2 CONTINUED FROM COVER - FALL PLANS

Sundays: We will begin with one service on Sundays, at 9:00 a.m. This will be followed at 10:15 a.m. by Sunday school for all ages (assuming we have the volunteers to make it happen). When our average attendance at 9:00 a.m. worship reaches around 75, we will begin to make plans to add a second service at 10:30 a.m. Hmm.... Did you catch that? Sunday school begins at 10:15 and the second worship service would begin at 10:30? Yep! This is one of the 'new things'. Around 11:15 a.m., Sunday school children and youth will be escorted upstairs to join their parents for the Eucharist (communion) and the end of worship. (We may even work in a children's sermon during that time.)

Wednesdays are the BIG 'new thing'! We are calling them "Wednesdays with Jesus", and the plan is to begin with a simple meal in the Fellowship Hall, from 5:30-6:15 p.m. (There will be a small charge for this - to be determined.). From 6:15 - 7:00 p.m., we will have contemporary worship in the sanctuary. From 7:00 - 7:50 p.m., we hope to offer multiple options: Confirmation, Choir, Adult Bible Study and Homework Help. At 7:50 p.m. we will gather in the sanctuary to give thanks for the day and send everyone home with God's blessing.

What about Saturday evening worship? It is still under discussion, but with just one pastor, it is a challenge. For now, the hope is that the contemporary worship on Wednesday evenings will reach our contemporary-leaning members. (If you are concerned, please talk with council members.)

Our Come Together Day is Sunday, September 12. Come Together for worship. Come Together for Faith Growth - Sunday school for children and youth, Faith Growth for youth and adults. And stick around to Come Together for a picnic (following Covid-19 precautions) and a special Come Together Beatles concert offered by our own Kerry Bieneman and a group of her talented musical colleagues.

Come Together - you are part of this faith community, and now is the time to be part of all that God is making new in this place.



You know the Sunday school song: I am the church, you are the church, we are the church together....

In the early church, the disciples and followers of Jesus banded together for ministry: to worship, to care for each other, to teach about Jesus, and to care for the community around them. There were no pastors, no paid staff members to make sure the newsletter went out, no youth directors: just the people of God, working together, committed to being God's hands and feet where they were.

With a staff to keep things running at church, sometimes folks assume that "all I have to do is show up and take advantage of all the opportunities here." That is a nice thought, but it just doesn't work that way. **We are the church together.** That means, if we are going to have a vibrant ministry - good worship, engaging Sunday school for our children, youth and adults, care and service inside and outside our walls - we all have to be part of it. We all have to step up to offer our gifts and help.

This fall, we are doing a "reboot" of our ministries. As you read above, there is lots going on. But it will take *you* and me and he and she and we to pull it off. Next week you will receive a link to a Ministry-Wise Sign Up site. There, you can sign up to help in many ways: serving for worship on Sunday or Wednesday, helping with Sunday school, helping with food on Wednesday evening, or being a homework angel, or making sandwiches for God's Kitchen of Kenosha (see Ministry of the Month on last page), or... (To prepare - check out Jodi's Sunday School page and see where you can help.)

People keep asking me, "Pastor, is Lord of Life going to make it?" My response is, "It will, if you respond to God's call to being part of 'making it.' God bless you as you use your gifts in this place!

MOVING FORWARD UPDATE



Since last March, twenty-five people have been working diligently in the *Moving Forward Process*. They have looked into the recent and past history of the congregation, into the community, and to the future, with the purpose of discerning God's mission and future direction for the congregation, what potential stumbling blocks might be, and how to prepare to move into God's future.

This week, they are finalizing their reports and submitting them to the council. The council, along with representatives from each of the workgroups, will study the reports in preparation to meet in retreat later in August. During the retreat, they will clarify their understanding of Lord of Life's mission, put together a draft fo the *Ministry Site Profile*, and gather other information that they identify as crucial for the call committee to consider when they begin meeting and interviewing pastoral candidates.

On September 8, the draft *Ministry Site Profile* will be sent out with the Wednesday email. During Sunday school on September 12 & 19 (10:15 a.m.) and at 6:30 p.m. on September 15, you will have an opportunity to ask questions and discuss it. The council will take your comments, and develop the final *Ministry Site Profile* that will be sent to the Greater Milwaukee Synod at the beginning of October. Bishop Paul Erickson will be with us for a Town Hall Meeting on Sunday, October 24 to review the *Ministry Site Profile*, and formally accept it.

During September, the Council will be collecting names of people who are interested in serving on the Call Committee. Watch for further information.

What about Covid-19?

Hopes were high last spring! With the release of the vaccines, it looked as if we might get closer to normal. Unfortunately, with only about half of the population vaccinated, and with children not yet able to receive the vaccine, the risk of contracting and transmitting the virus - especially the Delta variant - remains significant.

