide; May 7, Germany surrenders; Soviet Union declares war on Japan; US forces retake Corregidor; in Aug, Pres. Truman orders atomic bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Japan surrenders Aug 14.

Military Cemeteries Overseas

By the end of the WW II, several hundred temporary cemeteries had been established by the American Graves Registration Service, US Army. From 1947-54 that service repatriated remains of 171,000 (61% of recovered bodies). Remaining were given final interment in 14 foreign sites selected in 1947. All were on the continent except one in Cambridge, England and one near Manila, Philippines. Others maintained by Dept of Army are in Honolulu, Puerto Rico and Sitka, Alaska, Locations reflect the progress of military operations.





are established. When North Korea
invades South Korea, UN authorizes member nations to aid South
Korea. Gen Douglas McCarthur
commands UN forces until 1951
when he is replaced by Gen Matthew B Ridgway.

Chronology:

June 27, 1950: Pres Truman sends US forces; Chinese Communist forces join North Korean army; fighting begins around 38th Parallel.

1951: Negotiations for cease-fire begin at Panmunjon.

July 27, 1953: Cease-fire achieved; armistice is signed.

Results:


Inconclusive; hostilities continue for decades; however communism is contained in Asia. Price: 37,000 US killed, 8,000 MIAs.

Korean Era experiences

Tribune news...May 1, 1952: Cpl Dale A Stewart, heavy equipment operator, is currently serving with the 116th Engr Combat Bn, an Idaho National Guard unit which arrived in Korea Feb 1951. This unit is supporting X Corps on the muddy Korean front. Stewart, who left the US Dec 1951, operates a large caterpillar tractor.

Tribune news...May 1, 1952: Cpl Melvin Simek and Lt Robert Pokorny unexpectedly met while shopping in the main PX at Camp Kokura. Simek writes that Pokorny, a medical officer attached to a battalion aid station, hopes to leave Korea in May. Simek is a mortician in the laboratory at Camp Kokura.

S/Sgt Darrel Schuurmans learned first hand about continuous summer daylight and winter darkness while stationed at an air installation site on Fire Island in Cook Inlet, Alaska in 1951-52. In charge of maintenance, he remembers clearing the air strip of icebergs which washed up during high tide and using tunnels to get around the 3x5 mile porkchop-shaped site.

Vietnam War (1954-1975) - Vietnam Era (1961-1990)

The Vietnam War 1954-1975

Foes:

North Vietnamese Communistled guerrillas (Viet Cong) vs. South Vietnam Nationalist government.

Causes:

Following France's defeat in French Indo-China War (1946-54), Geneva Conference, 1954, divides Vietnam into North Vietnam and South Vietnam.

Chronology:

1961: US supplies support troops to South Vietnam.

1964: Following Tonkin Gulf Resolution, war quickly escalates.

1968: Tet Offensive is major defeat for Viet Cong; however, opposition to war increases in US as 550,000 American troops by now have been involved.

1969: Pres Nixon orders increased bombing and begins troop withdrawal.

1973: Cease-fire agreement signed in Paris allows US troops to withdraw.

1975: War finally ends with Communist rout of South Vietnam Army, leading to reunification 1976.

Results:

Inconclusive. US ends economic embargo in exchange for Vietnam's aid in search for missing American servicemen.



A different kind of war...



Clark Mola, THS 1961, earned an honor awarded to few, the Distinguished Flying Cross, for "heroism while participating in aerial flight in the Republic of Vietnam April 5, 1968," during combat operations in the Hue area. Mola was helicopter pilot for Command and Control Group Co C 1st Bn 501st Inf which in contact with a reinforced North Vietnamese unit had sustained 11 wounded.

Proceeding to the battle area and ignoring intense enemy fire in the landing zone area, W/O Mola landed without damage each of three trips. "His skillful piloting contributed immeasurably to the successful evacuation, enabling the unit to continue its mission without further loss of life."

Persian Gulf War - Desert Shield - Operation Desert Storm (1991)

History

Foes:

Coalition of US, Britain, Egypt, France, Saudi Arabia, others vs.

Events leading to war:

Aug 1990: Iraq invades, annexes Kuwait; UN calls for Iraq to withdraw; embargoes trade.

Chronology:

Jan 1991: massive air attack on Iraqi radar station: USS Louisville launches cruise missiles; ground unit engages Iraqis; Battle of Khafji begins.

Feb: US Special Forces infiltrate Iraq; ground attack begins in Kuwait and Irag; Iragi Scud missile explosion in Dhahran kills 28; battles of 73 Easting, Norfolk, Medina Ridge precede cease fire: troops begin returning stateside.

