2024 Annual Congregational Meeting



On Sunday, January 28th immediately after worship, we will gather for our annual congregational meeting. The agenda of this meeting includes:

- Approval of the 2024 operating budget (The draft budget will be shared prior to the meeting.)
- Nominate and approve members for two opportunities to serve Lord of Life:
 - Nominating Team, whose job is to seek out leaders to serve on our Congregational Council, to be elected at the June congregational meeting. This team typically consists of three people, one of whom is an outgoing Council member.
 - o Delegates to represent Lord of Life at the 2024 Greater Milwaukee Synod Assembly, to be held May 17th and 18th at the Italian Community Center in Milwaukee. The Synod Assembly is the annual synod gathering in which nominated representatives of congregations meet to vote on Synod business issues, and gather to worship and pray and celebrate our ministry together. Registration fees, which include meals, are covered by Lord of Life. Every congregation is allowed to send three voting members of any age, and may send a fourth member if that person is 30 years old or younger on the day they are elected.

The attendance and input of all voting members at annual congregational meetings are very important, so we encourage you to attend.



Following the meeting we will gather in Fellowship Hall for a potluck brunch. Please bring a dish to pass and join us for a time of food and fellowship to celebrate the new year.





4 FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Dear Friends,

It is no secret that cracking into the ideas and feelings of a teenager can be a challenge at times. Emotional check-ins are an important way for parents to support the mental health of their children. Good communication about mental health between parents and teens can help parents get an idea about what is going well, recognize and work on any problems, teach approaches for handling stress and complicated situations.

If you are stressed and wondering how to start these types of discussions with your teen, you are not alone. There is no secret formula. Go ahead and ask your teen. If your questions are met with apprehension or snarky comments, remain calm and explain why you are asking. Stating your feelings openly is a great way to model the type of dialog you pursue to have with your teen.

Here are a few tips to get you started:

- ◆ Be patient. Take it slow, don't push too much. Some teens find it uncomfortable at first. Follow their signs about how much they want to share at first.
- → Short conversation is still helpful. Some teens will reveal and tell lots of details while others will give brief conversations. Brief updates might give enough information. If your teen is toiling or at risk of having a problem, be more persistent for safety and well-being.
- ◆ Do not give up. Asking questions shows support and this alone can make a difference. Sometimes asking the teen how you could better communicate can be a productive conversation. Effort means something and overtime will hopefully result in improved communication.
- Find the appropriate time. Check in times for parents and teens differ. Look at the flow of your day and what might work. Find time when you are not distracted and can be alone with your
 - teen. Consider asking your teen what time works for them.
 - ◆ Make observations. When you are feeling concern for your teen, try using specific examples of what you observe. Take a curious calm approach which might be less confrontational and get a better response from your teen. This also is a good example for your teen as they learn to reflect on their own behavior.
 - * Success is relative. Your teen is not going to share everything with you, but you are moving in the right direction with communication. Getting a teacher or therapist involved might even be a part of the communication that is requested.

It can be a challenge to get communication going with your teen. It is very important to support your teen during this chaotic developmental period in their life. When you ask, you communicate that you care. That message is always important and does make a transformation.

May the Lord bless and keep you as you strengthen your communication in your families.