The Covid Task Force has developed the following guidelines:

- Masks will be worn in the sanctuary during worship until the COVID infection daily rate is 2 per 100,000 for 2 consecutive weeks. If the rate rises in the future mask wearing will be reinstated.
- Masks will continue for the unvaccinated and children younger than 12 years old until further notice.
- Hymnal usage will may be resumed.
- Singing by worship leaders and congregation permitted.
- o Individual communion elements (no baggies). Collection by ushers.
- o Physical distancing in the pews continues.

Lord of Life has purchased several air purifiers, which we primarily used in the sanctuary, and will be used in Sunday school areas this fall. These offer another layer of protection.

As Christians, we continue to prioritize love of neighbor - even when this is challenging. Thank you for your faithfulness and love of neighbor.

Wearing a mask is an easy way to keep everyone safe, especially when children who are not yet eligible to be vaccinated, are in our midst and the Delta variant is running rampant. Therefore, at this time, we will continue to require that masks be worn, with the exception of when consuming the communion elements.

Bring a lawn chair and keep some distance between other family units or individuals. Masks are not required for our outdoor worship.

(If weather prevents us from meeting outdoors, we will move inside to the sanctuary, with masks required.)

Hello Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It is my pleasure to bring you good news about our restart from the pandemic. As you all may have noticed, our sign out in front of the church has LED panels that are out. The original panels are beyond warranty and can only be replaced. We have been shopping for replacements and they are all coming in with quotes around \$20,000, which will actually be a full color display. This is our most outward facing part of our property that communicates to our neighbors what we are doing and at what times. In the hopes that we can reach out and serve our neighbors better, we have received a faith filled donation of \$10,000 to help replace the panels. We are extending this stewardship



opportunity to all of you to help. We do have some funds from Memorial and Scrip to go toward this major repair and we are still about \$6,000 short. God has graced us all with his abundance so that we can share. This is an opportunity for you to share with your Lord of Life family and our neighbors as well. Please prayerfully consider making a contribution. You can send it directly to the church office or place an envelope marked in the offering basket.





July 13, 2021 Meeting Minutes

- Two of our members whose terms just ended also attended the meeting and they, along with the continuing council members, spent time sharing their thoughts on serving on Council for the new Council members. Some highlights of things shared are; "felt called to step up", We need to be ready to step up and pull hard to those that are not here.", and "expect the unexpected...nobody told us we would be doing this during a pandemic."
- Pastor Carol then led a devotion on Romans 5:5, "hope does not disappoint" and asked each person to share where they saw hope. Some responses were; "increasing number of people around here and people being ready to act", "recovery from the pandemic", and "At some point people will start to feel that they "need" to be in person and BE with others.". Pastor Carol shared that she is hopeful that the spirit continues to work and that what will come is going to be beyond creative and beyond what we can imagine.
- The election of officers was held, with the result of Tanya Brady serving as President, Russ Brewer as Vice President, Lori Vogel continuing as Secretary, and Brian Lynch continuing as Treasurer. Lynn Kancian, Lisa McCarthy, and Rhiannon Urso will serve as at-large members. We thank them all for their leadership and dedication.
- Discussion was held, and a motion made and passed, to purchase five air purifier units to be used throughout the building. These units use ActivePure technology, which continuously disinfects surface and air contaminants. This technology
 currently is used in the International Space Station, the Ground Zero Memorial, the Cleveland Clinic, homes, offices and
 churches. For further information about this technology, visit www.clearrails.com.
- The replacement of the sign display was discussed at a previous meeting and it was shared that we have received a \$10,000 donation to be put towards this project. The four quotes received are all approximately \$20,000. Council approved approaching the Memorial Team for \$2,000 of memorial funds to be put towards this project and another \$2,000-\$3,000 will be used from Scrip profits. The remaining \$5,000-\$6,000 will be raised by a special fund drive. More information will be in the August newsletter.
- Much discussion was held regarding our fall programming and plans. Staff and ministry leaders will continue to finalize the plans and announce them in the August newsletter.
- Discussion was held on some of our ministry teams that need leadership. Russ Brewer volunteered to lead the Stewardship team and Tanya will approach some suggested names regarding leading the Property Team.
- Council reviewed and approved an addendum to Pastor Carol's contract, which goes through the end of the year. As
 previously agreed upon, her status and salary will move to full time beginning in September, for the remainder of the
 year.

The September newsletter will have more information about a family worship experience we'll hold the first Sunday of each month, beginning October 1st.



This class offered to children beginning in 4th grade, to younger children whose parents feel their child is ready to receive the gifts of communion, or to older children who may have never attended the class, especially our 5th graders, who missed this class last year. At least one parent or sponsor must attend the class with their child.