Apr 6: War formally ends. US casualties are 146 KIA, 235 nonhostile deaths, 467 wounded, 20 POWs (all released); peak US strength 541,425.

Results:

Ten years later Saddam Hussein remains firmly in power.

Persian Gulf memories



Anessa Mola Van Osdel's 730th Med Co SD National Guard based at Vermillion was activated Nov 1990 and very shortly entered Desert Shield in Saudi Arabia. They first supplied med support for the 2nd ACR (Armored Cav Reg) in Iraq and Kuwait. In April, the unit set up treatment areas for injured Iraqi soldiers and refugees (see photo at left). The 730th returned May 1991.

A Saudi experience...(excerpt) "We knew the air war had begun," Sgt Jean Beringer recalled as the gas alarm and din of aircraft awakened her in mid-Jan 1991. An RN at 8th



Evac Hospital near Dhahran, she began helping patients don their MOPP suits. The hospital handled 650 inpatients, 177 enemy POWs and 15,000 outpatients the five months Beringer served there.

Springfield Army National Guard (1956-1994)

The Springfield Unit of the SD Army National Guard was organized Oct 29, 1956 as Co D 137th Engr Bn with 31 men signing the initial morning report. Shortly after, 60 men, many of them Tyndall area WW II veterans, reported under the command of Cpt Robert P Monfore and Plt Leader Lt Elmer E Gemar. In 1958, when Joe Foss was governor, an armory was constructed at Southern State Teachers College in Springfield as a joint facility.

The unit underwent reorganization and redesignation as 153rd Co D Jan 4, 1968 with Cpt Elmer Gemar as commander along with five officers and 137 enlisted men. Besides its role in maintaining national defense, the local unit assisted with many Bon Homme Co and South Dakota projects, using its unique engineering skills. In 1989 the 153rd received the prestigious national Itschner Award for Outstanding Service. Unexpectedly, in early June 1994, Major Gen Harold J Sykora, Adj Gen SD National Guard, sent word that the Springfield unit was to be deactivated, its 83 members to be given

the opportunity to retire or be absorbed into other units. This occurred in Jan 1994, much to the dismay of many area men and women who had been loyal members and supporters of the unit.



Six sons bring honor

Six sons of John A. and Mary Benesh Cole, respected Tyndall farmers, reaped the benefits of their parents' foresight in sending them as youths in the 30s to Citizens Military Training Camp. The three month summer program qualified them as commissioned officers in the reserves and may have helped them survive the long years of WW II. Mrs. Cole was honored as the third mother in the nation to have five officer sons in that war. All continued until retirement in active or reserve careers.



Cletus Cole, THS 1928, entered the Army in May 1942 and at discharge 1946 was Lt Col. He served with the Amph Tractor Bn in the Pacific, and made three landings participating in combat at Saipan and Tinian. Among awards earned was the Bronze Arrowhead for assault landing June 15, 1944, in the Marianas. Deceased.



Vitalis Cole, THS 1930, as 2nd Lt in 1934 directed a black CCC in MO; taught rural schools four years; was called to active service May 1941; assigned to the new Ft. Leonard, MO; after transfer to Air Force and intensive flight training, flew over 500 hours in anti-sub patrol in Panama; was reassigned to China as air-ground

support to Chinese Army recovering Burma Rd; reenlisted 1946, served in Alaska, Pentagon, before retiring as Lt Col in 1961 and teaching ROTC at South Dakota State.



Firmin Cole, THS 1932, was needed on the farm and was last to enlist. "He wasn't going to be left behind," his brother Hilary said. Firmin served in England in Army Ordnance, repairing tanks used in the African campaign and preparing them for the D-Day landing.



Nester Cole, THS 1933, entered the Air Force as 2nd Lt in May 1939, commanded units in Panama (brother Vic was in one); tallied 10,000 hours in 13 types of aircraft before ending a distinguished career as Colonel Nov 1959, He recalled crash landing a B-18 in Central America while on anti-sub patrol and being res-

cued by Vic and crew; successfully deadstick landing after catching his own ricocheted bullet in his belly while piloting a P-51. Duty assignments after war included Texas, California, Arizona, Okinawa. Deceased.



John Cole, THS 1934, entered the Army USAR Inf Aug 25, 1940, as 2nd Lt. A pioneer in parachuting, he was in Latin America before WW II; went directly to Pacific Theater; made first combat jump in New Guinea; contracted malaria, later became instructor at Fort Benning. His final assignment before discharge as Lt Col in 1959 was with (Res) 5th US Army Hq.



