

4 FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Dear friends.

We are seeing more sunshine, and it is heating up in Wisconsin! People choose lighter and less clothes which puts us at risk for skin damage from the sun. Guarding your skin from the sun is really something to stay on top of all year long, not just in the summer. It might seem cosmetic to use sunscreen, but it goes a lot deeper than that.

According to scientists, sun rays give off several different types of ultraviolet rays such as UVC, UVB and UVA. These special rays can cause skin aging, sunburns, and skin cancer. Three common types of skin cancer that we frequently hear about are basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma, and melanoma.



Basal cell carcinoma occurs in the lowest part of the skin's top layer. We hear about this cancer more often than the other skin cancers. It is the least aggressive and grows more slowly and develops in areas vulnerable to the sun. A person might find it on their head, neck, and face. So keep your eye out for patches that might look like a scar, or an itchy, red raised area of skin.

Squamous cell carcinoma occurs in the upper part of the skin's top layer. Like basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma often can form in areas that are exposed to the sun, such as your face, neck and lips. This type of skin cancer can look like a red, scaly patch, an open sore, or a brown spot like an age spot.

Melanoma cancer is the most aggressive form of skin cancer and has a high risk of spreading. Melanoma forms in skin cells that produce melanin, which regulate skin pigmentation. This type of skin cancer is usually found on the head, neck, face, chest, back, and legs. Melanoma can look like a dark mole, freckle or lighter color like a cyst.

A good tip for evaluating any suspicious changes in your skin is to consider their features according to the ABCDE list:

- ◆ Asymmetry Look for moles that are oddly shaped or show a different shape on each side of the mole.
- ◆ Border irregularity If the edges of a mole are ragged or blurred, or its coloration has spread into nearby skin, have it checked by a dermatologist.
- ◆ Color variation Sometimes, a melanoma may show multiple shades of the same color (typically brown), or it may look mottled, with areas of white, gray, red, pink or blue.
- ◆ Diameter Although melanomas can be smaller, most are at least a quarter inch in diameter, or larger than a pea.
- ◆ Evolving characteristics Consult with a dermatologist if a mole changes size, shape or color over the course of a few weeks or months

Enjoy the sunny weather but avoid direct sunlight for long periods of time, especially mid-day hours, protect your skin with good sunscreen, reapply every 1 -2 hours after sweating or swimming, wear a wide brim hat outside and do self-exams monthly looking for any new changes in your moles. See your dermatologist yearly for a quick skin check.