7 FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Dear Friends,

Viral hepatitis is a global killer which claims the lives of 1.4 million people annually, more than HIV/AIDS or malaria. Yet most people living with the disease do not know they are infected! Hepatitis can be prevented and treated, so it pays to know more about this disease and be proactive.

Hepatitis is an inflammation of the liver. The condition can be self-limiting or can progress to fibrosis (scarring), cirrhosis or liver cancer. Hepatitis viruses are the most common cause of hepatitis in the world but other infections, toxic substances (e.g., alcohol, certain drugs), and autoimmune diseases can also cause hepatitis.



There are five types of hepatitis viruses:

Hepatitis A virus (HAV) is present in the feces of an infected person and is most often transmitted when we eat contaminated food or water. There is a vaccination for hepatitis A and the body is often able to clear this infection by itself within a few weeks.

Hepatitis B virus (HBV)is transmitted when we are exposed to infected blood and other body fluids. Hepatitis B can also be transmitted from mother to infants at the time of birth or early childhood. There is a vaccination that can prevent infection of hepatitis B as well as drugs available for treatment.

Hepatitis C virus (HCV) is usually transmitted through exposure of infected blood through transfusions of contaminated blood or through contaminated injections with needles. While there is no vaccine for hepatitis C, there are medications that can eliminate the virus.

Hepatitis D virus (HDV) infections occur only in those who are infected with HBV. The dual infection of HDV and HBV can result in a more serious disease and worse outcome. Hepatitis B vaccines provide protection from HDV infection.

Hepatitis E virus (HEV) is mostly transmitted through consumption of contaminated water or food. HEV is a common cause of hepatitis outbreaks in developing parts of the world and is increasingly recognized as an important cause of disease in developed countries. Safe and effective vaccines to prevent HEV infection have been developed but are not widely available.



All forms of hepatitis can be prevented with education. Prevention begins with lifestyle changes to avoid contraction of hepatitis B and C, since they are spread through contact with blood or bodily fluids of people who are already infected with the virus.

Each year an estimated 30 million travelers visit destinations that are considered highrisk for hepatitis A and B. Hepatitis A and B are the most common vaccine-preventable diseases in travelers, affecting more than 280,000 Americans.

The good news is that in addition to getting the two vaccines separately, there is a combination vaccine that safely and effectively prevents both potentially fatal diseases. This vaccine will reduce the number of shots needed to protect against both diseases from five to only three.

When we opened for worship in the sanctuary, we loved seeing our faithful raving fans. But, if you would come to the service and look around, you will also notice some faces missing.

A year ago I was making many phone calls and checking in with our congregation. We also had a volunteer team that made weekly phone calls. Back then, we heard the extreme opinions of people ready to go back to church at any cost and those who are not planning to come back for quite some time. I recently talked with someone who thought our church was closing! I am reminded that what we communicate represents Jesus and the gospel. It's common for humans to get caught up in personal feelings, opinions, and politics. However, as Christian leaders, it's vital to think about reopening from each layer by considering every ministry and how they'll be affected.

As I continue to make calls and emails, there are many families who will be honest and tell me that they need to get their families back to the church routine. And many admit that they kinda have gotten used to their Sunday morning's with their hot coffee and eating breakfast with their family. They are just exhausted with the weekly running out the door and that a "stay at home Sunday" is a breath of fresh air. I get that, I had three children too. They are now adults and they were brought up in church, just like I was. I pray that I have laid a foundation and continue to do my job as a parent to teach about church and community. I pray with every ounce of me that when they have kids, they will be bringing them to church too. It is how we get through life... to learn, explore and see God every day. Sunday is our recharge for the week...

I found an interesting article from Church Fuel about a recent Gallop Study that has found American's mental health ratings to have sunk to a new low.

Across the board, people report that they are doing worse this year compared to last year. It's the worst it's been at any point over the last two decades, with a nine-point drop from last year to this year. This didn't surprise me one bit.

HOWEVER...The ONLY group doing better?

People who attend religious services weekly.

Let this sink in for a minute.

- ◆ Men say they are doing worse.
- ◆ Women say they are doing worse.
- ◆ Republicans say their mental health is down.
- ◆ Democrats say the same thing.
- Marital status and income...all down.



But those who attend a religious service weekly have experienced a 4 percentage point INCREASE.

I'm convinced one of the reasons for this is the need for community of church gatherings. Church isn't just where we worship...it's where we worship together. Church isn't just where we pray...it's where we pray together.

No, our beautiful church is not closing, but we will need everyone's help to get everyone back! Our fall worship, Christian education, and serving our community has been planned out with lots of opportunities needing YOU! Please sign up to help and serve.