Hilary Cole, THS 1938, soloed two months after joining the Air Force in 1941; was commissioned May 1942; flew 65 missions from England as A-20 flight leader of 9th AF "Famous 416th," bombing strategic sites, making D-Day run. He earned Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal w/12 Bronze Oak Clusters. After retiring as Lt Col 1949, he joined

National Guard at Sioux Falls, was recalled in 1951 and sent to jet school.

In Memory of Rudolph Pavel

Tyndall Tribune Dec 12, 1918: (excerpts)

On Sunday afternoon a memorial service under the auspices of the Red Cross was held in the Opera House* in honor of Rudolph Pavel, the first soldier from this community to be killed in action...

The Home Guards were out in uniform, lending a military atmosphere to the meeting.

Pavel was born on the farm near this city...was a faithful member of the Bohemian Presbyterian Church and truly a Christian soldier.

In the fierce struggle of Oct 12 when the Americans were storming strong hill and forest positions, Rudolph received his mortal wound. His brother Frank saw him fall. Rudolph was hurried to a hospital where his case proved hopeless and he died after a few days.

Fred C Lang KIA

T/Sgt Fred Christ Lang, son of Mr and Mrs Fred Lang, THS Class of 1939, died in battle Sept 14, 1944, age 24, father of two, one he had never seen. He was sent overseas at Christmas time, 1943; wounded May 14, 1944, from a hit by a mine sweeper in southern Italy and again early in August and died on a rugged slope of the North Appenine Mts. in Italy during the struggle to break through the heavily fortified Gothic (Green) Line.

When both platoon leaders became disabled, Sgt Lang assumed leadership of two leading platoons of the 338th Inf Reg, 85th "Custer" Div, 5th Army, in a desperate attempt to scale the unprotected bare crags of Monte Altuzzo. After aggressively repelling counterattacks but disabled by a malfunctioning radio, Lang sent messengers to the command post below requesting desperately needed ammunition and support. Finally descending himself and while he and the commanding officer lay stretched out on the ground, he was struck in the head by a rifle bullet, thus becoming one of nearly 300 casualties the 338th suffered in the five-day battle to take and hold Altuzzo.

For gallantry in action with Lt Gen Mark W Clark's 5th Army, he was posthumously awarded the Silver Star and Purple Heart.

Col Joseph A Plihal began a 30-year military career in ROTC at SD State College where he excelled in track and football as he had at THS (Class of 1930) and later in pro football. Although a graduate engineer, the only slot in the military was infantry, finally Signal Corp. After the Air Force became a separate entity, he transferred; served as Signal Officer of IX Air Force Tact Depot, Omaha Beach; served in Berlin Air Lift and Occupation Army in Germany before retiring Jan 1, 1964. A



modest man, only his numerous medals tell a story he would not. After 11 years at USD-S at Springfield teaching electronics, he died Nov 5, 1988.



PFC Julis Bauder, 3/27/42-10/24/45, served with Co C 64th ARMD Inf Bn, later MP Plattoon 90th Inf Div in Normandy, Northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland, European-African-Middle Eastern theaters, earning the Bronze Star Meritorious and Bronze Arrowhead.

Major John A Ptak KIA

John "Katy" Ptak began his military career as one of three top-ranking ROTC cadets at USD where he also excelled in basketball and track. Following his commission as 2nd Lt Feb 1941, he served with the 1st Marine Div in Iceland 8 1/2 months.

Jan 23, 1943, as Company Officer of Co "E" and Bn, 9th Marines, he embarked for SW Pacific. In Oct he was named commanding officer at Camp Tetere, Gualdalcanal and participated in landings at Efate, New Hebrides. In Jan 1944 he joined Hq Co, 1st Bn 3rd Marines and as Bn Exec Officer of Cocoanut Grove, Tetere, Guadalcanal British Solomon Islands, he saw action in some of the toughest Marine drives. He met his untimely death on Guam Island, Marianas Aug 1, 1944.



Best friends in THS (and at USD), Howard Taplett (1939), Robert Taplett (1936), Ray Ptak (1940) and John Ptak (1936).

Stephen John "Huck" Srstka KIA

Stephen Srstka began active duty in the South Pacific with the 2nd Armored Amph Bn, 2nd Marine Div, April 10, 1944. He was wounded June 15, 1944, in the initial landing on Saipan. When his amphibian was disabled by enemy shell fire, he voluntarily assumed duties as loader of another amphibian in his sector whose crew had suffered extremely heavy losses. His cool determination and bravery were an inspiration to his comrades, meriting him the Bronze Star medal.

