


WELCOME NEW COUNCIL MEMBERS!





- Sonja Wolfe recognized and thanked outgoing council members Sue Schmidt-Decker, Rich Walasek, and Don Estes. Joe Nosalik was appointed in March to complete a term vacated by another individual, and that term also ended.
- Don Estes shared a report from the Nominating Team, including the names of the three people who wished to be considered for nomination. Those people were Brian Lynch, Joe Nosalik, and Kathi Strott. Nominations were needed from the floor for the fourth open position. Gary Kovacs declined a nomination made by another person and Liz Young and Doug Kancian accepted nominations made by others. Ballots were distributed to each voting member present with the instructions to write down four names. The names of the five nominees were shared on the overhead projector. Elected were Brian Lynch, Joe Nosalik, Kathi Strott and Liz Young.
- Moving on to New Business, John Meyer shared some information about the Zeidler Center for Public Discussion and how they will be guiding us through the process of planning and visioning as to where God is calling us to go and what to be as a Congregation. They will work with a Planning Committee made up of Lord of Life congregation members and council members.
- No other new business was discussed and the meeting was adjourned.



experienced God the most was on Thursday when we went to a garden [Focus on Youth] that helps the homeless youth that live in Oregon so that they have healthy food to eat."




"My week in

7 FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Dear Friends,

The sun is shining and we are enjoying the lovely weather. July has been deemed UV safety month which makes sense as we feel the rays. I would like to focus on eye health and the sun. The eye occupies less than 2% of the whole body surface area, but it represents the sole organ system to allow the penetration of visible light deep into the human being. Professional caregivers are suggesting that people in their early and older years should be guarding their eyes to preserve vision. UV light from the sun raises the risks of eye disease, including cataracts, growths on the eye, and cancer.



People in their teens and twenties are developing growths on their eyes, such as pterygium, a pinkish, triangular tissue growth on the cornea of the eye. These are found especially in skiers, farmers, outdoor game spectators, beach lovers, those that enjoy fishing, and those that spend long hours in the mid-day sun or by UV-intense environments found by water or the mountains.



Cataracts and eye cancers take some time to mature, but each time we are in the sun without protection, we are increasing our risks for disorders of the eye. We need to put hats and sunglasses on our babies and children as well as ourselves when outdoors.

Here are a few tips to protect our eyes:

- Never look directly at the sun, even during an eclipse. You could develop solar retinopathy which is damage to the retina.
- Don't let cloudy days take your guard down. Sun rays can pass through fog and clouds.
- Wear UV-blocking sunglasses and broad brimmed hats whenever outside.
- Remember don't forget the kids or your older family members. Protect their eyes with hats and sunglasses.
- Exercising and eating a diet rich in a variety of vegetables and fruits can protect against blinding eye diseases such as glaucoma and age related macular degeneration.
- Get regular eye exams so you can catch any issues early. The American Academy of Ophthalmology recommends adults under age 40 have a comprehensive medical eye exam every five to ten years. Those of us over 40 years of age should get checked more frequently according to whether you wear glasses or need glasses. ©
- Look for a pair of sunglasses specifically designed for UV eye protection that are rated UV400 or higher: that means they'll block 99.9% of UV rays. Lenses should be polarized, to help neutralize harmful glare.
- Photochromic lenses are an excellent choice for sun protection outdoors if you need corrective lenses.

Enjoy your summer and remember to keep your eyes safe from the sun!


Women's Retreat Reflections



PASTOR'S MESSAGE

One Year of Ministry

Last year, on July 8th, I was ordained as a Minister of Word and Sacrament within the Greater Milwaukee Synod of the ELCA. One year ago, this congregation called me to serve as one of your pastors. As I celebrate a year of pastor ministry, it seems like a good time to reflect on this past year and look ahead to where God is calling!

Just one year...and yet, so much has happened. After my ordination, one of my first Lord of Life events was attending the Youth Kick-Off over at the Klimisch's. Let me tell you...here at Lord of Life, a great way to make a lasting impression is to lead with your youth! They are remarkable, a lot of fun, and a wonderful introduc-



tion to the openness and inclusion which are cornerstones of this congregation! In the weeks that followed, I met over coffee and meals with council and leadership team members, couples and families, and so many more. I also got to know the staff and the many gifts of Angie, Connie, Jodi, and Sue. Even with the challenges of the call process, I was welcomed, supported, and empowered.

Fast forward to a year later, and we look back on a year full of ups and downs, blessings and challenges. The Children, Youth, and Family Ministries explored some new and dynamic ways of reaching out to our young people and their families. We intentionally sought to create a place for young adults to feel welcomed and included within our ministry. And several adults have discovered the joy of connecting with the children and youth by participating in our Cross+Generational Ministry events, like God's Work Our Hands Weekend, the Christmas Proclamation and the Guys' Retreat.

Yet, difficulties within the congregation have been a part of my call since the beginning, as well: a decline in members, a decline in financial giving, and a decline in volunteers. Unable to truly afford a second pastor, four months into this call, I was cut down to 80%, only to need to be restored two-months later, because our senior pastor had resigned. Unexpectedly, I had to transition from a role as the Associate Pastor to the role of a Solo Pastor. However, even in the midst of these challenges, God has been at work. The pastors of Kenosha came together to support the collaborative Good Friday community service and members of the congregation stepped up to share their stories for the Good Friday evening service. Leah Holloway was able to contribute in a very meaningful way to the powerful services of Holy Week and Easter. Our Council remained dedicated in service, meeting 5 times in 8 weeks and leading three congregational meetings so far this year. And in May, we welcomed 13 new individuals and families into our Lord of Life family. This month, we celebrate a year in our ministry together and it has been a rollercoaster of a journey. It's not what any of us could have expected or planned for, but we made it...one whole year, together.

As I reflect on my experience, I invite you to stop and think about this past year, as well. What has been your experience? What has been your role in helping to create a faith-filled experience for others? I am so happy to be part of the Lord of Life family, and I am excited to discern where God is calling this congregation in the coming year. As I step into new responsibilities as the solo pastor of this congregation, I invite you to think about ways to get more involved this coming church year. How can you more fully participate in all that Lord of Life has to offer? How can you be more of a contributor and not just a consumer? I hope that you will join me this coming church year in challenging ourselves to explore our faith more deeply, engage in relationships more fully, and seek to experience God more intentionally!


