




We are led by love and inspired by grace to serve.

I hope this month's newsletter finds you well and having enjoyed a fun Summer!

In my travels within the Navy (and afterward), I have attended a LOT of different kinds of churches. Some Lutheran...some not...but all had things that needed to be done. That was always how I would pick a church. Yes, some of the reasoning of joining had to do with the Pastor and some with the people but, mostly, it was the opportunity to be involved and the work that God calls us to do that would bring me into the church (more than anything).

Volunteer organizations (like the church) can't get things done without people to do them. ALC mission group started

A new mission congregation of the American Lutheran Church is being organized on the northwest side of Kenosha by the Rev. Jack Ottoson, pastor/developer.

Ottoson has been serving English Lutheran Church in Chippewa Falls since 1980. He is a graduate of Wartburg Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa, and the University of Wisconsin-Platteville. Prior to entering seminary in 1976, Ottoson worked as a sales representativve for the Xerox Corp. Ottoson, a native of Rockford, Ill., moved to Kenosha recently with his wife and two children.

The steering committee of the new congregation, made up of members of St. Mary's Lutheran Church who live on the northwest side of Kenosha, held its first meeting Nov. 14 at 5108 Green Bay Road.

Ottoson said the group hopes to find a place of worship in the near future and to hold their first service in early 1985.

The new congregation is one of "50 more in '84," a special outreach in which 50 new congregations are being developed by the American Lutheran Church across the United States.

Ottoson said the congregation intends "to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ and to translate that message into greater service to neighbors and community.

What's in a name?

If you were to ask an ancient Hebrew that question, the answer would be -- EVERYTHING! To know someone's name was to not only know a label, but to know a name was to know the deeper essence of a person. The Old & New Testaments are filled with important naming events. The names of places like Sinai, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, and Jericho spoke of their history. The names of such people as Adam, Abraham, Israel, and Jesus spoke of God's activity among human kind.

Our mission church must have a name, too. The name we choose will be used when people in our community identify who we are, what we stand for and how we serve. It's no small thing. Many names have already been talked over. Be thinking of possible names for our new church. Be thinking of what our church should be. Be thinking -- "What's in a name?"

5 FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Dear Friends,

September has arrived, with school and activities that abound. Hopefully we will be packing healthy lunches and preparing meals that can be safely enjoyed. September is a month we raise up food safety as we get back to the rhythm of life. According to the CDC, 1 in 6 people (48 million) in the US get sick, 128,000 are hospitalized, and 3,000 die from eating contaminated food.

FOOD SAFETY EDUCATION MONTH

Here are a few thoughts to consider as you brush up on safe food handling.

- When you are baking your sweet treats such as cookies and cakes, remember to refrain from letting the young ones eat the raw dough and batter before baking. Harmful bacteria such as e-coli and salmonella can be found in raw flour and eggs.
- ◆ It is important to clean your refrigerator bins each month even if the bins only hold fruit and vegetables. Salmonella, Listeria, yeast, and mold can be present in our bins. Clean the produce bin using a solution using a solution of 1 Tablespoon of unscented liquid chlorine bleach in one gallon of water. Air dry or pat dry with clean paper towels.
- ◆ Don't let an open food pouch sit out too long. Throw it away if it comes home opened from a lunch box. If it was recently opened at home put it in the fridge if your child didn't eat it all but eat within 24 hours.
- Feeding your baby directly from a container or jar can increase the risk of food poisoning. Use a clean spoon to place baby food into a clean bowl. Refrigerate unserved portions of baby food after labeling it with the opening date. Leftover food should be used or thrown away within 3 days.
- ◆ Use an appliance thermometer to make sure your refrigerator is cooled to 40*F or below.
- ◆ Throw away perishable food that is left out all day. The fridge can slow the growth of bacteria in food but will not kill the bacteria. Bacteria can multiply rapidly in perishable food left at room temperature or in the 'danger zone' between 40*F and 140*F, which can make you and your loved ones sick.
- Even though you will be removing the firm skin and or rind of fresh produce before eating, wash it first by scrubbing with a clean brush gently under running water. Dry with a paper towel. There can be harmful bacteria on the outside of produce that can spread to the inside when you cut into the produce if not cleaned.
- Older children must be taught how to cook food properly and safely in the microwave. Simple 'heat and eat' meals come with instructions that need to be followed to ensure safe food. Always follow package directions that advise a "standing time" or rotating and stirring food. Know your microwave's wattage and use a digital food thermometer to ensure food has reached a safe internal temperature.

COUNCIL'S CORNER

August 13, 2024 Council Minutes

- Officer election was held—no change to positions:
 Russ President; Matt—Vice President; Ralph-Treasurer;
 Lori-Secretary; Tanya, Julie & Lynn—members at large.
- The need to have a handy-person, rather than just someone to clean was discussed. There are several things, especially wood work, that needs attention. Pastor Chip is meeting with the other pastors this week and will inquire what they do. Angie will also start researching.
- Angie shared that we have more age-related issues with our sprinkler system piping. It has developed multiple leaks, which were patched the day of the meeting, but actual replacement of pipe sections will be required.
- February 16, 1985 was the first worship service of the yet un-named mission development that became Lord of Life. That means we'll celebrate 40 years in 2025. We will plan a celebration and will start sharing historical mementos leading up to it.
- Job descriptions of the paid church staff will be reviewed and updated to make sure they align with the needs of the church. The pandemic changed some of the actual duties each staff person is performing, and those changes need to be reflected. Compensation will be reviewed with the upcoming budget planning.
- The Stewardship Team will meet at the end of August to begin preparing for a fall campaign. Planning for a debt reduction campaign in 2025 will also begin.