THS classmates remember him for his speaking abilities (including Boys State Supreme Court), his Boy Scout work and his skill on the football field.

Noncombat horror story with a happy ending!

T/Sgt Joe Fuchs attended the private Curtiss Wright Aeronautical Univ in Chicago, one of 400 cadets in a 4 1/2 month course to become crew chiefs or head mechanics at Army Air Corps flying fields. His training served him well at an 8th AF base 20 miles from the English Channel as Flight Test Engineer on combatweary B-24 bombers in need of repair.

June 7, 1944, he was assigned to fly on one which had been stripped to transport men and supplies to Belgium, Most on-board soldiers had not flown before and knew only they were to fill in where infantry was needed. Shortly after takeoff, one tugged on Joe's leg at his elevated position on the flight deck, stating that gas was pouring all over. Joe jumped down with flashlight and tool kit to discover and tighten a loose gas line clamp connecting one wing tank to another. "No Smoking!" Joe counseled emphatically. Plane and cargo unloaded successfully in Belgium and returned safely.



Fuchs served with the 844th Air Engr Sqd 418th Air Service Group, 8th Army Air Force 1942-45 in England, France and Belgium.

"It was something to see..."

"San Juan Assists in the Liberation of POWs."

"Yesterday (29 Aug 1945) several members of the ship's company had the rare privilege of seeing one of the most beautiful sights that man has the honor to see. To state the fact, 'Several hundred POWs (1,300) were liberated from the Tokyo area yesterday,' is a masterpiece of understatement. These men were given freedom. That was the magic of it, the precious thing that this war has been fought for...

"...It was something to see, that oddly clothed cheering crowd proudly holding aloft the secretly made flags of the US, Great Britain and Dutch...those four years of waiting, wanting, starvation and imminent touch of ever-pending death was gone in a flash--really gone...no more stealing food, cigarettes, any little comfort that was so highy treasured...

"There was a strange bond between them. They were a little worried about being separated from the members of that strange little society...They will miss that mass ingenuity of their little band of freedom loving souls."

--Cpt. Ralph Berry after assisting in transferring ill POWs from Omari Prison Camp to the hospital ship USS Benevolence. Berry Brothers continue medical tradition

Col Wilbur C Berry, MD, US Army and brother CPT Ralph B Berry, MD, US Navy, were born to long-time Tyndall doctor Sherman G and Nettie Barber Berry. Wilbur (THS 1927) and Ralph (THS 1928) both attended USD and Creighton Med School, graduating there in 1935 after working as railroad burns to help pay their way. Both had distinguished careers in the military, retiring in 1965, Wilbur to San Francisco and Ralph to Hawaii.

When WW II began, Wilbur was stationed in the Philippines with Gen Jonathan Wright at Corregidor, working in Hospital "2" located in a tunnel. When Corregidor surrendered Apr 9, 1942, the troops became part of the Bataan Death March from Mariveles to San Fernando 65 miles away. In all, 76,000 American and Filipino POWs were bound, beaten or killed by their Japanese captors. Only 56,000 survived but thousands more died from malnutrition and disease.

Wilbur was incarcerated in several camps in the Philippines before being transported to Japan on one of the death ships (used as protection for Japanese warships - sadly many were sunk by US forces). Near starvation existed to the point where cockroaches were considered a luxury for their protein. After liberation Sept 4, 1945, from Honshu, Wilbur returned highly decorated to a hero's welcome in San Francisco, where he was reunited with his wife and daughters Peggy (Sutherlin, who contributed this story) and Patsy.

When WW II began, Ralph was stationed at Naval Air Station, San Diego. In 1944, he joined the USS San Juan as Senior Med Officer assigned to the first relief party ashore off Tokyo to rescue allied POWs. Also highly decorated, he received commendations for having participated in five major campaigns on board USS San Juan for work in evacuation of POWs and for work during Korean War.






Cpt Ralph Berry, left, and Col Wilbur Berry, following their father in medicine, made the military their careers.

2nd Lt Marcel Novotny KIA

Marcel Novotny endured seven months of heavy action in France and Germany, beginning immediately after his arrival in Oct 1944. Promoted to 2nd Lt on the battlefield, he received a Bronze Star for gallantry in the six week Vosges Mts Campaign in Eastern France, particularly for his leadership in the successful attack and containment of the enemy-held town of Lemberg.

Novotny earned the Silver Star in Jan 1945 for his gallantry through continuing fire which

resulted in securing the objective against counterattack. Later, in April, on the day he died, he again exhibited his aggressive style of leadership in the vicinity of Bielstein Germany by personally advancing forward of his men to draw fire, thereby enabling the platoon to complete its defensive positions and eventually repulse the attack. His wife Catherine, whose letters provided this information. received an Oak Leaf Cluster to the Silver Star, awarded posthumously.




Japanese descend a broom-painted white plane with Red Cross emblem in a surrender ceremony in the Pacific, 1945. (donor, Leo Hisek)

Lester R Arneson KIA

Lester Arneson had no opportunity for a furlough after induction in the Army in 1942. He participated in the Oran North African campaign with the 47th Inf Reg until its conclusion. A truck driver, he was transferred to the foot troops just before the invasion of Sicily where he died in his buddy Erwen Thoreson's arms Aug 9, 1943, at 9 a.m. Excerpts of a poem written in Lester's memory by PFC Thoreson follow.

Battle days were dreary as I looked death in the face 'twas then Christ came into my heart to fill that hollow place

to fill that hollow place

I had a loving buddy who was a gruesome sight. He was blown to bits beside me in the top heat of the fight.


I did the best to aid him as I stroked his childish brow. He just closed his eyes and murmured.

Loyd and Stella Jordan

Loyd and Stella Jordan will always remember Dec 7, 1941. On their Hawaiian honeymoon, he was just off guard duty and in breakfast line at the Immigration Center in Honolulu and she at military housing at Schofield Barracks.

Stella and Loyd were married Nov 12, the day she arrived in Hawaii after an uncomfortable five-day voyage. He soon returned to his barracks and she began work in child care and as maid for a major's wife, living in a small bungalow nearby.

The Jordans both saw planes overhead, unusual on Sunday. Soon realization hit, soldiers scrambled to duty amid the smoke and confusion and women and children hurried by bus to a school shelter. Military families were evacuated Christmas Day and it was to be four years before the couple was reunited.

Loyd's unit, the 25th Inf began island-hopping, including the fiery hell hole of Guadalcanal. He was wounded on Georgia, hospitalized in New Zealand, but returned to duty.

The Jordans farmed near Tyndall while their children Dennis (1964) and Linda (1968) attended THS.

Charles Skorpik, US Navy

Charles entered the Navy Jan 1942 and after boot camp was assigned to and remained on the newly commissioned USS South Dakota. This most decorated US battleship was involved in battles at Guadalcanal, where it took 44 hits; the Philippines and Marshall Islands; at the British naval base Scapa Flow in the North Atlantic where with sister ship USS Alabama it circled the Arctic Circle north of Norway for six months pursuing and destroying German battleships.

Skorpik remembered "the ship was on the go all the time," that the limited food supply often contained insects, that a watch-repair hobby helped fill long hours. Considering himself lucky, however, he had switched from search rescue to fire fighter just two days before a bomb killed his replacement along with 14 others of the rescue squadron.

Up until his death, Charlies delighted in attending reunions at the USS South Dakota Memorial in Sioux Falls reliving memories with former crew members.



Lloyd Hovorka's Bronze Star arrives 40 years late

Soon after Lloyd Hovorka left his farm near Tyndall in 1943, he began to experience hazardous wartime conditions in many unfamiliar places in a four year one month two day odyssey. As member of the 2nd Inf 7th Div US Army, his military career took him island hopping in some of the toughest fighting in WW II. Along with driving caterpillar on road jobs, his main job turned out to be transporting supplies, ammunition and the wounded by truck and jeep.

From the cold rugged island of Attu, Aleutians, his unit went to Ryukyu, a small island, like Attu heavily fortified, which took five days to secure. "There wasn't a coconut tree left standing," he recalled, "but Leyte was the toughest." During the final assault Easter morning 1945 on the beaches of Okinawa, he delivered a load of ammunition in darkness through areas crawling with Japanese. Lloyd returned to Spokane Oct 1945 with \$300 in his pocket and so glad to get home, he hitchhiked the last 30 miles. It was 40 years later, however, before he received the Bronze Star "for meritorious achievement...in the Asian-Pacific Theater of Operations."

Fridrich suspects "fresh eggs for breakfast!"

Fresh eggs for breakfast Oct 14, 1943, alerted the B-17 crew that something was up. Briefing explained to joined crews of the 94th Bomb Group in England what to do if captured during the second bombing of a ball-bearing plant in Schweinfurt.

Maurice Fridrich was about to depart on his 7th and last mission with the 10-man crew of "Spare Parts." After German fighters and ground fire crippled the plane, the pilot gave the order to bail out and Fridrich, after his first-ever parachute jump during which he lost his sheepskin boots, began a 10-day 120-mile hike toward the Rhine River. Hiding by day and without food, he finally appropriated a bicycle but was captured almost within sight of safety.

At Stalag Luft I, his Slavic language background helped secure duty with Russian guards who were issued rifles not only to prevent prisioners from leaving but also to prevent starving people, many who were former slaves of the Germans, from entering. German guards and citizenry had left for fear of marauding Mongolian Russians in the countryside who had no fear as they themselves were cannon fodder.

Early in May evacuation through Barth to a nearby airfield began. Space for freed prisoners had to be guarded from Germans who also wished to flee. For three days B-17s with motors running landed and loaded evacuees, delivering them to Rheims, France, then to Camp Lucky Strike, a tent city for recovered allied military personnel, and eventually home.

Frank Base writes home

"We wear our helmets and light suntan uniforms which have a neat appearance. I look like Frank Buck," Base writes to his family from Luzon Nov 30, 1941, where he was serving with a med detachment prior to capture and imprisonment by the Japanese.

"We have been issued helmets, gas masks, war paraphernalia...to be ready in a minute's notice...Even if it comes to war, you can figure I am safe because my job is not dangerous or hazardous."

147th FA Bat E (Yankton)

In late Nov 1940 orders were cut for SD's National Guard to mobilize and report for full time duty. The unit embarked on the USS Holbrook, and after a stop in Hawaii, left Dec 1, 1941, for Australia, the first Americans to visit. On full war alert, they affectionately became known as the "Bushwhackers." The unit "island-hopped" in the South Pacific, gaining many honors and much respect. (Other locals in the unit included Alois Broz, Charles Cokely, Norman Schuett, others?).

Donald "Butch" Colgan writes...

(from Australia to Tyndall Tribune, thanking the Legion for sending records to play)

While sympathizing with news of boys "who are having things sort of rough, things here (Australia) have always been interesting if not enjoyble." He suggests that by piecing information together in an article by Ring Lardner in *Newsweek*, hometowners might get a good picture of what has happened to us..." He went so far as to say they were the first American veterans of this war.

Butch enlisted in 147th Fld Art in 1940, had 5 years service, Purple Heart w/Oak Leaf Cluster, seven overseas stripes.

Cpt. Leon Scoblic writes ...

(to his aunt Mrs. FM Scoblic Nov 27, 1941, from the US Army Transport Willard A Holbrook)

"There are 240 men down here below the water level in a room 40x60x10...we don't have any fresh air...bunks are stacked four high, top one against the ceiling and bottom one six inches off the floor. We can see lights of Honolulu...When we leave here we will travel in convoy...only eight knots an hour, due to a slow freighter which will be with us."

Scoblic was a member of the 147th, and like most, spent five Christmases away.

Trevillyan in Korean waters...

Jacques Trevillyan, THS 1945, Annapolis 1950, (photo below), served his first assignment on the heavy cruiser USS Rochester off the coast of Korea, in the plotting room for the ship's "8" guns. "As far as seeing everything with my own eyes, I might as well have tied up at Lake Tyndall!" he wrote to a friend. Although a close call damaged the portside amidships, the Rochester continued to provide fire support to Robert Taplett's Marine unit during the Inchon invasion and later suported the evacuation of the Marines from the Chosin Reservoir. Of Taplett, "the Marines regard him 'as one of the true heroes in the Corps.' mighty high praise since the Marines have never been short of heroes."



Peter Monfore KIA

Peter Monfore was an unabashed Christian soldier, reading his Bible daily, leading his men in prayers, constantly bringing hope and encouragement to the men of "L" (Love) Co. He died in Korea Sept 19, 1951, from a bullet to his heart on Heartbreak Hill No. 851, a short time after writing his brother Bob, "Somehow I feel that the Lord wants me to stay over here...Why, I don't know but I know I'll be in his will."

Pete wrote of extreme cold in Nov 1950, water freezing in the canteen cup while brushing teeth, ROKs freezing to death in foxholes and how he slept out in a sleeping bag to experiment with different ways to keep warm. The following summer, however, he wrote of the havoc constant rain created, keeping their "holes" wet and how he built a bunk off the ground to keep out of the water.

Monfore had already earned one Purple Heart and the prestigious French Croix de Guerre for leadership in rescuing an encircled French battalion. He was posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

Pete, who lived with his parents and siblings in Tyndall in the early 1940s, graduated from West Point in 1950. He not only was an honor student but also for two years Eastern Intercollegiate light heavyweight boxing champion. Pete was the son of Gertrude and Howland Monfore, WW I veteran who himself had earned four battle ribbons in France.

Brother Robert, Springfield HS 1946, attended OCS School in 1947, became a paratrooper with the Airborne Div, served three tours in Korea, one before, one during and one in 1968-70, as well as duty in Vietnam. He retired from the Army in 1973 as Colonel after 27 1/2 years in the service.

Anthony Chastka POW writes...

(Excerpts) "The military portion of my life is a little difficult to remember but..." (edited) drafted in 1943, sent to Texas to 86th Div; entered ASTP to train as engineer; returned to Army as PVT in Co I 335th Inf 84th Div; landed in Europe July 1944 with 335th; moved toward front near Aachen, Germany; lived foxhole lives, moved at night; in October the few of us who survived disastrous campaign in point position toward Cologne surrended; were moved in boxcars to Stalag IIA north of Berlin; walked around North Germany several months to avoid Russian army; sent to Danish border for medical treatment April 1945; freed May 3 by Canadians; were treated well, invited to lunch with them as Russian officers arrived on motorcycles; traveled through France home.

Cruel winter in Korea...

Col Robert Taplett's 3rd Bn, 5th Marine Reg had a mission. It was to clear a road along the Chosin Reservoir so that Allied Forces, outnumbered 5-1 by the Chinese, could retreat without being annihilated. The cruelest winter in a century with 40 degrees below zero common was the worst enemy. Insufficient warming tents, frostbitten noses and ears, rubberized boots filled with frozen perspiration, short rations (frozen pineapple juice and Tootsie Rolls) and constant combat Nov 27-

Dec caused enormous casualties. Of roughly 1,300 men, 326 remained effective.

Some considered the situation a result of a blunder by Gen Douglas McArthur, who had disregarded China's threat of intervention and sent his men across the 38th parallel in a race to the Yalu River border.

A fellow survivor spoke glowingly of Taplett's leadership. Unafraid to question orders he thought were wrong, he nevertheless earned the Navy Cross and two Silver Stars.

In an article published in *USA Today* June 23, 2000, the retired Marine (1960), who suffers nerve damage resulting from frostbite, said, "I hope and pray the North Korean leadership is sincere because the people there have suffered enough."

In WW II Taplett (THS 1936) spent 31 months on the USS Salt Lake City in the Pacific and two years on Guam.



A D-Day story...

Leonard Lange entered the Army 5/7/42. Assigned to 81st Chemical Mortar Bn, D Co, extensive training preceded a nerve-wracking 5day sail to England on the unescorted Queen Elizabeth and eight more months of assault training near Ilfracombe North Devon England. His Bn, now attached to 1st Inf. spent 96 hours in the English Channel before landing on Omaha Beach. One week later after continuous bloody action Leonard's company had cleared the way for the 175th Inf through Moon-Sun-Elle.

The 81st was one of six US outfits honored for outstanding gallantry on D-Day. Lange's awards included Bronze Service Arrowhead, many others.

Slavik experiences "suicide fleet"...

RM 2/c George Slavik, THS 1942, learned firsthand about the "Jap Suicide Fleet." Shortly after Christmas 1944, his LST, along with others making up a tractor group, made their way into Lingayan Gulf, Luzon, after practicing for the real invasion of Leyte. Among the many small crafts in the area, the lookout paid little attention to a flimsy plywood boat pulling



alongside until the Japanese crew of three or four were able to drop several depth bombs. The craft did not get away but the LST lost one, counted 48 wounded and suffered heavy damage. The ship managed to reach shore and after some repair, limped back stateside to the repair yards. Slavik, left, surveving the damaged bulkhead, was recommended for the Commendation Ribbon for rescuing bodies and for fire fighting. He also received a Navy award for heroic action after his minesweeper. USS the Spectacle, was hit by a Japanese suicide plane off Okinawa, May 1945, (from Flood Tide, Vol 4 No 15. Aug 15, 1945)

Van Gerpen wears many hats...

Lt Col Bill Van Gerpen, who grew up in rural Avon and graduated from USD-S, has since 1982 served as chaplain both in the US AFR and as Wing Chaplain of the 185th Fighter Wing, Sioux City, IA. In this capacity he trains mobilized personnel in religious customs and culture of foreign countries, and counsels military families experiencing medical and personal crises. Upcoming duties include, besides serving both as pastor of Tyndall Baptist Church and as SD State Representative, he will lead a national defense seminar in Washington DC assigned to develop strategy for responding to international crises. During his Air Force career he traveled to Germany where his assignment earned him "Best Officer and Airmen Evaluation Program," and "Best Personnel Office in the Air Force, 1976."

War plants provided an opportunity to serve...

When the US was drawn into WW II and men went off to war, war plants depended upon women. Three Slama sisters, Elsie (Charlie Skorpik) front left; Viola (Don Pesek) back left; Evelyn (Ed Stibral) back right and Irene Vavruska (Ray Herman) moved to Omaha to work on B-29s in the sprawling brand-new Martin Bomber Plant. Already there was Libby Pavlish, who had completed a five-week course in aircraft training. Elsie bent brackets (and lost her arm to the elbow in a press machine) while Viola and a partner checked radio lines from front to back.

A friend, Mabel Sutera, worked at Firestone Rubber Co in Los Angeles, CA where employees installed many layers of rubberized material over airplane gas tanks to make them bulletproof. She also worked as inspector in the sheet metal division of the cavernous Douglas Aircraft Plant, El Segundo.

Nearly all would soon be in the armed forces. 






Military notes from history...

Old Military Road

The first military to appear in Bon Homme County were soldiers from Ft. Randall who protected supply trains and travelers on the Old Military Road which stretched 160 miles west from Sioux City to the fort. The trail passed east-west about four miles south of Tyndall.

Dakota Cavalry

In 1862, the US Secretary of War authorized Dakota Cavalry Units A and B in Bon Homme County Dakota Territory in response to the Sioux Indian War in Minnesota. Many male citizens living in or near Bon Homme Village joined either "A" under Nelson Miner or "B" under Wm Tripp. Most eventually left the area, but one, Wm W Warford remained in Bon Homme and is buried in the Bon Homme National Cemetery. Close by lies GAR soldier J Delaney whom Warford is said to have killed in a barroom brawl in the village in 1862.



Custer's 7th Cavalry


Six troops from Gen George Custer's Cavalry died along Snatch Creek two miles north of Bon Homme in April 1873 (at the oxbow alongside Highway 52) while Custer waited for high water to recede. In 1893 the remains were exhumed and reinterred in Bon Homme Cemetery. A monument there simply states "In Memory of Six Unknown Soldiers Buried Here."

GAR veteran **John Valentine**, who is buried in Tyndall Cemetery, lived for many years in a small house in north Tyndall which the city had condemned as "unfit for human occupancy!"



US troops may have crossed the Atlantic in 1917 in slow troop ships like the USS AEOLUS captured on a picture belonging to WW I veteran John Berndt.

One-time Tyndall barber John E Souhrada, husband of Lois Glenn (THS 1925), enlisted in 1914 in the army then based in the Philippines. He was a charter member of the 31st Inf which served in Siberia in WW I.

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

Parting Thoughts

The editor trusts that this memorial book will be well received, even with its inevitable omissions and mistakes. Thanks are due to Bon Homme County Veterans Officer Rich Beringer for his aid in compiling veterans lists, and especially to Bob Hajek for his many hours arranging, checking over and over and finalizing lists of 1,173 veterans and more than 600 donors.

It may be of interest to know how the names appearing on the memorial were selected. Those automatically included were the following:

All known Civil War and Spanish American War veterans buried in Tyndall Cemetery and St. Leo Catholic Cemetery;

All known WW I veterans in Tyndall Cemetery, St. Leo Cemetery, Czechs National Cemetery and Czech Presbyterian Cemetery;

 All charter members and current members of American Legion Pike-Wagner Post 2 and VFW Simek-Ptak Post 6895;

Tyndall High School graduates listed on the WW II Roll of Honor plaque still located in the school's original foyer;

5) Nineteen known Tyndall area veterans who died in service during declared wars; and

6) Nine known Tyndall area veterans who were prisoners of war.

The planning committee then mailed 700 letters to known service men and women (or known family members) who had at one time or still have Tyndall area roots. The addressees were invited to submit names of veterans they wished included with a suggested donation of \$50 per name to share the cost of inscription and building of the monuments.

Rather than risk placing veterans in a wrong category on the monument itself, the committee has chosen to list all names alphabetically. However, in this memorial book, names are listed by conflict with every effort to be correct. Because of space limitations, veterans (particularly career men) are listed in only one category even though their service time spanned many years. The intent remains to honor each equally for his or her service to the United States of America.

Because of good response to an invitation extended in the *Tyndall Tribune* in March 2001, several pages are devoted to stories and photos (heavily edited to fit limited space). Another source was WW II scrapbooks, one from the Legion Auxiliary files and another from Ruth Sutera Pinkley, which provided interesting clippings that had been printed mostly in the *Tyndall Tribune* in the mid-40s.


